NAYLAND WITH WISSINGTON PARISH COUNCIL

Meeting: 10th December 2008

PARKING

Nayland parish councillors have backed the idea of a parking restriction outside the doctors' surgery in Bear Street. Chairman Gerry Battye told the December meeting Suffolk county highways senior engineer Karen Smith had met him on site and seen the congestion outside the school and surgery that occurred daily. She had suggested a 20-metre stretch of double yellow lines on either side of the Harpers Estate junction and councillors agreed. Mr Battye said this would still allow blue badge holders to park and patients to be dropped or picked up. During a later discussion on planning applications members heard a plan to extend the surgery car park would create 18 parking places which would ease the parking situation if it was successful.

It was also agreed to have "bus boxes" marked on either side of Bear Street to prevent parking there. The council considered the new road surfaces in Gravel Hill, Court Street and Horkesley Road were "appalling" and a complaint is to be sent to the highways department.

A resident's request for white lines outside the driveway of his house opposite the school was rejected but members agreed a white line in Court Street should be extended outside the Anchor Inn opposite the entrance to Stour House.

DISTRICT COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

In his six-monthly report on Babergh Council's performance district councillor Richard Cave said its priorities included building quality affordable homes and creating a greener, cleaner and safer, healthier Babergh. The council had already built 386 affordable homes in a five-year period and was on target to reach the designated 655 by 2010. The recycling rate was up by 40 per cent and household waste down by 4 per cent. Waste collection direct savings totalled £140,000 a year.

Mr Cave reported a mixed performance over planning applications due the large turnover of staff. Overall, crime was down by four per cent and violent crime by 14 per cent but burglaries were up by ten per cent. He said neighbourhood watch wardens had been appointed in 17 parishes and the scheme was working well. Babergh had allocated £2 million to Hadleigh's leisure facilities and was also taking action to mitigate the effects of the economic downturn.

BOTTLE BANK

Mr Battye said for various reasons the parish council had never been able to find a suitable site for a bottle bank in the village and Mr Cave agreed to look into the issue again.

AFFORDABLE HOUSING

Tricia Fuller said a successful second meeting had been held to discuss the Wiston Road affordable housing site. It was attended by planner Graham Chamberlain who was amenable to several points suggested by the council. The architect would have revised plans ready for the next meeting in January. It was agreed to write to county councillor Selwyn Pryor about a possible footpath.

VILLAGE HALL

Reporting on the village hall, Rosemary Knox said although he no longer lived in the village Roger Mitcham was still a committee member and would continue as deputy licensee for the hall.

FINANCE

After hearing a report on the finance working party meeting councillors agreed to its recommendation to ask for a £31,900 precept for 2009-10, a 2.9 per cent increase on last year. Mr Battye said he felt the council needed to consider carrying forward more money in reserves to cater for capital renewal. He also suggested the finance group should meet again during the year to discuss strategic issues.

STREET LIGHTING

Clerk Debbie Hattrell said quotes for two new street lights in Fen Street and Newlands Lane/Church Lane had been agreed

but one resident in Church Lane could be affected by 'light spill' from the new design and it was decided to hold a site meeting before going further. CRIME

A report from Nayland's new PCSO Amanda Coleman said there was a burglary in Wiston Road overnight on November 17/18. Thefts of heating oil were a current problem and residents were urged to be vigilant.

PLANNING

Reviewing recent planning applications, Mr Battye said a plan to increase the number of caravans at Rushbanks Farm from ten to 16 and change seasonal opening hours had been refused.

The council had objected to an application for ten parking spaces at the former pig fattening unit at Harpers Hill Farm.

He said an eight-page letter had been received from Birch Fall resident Tony Mann concerning an application for change of use at 28 Harpers Estate from a house to a doctors' surgery and the extension of the surgery car park. Although Mr Mann did not object to the development in principle he was concerned about the adverse impact on the residential amenity of his property citing security and loss of privacy. The council had no objection to the change of use but agreed it would expect to see more detailed plans before the development went any further.

NAYLAND WITH WISSINGTON PARISH COUNCIL

Meeting: 14th January 2009

FOOTPATHS

A plan to re-align the well-used footpath at Wiston Mill is to be re-considered after Nayland Parish Council learned the cost of advertising the diversion in a local newspaper. The council had sought a diversion of the path, wrongly drawn on the definitive map, to its existing line so the wooden bridge could be repaired but at the January meeting members heard from Babergh's senior administrative officer the parish council bill for two insertions in the Suffolk Free Press of the application to divert the path would be £650. The county council would meet the cost of replacing the bridge over the mill lade. Clerk Debbie Hattrell said when the earlier decision was made the council knew there would be a £400 administrative fee but chairman Gerry Battye commented a £1,000 bill had not been budgeted for.

Tibby Mimpriss felt the heavily used footpath was something the council should finance and stressed the wooden bridge was extremely dangerous. She agreed to speak to the landowner who had said he would make a donation towards costs.

WHITE HART

The council heard the future of the White Hart was being considered following its closure on December 31. A letter from planning and development consultants acting for owners lan and Christine Altug said they had regretfully decided to close the premises following decreasing trade over recent months. The business had only broken even one year in 14 years of trading and it was no longer possible to subsidise it. With the recent economic downturn and no hope of improvement the decision had been taken to ensure no further losses. The couple were now considering an appropriate alternative use for the building and wished to consult the council in advance of any firm proposals for change of use.

VILLAGE HALL

Reporting on the village hall Rosemary Knox said its financial situation was perfectly reasonable and there had been no fall-off in bookings.

The committee hoped the new drum kit bought with a grant by the youth club would give its members something to concentrate on and use up their considerable energies.

STREET LIGHTING

The council agreed a new street light at Newlands Lane/ Church Lane should go ahead, if necessary fitting a rear baffle to avoid light spillage. It was pointed out a unit at the start of Wiston Road was still not working and the matter would be followed up. A Bear Street resident will be contacted again over a tree branch in her garden overhanging a neighbouring street lamp. Mrs Hattrell was asked to draw up a table of street lights throughout the village so members could keep track of them.

FIRE SERVICE

Responding to Suffolk Fire and Rescue Service's draft fire action plan consultation, the council felt the objective of supplying sprinkler systems in affordable housing was not feasible. Members said finance for affordable homes was restricted and if developers were told to provide domestic sprinkler systems funding could be withdrawn. They did not feel the action was viable and would not justify county council resources. The council was pleased the county authority had set up a panel to look at the effectiveness of the retained fire service.

PARKING

Mrs Hattrell said she had heard from the county a marker pole would be necessary in Bear Street where there were 'bus stop' road markings and it was agreed to ask for a pole to be placed on the grass verge. There was no further discussion over possible yellow lines in Bear Street though Mr Battye said he had received complaints from residents disappointed they were not getting white H lines outside their driveways to prevent motorists blocking them. He added the council was concerned about the situation and would be interested to receive documentary evidence with times of day and duration. With increased surgery hours and extra activities at the school he said the parking problem there would not go away. The area would be monitored over the next month and the matter discussed again at the next meeting.

HIGHWAYS

Responding to the council's complaints about the new road surfaces in Gravel Hill, Court Street and Horkesley Road, a letter from the county's western highways manager Jim Nunn said the main reason for the failure was the use of a new piece of equipment and contractors would carry out remedial work in the summer. The department always tried to coordinate roadworks but with hundreds of miles of road to manage defects did not show up until afterwards. Mary George pointed out contractors who repaired potholes in Court Street had also poured tar over some manhole covers.

PLANNING

Reviewing recent planning applications Mr Battye said a plan for ten parking places at the former pig fattening unit at Harpers Hill Farm had been granted. The council had no objection to an application to convert a stable to a workshop at 3 Fox Cottages, Wiston, provided it was not used for business and was always linked to the house.

DISTRICT COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

In his report district councillor Richard Cave said the local government review had been postponed and the Boundary Committee report would be published on February 13, followed by a four-week consultation.

Babergh members were currently concentrating on the rate of council tax increase which was unlikely to be below 3.5 per cent.

He also explained the work of the Suffolk Strategic Partnership which has 42 members representing organisations throughout the county. The SSP revolved around nine delivery partnerships, multi-agency teams responsible for the delivery of strategy and appropriate local authority targets, and was the core of local government activity in Suffolk.

IN BRIEF

Councillors were invited to attend a meeting organised by the Suffolk Project Manager for London 2012 at Stowmarket on February 9 with the object of maximising tourism and promoting other opportunities in the county provided by the Olympiad and Paralympics.

It was agreed to investigate whether a site for non-hazardous waste at Layham Quarry would have any possible implication for Nayland.

Two crimes reported in November were a motorist with excess alcohol in Bear Street on November 1 and the theft of copper piping from Wiston Road premises on November 17.

The annual parish assembly will be held on Monday, April 27.

Societies were asked to go back to their members and ask if they wanted the Christmas Bazaar to continue and to report back at the AGM on 9 March.

If it is agreed to continue this tradition ideas for making it a bigger and better village festivity would be welcome.

Members were grateful to Tricia Hall for organising the event, and to Santa and his elfin.

CHRISTMAS TREE

The meeting expressed its appreciation to Claire Prescott and her team who had organised a marvellous village Chistmas tree and to Roy Chapman and Sons for the electricity supply. **BONFIRE**

It was reported that David George had cleared up the glass from the vicinity of the lower goalpost.

BABERGH COMMUNITY ACHIEVEMENT AWARD

The meeting expressed its delight that Olive Noakes had been given this award for managing all the floral decorations in the church for so many years. The presentation will be held on 4 March at the Stoke by Nayland Golf Club.

CONSTABLE 200

The 200th anniversary of the Constable painting in St James is in 2010. Members felt a celebration to mark this occasion would be the concern of the PCC and the Church but the Community Council would give support if required.

TREASURERS REPORT

In the absence of Bryan Smith, Alan Hodges read a written financial report which concluded that the Community Council currently have unencumbered assets of £12,129.

COMMUNITY TIMES

At this time there is no evidence of loss of advertising caused by two commercial magazines and the Community Council was pleased that the village was giving its full support to their own newsletter and rejecting the interlopers. Following a suggestion at the meeting Lorraine Brooks agreed to include a free small advertisements column for residents for items under £50.

VILLAGE CALENDAR 2010

The sub-committee of Hazel Gardiner, Wendy Sparrow, Chris Hunt, Lorraine Brooks, Jenny Smith and Alan Hodges reported on progress of the project.

A competition would be held to generate 13 photographs; one for each month and one for the front cover. For each month a corresponding old photograph and small piece of text would also be included which will be organised by Wendy.

The closing date for entry for the competition would be 25 April, with judging taking place on Bank Holiday Monday 4 May. This would enable calendars to be available for sale in August.

The Community Council agreed to cover costs of the project and incidentals such as hire of the Church Hall for judging until such time as income was made. Hazel reported that in addition to sale of the calendars income would come from sponsors for which there was already interest, .

Chris outlined submission criteria of photographs for the competition. They must be 7" x 5" landscape colour prints which were not digitally enhanced. They would be submitted, with a completed application form, in an envelope into the Community Times box situated in the Post Office. The subcommittee would mount them for display and judging.

It was agreed that the number of entries be restricted to a maximum of five per household. The competition was open only to residents of the Nayland with Wissington Parish.

Geoff Meadowcroft would lead the team of judges. Lorraine

Brooks was nominated as the CC representative.

There was a discussion regarding situations where permission of people appearing in the photographs may be required. This would be investigated and the Sub-committee was delegated the task of making a final decision. Steve Maguire would look at the legal aspects and Hazel would seek advice from the printers.

VILLAGE TRANSITION MOVEMENT

Will Hitchcock put forward his ideas of a Village Transition Movement. He explained there was already a movement in Lavenham and in many other places in UK. This gave people who were concerned about what is happening to the planet an opportunity to make a contribution to changing things. The aim was to encourage consumption of locally produced foods, use of cleaner transport, increase re-cycling, increase biodiversity, improve sustainability, reduce energy consumption, increase clean energy production.

It was recognised that many different groups were already touching on this and there were projects within the School.

The meeting agreed to support the idea. Will agreed to recruit interested parties and organise an awareness raising event to test the interest. Steve Maguire agreed to assist. The Community Council would help financially by paying for a meeting venue.

SOCIETY REPORTS

CONSERVATION SOCIETY: Jill Badman said their AGM would be on 10 March. The speaker was Richard Ward, Suffolk Preservation Society on 'Affordable and Sustainable housing for Suffolk'. Open Gardens would be on 14 June.

HORTSOC: Sylvia Bond reported a successful Christmas Bazaar. Their AGM would be held on 14 April and the Morning Market on 16 May. She added that she and Lorraine were sharing secretarial duties.

BOWLS: Sylvia Bond said the Club in not happy with its form at present as they are currently in the second half of the division.

WOMENS INSTITUTE: Mary Bull said that at their next meeting Francis Lamb from 'Josephine' would be their speaker on 'World of Interiors'.

ROYAL BRITISH LEGION: Andrew Gown recalled a fantastic joint Christmas party.

VILLAGE PLAYERS: Alan Hodges was pleased to say their pantomime had been a huge success with over 700 attending. It had been their most ambitious production with the largest crew and cast and the first production to have been written by members. Preparations are in hand for their production, 'Party Piece' on 26-28 March and 'Oliver' for November.

VILLAGE HALL: Iain Wright invited everyone to go along to the AGM on 2 February at 7pm where they could all have their say about what they want from the Hall. He added very generous donations had been received. This helps ensure the long term future of the Hall which could not be secured by lettings income alone.

CHOIR: Their next performance on 21 March in St James church would be 'Rutter's Magnificat'.

VILLAGE HALL CINEMA: Alan Hodges said the cinema evenings were being relaunched with a showing of 'Mamma Mia' on 30 January, then 'The Edge of Love' on 20 February. VILLAGE QUIZ

His popular stage plays include the comedies 'Outside Edge' and 'Stepping Out' but a large body of his work is on drama and crime for television. Beside assorted individual episodes he was largely responsible for the first series of both 'A Touch of Frost' and 'The Last Detective'. It is the influence of this television work that becomes evident in his situation comedy stage plays, of which 'Party Piece' is a fine example. Written in 1990, it is set in the adjacent back gardens of a pair of terraced houses in south west London. The two houses are owned by a widow in her late sixties, Mrs Hinson and young doctor and his wife, Michael and Roma. Having recently acquired their property Michael and Roma are now preparing for a house-warming party with barbeque to which many guests have been invited. Internal friction within each household rises with the tensions in preparing for the party on the one hand and the efforts of Mrs Hinson's son and daughter-in-law to persuade her to sell her house and move into a self contained flat, on the other. Guests ring to cancel, the barbeque is reluctant, neighbours become irate over occupied street parking spaces and that is only in the first act. The intermingling of the two groups over and then around the garden fence results in a very funny, fast moving and action packed play.

OVER 60s LUNCHEONS

As one of those elderly people who regularly go to the Over 60s lunch once a month may I echo the thanks that all of us have for Mrs Olga Alexander and her band of workers.

Although the Village Hall showed a loss on the year of about £3000; this should been seen in the context of the one off expenditure to repair the roof, refurbish the internal hall lights and to decorate the foyer. Bookings were slightly down and day to day maintenance slightly up. The money received from hiring will never cover the full costs of running the hall and we do need to undertake additional fundraising to keep our books in balance. We are very grateful to everybody who has supported our fundraising particularly the Carpet Bowls, Country and Western, the attendees at the cinema and village lunches and the purchasers from our plant stall and most of all to the societies that use our Hall. Thank you all very much.

TREASURER'S REPORT

Garden Notes

Well, we didn't quite manage a white Christmas, but the squirrels weren't all that far out in their predictions, and we certainly got some cold weather with possibly more to come. Bearing in mind, however, that this article is not supposed to be about meteorology, but rather horticulture the OM/S will not digress further.

If the weather warms up a bit we shall soon be seeing the usual Aconites and Snowdrops, as well as the Algerian Iris, I. Unguicularis (previously known as I. Stylosa). The latter is a really undemanding plant, flourishing in poor soil and quite happy providing it has a bit of sun during summer to ripen its tubers. Add the Sarcococcas, (see last Decembers N.C.T.) Viburnum Tinus (Laurustinus) and V. Bodnantense and Fragrans, and it should be possible to produce quite a bit of flower and scent in an unpromising season of the year.

In recent years some slightly tender plants such as Fuchsias have come through the winter without suffering much frost damage, though looking pretty scruffy and needing to be cut down. This year they and their kind have already shrivelled, but the dead stems will provide protection to the crowns, and are best left until spring, when they can be tidied up.

The OM/S, always a sucker for bargains, recently bought some Crocuses and Narcissi at about one fifth of their normal prices. Provided that the corms and bulbs are not shrivelled and already producing long green shoots they should flower well, although six to eight weeks later than usual.

Not every bargain, however, is quite so advantageous to the purchaser. Newspapers and magazines frequently advertise "special offers", and in many cases they are fairly straightforward, though when postage costs are added they aren't necessarily cheaper than if bought from a nursery or garden centre, when the plant can be inspected.

Some offers, however, are highly misleading especially when fancy names are used, and much enlarged photographs of the flowers are displayed. Recently the OM/S spotted an offer for a tropical fruit, given a fancy name. Nowhere in the offer was the proper scientific name given, but the flowers, highly magnified enabled him to identify it as a shrub that he had grown for some twenty years protected by a wall. It flowers a bit in a decent summer, but has never produced fruit. I suppose you may get a few small ones in Cornwall, or a conservatory, but hardly the bowls of luscious specimens shown in the paper. Careat Emptor, as the lawyers say, which for those whose Latin is a bit rusty translates as "Let the buyer beware".



On 3rd December Tuddenham came to us, last time they came to us we managed to beat them 9-1, this time they were on their guard, and we only managed to score 2 out of the 10 points available.

The New Year has started just as badly, we went to Hintlesham on 8th January, and again only managed to score 2 points. We did slightly better when we went to Claydon and managed to score 4 points, winning two of the games and one of the other games could have gone either way, but Claydon managed to win in the end.

We are dangerously near the bottom of Division 1, the bottom two teams are relegated, and at the moment we are not far above them, with some difficult games still to play.

WORDSEARCH

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HAVE YOU SEEN THE OTTERS?

I recently received this photograph from the grandson of Frederick and Cissie Lucas who ran the White Hart in Nayland during the 1920s. Mr Lucas is in the middle of the group and if you look closely you will see that the men either side of him are each holding a dead otter. I understand that these otters were caught in the river at the back of the White Hart.

Otter hunting was a very old sport and, in his book *The Suffolk Stour* published in 1957, Ambrose Waller wrote that records exist of King Edward II in 1386 directing the Sheriff of Essex to pay the Master of the King's Otter Hounds two pence a day for his services and three farthings a day for meat for eight hounds. In the 1950s otters were fairly common on the Stour and Ambrose Waller recalled that the Eastern Counties Otter Hounds had occasional meets at various places on the river.

You may have read Henry Williamson's novel *Tarka the Otter* which was published in 1927, about the time that the photograph was taken. This delightful and moving story of a young otter growing up with his family in idyllic surrounds depicted the otters' struggle for survival, living a life of being hunted and killed by hounds. Otter hunting was outlawed in 1978 and soon after this, in 1979, the story of *Tarka* was made into an unforgettable film.

At one time otters were widespread throughout the United Kingdom but hunting and the destruction of their riverside habitat, pollution and diminishing fish stocks in many rivers caused a fast decline in their numbers from the 1950s. Gradually people woke up to what was happening and one pioneering couple, Philip and Jeanne Wayre, formed the Otter Trust in 1971. The Trust's aims were to encourage the conservation of otters throughout the world but with particular emphasis on the British Otter. The Trust's Centre at Earsham near Bungay in Suffolk was opened to the public in 1976 and the income raised was used to finance an extensive otter breeding programme. On a visit there in the 1980s I saw otters for the first time; it was a wonderful to see these fascinating mammals swimming and diving, as much at home on land as in the water, in a completely safe environment. The project, carried out on behalf of the Nature Conservancy Council (now Natural England) was highly successful, the



117th otter being released into the wild in 1999. The breeding programme was then scaled back and the centre was closed to the public in 2006. The Trust, however, continues its original conservation aims.

Another important part of the otter story is the strict protection which they received under the 1981 Wildlife and Countryside Act when it was made an offence for otters to be killed, injured, kept or sold without a licence.

Locally much work is being carried out by the Dedham Vale & Stour Valley Project in encouraging the return of otters to the Stour Valley. A report in the January 2006 Community Times described how the Project is building ledges under bridges to encourage otters not to use the road; improving riverside habitat and constructing artificial holts to provide a daytime safe haven for otters living on the river. Surveys have shown that many of the holts are being used regularly, including one near Nayland, where there have been many sightings.

What a lot has happened since that photograph was taken in the 1920s. The three men look rather pleased with themselves and I wonder what they would have thought if they had known that today they would be prosecuted for their sport.

Rainfall at 25.27 inches in 2008 was 3 inches up on 2007. Looking back one's memory sees the year as having been dull, cool and rather wet. Whilst rain fell quite frequently (e.g. on 11 days in April and November, 12 days in August) the heaviest downpour was on 25 May, the day of the Fete, and was accompanied by gales. 1 inch fell in about 6 hours on 12 August.

Mid February and early March were frosty and snow fell on 24 March and again on 5 April. The nicest summer weather occurred towards the end of July and on the memorable weekend of 30/31 August.

We had sleet and snow on 23 November and sharp frosts in late November/December leading into very cold starts to 2009. Keep warm.

THE BIG SING



Young singers at Nayland Primary School helped break the Guinness World Record for the biggest simultaneous sing-along when they took part in the third Big Sing.

They joined more than 300,000 children nationwide on November 27 as they sang along with singer/songwriter Des'ree performing her hit *You Gotta Be* live from London's O2 arena.

Nayland's adjudicators Andrew Gowen and Teresa Moriarty verified the exact number of children and checked they started at exactly 2.45pm.

Teacher Jayne Kennedy said: "We had 110 children from reception to year four singing and they were very excited as we counted down to the start time. We're doing a lot of singing in school at the moment and this was another musical project to keep them motivated.

"They were especially thrilled to be part of an event which will be in the Guinness Book of Records."

Previous Big Sings were held in 2002 and 2005, raising funds for cancer charities.

Nayland Primary School hall became an art gallery on December 1 when pupils displayed their work in a formal exhibition.

Each class had taken a theme - Van Gogh, abstracts, Jean Miro and landscapes - and the children created pictures in those styles.

The 139 paintings were framed by Images of Cambridge who set up the exhibition in the hall.

"Children and parents were thrilled to see their work looking so professional," said deputy head Ginny Day. "More than half the pictures were sold in the first 30 minutes."

Profits from the show will be used to buy more art equipment for the school.



The 15th March 2009 will be the 40th anniversary of a memorable event in Nayland. Though not a cause for celebration it will never be forgotten by residents living here at that time. It was the night that Pop's Bridge on the old road into the village collapsed and was swept away by the flood waters. A motorist then dramatically plunged into the gap where the bridge had been.

Major construction work on the new Nayland bypass had begun in 1968 and soon after this there was considerable flooding in the Colne and Stour Valleys. The old bridge which was destined to become obsolete with the building of the new road and bridge was already in a poor state. It was during the early hours of the 15th March when the bridge went; the motorist from Polstead was returning home from London and in the darkness tried to drive across the bridge, plunging into the river. The car was swept downstream by the flood water until it got stuck on a mudbank. A non-swimmer, the driver climbed out through the sunshine roof where he perched for more than hour until he was rescued by Nayland firemen. What a lucky escape!

The village was cut off for four days while a temporary Bailey bridge was erected by the Royal Engineers, prior to the new bridge being built on the new bypass some months later.

Are there any eye witnesses left who could tell us what they saw?

VILLAGE PLAYERS' PANTO

Set in a magical underwater world, Nayland Village Players' unique production, Beauty and the Deep, proved another winner for the group.

Co-written by two long-standing members Christine Hawley and Stephen Ferrari, this "fishy fantasy" cleverly combined pantomime tradition with contemporary themes.

A colony of colourful sea creatures living happily on a rainbow reef is threatened by pollution emanating from the darkest Deep but in the end the enemy is mastered and good triumphs over evil.

The production was particularly notable for its fabulous costumes. Ranging from a small starfish to a giant manta ray, they had involved six months' work by the costume team and were exceptional.

In a programme note Mrs Hawley, who also directed, said she wanted to engage with young and old both on and off the stage and certainly succeeded with a family show appealing to all ages.

Among the principals assorted fish and mermaids were a delight and John McCarroll was in his element as the dastardly Mad Max Manta. Stephen Ferrari was a feisty Miss Octopussy, an eight-legged dame and there was plenty of other comedy from Jim Bond as Mungo Jelly, Chris Hunt as Barry Bling and Chris Baalham as the cool Dirk the Dog Fish. Rebecca Napper and James Alexander made an attractive duo as mermaid and merboy, Marley and Marvin.

Complete with song and dance, this ambitious production with its 60-strong cast from five-year-olds upwards was a terrific team effort and the Players are to be congratulated on their achievement.
