NAYLAND WITH WISSINGTON PARISH COUNCIL

Meeting: 10th August 2011

NEW COUNCILLORS

Three new members - Tom Gardiner, Will Hitchcock and Matthew Pescott Frost - were co-opted at the August meeting of Nayland parish council.

STREET LIGHTING

The council decided to wait for a feasibility study to be done before making a decision on changing some street lights to LED. Clerk Debbie Hattrell said the change would solve the G39 issue as half the village's 36 lights were not compliant with the regulations. The new lights were guaranteed for 25 years and although they were expensive the cost would be recouped in just over three years. The council has also been asked by Suffolk County Council if it wants to be involved in a scheme to turn street lights off between midnight and 5.30am. Members agreed they wanted to see the results of the survey before making a decision on both issues.

Mrs Hattrell is to chase up the matter of two lights in Birch Fall which have been permanently on for two months.

JUBILEE TREE REPLACEMENT

Members heard a lot of correspondence had been received over the choice of a replacement tree for the Jubilee copper beech in Bear Street. Mrs Hattrell said Babergh's arboricultural officer David Pizzey had acknowledged the council's intention to plant a hornbeam, Frans Fontaine, but objectors had said it was not the right tree for the location. It was agreed Tricia Fuller and Hector Bunting should arrange a site meeting with Mr Pizzey who has to make the final decision.

VILLAGE HALL

The council received a request for financial help towards the renovation of the village hall floor and it was agreed to contribute £1,000 from its capital investment fund. Rosemary Knox said the new hall was now ten years old and various jobs including renewing the guttering and other work needed doing.

She said the hall's treasurer Andrew Gowen was keen to install five sets of outdoor fitness equipment on the playing field and the information was circulated for councillors to consider. **HIGHWAYS**

A reminder is to be sent to the highways department that mud is accumulating on both carrigeways of the A134, beside the bus shelter in Bear Street and outside 19/21 Stoke Road because drains appear to be blocked.

Mrs Knox drew attention to a deep and potentially dangerous pothole in Cawley Road, Wiston.

ALLOTMENTS

Chairman Gerry Battye said the allotment competition winners -Stephen Osborne, Trevor Smy and Hazel Gardiner - were presented with their prizes at the summer flower show.

Mrs Hattrell said she was in the process of re-allocating allotments that were being given up. Each one had to be done in sequence and she was currently awaiting a response from one plot holder.

PLANNING

Reviewing planning applications, Mr Battye said a plan for a new open-fronted barn at the The Willows, Wiston Road, and an extension of time limit to John Davis and Partners for the erection of a detached building at Nags Corner, Wiston Road, to be used as a builders' merchants with associated parking were both granted.

RECREATION GROUND

It was agreed to have two broken fence panels on the recreation ground repaired. Quotes to redecorate the play equipment will be considered next month.

HORSE-WATERING

A query was received from Emma Childs who inherited Lock Cottage and paid for the horse-watering off Bear Street to be reinstated two years ago. Mrs Hattrell confirmed the money was spent on plants at the time. Mary George said the Environment Agency had been doing some work there recently and would have to reinstate the horse-watering again.

NAYLAND HEIGHTS DRAINAGE SYSTEM

It was agreed to ask Anglian Water to clarify the principle of the proposed changes in responsibilities for drainage systems circulated recently. A Nayland Heights resident had told the council the drainage system on the estate was not adopted and asked if the changes would affect the situation there.

DISTRICT COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

In his report district councillor Richard Cave said the council would be receiving a Budget Challenge document asking for members' views. Mr Cave said he would try and obtain a simplified summary and would, if necessary, be available for a special meeting in order to respond by September 30. He added he was writing an article for the Community Times setting out the procedure for reporting litter and flytipping.

COUNTY COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

A report from county councillor James Finch said the council was aware of the impending eviction of travellers from Dale Farm near Basildon and officers had developed a contingency plan. Some travellers had moved to Great Waldingfield and Chilton. Mr Battye agreed to attend a meeting in Ipswich when the situation would be explained.

POLICE REPORT

The police report from PCSO Mandy Coleman said the only crime since the last meeting was an attempted burglary on July 15/16 at premises on Harpers Hill but no entry was gained. In view of the current disturbances in other parts of the country Suffolk police had issued a list of advice to householders and would connect with communities by keeping its website up to date. **IN BRIEF**

Flagship Housing is to be asked if the hedges in front of the four new houses on Harpers Estate could be shaped and cut.

Suffolk rights of way officer Kevin Verlander will be notified about a loose plank on the top step of Horkesley Lock bridge.

It was agreed to replace three fence panels at the burial ground which are in danger of collapsing.

The council is to ask Babergh for more information about 'baffle' bottle banks being used at Chelmondiston which do not make a noise.

Do You Know Someone Eligible For The Walsh Trust Christmas Bonus?

Each Christmas the Walsh Trust, which has two parish council trustees and three others, gives out small cash bonuses to those over 80 who have lived in the village at least three years and who would welcome such a bonus. As the original charities were for providing food and fuel, the Trust gives a present to those who have previously had the bonus but are now in residential care. The income is very small and depending on how many are eligible the amount is normally around £20 for a single person and £25 for two people living in the same house. There is no official way we can find out who is over 80 so we rely on local knowledge and that means all of you.

So please let us know if you are going to be eighty or know someone who will be by Christmas. Contact Mr Battye, Mrs Rolfe, Mrs Mig Knight, Miss Kath Hunt or me, Mrs Knox, my number is 262224. If you already have the bonus and are still living in Nayland you will of course continue to get it and don't need to inform us. But because our income is so small once we have paid out for the year we simply do not have any money left to give late-comers so PLEASE let us know by the **1ST OF DECEMBER**.

NAYLAND WITH WISSINGTON PARISH COUNCIL

Meeting: 14th September 2011

TRAVELLERS

With five days to go before the planned eviction of travellers from the Dale Farm site near Basildon concerns were expressed at Navland Parish Council's September meeting over the possibility of some moving to Nayland. County councillor James Finch, who felt the allotment field was vulnerable, urged anyone with any information about travellers coming to the village to contact him as soon as possible. He added the county had a contingency plan and a gipsy and traveller liaison officer, Karen Wright. Questioned by Hector Bunting, he said individual landowners were responsible for evicting travellers if they decided to set up camp. It was agreed to padlock the allotment field gate as a precaution. Councillors with any other ideas were asked to email them to chairman Gerry Battye, who with vice-chairman Tricia Fuller will deal with anything that crops up.

BABERGH'S BUDGET CHALLENGE DOCUMENT

Discussing Babergh's Budget Challenge document, councillors felt the information provided was not enough for them to make any comments. District councillor Richard Cave wanted to know what members thought the council should be doing in terms of priorities. Mr Battye said they could have commented if they had been given a list and John Rix pointed out listeners to BBC Radio Suffolk had been sending in useful suggestions on the subject all week. It was agreed to write to Babergh saying the council had not been given enough detail to make any serious observations

STREET LIGHTING

Following a discussion on street lighting councillors agreed to use the locality budget to trial two LED lanterns costing £600 each in Wiston Road. Two members abstained as they wanted to wait for the results of a survey of the village's street lights. **DOG FOULING**

Dog fouling in various parts of the village was an ongoing problem, members heard. Clerk Debbie Hattrell said if witnsses were willing to sign a statement Babergh could take action against offenders. Will Hitchcock commented he had remonstrated with one dog owner only to receive a tirade of abuse.

Mr Battye said he would write another piece for the Community Times and the issue will be on next month's agenda.

PLANNING

Reviewing recent planning applications, Mr Battye said an appeal had gone to the Secretary of State over a refused plan for change of use of buildings at Harpers Hill Farm from B8 to classes B1, B2 and B8 with associated parking and servicing areas.

Members accepted an application for field access at Creems, Bures Road and a plan for change of use of the Catholic church in Church Lane to a residential dwelling, pointing out the building is on the local list.

NATIONAL PLANNING POLICY FRAMEWORK

Considering the National Planning Policy Framework consultation, Mary George said she thought the current draft document was dangerous for an area like Babergh and if the draft became law it would be difficult for Babergh's core strategy plan to work. It was agreed members should answer an online questionnaire, share views and discuss the matter again in October. A detailed letter on the subject was received from Suffolk Preservation Society.

VILLAGE PARKING

After discussing parking issues round the primary school it was decided to write to the school asking whether there was any plan to alleviate the problem, particularly as the school will increase in size in three years time.

ALLOTMENTS

Three half-size allotments, said to be in a poor state, are to be passed on to people on the waiting list and it was agreed to warn allotment holders that rentals would go up next year.

COUNTY COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

In his report Mr Finch said the council was working on the 2012/13 budget and was looking to save £50 million. A

consultation into mobile libraries was taking place but there were no plans to get rid of them. Nayland's was well-used with 57 registered users and 20 active borrowers.

DISTRICT COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

Mr Cave reported the integration process was proceeding and the senior management team would shrink from 19 to 12 within the next two months with the programme completed by April 2012. POLICE REPORT

A police report from PCSO Amanda Coleman said there had been three crimes since the last meeting. Two involved harassment and threatening behaviour in Wiston Road which were dealt with and the third was a burglary of copper tubing and cable on August 23 from a business unit on Harpers Hill.

She had been monitoring cars parking on the pavement in Harpers Estate but did not feel they were causing an obstruction to pedestrians or other vehicles.

IN BRIEF

Mrs Fuller said a meeting with Babergh's arboricultural officer David Pizzey to discuss a replacement for the Jubilee tree was being held on September 19.

Members heard via Babergh that 'baffle' bottle banks were not efficient so will not pursue the matter.

Councillors were asked to let the clerk know if any grit bins or heaps needed replenishing.

A quote to re-decorate the play equipment on the recreation around was accepted.

It was agreed to accept a £729 renewal invitation for one year from parish council insurers Zurich.

CHEAPER HEATING OIL

However the bigger the order, the bigger the discount!

www.maldonbuyers.com just recently placed an order for 150,000 litres for its local residents and in return was able to secure a price that most of us could only dream about achieving!

COMMUNITY COUNCIL REPORT Meeting: 12th September 2011 Vice Chairman: Jenny Smith 262430

Jenny Smith welcomed everyone to the meeting.

VOLUNTEERS

Unfortunately no volunteers had come forward for the roles of Chairman, Secretary or to act as Publicity Person. David George has agreed to Chair meetings up to the AGM, and beyond if no-one comes forward.

GIFT FOR ROY EVANS

A book token was presented to Roy by Jenny Smith at HortSoc's summer party in thanks for his valuable contribution to the CC overr many years.

CC NOTICE BOARD

Alex Badman said the noticed board was past repair and a new one was being constructed. The cost of £204 including VAT was agreed. It was pointed out a soft backing was needed to insert drawing pins.

CORRESPONDENCE

A letter of thanks had been received from Jane Kennedy on behalf of the School Choir. The PA system is now being used by the Choir and is available to other village groups.

A letter had been received from Andrew Gowen on behalf of the Village Hall thanking the CC for their $\pounds1,000$ grant which was a great help towards the $\pounds4.600$ cost of renovation of the wooden floors.

VILLAGE FESTIVAL

It was agreed the festival would not be taking place next year because the Jubilee and Olympics made it difficult to find a time slot. A festival may be held in 2013 but it will need more volunteers to come forward to help with planning and implementation.

TREASURER'S REPORT

Bryan Smith reported on finances concluding that the council's unencumbered assets were £13,689.85. After payment of grants profit on the year to date is £124.56. He said the festival made £890.22 profit, the Community Times £1,474 and the 2012 calendar £105.60 with 88 copies sold so far. We have made our annual return to the Charity Commission for 2010.

COMMUNITY TIMES

Lorraine Brooks said that advertising was increasing slightly. **VILLAGE CALENDAR**

The project was already in profit by £105. Hazel Gardener said the photo album of entries in the photographic competition had been on show at the Flower Show and has been passed round to various village organisations. Lorraine added Graham Griffiths had kindly provided a calendar page on the village website. A digital version of the album could be viewed online at naylandandwiston.net.

FORTHCOMING ACTIVITIES

Fun Quiz on Friday 7 October:

Chris Hunt said the Bellringers had prepared the quiz with a variety of themes and questions. It was agreed to spend £50 on prizes for the winners and runners-up. Nibbles will be provided on the tables but bing your own drinks. There will be a raffle.

Bonfire Night on Saturday 5 November:

The fireworks and bonfire night is being planned with the usual barbecue, refreshments, etc. No-one, without exception, will be allowed to deposit garden rubbish on the bonfire. The entry charge will remain at £3 for adults, £1 for children this year but as insurance and other costs have risen it will need to go up next year.

Christmas Family Fayre on Sunday 27 November 12-2pm:

Alex Badman is leading and the same popular format is being planned. Father Christmas will be in attendance, Julie Mansfield agreed to organise the presents and said one of the brownies would be Santa's elf.

Jubilee 2012 Celebrations:

The official Jubilee Holiday is Tuesday 5 June, the Fete is being held on Monday 4 June and HortSoc with be staging a 50s exhibition over the weekend. The idea of a Street Party for children in High Street and an evening event for adults was suggested. It was agreed to hold a public meeting on Monday 3 October in the Village Hall at 8pm to gauge the interest and ideas of residents and form a planning sub-committee.

SOCIETY REPORTS

RBL: David George said 24 members visited RAF Museum Hendon. It was a fantastic day out and 5½ hours was not long enough to see all the exhibits.

Art Group: Colin said their autumn term begins this week.

HortSoc: Trevor Smy said 50 members enjoyed the 30th Anniversary garden party. The Flower Show had gone very will with entries up to 320. Bryan commented that it had been a very good show. There a minibus outing to Helmingham Hall Gardens and Plant Fair on 18 September, a talk by Matthew Tanton Brown on 'Growing Vegetables' on 18 October and the joint meeting with the Conservation Society on 8 November Shirley Boyle, head gardener at RSBP Flatford garden will talk about Gardening for Wildlife.

Guides & Brownies: Julie Mansfield said they would be staging a pantomime on 29 November at the School Hall.

Village Players: Jenny Smith said they are rehearsing for the panto, Dick Turpin. Performances will be on November 25 and 26 with a matinee on 26th and on December 2 and 3 with a matinee on 3rd.

Transition Nayland: Will Hitchcock said their BBQ in the allotment field had gone well and Stocks Farm open day on bank holiday Monday had been well attended. They will be having a Food Stall on Saturday 17th September in the High Street with a food swap and apple press.

They are in the process of adopting the Wiston telephone kiosk with a view to moving it to replace the one removed from Bear Street.

The meadow wildflower belt has again provided a wonderful show of flowers this year and now that the seeds are forming, it is due to be cut and cleared in early October. The cuttings will be piled up to create over- wintering habitats for small mammals and grass snakes. A member of the community woodland project, which manages Cherry Wood, Stoke by Nayland, has asked if they may take some of the seed heads as 'green hay' to spread in their meadow and hopefully boost its diversity. This will happen shortly before our contractor does the annual cut.

Mike Hunter has been working hard on a revision of our footpath map of the parish and this will be available in due course at the Post Office and Forget Me Not, as well as at our meetings.

The Society's adoption of the Wiston BT Kiosk, which will be moved to the original Bear Street site, has now been put in hand, and we hope to complete the project in a few months' time. The kiosk needs extensive cleaning and restoration and then we can decide how best to make use of it. Suggestions so far include a book exchange and village information resource centre.

Following an initiative to re-instate native elms in Suffolk and Essex, as depicted in John Constable's pictures, the Society has been in touch with local landowners, the Parish Council and the Parish Tree Warden. As a result it is hoped that planting of disease resistant elm trees at three or four locations within the village will take place in September or October.

We are most grateful to the Parish Council and the Community Council for their contribution of £1000 each to the renovation of the wooden floors. This was a major and welcome contribution to the £4600 bill. For fire safety reasons we have re-sited the dustbins away from the Hall and we will be shortly replacing the plastic guttering on the

It has been a busy summer for the Dedham Vale AONB and Stour Valley Project.

The Stour Valley Volunteers have been out, hard at work in the Project area and have completed over 16 volunteer tasks since April. Path clearance and kissing gate construction, dead hedging, bracken pulling ,otter holt construction, cutting and raking grassland were among the activities undertaken to improve the landscape and environment and boost biodiversity for the local community and visitors alike.

One of the highlights was a Managing a Masterpiece (The Project's Heritage Lottery funded scheme) task where Stour Valley Volunteers worked with National Trust volunteers at Flatford to restore the Dry Dock made famous in one of Constable's painting.

There has also been a lot of community action in the Stour Valley too which has been fantastic!

One of the initiatives that the Project has been involved in has been the development of the wildlife garden at Nayland School. Emma Black, Project Officer with the Dedham Vale AONB and Stour Valley Project, took members of the Eco team to Stoke by Nayland School so they could visit their Eco team and see what they have been doing in their wildlife garden.

Both teams had lunch in the wildlife area, learnt about a native plant then did some practical work. The children thoroughly enjoyed their visit and have come back inspired to do more with their area to create more habitats for wildlife. The group applied to the Dedham Vale AONB Sustainable Development Fund and were awarded a grant to plant a hedgerow (with native trees and shrubs), wildflowers and pond plants as well as building bird / bug boxes and a stag beetle pyramid.





Welcome to this months Police news item. Suffolk Police are urging you to consider the effect your actions may have on others this Halloween and

There is a need for everyone taking part to behave responsibly. We would ask parents to ensure they supervise their children, for their own safety and to ensure they do not call at addresses where the occupants do not want to take part, and that anyone trick or treating only visits homes where they know the residents. Most residents that do like to take part normally have some form of Halloween gimmick outside their property. Halloween and Bonfire night can be genuinely scary for many older residents - please don't cause them any unnecessary distress. There is a line between high spirits and anti- social behaviour and we are well aware there are small minorities who will ignore our appeals and we will be out trying to cause trouble.

A series of posters has been produced which address the issues surrounding Halloween. One is designed for those who do not want to take part while another asks parents if they would normally let their children call on a stranger's home unsupervised. These posters will be put up around the county and are being widely distributed to schools and businesses, (look out for these nearer the time in your local shops, also at Hadleigh police station).

Don't forget the clocks will go back at the end of the month. This is a little reminder I use to remember which way and when to change the clocks: - spring forward (1 hour forward in the spring time) and Fall back (1 hour back in the fall/autumn) Neighbourhood Panel Meetings will be held on:

Garden Notes

by The Old Muckspreader

In his old age the OM/S, who until recently had ignored their virtues, has been using annuals to fill gaps in his borders and add colour to parts of the garden where the spring flowering shrubs are over. The more tender species cannot be sown until next year, but the hardier ones can be sown in the autumn, and will survive a fairly mild winter, to make good sized plants and flower earlier next year. The Met. Office is forecasting another severe winter so assuming they've goy it wrong again, it might be worth risking a sowing now.

In articles in previous years we discussed plants that earn their keep. Here is another, Diascia Barberae (previously D. Cordata), a low-growing perennial with flowers or orange, pink and red. Three small plants bought, like so many other good things from John Smith of Constitution Hill, Sudbury in early spring have been flowering non-stop since, and should continue until the frost: another planted last year, survived the winter.

There is another member of the species, D. Rigescens, but it is a difficult customer and less garden worthy.

On a recent visit to a Plant Fair the OM/S, who goes round talking to nurserymen (and women) on these occasions met someone who was selling Diascias, and was equally enthusiastic about them.

Despite the marvellous show of blossom on the Indian Bean Tree (Catalpa) mentioned in the last issue it has failed to live up to its name, and hasn't produced a single seed pod.

We have had some success lately in the war against rabbits; since they appeared to enjoy the odd fallen fruit of an old pear tree the OM/S has employed what might be called a homoeopathic method of trapping them by using pears as bait. Now however, too much fruit is falling, so the pear bait is removed to somewhere else. At the moment there seem to be fewer rabbits about: is myxomatosis, albeit a cruel disease, about to solve the problem?

Since the last issue the Dean, with his family of young pheasants has changed his behaviour. After going absent for several days he reappeared only to attack the hen, and seemed uninterested in food. Now he has regained his former composure, and returns to the back door expecting food.

Some Photographers of the Past

NAYLAND WITH WISSINGTON COMMUNITY TIMES

These days most people enjoy taking photographs and with modern digital cameras this could not be easier. Photography has made considerable advances since the early nineteenth century when it began. The first men to make permanent photographs were two French men and the first English photographer was a physicist, William Henry Fox Talbot. From 1833 Fox Talbot lived at Lacock Abbey in Wiltshire, now run by the National Trust, where there is a fascinating museum of his photographic work and equipment.

The recent competition held for the 2012 Nayland Calendar produced some wonderful photographs of the village and there is no shortage these days of images of Nayland and Wiston. Compare this with the Victorian era when hardly anyone had a camera.

We all enjoy looking back at old photographs and here in Nayland and

Wiston we have been very fortunate to have had several residents with an interest in photography since its early beginnings.

Most of the surviving photographs dating from the early years of the twentieth century were taken by Charles Gowing who was a baker and confectioner in Birch Street. He was born in 1846 and in his handwritten memories of Nayland during his lifetime (now in the Bury Record Office) he explains that after 35 years as a baker he passed on the bakery business to Mr Albert Butler in 1901. He then moved to Cambridge Cottage in Stoke Road to devote more time to photography, "shortly after the passing of my cousin, Mrs Frank Gowing, who at Wiston and Bulmer Farm had carried on photographic work for some years." This he continued to do for about 14 years.

Mrs Frank Gowing was married to Charles Gowing's cousin who with his family lived in a cottage at Wiston Mill in the 1880s. They presumably later moved to Bulmer Farm. Whilst most of Charles Gowing's photographs were of Nayland, where he lived, his cousin produced some wonderful photographs of Wiston and the river. Many family portraits were taken by Charles Gowing, and Bill Norfolk, who died in 2001 aged 90 and lived round the corner from the Gowing family, in Mill Street, told me that he knew Charles Gowing very well. Bill had a photograph of himself dressed as a page boy at an aunt's wedding, aged 5, taken by Charles Gowing.

In his memoirs, Charles Gowing said that he believed the first photographer in Nayland was Thomas Barber who is listed in the 1858 Kelly's Directory as a cabinet maker in the High Street. Gowing said that "He of course used the wet plates". However, he said he had strong reasons for believing that the Reverend CW Green, Nayland's vicar from 1846 until 1863, was the first 'amateur' photographer who did some work previous to Mr Barber.

Thomas Barber was followed by Henry Faiers whose family had lived in Nayland since the 1780s. In 1844 Robert and Henry Faiers were coopers and basketmakers in Nayland and had a shop and workshop in Bear Street. Henry's son was also a cooper but later had an ironmongery and furniture shop in the High Street in the 1880s. A descendant of the Faiers family believes that the younger Henry was the photographer and in his book about the family he has included several photographs of his family and of Nayland taken by Henry Faiers. Henry's brother, Thomas, carried on as a cooper and basketmaker in Bear Street until he gave it up to open a grocer's shop and when he and his wife died, their children Olive and Alec continued to run the shop until Alec died in 1971, followed by Olive in 1972. A lot of residents still remember the shop before it closed.

Charles Gowing in his memoirs tells us that Charles Abbott

followed Henry Faiers. According to the 1901 census Charles Abbott was a Watchmaker and Photographer, aged 38, living at Churchgate House, next to the High Street butchers. Little is known about Charles Abbott but at that time Charles Gowing was about to give up his bakery business to take up photography so he and Charles Abbott may have been in competition.

Charles Gowing had given up photography by 1920 and his place was taken by Tom Archer, who always signed his photographs TWC Archer. Tom Archer lived in Fen Street next to the old factory (now the flats) and took many photographs of Nayland during the 1920s and 30s. His work was very professional and his photographs of families and events were always well presented. Before he died, in 1936, Sidney Butler (son of Albert Butler who had taken over Gowing's bakery in 1901) bought up all Archer's photographic equipment and took over the work that Tom used to do for the local newspapers, village weddings and other events.

A lot of Gowing and Archer photographs were produced as postcards and were widely available to residents. Many of these postcards were used for their proper purpose of communicating and we are lucky that so many have survived. They show the many changes which have taken place in the village, the horsedrawn transport, the many shops and businesses which are no more, the changing street scenes and the smiling faces of people long gone. Despite the advances of modern photography we treasure these old images of Nayland's history which have a unique and evocative quality all their own.

Affordable Housing Scheme: Five Properties for Local People

A celebration took place at Meadow Cottages in Nayland on Friday 29 July when residents and guests from Babergh District Council and Mid Suffolk District Council came together to unveil a new garden bench for the new rural housing development.

Costing £665,000 the scheme of five homes, developed by Flagship and built by DCH Construction, received £250,000 from the government's Homes and Communities Agency. Situated on Wiston Road, the scheme comprises four twobedroom houses, and one three-bedroom house, all for social rent.

The homes were built as a result of a Housing Needs Survey carried out by Nayland with Wissington Parish Council, Suffolk ACRE and Babergh District Council. The survey identified a real shortage of homes for young local residents.

Prior to their move, residents Helen Prince-Wright (28) and Tim Harper (31) were renting privately. They have two children, Thomas (3) and Madison (eleven weeks old). Helen said, "Paying for private accommodation meant we couldn't afford to save for a deposit. We wanted to stay close to Nayland because Tim grew up here and wanted our children to go to the same school. With both of us working, it really helps to have Tim's parents five minutes away for childcare."

Peter Lakey, Chair of Flagship said, "I am thrilled that we can show so many councillors from both Babergh and Mid Suffolk District Councils what we can achieve to address the real need for rural housing in Suffolk. Partnership working is the key to success with developments like these."

Guest of honour, David Wood, Chair of Babergh District Council said, "A lack of family homes will have an impact on a village community and this is why we need affordable housing as the social glue to keep schools, shops and other amenities available, to create sustainable communities."

- 26 October: Autumn Tidy Up at Hornestreet Field, Langham. Cut and rake, pond planting and other maintenance tasks.
- 9th November: Pond clearance at Coes Meadow, Bulmer. Remove overgrown vegetation to stop the pond succeeding into a reed bed.
- 23rd November: Pond clearance at Flatford. Removing reeds and willow will open up the pond for pond dipping.
- 7th December: Pond Clearance & Repairs at Daws Hall, Henny. Repair bat/bird boxes and clear the pond on invasive burr reed/willow for dipping.
- 14th December: Conifer Felling at Assington Mill, Assington. Thin out conifers at this festive task to encourage native trees and woodland flora.
- 4th January: Ditch Clearance at Rowley Wood, Stoke by Nayland. Clear overgrown vegetation and rubbish from a ditch to allow better drainage.

My word, what rich diets some of you have! The Council fully appreciates that you can't recognise the red colour of the homo sapien funded poop bins or read the labels on the Caley Green bag holder...even though you have six senses! You dogs are not expected to read the notices banning you from the Fairfield Recreation Ground and Village Hall grounds where humans walk and play. All is not lost, though. Litter is dealt with by the Open Spaces service and usually relates to street cleaning.

Fly-tipping is dealt with the Environmental Protection service as it is a crime which has to be followed up by an investigation.

There is no precise definition of the difference between the two but they can be described as follows:-

Litter is generally considered to be waste associated with eating, drinking and smoking which has been improperly discarded and left by members of the public. It can also be waste that has been spilt during business operations.

Fly-tipping is controlled waste i.e. household, commercial, industrial and clinical waste, which has been illegally dumped rather than being disposed of correctly.

All reports of litter and fly-tipping are followed through where it is building up to, or already at, an unacceptable level (a matter of judgement).

Luckily our new Landshare Scheme allotments (we share the old kitchen garden with four other families) have the Assington Brook running on three sides, so the veggies have done amazingly well. We have been able to feed students on the courses with organic vegetables for the last two or three months, which was always the aim. In the strawbale owl tower constructed on a course here in 2008, the barn owls have had a successful season with three chicks raised out of four. All have been ringed, so we shall be able to trace them in the future.

Have a look at the website (http://www.assingtonmill.com/ courses) where you will see all the courses on offer at present in much greater detail.

New topics for this year are:

- Family History, which will help you trace the family on the internet and then show you how to create a family tree with the information.
- Hunting with Harris Hawks, an unusual course for only four people. The birds will be looking for rabbits at this time of the year, and we shall have to keep the cat and the chickens shut in that day, just in case.
- Ghost Storytelling with professional Paul Jackson at Halloween, in the thatched strawbale storytelling hut (class of 2005) where we will sit in a circle around a fire.
- Scything, using Austrian scythes. The course tutor, David Mason, says that cutting grass and undergrowth with a scythe is much nicer than using a strimmer.
- I am hoping to put on Long-bow making, Blacksmithing and Rope Knot-tying, but haven't found the right tutors as yet. Can you suggest anyone?
