The Community Council and the Parish Council wish to commemorate Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II's 2012 Diamond Jubilee by commissioning a special Jubilee Mug.

GIFTS TO NAYLAND & WISTON CHILDREN

A gift of a commemorative jubilee mug will be available for each Parish resident who will be no older than sixteen on 31st December 2012 but to receive the gift parents must pre-order using the form on page 30.

AVAILABLE TO PURCHASE

For adults and anyone else who would like a commemorative mug they will be available to purchase, priced £5. Again, pre-ordering using the form on page 30 is essential as surplus mugs will not be available.

The custom design bone china mug will feature the official Diamond Jubilee emblem, which was the winning entry in a national children's competition organised by BBC's Blue Peter and Buckingham Palace. It will include an image of Queen Elizabeth, Nayland with Wissington's personalisation, and has striking bunting around to complement the design.

Meeting: 14th December 2011

POLICE REPORT

PCSO Amanda Colman reported on four crimes in the last month; a burglary in Harpers Hill, theft in Bures Road, criminal damage in Larch Grove, and a house was broken into in Bear Street. She added that generally there had been an increase in theft from building sites and catalytic converters being taken from vehicles.

ALLOTMENT FIELD

Discussing the future use of the allotment field when current grants come to an end in 2013 councillors felt a working party should be set up to explore the options available and take the project forward. Neil Catchpole, Landscape & Biodiversity Officer at Dedham Vale AONB Stour Valley Project, will be asked for his advice.

COMMEMORATIVE JUBILEE MUGS

Although the number of children in the parish was not yet known it was thought the Parish Council would only be able to part-fund the gift of mugs to residents aged 16 and under.

Councillors agreed the chairman should act on their behalf on the Jubilee Committee. They were happy with the style of the sample mug and hoped a photo of Queen Elizabeth could be included as well as the official diamond jubilee emblem. **PLANNING**

PLANNING Reviewing r

Reviewing recent planning applications, Mr Battye said those granted included erection of conservatory and gym at the Old Vicarage, 4 High Street; erection of a rear extension and cartlodge with studio above at Smokey Farm, Campions Hill; construction of new vehicular access at land west of Creems, Bures Road and crown reduction of a Robinia pseudoacacia at 13 Fen Street.

Councillors heard an appeal relating to change of use of buildings from class B8 to classes B1, B2 and B8 with associated parking and servicing areas at Harpers Hill Farm had been dismissed.

Babergh had advised that an enforcement notice had been issued in respect of The Lodge, 13a Court Street which is being used as a separate accommodation unit contrary to planning.

Between meetings councillors had no objections to extensions at the Primary School but they were mindful of the parking and consequent safety situation in the area. They had no objections to roof mounted solar PV array at the Fire Station; to internal alterations to a listed building at 50 Bear Street if conditions were met to the satisfaction of the conservation officer; or to extensions and annexe accommodation at 2 Blacksmiths Cottages, Bures Road providing conditions were met and the annexe accommodation was linked to the main dwelling.

Councillors discussed an application for the erection of a twostorey and single storey rear and side extension and erection of a single storey detached outbuilding at 95 Bear Street. An objection had been received from the Conservation Society who pointed out the property was on the Local List as it was one of four pairs of houses in the Arts and Crafts style. They were concerned that the size of the extension would affect the A-line symmetry and the unique street scene and may set a precedent if the application is approved. Councillors agreed they had no objections to the application providing the planning officer visited the site bearing these concerns in mind, ensuring appropriate construction materials were used, that there was no

8pm in the Village Hall Further details in next issue business usage of the outbuilding and usage was linked to the residential property.

Councillors agreed to object to a roof light which has been inserted without permission on an extension at 58 Bear Street on the basis it affects neighbours' amenity.

Tom Gardiner expressed concern that there was often insufficient time to adequately discuss and determine the affect of planning applications.

DOG FOULING

A letter from Babergh's Environmental Control Officer confirmed it was an offence for owners not to clear up after their dogs. With sufficient evidence (photographic and witness statement) it can lead to a fine of $\pounds1,000$ and without such proof a warning notice can be issued.

It was agreed to organise a campaign of temporary notices, to include locations round the village hall playing field.

It was noted that incidents of dog faeces being bagged and then left should also be mentioned as the bags should be disposed of appropriately.

COPPER BEECH JUBILEE TREE

Following a query by the Horticultural Society, Babergh's Arboricultural Officer had confirmed that the tree planted to replace the Copper Beech was incorrect as it is a columnar shape variety Hornbeam. Councillors will ensure that the correct tree, a Common Hornbeam with a natural shape, is planted.

After discussion councillors agreed 4:1 that the new tree will be dedicated to both the Silver Jubilee of King George V and the Diamond Jubilee of Queen Elizabeth II.

OUTDOOR FITNESS EQUIPMENT

During discussion it was noted that Leavenheath held a consultation event to establish a need for play equipment. Patricia Fuller agreed to contact Babergh for advice on the possibility of organising a consultation event to establish whether there was a need for outdoor fitness equipment in Nayland.

FOOTPATHS

Rosemary Knox reported that a tree had come down blocking a well used footpath at Dead Lane, Wissington and the landowner would be contacted.

Discussing maintenance of the non-slip surface on Horkesley Lock bridge, which is the responsibility of Essex County Council, councillors agreed they would prefer the current mesh is removed and not replaced. Should the bridge need a non-slip surface it was felt there were options available other than mesh which can be hazardous to animals.

VILLAGE HALL

Rosemary Knox reported there were perpetual incidents of damage in the hall by the Youth Club. The VHMC have been along to talk to the Youth Club members. The club have a new chairman but are still short of volunteer parents.

IN BRIEF

Discussing the poor condition of the Horse Watering area it was felt repeating previous planting plans plus having a barrier should be considered.

Following the report of a pedestrian injury at a site of scaffolding in Bear Street the council will check with Highways that the site is complying with permission and safety regulations.

PARENTS URGED TO REGISTER INTEREST IN HIGH SCHOOL

Around 200 attended the recent meeting at Stoke-by-Nayland Golf Club regarding the exciting new plans for a local 11-16 secondary school at Stoke-by-Nayland.

The application for the school will be submitted by the Seckford Foundation, one of Suffolk's oldest charity foundations.

Police Report:

PCSO Amanda Colman's report included four crimes in the last month; two burglaries in Bear Street and rural Wiston, theft from a vehicle in Fen Street, and criminal damage to a vehicle on The Heights.

District Councillors Report:

Richard Cave said Babergh were considering budget options. Allotment Field:

Councillors are awaiting a response from Dedham Vale AONB Stour Valley Project for advice. Hector Bunting, Tom Gardiner, Will Hitchcock and Matthew Douglas agreed to form a working party to explore the options available and possible sources of income for the field while preserving the ability to extend allotments in the future.

Hector agreed to re-circulate information on rules and conditions for allotments.

Planning:

Reviewing recent planning applications, Mr Battye said those granted included installation of roof mounted solar PV array at the Fire Station; internal alterations to a listed building at 50 Bear Street; extensions and annexe accommodation at 2 Blacksmiths Cottages, Bures Road with conditions including that use remains ancillary to the residential property; erection (replacement) of Class B8 commercial building at Harpers Hill Farm with conditions relating to external finishing, landscaping, vehicular access, usage and hours of operation.

Councillors had no objections to the felling of two cherry trees and pruning of 2 Yew trees at Alston Court; installation of two ventilation louvres windows at the Telephone Exchange, Wiston Road or to amended plans for the Catholic Church but are mindful of highways issues.

Information relating to an appeal against an enforcement order relating to use of accommodation as a separate unit at Lower Courtwood, 13a Court Street would be circulated for urgent consideration.

Councillors heard access issues were delaying a decision for extensions at the Primary School. The driveway is owned by the Diocese and access rights shared with the Council and Nayland House. The council has no objections to contractors' access providing protection is given and any necessary reinstatement made to the greensward, fencing, bollards, kerbing, yellow lines, speed humps and the 3 parking spaces are maintained.

Councillors heard the correct variety Hornbeam, with a natural shape, is about to be planted as a replacement.

Mr Battye felt a plaque should commemorate the new tree to the Diamond Jubilee of Queen Elizabeth II and also refer to its positioning adjacent to the original tree celebrating the Jubilee of King George V.

Outdoor Fitness Equipment:

The working party will conduct a questionnaire with a view to establishing whether there is a need for outdoor fitness equipment in Nayland. They are seeking advice from Babergh on the possibility of organising a consultation event.

Dog Fouling:

Councillors are awaiting a reply from Babergh with advice on running a posters campaign.

Commemorative Jubilee Mugs:

Councillors were happy with the sample mug and the proposals of the Community Council Jubilee committee and agreed to payment of £500 to part-fund the gift of mugs to residents aged 16 and under.

In Brief:

Councillors heard they took stewardship of the Horse Watering area in 1967. It was agreed to draw up specification for defining the area and replanting and gets quotes for the work.

Discussing section 106 funds, Will Hitchcock agreed canvass parents for views on the need for outdoor recreational equipment for teenagers.

It was agreed to get an independent risk assessment of trees.

The Parish Assembly will take place on **Monday 30th April** at 8pm in the Village Hall.

Community Council COMMUNITY COUNCIL REPORT

Meeting: 9th January 2012 Chairman: David George 262294

CC Notice Board: Alex Badman said cork backing was being obtained which he would insert to enable drawing pins to be used easily.

Youth Club: Maria and Adrian Mason reported that a whole new committee had taken over running the club with the employed youth worker. The CC explained that there had been numerous reports of damage to the village hall by Youth Club members. A grant of £700 has been made annually by the CC but members would like to see a structured programme of activities in place to keep members occupied and more discipline exerted by an adequate number of adult supervisors if this is to continue.

Christmas Family Fayre: Alex Badman was thanked for leading; it had been a successful event. Alex raised concern at the number of raffles and tombolas and that the CC could make more profit. It was pointed out the Fayre wasn't a primary money-maker for the CC, its purpose was to facilitate fundraising for village organisations. To better achieve this they have discontinued charging entry at the door and asking a percentage of stallholder's takings.

Raffles have traditionally been included by the CC, HortSoc and RBL plus a tombola by playgroup (now Woodland Corner). In future the form for tables will ask for information on what will be sold and include something to restrict raffles/tombolas to the existing four. It was felt the cost of tables for those who weren't village organisations could be increased.

Village Christmas Tree: Thanks to those who helped put the tree up, only for the strong winds to blow it down! Claire Buller thanked Bryan, Andrew, David and Chapmans for putting it back up again. It was agreed to purchase new lights and some additional decorations as they had been damaged.

The possibility of having a permanent sunken fixing and protective cover would be explored.

Grant for Nayland House residents: David said an application to give the residents a Christmas present to the value £50 had been received between meetings and initially approved by Executive members at the Christmas Fayre. A letter of thanks has been received.

Treasurer's Report: Bryan Smith's detailed report stated that unencumbered assets stood at £17,135.50 and gave what was effectively a year end report .

Main profit centres were: Community Times £1837.65, Fireworks £1238.67, Calendar £1087.70, Village Festival £890.22, Quiz £156.82, Christmas Fayre £141.39. Grants were made to: Youth Club £700, School Choir £250, Village Hall £1000, Nayland House £51.06.

Village Calendar: To date 293 calendars have been sold – there are still some available to buy. This year's photographic competition which will be held on 7th May, deadline for entries on 28th April.

Jubilee 2012 Celebrations: Sunday 3rd June.

Jill Badman reported on progress of the Jubilee committee. Celebrations would be around a lunchtime street party in the High Street (if wet in the Village Hall). It would be 'bring your own' food but there would be some food and refreshments available. The theme will be red, white and blue and people will be invited to wear something to match of they wish. There will be children's entertainment; Punch and Judy, magic, face painting, a treasure map/hunt, etc. The Fire Service will be presented with their official Jubilee medals. A children's art competition is being planned. During the afternoon the Thames Pageant will be screened in the Village Hall. Duck Olympics in Fen Street's Mill Stream have been suggested.

A sample of the proposed commemorative mug and graphic of customisation was passed round. The plan is that all children living in the parish who will be 16 or under on 31st December 2012 will receive a mug as a gift. This will be

part funded by the Parish Council who will contribute £500. They will also be available for anyone to purchase, priced £5. Mugs will only be available as gifts or to buy by pre-ordering - the deadline will be 28^{th} February.

Fun Quiz: Volunteers to lead on this are needed. The Village Hall is provisionally booked for Friday 5th October.

Bonfire Night - Monday 5th November: Tom Gardiner has volunteered to train for a Pyrotechnic ticket. Alex Badman said he would enquire about dates of courses. The bonfire debris has been cleared.

Christmas Family Fayre - Saturday 1st December 2012: It was suggested holding it on a Sunday, as it was this year, to mixed reaction. Groups who contributed or had stalls should be contacted to confirm their views. A decision would be made at the next meeting.

SOCIETY REPORTS

RBL: David George said there are currently 34 widows, plus widowers, in Nayland who receive a Christmas present from the Legion. They continue the hospital and medicine runs. They are planning some outings.

Art Group: Colin Ramsell said their first meeting this term will be a late Christmas lunch at The Lion, then normal classes will resume.

HortSoc: Trevor Smy said the stall at the Christmas Fayre had been successful. On 20th March Terry Illesley would talk about *'The Victorian Garden: the golden age of gardening'*, the Spring Show is on 24th March and the AGM and Fun Quiz on 17th April. Their coach outing on 13th June is to East Rushton Old Vicarage Gardens and Blacksmiths Cottage Nursery - details on www.naylandhortsoc.org.uk

Bowls: Sylvia Bond said they are currently top of the bottom division and 12pts ahead, if they can keep it up they may go up a division. Their annual charity day will be on 10th June.

Firefighters: Karen Elliott said their last car wash made £209 for the Firefighters Charity and there would be another in March. A new firefighter was going through training but another is required.

Village Hall: Iain Wright said their AGM was on Monday 5th March. Their finances were stable and they would have some maintenance to do.

W.I.: Wendy Sparrow said their stall at the Christmas Fayre sold out. They will be helping at the Fete but would help at the Jubilee party the day before if they could.

Transition Nayland: Will Hitchcock said they had a successful soup kitchen at the Christmas Fayre and an interesting Winter Solstice Walk led by Chris Hunt.

Conservation Society: Jill Badman said the Wiston telephone kiosk will soon be moved to the site of the original in Bear Street. It will be empty but they are open to ideas for uses. Anna Kettle will speak on *'Pargeting'* at the AGM on13th March. Jubilee (red, white & blue) tea towels and a new colour footpath map will be on sale. Three disease resistant Elm trees have been planted in the village.

Babergh Achievement Award: Claire's proposal on behalf of the CC for Kathy Hunt to receive an award has been successful. The presentation will be on 7th March.

Outside Fitness Equipment: Andrew Gowen had advised on progress on the proposal for fitness equipment on the Village Hall playing field. It is hoped a questionnaire in the Community Times will help evaluate whether there is interest in the equipment.

Date of next meeting: the **AGM on Wednesday 7 March**, Church Hall, 8pm with Executive at 7.30pm. Meetings for rest of the year: 9 May, 4 July, 5 September, 12 November, 9 January 2013 and AGM 6 March 2013.

COMMENTS

Without the grants from the Parish Council and Community Council of £1000 each towards the cost of sanding the floor our deficit would have been much greater. The Floor sanding cost £4624.00.

The Hall was let for some 1379 hours during the year which works out at a cost of £12.04 an hour. Last year the cost was £13.72 per hour. This is calculated by dividing the routine everyday expenses (£16610.00) with the number of hours let.

A few statistics are: Total income up by 18%

Hall hire income up by 8% Plant sales made £1065 Village Lunches made £865 Cinema made £378

This has been a very satisfactory year financially and if we take into account the additional hirers encouraged by our booking secretary; establishing a dishwasher and a computerised booking system and the additional maintenance carried out on the Hall; the Village Hall Management Committee has had a most successful year.

We would like to draw your attention to the NHS Bowel Cancer Screening Programme that is routinely offered to patients every 2 years between the ages of 60 and 75. Unfortunately we are aware that many patients do not use the opportunity, which could potentially save lives. This simple test (involving sending stool samples in the post – don't worry only a very small amount is needed) can detect cancer in the early stages even before symptoms have started.

These tests will arrive automatically in the post soon after you reach the age of 60 and every 2 years after this until you are over the age of 75. If one does not arrive you can contact the NHS Bowel Cancer Screening Programme on :- 0800 707 6060 or visit their website www.cancerscreening.nhs.uk/bowel/index.html

As world leaders have warned us in their New Year speeches, 2012 is not going to be an easy year. Economic recovery seems distant but is vital. Protecting peoples' livelihoods is essential, as is creating new jobs for the younger generations. Perhaps it's time we considered a different way forward. Does the current economic crisis present us with a unique opportunity to make a change? A transition to a more sustainable way of life, and ultimately a more sustainable economy. One not focused on consumption and GDP growth, but perhaps one which recognises the importance of health and well-being.

Conventional economic theory was developed at a time when the environment and sustainability were not perceived as a problem. Yet now we see that over-consumption is depleting global resources and diminishing our natural habitats and eco-systems. Let's not leave the solution to this growing problem solely down to politicians, let's take some action ourselves. Much of what we need to know already exists in the older generations, rediscovering forgotten skills is an important part of Transition. Let's not wait until it's forced upon us, but make a start building local resilience the 'Transition way'. Let's keep Transition Nayland on the map and build on what we have started.

And remember, this isn't just about the village of Nayland, true local resilience will require the same thinking and change throughout our surrounding parishes. WORDSEARCH:

Garden Notes

by The Old Muckspreader

On Christmas Day, as well as the usual suspects such as Winter Jasmine and Iris Unguicularis (it used to be I. Stylosa), the OM/S counted a large number of plants in flower weeks if not months in advance of their usual season. Now, writing in mid-January, here are even more, with Aconites, Snowdrops, Triteleia, the little Crocus 'Tomasinianus' and Cyclamen Coum; the Autumn-flowering Cherry is still soldiering on!

In the recent gales a large Balsam Poplar came down across his orchard, fortunately missing most of the fruit trees, though an Egremont Russet apple lost two of its four main branches. Two of there poplars were planted about 30 years ago to replace a line of Wych Elms which had succumbed to the dreaded Elm Disease; during the intervening years they had grown from 3-foot cuttings to a height of about 60 feet. Intended to give shelter from the South Westerlies, they ended up shading a good part of the orchard from the ripening power of the sun, so maybe this loss may prove to be something of a blessing. We wonder if the survivor should be felled as a precaution.

The mild weather gives us the opportunity to plant and/or move subjects, which will continue to make root growth and become established before the usual East Anglian spring drought. The OM/S bangs on about this every year, but when he neglects his own advice he subsequently regrets it.

In horticulture, as in most other aspects of life, there are fashions. A recent one is Prairie Gardening, with its chief exponent a Dutch man by the name of Piet Oudolf. When Monty Don went around the world and showed a selection of his favourite gardens on television his was one of them.

If you have the odd acre or so and don't know what to do with it, and it's dead flat like most of Holland, then perhaps lots of waving grasses, intersected by paths and dotted with clumps of perennials may well be just the thing. But look out; some garden designers anxious to be in with the avant-garde, may well try to lay it out on the back lawn, where it will look somewhat out of place.

The United Reformed Church, Nayland

NAYLAND WITH WISSINGTON COMMUNITY TIMES

Amongst the greetings cards on our door mat on Christmas Eve I was delighted to find the photograph below sent to me by a resident. It shows Dr Jane Walker in the doorway of the United Reformed Church in Stoke Road, Nayland, surrounded by people in either fancy dress or perhaps costumes for a drama production. The occasion is not known but it was probably in the late 1920s.

On Dr Walker's right is the Rev Birch, then Ewart Russell (father of Sir Bob Russell, MP for Colchester) ? Oliver, Cissie Noy and Jackie Boon; to her left, Dr Eleanor Soltau (a colleague at the Sanatorium), Dick Thorpe, Sidney Butler. Front Row (left to right): Joan Barton, Muriel Butler, Paul Birch, Mrs Birch, "Tiny" Norfolk, Mrs Ethel Butler, and Miss Faiers.

Sidney Butler (the late Muriel Norfolk's father) and his wife Ethel kept Beaumont's shop in Birch Street (now Forget-me-not) and were members of the United Reformed Church. Sidney played the organ and looked after the churchyard and was also secretary and treasurer until the church closed in 1985.

The United Reformed Church in Stoke Road was built in 1864. It closed in 1985 and became a private dwelling in 1990. The Independent Church in Nayland had been officially recognised in 1672 and in the early years its services were held in several locations in the village. The congregation was first licensed to worship in the house of William Spring, a tanner, and services were conducted by a visiting Presbyterian minister. The congregation then moved to a barn and in 1690 to a permanent meeting house in Fen Street. Several resident pastors followed and by the mid eighteenth century the Nayland Independent church had changed from Presbyterian to Congregational.

In 1739 the church was able to purchase larger premises in Stoke Road. This impressive building was believed to have been a wool-stapling factory and the pastor lived in a smaller house adjoining. In February 1864, the church minute book recorded a decision to demolish the present church and minister's house and to erect a new building to include chapel, school room, classrooms and house upon the site of the old. In the following May the church was pulled down and the new building opened for worship in November. A memorial stone, still to be seen today, had been laid on the front wall of the building in August the same year. Behind this stone, in a cavity in the brickwork, a glass vessel was deposited which contained a copy of the New Testament, a programme of the service of the day, a Telegraph newspaper, a photograph of the old Chapel which had been pulled down and a document stating:

"This stone was laid by Manning Prentice, Stowmarket, Suffolk on Tuesday, August 23rd 1864. The congregation for whose use this Chapel is erected dates back to the 17th century. The first building erected for its use was situated in Fen Street, the congregation moved from there in 1740 to a place of worship erected for its use on the site. About 1820 it was found necessary to add three galleries in order to provide accommodation for the Worshippers. A continuing history of the Congregation from its origin is to be found in the Church Book". Presumably these artefacts are still in situ, some 150 years later.

Charles Gowing, Birch Street baker and later photographer (1846–1934), in later life wrote down some of his memories of the church. Although his family were Church of England he began attending the Congregational Sunday School and



Church at the age of 11 because he was employed in a Congregational Church family. He soon became involved, winning a prize for attendance and good conduct in the Sunday School. He began to play the harmonium in the old chapel when he was 16 and also took a small class of very young children. He remembered the opening of the new church and the new American organ which he played. He recalled that "lighting in the church was by candles and during the service two men, wearing slippers, went round with snuffers and cut off the burnt part of the wick. They also had long white wands and during the sermon time, they walked all round the church prodding anyone who had fallen asleep... Folks sitting in church could hear now and then, the sound of a long cane coming into contact with some boy's head".

Charles Gowing later acted as church secretary and treasurer. He was a Sunday School teacher and organist for over 50 years and was made a Life Deacon at the age of 86.

The photograph is interesting because of Dr Jane Walker's connection with the United Reformed Church. As we all know, Dr Jane Walker founded the East Anglian Sanatorium at Wiston in 1901. She was born in 1859 in Yorkshire, was one of the first women in this country to qualify as a doctor and was a pioneer in the treatment of consumption. She was a remarkable woman by all accounts. In their book about Jane Walker, Anna and Michael Smith briefly state that, "In religion she switched from nonconformist to devout churchwoman...." When she died in 1938, aged 79, she was buried with full honours at St Mary's Church, Wiston, close to the hospital which she founded and to which she gave so much of her life. This photograph taken a few years before her death seems to suggest that she may have kept an affiliation with her earlier nonconformist beliefs.

CONTROL OF DOGS, THE LAW AND YOU

You could be breaking the law by allowing your dog to be dangerously out of control....

WHAT IS MEANT BY DANGEROUSLY OUT OF CONTROL?

Any dog is dangerously out of control if it injures a person, or it behaves in a way that makes a person worried that it might injure them. The law applies everywhere the general public is allowed to go and anywhere your dog goes where it is not supposed to be. The maximum penalty for allowing a dog you own or are in charge of to be dangerously out of control is two years' imprisonment, or a fine, or both.

In addition, if your dog is dangerously out of control in its own home or garden then the police or anyone else that is worried about the dog being a risk could also seek a control order.

If your dog injures another person's animal, or an owner of an animal reasonably believes that they could be injured if they intervened to protect their animal from your dog, then an offence may be committed.

If you do not keep your dog under control, your dog could be destroyed and you could be banned from keeping a dog. Or you might be ordered to keep your dog muzzled when taking it for a walk.

If you use your dog to injure someone then you may be charged with malicious wounding. The maximum penalty for this is five years' imprisonment.

DOGS OUT OF CONTROL IN A PUBLIC PLACE

If a dog is dangerously out of control in a public place - then the owner or the person in charge of the dog is guilty of an offence, or, if the dog while so out of control injures any person, an aggravated offence under the Dangerous Dogs Act 1991. In proceedings against a person who is the owner of a dog but at the material time was not in charge of it, it should be a defence for the accused to prove that the dog was at the material time in the charge of a person whom he reasonably believed to be a fit and proper person to be in charge of it.

Section 10(2) of the 1991 Act defines a public place as meaning any street, road or other place to which the public have, or are permitted to have access. This is a wide definition of a public place and one which specifically includes the common parts of a building containing two or more dwellings. It is intended to cover, for instance, those parts of a block of flats where, although there may be a secure front entry door so that the interior of the flat is not a place to which the public has unrestricted access, nevertheless the common parts are, in all other respects, a public place.

A person found guilty of an offence may face imprisonment or a fine, and the courts may disqualify the offender from having custody of a dog for any period. Mandy, PCSO 3108 Coleman
