NAYLAND WITH WISSINGTON PARISH COUNCIL

Meeting: 13th February 2013

POLICE REPORT

PCSO Julia Bignell's report stated there had been no incidents reported in the last month. However, there had been a spate of daytime burglaries in the wider area particularly targeting large isolated properties and an increase in the number of vehicle number plate thefts.

DISTRICT COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

Richard Cave reported the Babergh and Mid Suffolk integration process is progressing and they are looking at the constitution. He said an office presence is likely to remain at Hadleigh.

COUNTY COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

James Finch reported a new travel card for young people for discounted travel to college, training or work is being developed. Tim Yeo is calling a meeting of all MPs whose constituents are affected by National Grid Pylon projects to persuade them that the projects should be totally underground. The site of Stoke by Nayland Middle School is for sale. There is a hierarchy of successor uses: first, education; second, other community use; third, other private/commercial.

The gritting teams remain on full alert. Dangerous potholes should be reported in the normal manner.

STREET LIGHTING

Debbie Hattrell has investigated the next phase of upgrading street lighting to progress further along Bear Street. Options for the following four years have also been considered and discussed with James Finch and Richard Webster. Quotes with an option to pay over a five year period are looking positive.

ALLOTMENTS

Allotment holders who are not keeping their plots in good order have been contacted. Any plots which become free will be allocated to those on the waiting list. It was agreed to create an additional 2 plots (4 half plots) to reduce the waiting list and once the plots had been fenced by the plot holders the PC would form a barrier to prevent access of unauthorised vehicles onto the allotment field.

It was agreed to accept an offer from Suffolk Wildlife Trust for a free barn owl box for the allotment field.

MEMORIAL BENCH

Highways have agreed in principle to the siting of a memorial bench for John Kent at a location opposite 30 Bear Street. Homeowners neighbouring the site are being consulted about the proposal.

HIGHWAYS

Residents have been using the bins/heaps to keep roads clear round the village. Named volunteers for spreading grit or clearing snow will be insured through SCC's insurance – residents can be included by giving their name (if they haven't already done so) to Debbie Hattrell. A new grit bin, at a cost of £169, has been positioned in Church Lane. Councillors felt SCC had done well this winter keeping the roads gritted.

Rosemary Knox reported a leaking water main on Campion Hill. Anglian Water have said they are unable to replace the water main but will continue patching it up. This will be reported to the County Councillor as the leaking pipe could affect the condition of the road surface.

PLANNING

Reviewing recent planning applications Gerry Battye said permission had been granted at 19 Fen Street for erection of rear garden room extension.

Permission had been refused at Creems, Bures Road for change of use from agricultural land to residential to allow for new driveway, parking area and erection of garage for use with existing dwelling. Reasons for refusal included it would be a harmful intrusion into the agricultural field, its urbanising impact would be compounded by the site's location on the steep valley side within an AONB which could not be fully ameliorated by the proposed planting, it would be an incongruous addition to the landscape contrary to various policies and guidance in the

National Planning Policy Framework.

An appeal had been dismissed at Oak Cottage, Breach Grove, Kingsland Lane for erection of a new dwelling (to replace an existing dwelling). Reasons for dismissal included it is contrary to various planning policies, the proposed building is significantly larger than the dwelling it is proposed to replace in its footprint, mass and scale and it would be much more visually intrusive than the existing structure, and the form and detailed design fails to respect the woodland context of the site and its wider countryside surroundings.

Notice was given by the Planning Inspectorate that a Heritage Statement will be included in the planning appeal relating to 9 & 11 Mill Street, Nayland for the demolition of existing disused bus garage, erection of two semi-detached dwellings, provision of associated parking to the rear and listed building consent for alterations to 9 Mill Street including reinstatement of 1 window on front elevation, replacement of bay window with 1 window on side elevation, blocking up of 1 door opening on side elevation, removal of canopy to side elevation and blocking up of 1 window to opening on side elevation.

Councillors had no objections to an application for listed building consent for erection of single-storey rear extension at 5 Mill Street, to listed building consent at 6 Bear Street to remove existing cement render to the right hand gable wall, timber repairs and reinstating lime render, or to a retrospective application for advertisement consent at 18 High Street for the erection of a hanging sign.

Matthew Pescott-Frost agreed to attend CBC's planning meeting on 28th February on behalf of the PC to raise objections to the proposed Stour Valley Visitor Centre at Horkesley Park.

RECREATION AND OPEN SPACES

Gerry Battye said he met with the contractor at Fairfield Playing Field to find a solution to prevent children crossing the boundary ditch at the back of gardens on the Heights. The contractor suggested the existing overgrown shrubs/hedge should be cut right back, a chestnut paling fence erected and a new hedge could be planted at a later date. Councillors would discuss this further at the next meeting.

Debbie Hattrell said there had been interest in the project for new play equipment for the village using 106 Recreation grants but no firm volunteer to lead the project had come forward. This will be discussed further at the next meeting.

Four A5 dog fouling posters have been received from Babergh; more will be ordered as this is insufficient.

VILLAGE HALL

Rosemary Knox said their AGM will be held on 4th March and they hope a new committee member will be elected. Feedback on the new monthly Farmers Market has been positive from the organisers and villagers.

IN BRIEF:

Quotes will be obtained to replace / reinstate ivy covered fence panels in the burial ground.

Mary George agreed to represent the Parish Council at the Community Council AGM on 6th March.

The Parish Assembly would be held on Monday 22nd April at 8pm and Jonathan Free, Head of Communities at Babergh as agreed to attend.

GOURMET COFFEE MORNING

A gourmet coffee morning held by the Friends of St James' Church at the church hall on February 23 raised a record £431.

Chairman Alan Edwards said: "We are really grateful to Hazel Gardiner and her band of helpers who made this annual event go so well. "

POLICE REPORT

PCSO Mandy Coleman's report stated there had been two incidents reported in the last month; criminal damage to a vehicle in Harper's Estate and theft of vehicle number plates in Bear Street.

In the wider area there has been a spate of vehicle number plate thefts and heating oil thefts have increased. Dwelling burglaries are still occurring - contact 101 if you see anything suspicious or 999 if a crime is being committed.

DISTRICT COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

Richard Cave reported that the Babergh and Mid Suffolk integration process is progressing.

CO-OPTION OF MEMBER

Graham Walker, a resident of Wiston, was co-opted onto the Parish Council.

ALLOTMENTS

Following last April's successful meeting with allotment holders another will be arranged for this year.

Debbie Hattrell said one half plot had been given up and could be allocated to one of those on the waiting list. A site meeting would take place to reconsider the need for additional allotments and erection of a barrier to prevent vehicle access onto the field beyond the allotments.

STREET LIGHTING

Negotiations are ongoing with SCC regarding a five year plan for upgrading all the PC's lights; a decision is awaited on whether suppliers are willing to accept payment over 5 years. The next phase of upgrading street lighting to progress further along Bear Street will be carried out next year.

Gerry Battye reported a light out in Mill Street.

MEMORIAL BENCH

Neighbouring homeowners support in principle the siting of a memorial bench for John Kent opposite 30 Bear Street. A meeting on site will be arranged to identify a suitable position for the bench to be fixed.

PLANNING

Reviewing recent planning applications Gerry Battye said Colchester Borough Council had refused permission for the Stour Valley Visitor Centre at Horkesley Park.

Permission had been granted at 18 High Street for erection of a hanging sign and at 26 Heycroft Way for erection of greenhouse and rebuilding of existing garden shed on condition external facing and roofing materials used shall be as agreed.

Listed building consent had been granted at 6 Bear Street to remove existing cement render to right hand gable wall, timber repair and reinstate lime render and at 5 Mill Street for erection of rear single storey extension subject to conditions relating to;

roofing material to be natural slate, external timber cladding to be painted cream, brick plinth to be painted black, window and door frames shall be painted timber to match the existing fenestration.

Councillors had no objections to listed building consent at Vine House, 1 Court Street for 2 new doors and 1 window in rear elevation, 2 new windows in side elevation, installation of flue, and internal alterations.

RECREATION AND OPEN SPACES

Concerns have been expressed by residents backing onto the Fairfield recreation ground regarding the cutting back of the hedge/shrubs which they feel leaves their back gardens exposed and insecure. The PC were sympathetic and agreed to get a quote for a double row of hedging with rabbit guards which would be planted behind the chestnut fencing. The contractor would be asked to confirm the best time for planting. It was pointed out the existing hedge would make good new growth.

The dog fouling posters ordered from Babergh have not been received.

Mary George and Gerry Battye agreed to keep an eye on the Horse Watering to ensure it is maintained when needed.

Debbie Hattrell said Rachel Hitchcock had volunteered to help with the project for new play equipment for the village using 106 Recreation grants. There are two others who have expressed an interest to help. Rosemary Knox and Mark Burbidge agreed to be on the sub-committee for this project.

Councillors confirmed fishing by parish residents was permitted and signs are displayed on Caley Green. Some banks are managed by the Nayland Land Company.

VILLAGE HALL

Rosemary Knox said it was disappointing only three people attended the AGM. She added volunteers are needed to help out on film nights with tea making or selling ice creams.

PARISH ASSEMBLY

The Parish Assembly would be held on Monday 22nd April at 8pm and Jonathan Free, Head of Communities at Babergh has agreed to attend. Refreshments will be available at 7.45pm. It was agreed not to have reports but parish, district and county councillors would be there to answer questions. Questions from residents would be encouraged.

IN BRIEF:

It was agreed to accept a quote to replaced 5 fence panels on the burial ground.

Rosemary Knox reported a footpath sign was down on path 16 at the northern end by Highlands.

CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

To all of the members of the Executive and the committee members of the Community Council I must first give my personal thanks for all of your hard work during the last year.

We had a packed year, with our normal events of the Christmas Fayre, Christmas Tree, the Quiz Night which this year was a little different as all of the clubs/societies within the village were invited to submit questions on their own subjects and was a great success, the Fireworks Night, this year without rain and of course we cannot forget the Queen's Jubilee Party, where over 400 residents were able to sit down and celebrate together. I must give a personal thanks to Iain Wright for his assistance in producing a marquee that sat over 150 people, at the drop of a hat, and the team of local residents that helped to put it up and take it down again.

A constant within the parish is the regular arrival of the CT, with its updates on what is going to be happening soon and the reports of the various societies advertisements timetables etc, this is a mammoth task and one that the CC Secretary takes on with all of her other little jobs, with this in mind I would like all of you to thank Lorraine Brooks for all of her fantastic work.

As some of you will know Jill and I have put our house up for sale and we may be moving out of the parish this will not happen quickly, it never does, so if required I am quite happy to continue as Chair of this committee at present but may have to resign in mid term if the need arises.

For next year we have much of the same in terms of events planned excluding the jubilee but we would like to put on an event that helps the CC to raise some money to replace some of our expenditure from this year, we have had some ideas given to us but we could do with more, how about a Boot sale or coffee morning, if you think you could help please let us know. The CC's mandate it to raise funds or to assist groups to raise funds within the parish so that they can operate; we also make a regular donation to the Village Hall to allow them to budget for any large amounts of expenditure that may arise due to the age of the building. The VH is one of the villages biggest assets and I urge you to support it, with not only your money but also with your time.

The CC this year has lost some of its committee members due to retirement, and I would like to take this opportunity to thank them for all of their help, but, we need to replace them so if any of you can or know somebody that can help out, we would welcome their support.

TREASURER'S REPORT

Bryan Smith read out highlights of the year and thanked Andrew Gowen for examining the year end accounts with his normal due diligence. The accounts were adopted and will be lodged with the Charity Commissioners. Iain Wright thanked Bryan.

There is a vacancy for a PC representative.

ANY OTHER BUSINESS

Village Christmas Tree: the new fixing for the Christmas tree will be fitted when weather is better, in April/May.

Notice Boards: A quote will be obtained for a new notice board at Forget Me Not. Repairs are needed to the CC notice board.

Community Times: Lorraine Brooks thanked all who support the CT; proof readers, Colin and the distribution team, Bryan for managing payments, those who contribute copy and the advertisers. She thanked Graham Griffiths for hosting the village website and pointed out the website will be 10 years old in June.

Andrew reminded the meeting that a colour version of the CT, including back copies, can be viewed on the website. Claire suggested reminding readers of this on the cover.

Village Calendar: Lorraine said plans were in hand for the next calendar competition to be held on Bank Holiday Monday 6th May - deadline for entries is 27th April. It is hoped more society members will enter photos of their activities and more photos of Wiston are being encouraged. We are grateful to the 12 sponsors who have supported the calendar.

Fundraiser for 2013: Alex reminded members that the CC needs to raise funds in order to give out grants. A car boot sale was suggested but it was felt that one-off boot sales don't tend to make much profit. A coffee morning was also suggested - this would need donations of raffle prizes, cakes, plants, etc. He asked for further ideas, or for an event/activity someone (or a group) could put on for the CC.

Forthcoming Events:

Village Quiz - Friday 4th October: Rachel Hitchcock has kindly offered to lead on the quiz again, in the same way as last year's successful event. Village societies will again be asked to submit 10 questions.

Other events include: Firework Night on Tuesday 5th November and the Christmas Fayre on Sunday 1st December

Following a request by the VHMC it was agreed that the AGM on 5th March would be held in the Village Hall and they would have their AGM on the same evening.

SOCIETY REPORTS

RBL: Andrew Gowen said their 30 seat coach to the Combined Military Services Museum at Maldon is full but if others wish to go they will book a larger coach. They will visit Bosted Airfield Museum on 17th July.

Village Players: Bryan Smith they are rehearsing for their spring production, Noel Coward's *Hay Fever*. Performances will be on 18th, 19th & 20th April.

HortSoc: Trevor Smy said on 19th March Rob Sherriff will give a talk on *Dahlia Growing*, the Spring Show is on 23rd March, the AGM and Fun Quiz will be on 16th April. The coach outing on 11th June to Sissinghurst Castle Garden is full but there is a waiting list should anyone be unable to come.

Conservation Society: Jill Badman said John Walker will talk about his *Ten Years with timber Framed Buildings of Suffolk* at the AGM on 11th March. The results of the Nayland Test Pit Dig will be revealed by Dr Carenza Lewis on 29th April, Open Gardens will be on 9th June.

Nayland Fundraising Committee: Jill Badman said they are organising a coffee morning on 27th April in aid of the The Shelley Centre for Therapeutic Riding (*Riding for the Disabled Assoc.*) and a cabaret evening on 5th October for motor neurone and ovarian cancer organisations.

Women's Institute: Wendy Sparrow said Mary Moriarty had given a very interesting talk about the Village Players and brought along some beautiful costumes. For the branches 56th Anniversary members will be going out to lunch.

Choir: Ian McKay said they are rehearsing for Mozart's Requiem concert on 24th March on St James'. On 18th May they will be performing Verdi's Requiem at Bury Cathedral and in the Albert Hall on 7th July for a 'Come and Sing' performance of the Verdi Requiem.

Art Group: Colin Ramsell said the group is at full capacity. At their last meeting their tutor, Vernon Lever, brought in an ancient bonsai tree for still life or to incorporate into a landscape scene.

Youth Club: Maria Mason said they have about 20 teenagers regularly attending. Due to high uptake their Table Top Sale will now be held in the Village Hall on 16th March. A fund raising Snail Race evening is being planned on 27th April.

Woodland Corner: Sue Clark said they are having a cake sale outside Kerridge's on 9th March and on 14th March a Boden Party at Woodland Corner. Sessions are available for the Easter Holiday Sunshine Club and a Summer Holiday Club is being organised.

Village Hall: Iain Wright said the committee continues to run the hall.

Bryan Smith, who attended their recent AGM said attendance had been very low and asked for greater support.

Parish Council: Mary George said Andora Carver is receiving her Babergh Achievement Award tonight. The Parish Assembly will be held on 22nd April - Jonathan Free, head of Communities at Babergh will be the speaker. They are looking for volunteers to take forward a project for new recreation equipment for the village.



The annual Remembrance Day service takes place at the war memorial in the High Street and members of the local branch of the British Legion are standing outside the Post Office. This year's young men from Nayland who lost their lives in the First World War, and six from the Second World War, are listed on the memorial and are remembered for their sacrifice at the service every year.

The Nayland memorial was unveiled in 1921 at a ceremony attended by many residents, as shown in the old photograph. A procession of scouts and members of village organisations marched through the village and gathered in the High Street. The flag in the background, formerly St John's, was then owned by St Peter's.

The Results of the Nayland Test Pit Digs

As part of the Heritage Lottery Funded Managing a Masterpiece scheme, Access Cambridge Archaeology (ACA) gave Nayland residents the chance to carry out their own small archaeological 'test pit' excavations to find out how the village developed over hundreds – even thousands - of years in the past. Thirty-four test pits were dug by residents, family, friends and interested members of the public from elsewhere over one weekend last October.

The project was run by Dr Carenza Lewis, well-known from Channel 4's *Time Team* and BBC's *Story of England* and *The Great British Story*. HOW TO HAVE FUN AND SUPPORT YOUR VILLAGE HALL!

Nayland is very fortunate in possessing a village hall of such size and quality. Our thanks go to the residents who had the foresight to create such a facility. However the ongoing cost of maintaining the hall presents a challenge for the Village Hall Management Committee. Currently the annual expenditure for running the hall is in the region of £17,000. Income from letting the hall covers a large part of this sum and the management committee supplements the shortfall by a number of fund raising activities including the Village Cinema, plant sales and the Village Lunch.

However there are no additional monies to fund extraordinary items such as major repairs or development of the village hall. The Parish Council and the Community Council have been very supportive, especially for specific projects, but it would be wrong to rely upon these organizations in substitution for seeking support from the community.

You may be wondering how you might assist to preserve and maintain this wonderful asset?

Firstly, you can have some fun and raise money for the hall at the same time by playing Cashcascade, a weekly lottery game in which for a £2 stake you can win £50,000 and for a £1 stake you can win £25,000. For every pound

you spend 45 pence will go to the village hall. If you have an Internet connection it is a very easy game to play. Type www.cashcascade.org into your web browser, choose 5 lucky numbers from 1 to 59 and enter them where directed. Select "Nayland Village Hall" as your charity choice and then fill in your details and a direct debit form on line. It is very simple and a great way to support your hall.

Secondly, have you thought about leaving a bequest to the hall? As the village hall is a registered charity, any gift is free of Inheritance Tax and therefore reduces the estate for tax purposes. You can specify the purpose of the bequest. For example, the Village Hall Management Committee have created an endowment fund which cannot be used for day to day purposes but is reserved for major items of expenditure e.g. extensions or structural alterations. You might therefore direct that the bequest be paid into the endowment fund.

Please remember that the village hall is a tremendous asset to the village that benefits everyone and it merits your support.

The choir is always willing to extend a welcome to anyone who would like to sing or come to hear the performances.







By the time you read this, another Transition Nayland walk will have taken place, on the 23rd March. Each of our guided walks explores local footpaths and sites of interest. The December walk was cancelled due to terrible weather conditions, so we hope there were more clement conditions this time! If you haven't yet joined us on a walk, please do come in future – the next one will be in June.

We are more and more subject to adverse weather events, whether this is near-drought conditions or increased flooding. Having to cancel a village walk is a minor inconvenience compared to the experience of some farmers – here in the UK – whose crops failed due to flooding, and now (as the BBC reported this week) require charitable support in the form of food vouchers. In fact throughout our society these weather events are increasingly taking their toll.

For quite a long time, an influential but quite small group of people have, in the face of mounting consensus about the evidence, sought to control the climate-change debate in order to disprove two key connections: first, the connection between human activity and climate change, and second, the effects of climate change on the weather, and therefore on us.

To us, both things can be traced ultimately to our energy use. The high-energy lifestyle of the developed world demands more energy and natural resources than the earth can provide us with – an unwelcome and discomfiting state of affairs. The side-effects (waste, harmful emissions, extinct species, mounting energy bills and so on) of 150 years of unclean, non-renewable energy production are obvious.

The good news is that while we wait for 100%-efficient energy storage, transfer and conversion to be developed, there are things that we can do as individuals to help change this situation. One of these is to mark WWF's Earth Hour – which coincidentally this year took place on 23rd March. At 8.30pm that day, people from around the world turned off their lights for one hour, as a gesture of recognition of the need for us all to think more about our energy use.

Making a token reduction in energy use individually will not, of course, save the 'planet'. But it helps to make us mindful of actions we can take, at any time, to reduce our energy use, in ways that are frequently painless, and often turn out to be beneficial. If we encourage our friends to do the same, then they too can make a difference.



FEBRUARY COMMITTEE MEETING

At the February meeting, the Bookings Secretary reported that a Farmers Market will be starting soon in the Hall. The traffic situation will be monitored. The Treasurer presented a draft of the Village Hall Action Plan and invited the VHMC to email any amendments. The Youth Club reported that plans for their Table Top Sale are well underway. At the end of April a Snail Race Night is planned to raise funds.

MARCH ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING

The VHMC AGM took place at the Village Hall on the 4th March. The VHMC were re-elected with the addition of a new member, Mr. Peter Mann. Only three members of the public attended this meeting which was very disappointing. The Chairman thanked all those who help to keep the Hall running and all Hall users. The treasurer presented an Action Plan for the Hall (see article) which was adopted. At the VHMC meeting afterwards, all the VHMC officials were re-elected to their previous positions.

NAYLAND VILLAGE HALL ACTION PLAN FOR 2013/14

Introduction

Nayland Village Hall is currently managed by a Village Hall Management Committee of just 9 members. It should consist of 7 members elected at the AGM, a representative member appointed by the Parish Council and one representative member appointed by the Community Council. 2 extra members may be co-opted by the Committee.

The Village Hall Management Committee is registered as a Charity and comes under Charity Commission Rules and Regulations.

Its Objects are "the provision and maintenance of a village hall and a recreation ground for the use of the inhabitants of the parish of Nayland with Wissington and the neighbourhood without distinction of political, religious or other opinions, including use for meetings, lectures and classes, and other forms of recreation and leisure time occupation, with the objects of improving the conditions of life of the said inhabitants."

The Recreation Field (known as Webbs Meadow) and Hall are owned by the Parish Council which has leased them to the Village Hall Management Committee until 14 October 2029. A 'peppercorn' rent may be required by and paid to the Parish Council. The Parish Council has undertaken to maintain the drive approaching the hall, to assist in the maintenance of the car park which is also used as a parking area for the village and grass cutting of the recreation field in the summer (up to £250 not including VAT) when there is little income; and the maintenance of the grounds (hedges and trees etc) otherwise the Committee is responsible for the maintenance of the hall and recreation field.

Action Plan for 2013/14

1. To recruit a full Management Team.
2. To establish an operating procedures booklet for members to be reminded of their duties and to understand how elements of the hall and its facilities work (eg. key to the lift; switch on wall heaters; set up the hearing loop).
3. To establish an annual maintenance programme.
4. Review and update the cleaning equipment used in the hall.
5. Seek to make a financial surplus of £5000 per year after normal running costs of approx £16000 a year.
6. Seek grants and bequests for the Endowment Fund.
7. Review the progress of this action plan at each meeting and its success at the 2014 AGM.

The Village Hall Management Committee wish to draw to everyone's attention that dogs are not permitted on the village hall playing fields.

It will be appreciated that the fields are regularly used for sport and it will be readily understood that dog faeces may present a considerable health hazard.

Dog owners may still park their cars in the car park (provided that the hall is not booked out) but should use Newlands Lane to gain access to Candy Lane and from there onto the Fen if required.

Garden Notes

Looking back over the years it seems that we often talked of this and that coming into flower, warm days and so forth; no such luck this year, and now a further week of frost is forecast. It is not, therefore, time yet to count the casualties, since some may sprout from low down, or even ground level.

To replace them there are lots of "offers" in the catalogues which come through the letterbox, and in the weekend papers. Some of these are described as "half-price", but on closer inspection the prices seem to be the same as before, the so-called full price having first been doubled.

There may well be a few bargains around, but if you are prepared to be patient buy small plants or plugs, and grow them on.

In the past the OM/S has tended to overlook annuals but this year he intends to grow a few more to provide instant colour, since in a rash moment he agreed to open the garden to some members of a society he belongs to when they come to the Leavenheath Open Gardens in June.

The best annuals are those which repeat flower, provided that they are regularly dead-headed. Most are easily raised from seed, but it's possible to cheat, and John Smith sells trays of various species at his usual bargain price from his small nursery in Sudbury.

A list of suggestions appears below.

Sadly the muntjac attacks continue and the OM/S is forced to concede defeat; unless, that is, among his readers is someone with a firearms licence and a rifle who is prepared to camp out in the orchard over night.

On the rabbit front, however, we hold our own, and traps baited with apple have caught four in the last month.

What Happened to the Nayland Cricket Club?

It may be news to some that Nayland had its own cricket club back in the 18th century and, with the prospect of summer approaching and another cricket season dawning, I have been trying to find out what happened to it.

The origins of cricket are ancient and unknown but the earliest references to the sport were in the 16th century. By the 18th century organised cricket was spreading rapidly throughout England and in some parts of the world. In this part of Essex and Suffolk about 70 clubs were formed in the latter part of the 18th century and many more in the 19th. Existing Suffolk records show that Nayland was one of the first villages in the county to form its own cricket club, in 1778, the same year that Lavenham and Long Melford began. They were closely followed in 1779 by Hadleigh and in 1787 Boxford and Sudbury were established. Stoke-by-Nayland was formed in 1817. Across the county boundary, Colchester had only just preceded them all by forming in 1777. All these clubs still exist except for Nayland which for some reason fell by the wayside.

Unfortunately there are no known local records about the formation of the Nayland Club and where it played but a newspaper report a few years later, in 1788, recorded that Sudbury Cricket Club played Nayland on their home ground: "On Monday, July 14, was played at Nyland [sic] a game of single wicket cricket, for 4 guineas, between Mr Humphrey of Sudbury and Mr Ratford of Nyland, in which the former beat the 1st two innings."

Hadleigh club's records show that in 1819 they played a return match with Nayland when Hadleigh in their two innings scored 110 and Nayland 65. The report concluded that "The parties afterwards partook of an excellent dinner provided on the occasion at the Shoulder of Mutton Inn." In 1827 Stoke and Nayland played at Withermarsh Green where Stoke beat Nayland with a score of 286 and Nayland scored just 54 runs. Despite the disastrous outcome for Nayland, "The members of the two clubs with a large party of their friends dined afterwards at the Angel Inn where a cold collation was prepared by Mr Dorrill and the evening was spent in the greatest conviviality."

According to Sudbury's 1908 fixture lists, their team no longer played Nayland but they did play "Horkesley Park". We know that at some point the Nayland club combined with Great Horkesley and played at Horkesley Park, probably at the end of the 19th century or the beginning of the 20th, when Captain Edward Kelso lived at Horkesley Park (now Littlegarth School). His father had purchased the Horkesley Park estate in 1842 (at that time called Rice Park). Captain Kelso, a former Commander in the Royal Navy, was a benefactor and active member of the Horkesley community, a churchwarden and magistrate, supporting local charitable causes and creating various clubs. He died in 1924 aged 82.

Older Nayland residents I have spoken to over the years remembered Captain Kelso including May Wilson, who lived in Court Street. She told me that her father often played cricket at Horkesley Park, presumably for the combined club. She

remembered, as a child in the early 1900s, that these matches were always a big social event for Nayland and Horkesley villagers. She told me that Roberts, the Nayland Bakers at the Guildhall in the High Street, provided all the cakes and huge urns of tea for the afternoon. However, whilst Nayland men did not play cricket in the village, May said the ladies were happy to do so and she played cricket for the Chapel (United Reformed Church in Stoke Road) ladies' team on Webbs Meadow.

It seems that young people a hundred years ago were not so very different to today's as the following appeared in the Nayland Parish Magazine of July 1910: "A great effort is being made this summer to induce the youth of Nayland to cultivate our National Game of Cricket instead of hanging about under the archway of a well known local tavern smoking cheap cigarettes. At a committee meeting of the Horkesley Park Cricket Club it was decided that for this season at all events, Nayland lads be admitted members of the Club without subscription.... The Club has purchased small size bats for the smaller new members, and it is hoped that real enthusiasm will be displayed."

It is interesting that Nayland and Horkesley cricketers played together even though they were in different counties. The relationship between the two villages had its roots in the days before Domesday as the Manor of Nayland included the Horkesleys until 1517 when they were separated, and in fact Horkesley Park was at one time known as Nayland Park.

As well as playing at Horkesley Park some Nayland cricketers played at Tendring Park in Stoke-by-Nayland, as they still do. The Tendring Park and Horkesley Park estates are both on high ground on either side of the valley where there is no risk of flooding which could be one reason why there has never been a cricket ground in Nayland. Also, the owners of those two large estates were happy to allow villagers to play cricket on their land.

We can only speculate as to what happened to the Nayland Cricket Club but it is a pity that, being one of the first in this area, it is the only one which no longer exists.

CONSERVATION SOCIETY AGM

Nayland with Wissington Conservation Society will continue to monitor the condition of the former White Hart Inn, members heard at the annual meeting.

Chairman John Alexander said the society was in touch with Babergh's conservation officer who had inspected the outside of the building and was hoping to examine the interior. The appeal on plans for 9-11 Mill Street was to be decided on written representations and a decision was due shortly.

Mr Alexander added Bunting and Sons intend to appeal against the refusal by Colchester planning committee of the Horkesley Park application and this may take place in the autumn.

In his report circulated before the meeting he said the largest project ever undertaken in Nayland happened over three days in October when Dr Carezza Lewis and her team supervised the digging of 34 test pits all round the village. More than 100 people of all ages from all parts of the community were involved and Dr Lewis would return to Nayland on April 29 to explain the results.

During the year the society had acquired an original John Constable sketch and the BT kiosk from Wiston was re-instated in Bear Street as a book and magazine exchange.

Treasurer Jennie Jenkins thanked everyone who had contributed to enable the society to purchase land beside Horkesley Road. She added sales of society goods were almost double those of the previous year mainly due to the Jubilee tea towel.

Officers elected were: Chairman John Alexander, vice-chairman Martin Wright, treasurer Jennie Jenkins, secretary Andora Carver, committee: Pauline Heigham, Jill Badman, Mike Hunter, Clemency Doxey and John Partridge who was co-opted.

Mrs Carver was congratulated on receiving a Babergh Community Achievement Award in recognition of her work in the village over the past 34 years and as the society's secretary for 20 years.

The business meeting was followed by a fascinating talk by architectural historian John Walker on Ten Years with Suffolk Timber Framed Buildings.

VILLAGE HALL AGM by Pat Bray

An action plan for 2013/14 was adopted by Nayland village hall management committee at its annual meeting. The plan's aims are to recruit a full management team, create an operating procedures booklet for members, establish an annual maintenance programme, review and update the cleaning equipment, seek to make a financial surplus of £5,000 per year after normal annual running costs of about £16,000 and to seek grants and bequests for the endowment fund. The plan's progress will be reviewed at each meeting.

In his report chairman Iain Wright thanked ten individuals for their varied contributions to the hall. They were John and Yvonne Spooner, Sara Strover, Chris Thompson and Nick Moriarty, Tony Price and Graham Griffiths, Ken Willingale, Gale Scott and Jo Murrison. He also expressed his thanks to the parish council, hall users who helped maintain the gardens and Andrew Gowen for his work as treasurer and his fund-raising plant stall.

Mr Gowen said the hall's annual running costs were £17,000 plus rates and an entertainment licence. Last year, he said, the committee raised £3,400 and without this there would have been a deficit. Evening usage was good but it could be better during the day. He added the endowment fund needed to be greater to ensure the hall's future survival. Bequests from villagers could be encouraged.

The entire committee was re-elected plus Peter Mann. Bryan Smith thanked the committee for its efforts and added he was disappointed so few villagers had attended the meeting.



The Country Harvest

Looking outside today it seems hard to believe that the Elderflower season will soon be here. There are so many things this versatile plant can be used for, here is just one recipe.

Elderflower and Gooseberry Jam

2.7kg (6lb) Gooseberries 12-15 Elderflower Heads
2.7kg (6lb) Sugar 15g (½oz) Butter
1.1lt (2 pints) Water

- Use slightly under ripe gooseberries and remove the tops and tails.
- Cut off the elderflower heads stems close to the flowers. Tie the flowers in a piece of muslin.
- Place all of the fruit into a heavy bottomed saucepan and cover with water. Bring to the boil. Add the elderflower heads. Simmer, stirring occasionally for 30-35 minutes or until the fruit is tender.
- Remove from the heat and take out the elderflower, squeeze then discard. Pulp or mash the fruit. Add the sugar, stir until fully dissolved. Add the butter.
- Bring to the boil and boil rapidly, stirring frequently, for about 10 minutes. Test for a set, when the setting point is reached, remove from the heat. Skim the surface with a slotted spoon. Pot the jam into sterilised jars.


RONALD BLYTHE: A CELEBRATION

He said: "It went very well and all 20 traders were happy with their results. Lots of people said how pleased they were we'd got this going and I hope the village benefits."


Traders sold a variety of locally-produced food including meat, bread, fruit and vegetables and there were several craft stalls.

Kenny, or Tike, as he was known by a lot of his friends and family, was one of 15 siblings. He was born in Kersey on the 6th May, 1926 and at the age of about 6, he and his family moved to Poplar Farm, Stoke-by-Nayland. Gordon can remember when they used to get the carriage out of the barn and push it up the hill and his siblings would jump in the back while Tike would pull the shafts back and steer it down the hill. How did they survive! Gordon also remembers him being the fastest sugar beet hower with his shirt off, no-one could keep up with him, as they were paid by the acre.

After the death of his father, Kenny, his mum, Eleanor, or Nellie as she was known, and younger siblings moved to Essex, where they had various homes, including Kelvedon where Kenny worked for Nat Sherwood as a groom. They also lived in Fingringhoe, Boreham, Great Horkeley and Dedham, where he worked for Moorhouse as a farm labourer, before he and his mother moved to Nayland at Bridge Cottage where his mother died.

Kenny was the only one left at home and he and his mum enjoyed going to the local for his favourite tippie of whiskey and of course his cigarettes. They were both real characters and enjoyed life going out and about. Kenny was a hard worker and had quite a tough working life working on farms and gardening. He lived at Horkeley near the Rose and Crown where he worked for Cricks before moving back to Nayland to the Almshouse, in Newlands Lane, when he worked as a road sweeper at Colchester. He rented an allotment and entered his produce into the Nayland Horticultural Shows, as well as giving his family and friends vegetables. Rose used to cook his Sunday dinner and Elaine, Debbie and Tanya, his nieces used to pretend to ride his motor bike.

Kenny used to win several prizes for his vegetables and



flowers and won the cup "a couple of times", to which you could see such pride on his face. His garden was always a show of colour, especially his dahlias, and he freely gave a bunch to his visitors, earwigs and all! Sometimes the shop Forget Me Not would have a few bunches to sell for him. Kenny was a regular at the Anchor before it was an eating house, where he used to play bar games. The family can recall him ending up in the river one night after a game. This could have been because he had done a bit of cheating! In later life, he enjoyed going to boot sales with Caroline and Steve. He also visited his sister Eileen in Devon several times, which he enjoyed. He was always full of fun and could spin a yarn or two. He was always happy, even when he had health problems, and always cheery around Nayland village sitting on the bench chatting to passers by. So Ken, you will be sadly missed by so many friends and family, rest in peace.

CRIME REDUCTION ADVICE – COLD CALLING

Suffolk Police NEVER recommends utilizing the services of anyone 'Cold Calling' at your property and offering goods or services. We ask that you please read and adhere to the following advice:

- Use your Chain.
- If you don't know who is at the door, ask them.
- Check the caller's ID card. Never be afraid to confirm details by making a phone call to their employer.
- If in doubt, shut your door. Ring 999 to contact the police.
- **Never feel under pressure to make decisions**, which could lead to unnecessary, expensive or poor quality of work being carried out.
- Be wary of anyone calling at your door offering to do repairs or gardening on the spot. If you feel the work is necessary, get personal recommendations; and preferably use a trader who you know has carried out a good job for a neighbour, relative or friend.
- Alternatively look at the Trusted Trader Scheme www.suffolk.gov.uk/trustedtrader, which has a directory that lists local tradesmen who have been checked by Suffolk Trading Standards and have made a commitment to treat their customers fairly.

- Consider getting at least two quotations before agreeing to get any work carried out.
- It is reasonable to pay a small deposit but **never pay in full** in advance before work is completed and never hand over more money if the bill comes to more than the agreed amount.
- Don't keep unnecessary amounts of money at home. If you are in any doubt, contact Consumer Direct on Tel: 08454 04 05 06



Dear all

What do you think of when you consider being a Christian? What do you think of if you think about being part of the church? What does it mean to have any religious belief? Do we need to do it in groups or can it be something we do alone?

What a load of questions!

They have surfaced in my mind because I often wonder about the relevance of the church in today's society, or rather how that relevance is perceived. Does the Christian Gospel influence life in our society, or have we all become self-centred and selfish? I often think that those who don't regularly come to church must wonder what we are up to in our regular acts of worship.

We have a new Archbishop of Canterbury and a new Pope. Both of these people are important leaders within the Christian Church and I believe in the world. I suspect that both come from what we might call different stables.

Archbishop Justin is not a lifelong clergyman. He had a very different career before he was ordained. He brings to the post a different set of skills. He has wisdom and knowledge about things which many Anglican clergy do not have. I suspect that this means he may be more concerned with the perceived and actual relevance of the Anglican Church today and that he may have different ideas about improving it. I hope and pray that he will have the God-given strength to lead the Anglican Church and help us all to ensure that we are relevant and are perceived as relevant.

Pope Francis, we are told, is keen to live the gospel. He preaches it not just in words, but also by example. In his previous post I believe he was keen to live the simple life of the gospel. Whilst he obviously conforms to the liturgical norms of his church, he seems keen to disassociate himself from some of the grandeur which goes with the hierarchy of the church. I hope and pray that he will have the God-given strength to lead the Roman Catholic Church and work towards a greater actual and perceived relevance to today's society.

I hope and pray too that each may influence the other for the greater good of the world today and to show that Christianity is relevant.

Without any doubt in my mind, the Christian Faith has something to offer individuals, society and the world. I am not sure that we Christians are always good at showing that to the world, especially through the Church.

Let's ask the questions. Let's pray that God will give us answers and that we will hear them. Let's pray that as Christ's resurrection people we can be relevant and seen as being relevant. Let's pray that the gospel can be proclaimed in our generation.

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

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
