# NAYLAND WITH WISSINGTON PARISH COUNCIL

Summer Meeting: 12th August 2015

(Minutes available on PC notice board in High Street or www,naylandandwiston.net after the next meeting)

#### COUNCILLORS

Martyn Booth was welcomed to the meeting and he confirmed his willingness to be formally co-opted onto the Parish Council.

#### PLANNING

Councillors had no objections to an application at Clover Cottage 4 Bear Street for listed building consent for repairs/ improvements to a garage subject to the timber used in the construction being oak and this should be a condition of consent and that the Heritage Planning Officer is convinced that the Heritage Asset is not compromised and this must be done through imposed conditions.

#### ALOTTMENTS

Mary George reported the Best Kept Allotment prizes were presented at the Flower Show and suggested that the same judges are booked for next year. There has been a request from the Conservation Society that a technical archaeological survey is carried out on the Allotment Field.

# PARISH COUNCIL OPPOSES COUNCIL HOUSE SALE

At their meeting of 9 September, Nayland with Wissington parish councillors heard that - with no Parish Council consultation - Babergh District Council is offering a council property at 4 Bures Road (a three-bedroom house) for sale on the open market. Chair Mary George described this decision as an 'absolute disgrace' - a sentiment shared with councillors and members of the public alike.

Number 4 Wiston Road has been empty for some time and two other council houses and one privately-owned property are on the same site. Built in the 1930s, it is of single brick construction and requires about £30,000 of renovation work. As it appears that Babergh are reluctant to spend on 4 Bures road, Councillors were concerned to know if council tenants in adjacent properties were living in substandard conditions. Councillors queried whether a housing association might be involved in the necessary upgrade of 4 Bures road if finance is an issue.

District councillor Melanie Barrett said that Babergh officers considered the property 'remote' with a lack of interest from people on the Housing Register and this is why it was put up for sale. Councillors challenged the 'remote' label as it is one mile from Nayland (as indeed the estate agents point out in

It was not clear when 4 Bures Road was last available for bidding through the Housing Register. Had they been aware of the situation, councillors agreed that though interested persons might not have been on the Housing Register, the Parish Council could have alerted local families into action.

Mary George expressed the outrage of all councillors saying that it was very difficult to believe that of the thirty people who showed an interest in the houses built on Wiston Road six years ago, not one was interested in this particular property. Within a period of only 12 hours, councillor Martyn Booth had found three families who were interested in renting the house. They had contacted Babergh only to be told that the property was 'now scheduled for disposal'.

All councillors were confident that once the community is aware of the situation, there will be great local interest as council accommodation is scarce in the parish.

The Parish Council resolved to write immediately to Babergh's Head of Housing and Chief Executive to express their opposition to selling 4 Bures Road, to ask for the sale to be halted.

# Do You Know Someone Eligible For The Walsh Trust Christmas Bonus?

Each Christmas the Walsh Trust, which has two parish council trustees and three others, gives out small cash bonuses to those over 80 who have lived in the village at least three years and who would welcome such a bonus. As the original charities were for providing food and fuel, the Trust gives a present to those who have previously had the bonus but are now in residential care. The income is very small and depending on how many are eligible the amount is normally around £20 for a single person and £25 for two people living in the same house. There is no official way we can find out who is over 80 so we rely on local knowledge and that means all of you.

So please let us know if you are going to be eighty or know someone who will be by Christmas. Contact Mr Battye, Mrs Rolfe, Mrs Mig Knight, Miss Kath Hunt or me, Mrs Knox. My number is 262224. If you already have the bonus and are still living in Nayland you will of course continue to get it and don't need to inform us. But because our income is so small once we have paid out for the year we simply do not have any money left to give late-comers so PLEASE let us know by the **1ST OF DECEMBER**.

## NAYLAND WITH WISSINGTON PARISH COUNCIL

### Meeting: 9th September 2015

(Minutes available on PC notice board in High Street or www,naylandandwiston.net after the next meeting)

#### PUBLIC FORUM

Andora Carver reported that a geophysical survey of the Allotment field might be run as part of a practical course run by Colchester Archaeological Trust. It is believed that evidence of an older settlement may lie under the Allotment field and in Bell Meadow too.

#### DISTRICT COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

District Cllr Melanie Barrett reported that Cllr Jennie Jenkins is chairing Babergh, Ipswich and other councils' discussions on the Government's proposals for English devolution.

Babergh's senior officers coordinated emergency services' response to the recent major fire in Sudbury. Sudbury Town Councillors were impressed by their work and had felt that 'no one was left to themselves'.

#### **FOOTPATH WARDEN**

Sally Bartram said that repairs to Merles Bridge would start on 14 September when both sets of steps would be replaced. There is a missing disc on Footpath 4 which leads past the scout hut. Leavenheath Parish Council has produced a leaflet about their local walks perhaps a similar leaflet could be published for this parish.

#### COUNCILLORS

Cathleen Cannings was welcomed to the meeting as a new Parish Councillor. Russell Badrick has also joined the PC.

#### **FINANCE REPORT**

External auditors recommended changes to how the Council's Risk Management policy is recorded.

### LANDSCAPING AND MAINTENANCE

The PC is seeking quotations for: 1) the landscaping and maintenance of Caley Green, 2) the refurbishment of all public seats in Nayland, 3) the old part of the Playground area.

The boundary of the recreation field, vegetation beside the river and on the verge turning onto the A134 all need cutting. The PC approved a new insurance policy through Hiscox. PLANNING

Reviewing recent planning applications Mary George said no decision has been reached on the appeal at Little Firmins to lift the Agricultural Condition attached to the property.

Discussing new applications councillors had no objections to an application at Highlands, Campion's Hill for a first floor extension, two storey extension on south side of building, new porch, and erection of garage/garden store building or at Gladwin's Farm for a part two-storey, part single-storey, side/rear extensions.



They had no objections to an application to replace undersized roof members at Dresden Cottage, Nayland.

Councillors supported the Heritage Officer's objections to proposed plans at Bridge House, Nayland. The main concerns were regarding the installation of roof-lights and the conversion in the existing garage into additional living space.

The Parish Council was extremely dismayed to hear that Babergh District Council is selling a Council property at 4 Bures Road. Report on page 2

#### RECREATION AND OPEN SPACES

A request from a resident to convert a willow stump on Caley Green into a seat was not approved as Suffolk County Council's conditions included the PC indemnifying Suffolk CC against any claims made by members of the public.

#### **ADVERTISING BANNERS**

The Parish Council will set up a working party to regulate the permission, siting and size of banners. At present, some organisations erect banners without asking permission. Councillors noted that there are rules to follow when installing adverts beside highways. The Village Hall website will carry a note advising hirers that they need permission to install a banner on Caley Green. HIGHWAYS

Of the five illegible wooden street signs reported to Babergh in February, one (in Mill Street) has been replaced. Two pot holes in Mill Street have been filled. Two new leaks erupted following a repaired water main on Campion's Hill; it is hoped that warning will be given of the necessary road closure when the mains pipe is repaired again.

#### STREET LIGHTING

Evidence of contracts and easements concerning a streetlight attached to a dwelling have been requested for insurance purposes. This streetlight has been lighting villagers' way since before 1874 when gas lighting was introduced. Most of the new lighting planned for this year has been installed with Church Street, Fen Street, Newlands Lane and Church Lane scheduled next.

#### **ALLOTMENTS**

It was agreed that the geophysical survey can go ahead at the end of October. The PC will develop a four-year management plan for the allotment field on which the Dedham Vale and Stour Valley Project will be consulted.

#### VILLAGE HALL

Councillor Ian Harris is dealing with the field gate repairs. COMMUNITY COUNCIL

Mary reported that the First Response team gave a demonstration of a defibrillator. The PC was positive towards the idea of having a publicly available defibrillator sited in the village. These are usable by a novice (audible guidance is provided by the defibrillator) and could save lives.

Neil Barbrook welcomed members to the meeting.

**Executive Committee:** Members voted unanimously in favour when Rachel Hitchcock agreed to join the Executive Committee.

Neil Barbrook said we should encourage any potential new members to come along and also encourage representatives of village groups to support CC meetings.

**Fundraising Activities:** Julie Clark and Rachel Hitchcock volunteered to sell advance raffle tickets for the Quiz at the September Farmers' Market from 9.30am-1pm. Volunteers are needed for markets on 10th October and 14th November.

Ideas for fundraising are always welcome.

**CC History & Website:** Lorraine Brooks said further information relating to the history of the CC would be welcome especially as the 50th anniversary is fast approaching; this could be any details, memorabilia or photos which could be copied or photographed.

**CC Asset List:** Claire Buller confirmed the School will store the Father Christmas costume; we should let them know when it is required for the Christmas Fayre.

**Correspondence:** The Women's Institute has invited members to their coffee morning to celebrate the Centenary of the National WI on 18th September.

#### **RECENT ACTIVITIES:**

**Picnic in the Park:** Neil thanked lain Wright and Mandy Cook for organising the event and all those who helped make it an enjoyable day. Iain said the invoice for the Village Hall hire hadn't come in yet but the event was likely result in a small profit.

#### **GRANTS & DONATIONS:**

**Village Stiles:** Neil Barbrook said there is no news currently on the possibility of replacing another stile, located after the footbridge turning right towards Gravel Hill.

**Amy Napper Charity Trip:** The grant of £250 supporting the cost of Amy's trip to Malawi with other midwifery students from Southampton University has been paid. Rachel Hitchcock said Amy gave a talk about her trip to school children before she left and Neil said Amy would attend a CC meeting to let us know how the trip went.

**Village Hall Kitchen Refurbishment:** Information had been circulated prior to the meeting and lain Wright answered queries at the start of the meeting. It was noted that considerable expenditure would be required next year for repairs to the village hall roof and the CC would be approached for a grant again. For the kitchen refurb the cost to upgrade the electrical supply (£3,708), alter the kitchen layout and purchase a new cooker and hot cupboard would total £7,116.43.

After some discussion members highlighted concerns and would not support the application as it stood. If the VHMC submits a revised scheme taking on board some of our comments the CC would consider awarding a £3,500 grant at its next meeting.

The concerns were: that further grants, particularly Community Action Suffolk and the Lottery, have not been investigated; that consultation with other users of the kitchen (the CC executive, Fete, Open Gardens, Flower Show, Harvest Supper, etc) had not taken place; that the proposed plan includes loss of worktop. Feedback has identified considerable concern over the loss of worktop space. Replacing the existing cooker instead of having an additional cooker was the majority opinion. It was suggested a hot cupboard on wheels should be considered and could provide more options for use.

**Voting Policy:** lain Wright was not present for this item. Following discussions regarding clarifying the voting policy it was agreed that: in order to vote on proposals/grants Executive members should be present at meetings or submit their votes in writing or by email to the Chairman prior to the meeting; those with a vested interest are excluded from voting and from being present during discussions.

#### TREASURER'S REPORT

Income to date includes: Community Times £2493.80, Calendar £301.30. Expenditure includes: Community Times £603, Calendar £547, Fireworks £1020.72, Grants £1853.92. Monies received at the meeting totalled £262.50 (£87.50 CT, £175 Calendar). We hold £794.67 for First Response, £270 for the Services Fund and a grant of £500 for the Conservation Society Book. Therefore unencumbered assets are £18,019.03.

**COMMUNITY TIMES:** Lorraine Brooks said a volunteer to write reports on alternate Parish Council meetings is still required; the meetings are on the second Wednesday of the month.

Photos of village activities are nice to include so please email them through after your society events, including CC activities, etc as Lorraine is no longer able to attend many events to take photographs.

VILLAGE CALENDAR: Lorraine Brooks said calendars are on sale in local shops; the Post Office, Blue Owl Hatten's Village Stores and Forget Me Not. Suggestions to help boost sales are welcome and if anyone is able to assist by selling calendars at events please let Lorraine know.

Neil reminded everyone to take photos for next year's calendar competition.

#### FORTHCOMING ACTIVITIES:

**Fun Village Quiz - Friday 2nd October:** Rachel Hitchcock said preparations are in hand and posters are out. Iain Wright previously volunteered to step in to help if required. Claire Buller and Vicki Sargent will organise the raffle - first prize will be £50.

**Bonfire & Fireworks - Thursday 5th November:** Neil said the fireworks have been ordered. Neil will email round with the list of tasks and volunteers. Those at the meeting said they would be able to help again. Anyone else who could volunteer to help with manning the gates, clearing up the next morning, etc should contact Neil.

**Christmas Fayre - 6th December:** ideas and preparations will be discussed next meeting. Jayne Kennedy has confirmed that the School Choir and Ukuleles will perform again. Rachel will check whether soup will be available. It was agreed the 2016 Fayre will be held on Saturday 3rd December as the village hall was already booked by someone else on Sunday 4th. **Street Fayre - Sunday 17th July 2016, 11am-4pm:** Claire Buller is leading an enthusiastic sub-committee, including Julie

Clark, Jenny & Gary Napper, Mandy Cook and Gail Scott. Their next meeting is Monday 30th November, 7.30pm at 107 Bear Street.

The theme will be the 1960s. The Village Players, Nayland Choir and Nayland School choir are all going to contribute to the day. Punch and Judy, a 60s band and some side stalls are booked. They will be applying for any grants available from Community Action Suffolk. Street closure is being applied for; this will entail someone attending a traffic management session but no fee will be charged as the event is a community activity. Enquiries are being made regarding parking on Court Knoll.

A letter will be sent to all the village organisations asking them to commit to holding a stall/activity. They will not be required to pay for their pitches/tables.

The next Street Fayre meeting will be on Monday 30th November, 7.30pm at 107 Bear Street.

#### SOCIETY REPORTS

Art Group: Colin Ramsell said they had just begun their autumn term.

**Conservation Society:** John Partridge said Rosemary Knox will be talking about 'Aspects and personalities of Wiston' at their meeting on 13th October. They have complained to Essex CC about the time it is taking them to undertake repairs to Merle's footbridge.

**Parish Council:** Mary George said the footpath warden has made some progress regarding the footbridge with Essex CC who estimate work is likely to commence on14th September. They are creating a 4-year management plan for the allotment field but there are dog fouling problems on the field which contaminates the hay. Pot holes and incidents of SatNav directing HGV along inappropriate routes can be more efficiently reported online. There remains one vacancy on the PC; Martyn Booth, Russell Badrick and Kathleen Cannings have joined the PC.

**Village Players:** Bryan Smith said rehearsals begin this week for their production *'The Woman in White'* by Constance Cox'. Performances will be on 19th-21st November.

**Women's Institute:** Lorna Rumsey said the Nayland branch are holding a celebration Coffee Morning on 18th September to mark the centenary of the National WI. All are welcome fro 10am-12 noon. Penny Allen, a Nayland branch member, has created a banner which will be included in a celebration parade in Bury St Edmunds.

**HortSoc:** Lorraine Brooks said they've had a busy year. The summer garden party at Parkers went very well as did the Flower Show. Entries were very good and the show was well supported for which they are grateful. But their efforts to encourage more children and families to enter weren't as successful.

The pace is more leisurely for a while with an outing to Hatfield House in Hertfordshire on 8th September. For autumn they retreat inside; on 20th October Michael Warren will talk on 'Gardeners Delight: vegetable gardens, mine and others' and on 9th November, at the joint meeting with the Conservation Society, Barry Kaufmann-Wright will talk on his 'Role of a Police Wildlife Crime Officer'.

Show day on 8th August saw a steady flow of visitors coming along to the 34th annual Flower Show –

as reported on page 30. We can already reveal that the subjects for the photography class at the 2016 show will be 'Country Lane' and 'An Interesting Building' so get out and about with your cameras soon to capture some colourful shots. And don't forget photos taken in Nayland and Wiston could perhaps be entered in the next calendar competition.

Amid the recent unsettled weather HortSoc has been very lucky; the sun beamed down on us for a very enjoyable coach outing to Hatfield House and Gardens in Hertfordshire during September. Set in beautiful gardens and parkland the impressive Jacobean house was built in 1611 by Robert Cecil, 1st Earl of Salisbury and chief minister to King James, on the site adjoining the Old Palace of Hatfield where Elizabeth I spent most of her childhood. It was splendidly decorated for entertaining the Royal Court, with rooms rich in paintings, fine furniture and tapestries and has been splendidly preserved.

Superb examples of Jacobean craftsmanship can be

seen throughout, including the grand staircase with its fine carving and the rare stained glass window in the private chapel. The two-storeyed marble hall has oak panelling and a minstrels' gallery. The armoury displays historic armour including some taken from the men of the Spanish Armada. The kitchens and basement rooms have been restored back to 1846, the time Queen Victoria first visited. Displayed throughout the House are many historic mementos collected over the centuries by the Cecil family and many reminders of Elizabeth I scattered throughout. Among these are the 'Ermine Portrait' by Nicholas Hilliard and the impressive and iconic 'Rainbow Portrait' of the Queen, which was painted by Isaac Oliver around 1600.

The 42 acres of formal and woodland gardens were first designed in the early 17th century by Salomon de Caus and developed by John Tradescant the Elder who went to Europe to bring back trees, bulbs, plants, and fruit trees which had never previously been grown in England. During the 18th century the gardens declined as the marchioness preferred hunting to gardening, but her son began their restoration, which continued in earnest in Victorian times. Today, they are delightfully restored with the inclusion of some modern features marking each generation of the Cecil family.

During World War I, parts of the grounds were used to test the first British tanks; an area was dug with trenches and craters and covered with barbed-wire to represent no man's land and German trench lines on the Western Front and during WW2 the house was offered for use as an army hospital. Portions of the house and exterior have been used in film television productions. Hatfield House provided a delightful and interesting day out with something for everyone.

As autumn beckons our activities will retreat indoors; our autumn speaker 20th October will be Michael Warren who will give an illustrated talk on 'Gardeners Delight: Vegetable gardens, mine and others'. This is open to non-members and will be held at the Church Hall, Bear Street, Nayland at 7.40 for 8pm.

At our joint meeting with the Conservation Society on Monday 9th November Barry Kaufmann-Wright, will be speaking about his former career, 'The Role of a Police Wildlife Crime Officer' at Nayland Village Hall 7.40 for 8pm. All are very welcome.

We will be having a stall at the Community Council's **Christmas Family Fayre** on Sunday 6th December, 12 noon to 2.30pm in the Village Hall. Our Parochial Church Council has now agreed, unanimously, to the Friends suggestion that a Lavatory and Servery is built within St. James'. Initial consultation with the Diocesan Advisory Committee seems to have their support also. The Friends have now instructed a local Architect to draw up some initial, outline plans for the consideration of our P.C.C. and the D.A.C. # Garden Notes

## by The Old Muckspreader

A September garden is usually one that is well past its best; most of the flowering shrubs have done their stuff, the annuals with one or two exceptions are over, and the herbaceous perennials still in flower are the exception rather than the rule. There are however a few, and here is a selection.

Among annuals Cosmos starts flowering late and if regularly dead-headed will go on flowering well into autumn. That is, of course, if it hasn't been attacked by rabbits, as happened here. Diascia is another, though it's probably really a tender perennial; here it survived the mild winter.

Of the true perennials the Asters (Michaelmas Daisies) are about to flower here, and so are the Japanese Anemones, Anemone Hupehensis. The latter take a year or two to settle down if moved, but afterwards will spread themselves, sometimes a bit too much. Another plant, a bulbous one, is the Toad Lily (Tricyrtis) with its small spotted flowers.

Sedums are in full flower, and when there are some around a great attraction for butterflies. Not often seen, but good value, is Physostegia the so-called Obedient Plant; the flowers have hinged stalks and remain in position once they have been moved around.

What about Chrysanthemums? Not those with flowers almost the size of a football (OK for exhibiting if you want to) but the spray type with single flowers.

We're back into shrubs now with Hydrangeas. Their only drawback is that as indicated by their name they like water, and if planted in dry old East Anglia they need a regular watering in summer to produce a decent show of flower.

On a recent visit to Helmingham Hall, which stages plant fairs twice a year, the OM/ S noticed large plantations of Dahlias in their walled garden. They were very popular in the 1930s when the tubers were dug up as winter approached, wrapped in sacking and stored in sheds or indoors. Now most gardeners seems to leave them in the ground, protected by a good covering of soil, leafmould, or whatever. This has certainly sufficed in our recent mild winters, but might not if we got a really cold one.

It's not too late to plant bulbs for next spring, though Colchicums (often wrongly called Autumn Crocuses) are both for sale and in flower.

It is worth keeping an eye on the Wyevale Garden Centre at Newton Green; there are usually excellent bargains to be had with unsold bulbs in a few weeks time.

Our Swallows produced two broods this year (eight young in all), but there is always the doubt whether the second lot are sufficiently mature to make the journey to South Africa.

# THE STANNARD'S, MILLERS OF WISTON AND NAYLAND

A few years ago I corresponded with a descendant of the Stannard family which played an important part in Wiston and Nayland's history during the 19<sup>th</sup> century. Mr John Dudin who lives in Hampshire is the great, great, grandson of Jeremiah Stannard who was born in 1817. Mr Dudin has researched his family's history and a mutual exchange of information has added to our knowledge of his family's connections with Wiston and Nayland.

The Stannard family owned the mill in Wiston from about 1800 and then later the Nayland mill. This was a time of considerable activity on the River Stour as a result of the Navigation Act of 1705 and milling was an important industry, creating a lot of employment for local people. Horse drawn barges or 'lighters' collected flour from the various mills along the river from Sudbury to Mistley. Once a year the Stannards also arranged a barge trip along the river for the children of the village who stopped off for a picnic along the way. Vivid childhood memories of these outings have been recorded.

Jeremiah Stannard was married to Mary Ann with whom he had 11 children. After Mary Ann died Jeremiah remarried. He died in 1899 and he and both his wives were buried in Nayland churchyard, together with some of their children. Other members of the family were buried at Wiston. A conveyance shows that Jeremiah the younger acquired the Nayland mill on the corner of Fen Street and other property from William Stammers in 1846. He lived in the house adjoining the mill with his young family and the 1851 Census described him as a miller, corn and coal merchant employing 22 men. In later life he became one of Nayland's first Parish Councillors when the Council was created in 1894.

Not long after taking over the Nayland mill Jeremiah and his wife tragically lost one of their sons. In 1851 their second son Walter had an accident in the mill which resulted in his death. Aged six he was amusing himself with the millers and went too near the machinery. He was dragged into the machinery by his clothes and was crushed to death. The accident and his injuries were graphically described in a press report which stated that a verdict of Accidental Death was returned by the inquest. The report also said that a few years earlier Walter's brother had been drowned in the mill pool, presumably at Wiston.

1851 seems to have been an eventful year for Jeremiah Stannard. Another press report appeared in *The Spectator*, headed **Honesty, and Munificent Reward**: "While Mr Stannard of Nayland Mill was driving in his chaise to Hadleigh he lost a bag containing eleven hundred sovereigns. After his return to Nayland he was delighted by a small farmer bringing him the treasure which he had found on the road. Mr Stannard presented the farmer with one hundred of the sovereigns."

Twenty years later in 1874 Jeremiah Stannard was once again in the news. A press report headed Daring Burglary at Nayland described how "a burglary, which for daring was never equalled in this neighbourhood was committed on the premises of Mr Jeremiah Stannard, miller". The raid took place at 2 o'clock on the Sunday morning. The mill foreman heard noises coming from the office and roused Mr Stannard and his two sons, Edward and Henry. With three bludgeons and a revolver between them the four men attacked the intruders and captured one of them. The others got away but the brave actions of the miller and his comrades aroused the public spirit. In April 1877 Mr Stannard was presented with a Testimonial at a public luncheon at the Cups Hotel in Colchester with the names of 400 subscribers for the "public spirit and high sense of social duty displayed in his exertions to discover and bring to justice the offenders engaged in "The Nayland Burglary" of the 15<sup>th</sup> February 1874". The names included many local dignitaries such as Sir Charles Rowley Bart, JP, and prominent residents of Nayland and Wiston.



Jeremiah Stannard

Jeremiah and Mary Ann's fourth son, Henry, who helped his father in the famous burglary, was born in Nayland in 1850. He married Katherine Holton of the Wiston farming family and they had one daughter, Alice Muriel, who was born in 1879 and was John Dudin's grandmother.

Alice, known as Muriel Stannard, was a distinguished soprano in the early years of 20<sup>th</sup> century. Mr Dudin has a poster dated 25 May 1909 advertising an evening concert, at which Muriel sang, in the Steinway Hall in Lower Seymour Street, West London. Reviews by the Daily Telegraph and several other newspapers reported that the large audience enjoyed the pleasing quality of her voice and her refined taste and artistic style of singing.

Another member of the family, Frank Stannard, enjoyed painting and Mr Dudin has a picture of Wiston Mill painted by Frank with an inscription on the back: "Wiston Mill Colchester. Painted by F Stannard. Presented to ? Holton on her birthday August 2<sup>nd</sup> 1912". Interestingly another picture painted by F Stannard, this time of "J Stannard's Mill at Nayland 1850" came to light in 2013 and is now in Nayland.

Mr Dudin also has another unique and interesting artefact in his possession. This is a Police Constable's truncheon which has "Wiston Suffolk" painted on a scroll with a King's crown and marked GIIIR. King George III reigned from 1738 until 1820 by which time the Stannard family were at Wiston mill. Whilst Nayland and Wiston are now one civil parish they each had their own manor courts centuries ago and would have appointed their own constables.

After nearly a century of corn milling at Wiston and Nayland mills the Stannard family's ownership came to an end around the end of the 19<sup>th</sup> century when a bank failure in Colchester caused their bankruptcy. Wiston Mill continued as a working mill into the 20<sup>th</sup> century but Nayland mill stood empty for several years before it was partly dismantled and adapted for other uses.

Welcome to this month's Police news item.

Halloween is coming up at the end of the month as well as bonfire night at the beginning of November; please consider others on both of these nights and all can have a good time.

Suffolk Police are urging you to consider the effect your actions may have on others this Halloween and Bonfire Night – and to respect those may not want to take part in the festivities.

Traditionally both Halloween and Bonfire nights are busy for police with a large number of calls during the end of October and beginning of November relating to anti-social behaviour by a minority who take trick or treating too far and fireworkrelated incidents.

We want people to enjoy their Halloween and Bonfire night celebrations but we also want those taking part to have consideration for others.

There is a need for everyone taking part to behave responsibly. We would ask parents to ensure they supervise their children, for their own safety and to ensure they do not call at addresses where the occupants do not want to take part and that anyone trick or treating only visits homes where they know the residents. Most residents that do like to take part normally have some form of Halloween gimmick outside their property. Halloween and Bonfire night can be genuinely scary for many older residents - please don't cause them any unnecessary distress. There is a line between high spirits and anti- social behaviour and we are well aware there are small minorities who will ignore our appeals and we will be out trying to cause trouble.

A series of posters has been produced which address the issues surrounding Halloween. One is designed for those who do not want to take part while another asks parents if they would normally let their children call on a stranger's home unsupervised. These posters will be put up around the county and are being widely distributed to schools and businesses, (look out for these nearer the time in your local shops, also at Hadleigh police station).

Don't forget the clocks will go back at the end of the month.

This is a little reminder I use to remember which way and when to change the clocks: spring forward (*one hour forward in the spring time*) and fall back (*one hour back in the fall*/ *autumn*).

# Feedback from James Finch - Your Stour Valley County Councillor

#### KEY STAGE 2 RESULTS SHOW SIGNIFICANT IMPROVEMENTS FOR SUFFOLK SCHOOLS

The percentage of pupils achieving the expected levels in reading, writing and maths in primary schools in Suffolk is continuing to rise.

Data released by the Department for Education this last month show that 77% of 11-year-olds achieved level 4 or higher in their SAT tests in the three subjects in 2015 - up from 73% in 2014. The Suffolk figure of 77% closes the gap to the national average, which stands at 80%. These results mean that Suffolk has improved on its ranking against all authorities, moving up 22 places to 118<sup>th</sup> and is now 118 out of 150. This is an improvement of 22 places from last year. Another positive figure emerging for Suffolk is the progress in writing between Key Stages 1 and 2. The percentage of pupils making the expected progress went up from 89% in 2014 to 91% this year. The percentage of children making expected progress from key stage 1 to 2 in Reading and Maths also increased. Both areas seeing a one percentage point rise. (NB: All results at this stage are provisional. The validated figures will be published in October.)

Driving up educational attainment levels remains our top priority. These results are a real vindication of the work being put in by everyone involved. In the past few weeks we have received very encouraging A-Level and GCSE results; the Key Stage 2 grades today continue that trend and show definitive progress is being made.

# SUFFOLK'S BROADBAND PROGRAMME GETS NEW CASH INJECTION AS TAKE UP PASSES 20 PER CENT

Around £3.9 million is being made available to extend further the reach of high-speed fibre broadband across Suffolk as part of the Better Broadband for Suffolk Programme.

This additional amount is funding that BT is making available to extend Broadband Delivery UK (BDUK) projects as a result of the success of the projects in achieving higher than expected take-up levels so far. The money is for SCC to re-invest in further superfast broadband coverage to more homes and businesses, earlier than originally planned. This cash injection into the roll-out programme is great news as we pass the 20% take-up rate. It will help us to maintain our current momentum in getting communities across Suffolk switched on. We are on course to hit our target of reaching 100,000 properties by the end of this year and entering our second agreed contract with BT to deliver even more coverage in 2016 and beyond. We are committed to reaching 100% of all properties by 2020. It is important for all residents and businesses to understand that where high speed broadband service is available, they must contact their service provider to make the switch. It is not an automatic process."

The roll-out of broadband across Suffolk is one of the most profound infrastructure projects we have seen for decades. We are committed to supporting this project through to completion: generating economic growth and jobs, but also having a major positive impact on the quality of life for people across the county.
