NAYLAND WITH WISSINGTON PARISH COUNCIL

Meeting: 10th February 2016

(Minutes available on PC notice board in High Street or www.naylandandwiston.net after the next meeting)

PUBLIC FORUM

Items raised included litter on the verges on Horkesley Hill and dogs to be kept on leads near sheep under the Countryside and Rights of Way Act.

FINANCE COMMITTEE

The precept request had been acknowledged. The Parish Council agreed not to contribute towards the funding of a Police Community Support Officer as the concept was considered fundamentally wrong. It was noted that the Standing Orders and Financial Regulations should be reviewed annually. It was agreed for Graham Walker to work with councillors to make calculations in respect of Asset Management.

PLANNING

Reviewing planning applications Mary George said permission had been granted at **Ricklands House, Cawley Road** for alteration to existing access, erection of a garage, erection of porch and conversion of approved garage to summer house, subject to a number of conditions.

The Informal Appeal hearing relating to removal of an agricultural occupancy condition at Little Firmins, Cawley Road is scheduled for 16th February.

Discussing new applications councillors had no objections to an application at **High Garth House**, **Cawley Road** to alter the roofline on the cart-lodge and for two new dormer windows and velux style roof lights. Councillors objected to an application for listed building consent at **The Manse**, **27 Bear Street** for alterations, demolition of single storey lean-to's and repairs on the grounds of not having sight of the Heritage Officer's assessment and that the applicant did not seek pre-application advice.

The Chairman was pleased to report that an electronic version of the Local List had been sent to Babergh and they are now making this available via their website.

An approach had been made by Stoke by Nayland Parish Council regarding Planning Together and Community Engagement. Mary George and Gerry Battye agreed to attend the first meeting with them and report back to councillors.

It was agreed Ian Tippett, Babergh's Housing Development Officer, would attend at the start of the March PC meeting to give a presentation on a Housing Needs Survey.

HIGHWAYS

The poor condition of the road surface in Cawley Road has been reported. Delays in the emptying of refuse bins, despite requests being made has been resolved. The priorities of our litter contractors have been altered in view of the forthcoming Community litter pick. The road sweeping carried out by Babergh was discussed and it was agreed to ask whether this extends to Wiston. It was agreed to alert Leavenheath Parish Council to the untidy state of the lay-by between Nayland and Honey Tye. It was agreed to report fly tipping near the nature reserve on the A134 to Babergh. It was agreed to defer the item of a Village Sign to the March Meeting.

Gerry Battye agreed to meet potential contractors regarding installing a notice board inside the Heycroft Way bus shelter. The old one on the outside could then be removed. They could also consider the best approach regarding a cycle rack being installed inside the bus shelter. Martyn Booth agreed to consider ideas in respect of a bicycle rack.

. It was agreed to report the state of the tarmac on the steps in Star Alley to Suffolk CC. The pot holes outside Forget Me Not which are getting bigger have been reported.

RECREATION AND OPEN SPACES

Gerry Battye and Ian Harris outlined progress towards authorisation of major work at the playground. They are liaising with the contractors to ensure the quotations are comparable before making the final decision.

Our grounds maintenance contractors have a list of more

minor items to work through and it was agreed to ask them to cut back the hedge at Pop's Piece.

The signs advertising the Farmers Market were mentioned. **VILLAGE HALL**

Tricia Fuller confirmed the curry night had been successful and raised substantial funds. She met Paul Gant, SCC Highways, in respect of the sign to the Village Hall. They have had reports of the floor becoming slippery and are investigating. The AGM is scheduled for 7th March, following the Community Council AGM.

BURIAL GROUND

Mary George confirmed that winter clearance work had been agreed with our grounds maintenance contractor. Councillors approved the replacement of some fencing panels. It was agreed for the Clerk to ask Nayland House to clear ivy from their side of the fencing.

ANNUAL PARISH ASSEMBLY

The date had been set for 17th May at the Village Hall, with refreshments at 7.45 for a 8pm start. A potential presentation about the Allotment Field was discussed. Reports will be displayed as in previous years and questions will be taken from residents. The Parish Assembly would be a good place to publicise the remaining vacancy on the Parish Council. **IN BRIEF:**

The Police report said there were no crimes reported in the Parish during November and December.

The Chairman was delighted to advise that our two nominations for Community Achievement Awards had been successful.

Councillors agreed the on the position for the new lamp-post in Court Street.

It was agreed for the Chairman and Clerk to liaise over a suitable date for the annual allotment holders meeting.

A letter from James Cartlidge MP with a petition in respect of improving mobile phone coverage was shared with members. It was agreed to make the petition available for signing in public places around the village.

HOUSING NEEDS SURVEY

Prior to the PC meeting, Ian Tippett, Housing Needs Development Officer at Babergh gave a resume of how the Parish Council could implement a Housing Needs Survey, what information to ask about and processes to follow after the survey.

Babergh is finalising a survey with Community Action Suffolk. Babergh may financially contribute to surveys run concurrently and later in the year at Nayland with Wissington, Stoke by Nayland and Leavenheath. The survey would gather information across all tenures, age-groups and households.

lan Tippett explained that the successful housing built by Babergh and a Housing Association (HA) on Wiston Road was permitted under Planning Policy as it was deemed a 'Rural Exception' site. It followed a housing survey that proved local housing need and the housing there exists to provide 'affordable' housing in perpetuity.

Fewer grants are available for the construction of homes and the government is looking at whether HA tenants should have the same right to buy (RTB) as council house tenants, At present, HAs can choose whether they want to sell their properties or not.

One way to support the construction of further homes is to include an element of 'open market' housing (available for purchase. Open market housing might meet the need of older residents looking to downsize and wanting to stay in their locality, for example), but Babergh's current policy prohibits this on Rural Exception sites.

Babergh's Core Strategy (August 2014) sets out a more flexible approach to housing provision in rural areas. If developments meet the CS11 criteria, then it is possible to include an open market element.

Councillors considered the possibility that Housing Association tenants having a RTB would have a bearing on the willingness of landowners to provide land for local housing and that - if open market housing were included in new developments - it would be important to get the proportion right. Ian explained that in some instances, developments have included a couple of plots for the landowners, to allow them to make a financial return from their land. He assured Councillors that Babergh would expect all developers and HAs to be of a high standard.

lan Tippett suggested that the first action was to carry out the survey, see what the need is and then put out feelers to local landowners for potential sites. At present, there are only nine applicants on the waiting list for housing in Nayland with Wissington but many people do not register their housing need at all.

Councillors were interested in proceeding with a survey later in the year to run concurrently with Stoke by Nayland and Leavenheath. **PUBLIC FORUM**

The issue of garden debris blocking the grill at the Mill Street bridge was raised. Contractors were required to return after one week and were convinced the debris was from Bear Street riverside gardens. The PC would again write to residents to request that no debris is thrown into the river.

PLANNING

Reviewing planning applications Mary George said permission had been granted at **High Garth House**, **Cawley Road** to alter the roofline on the cart-lodge and for two new dormer windows and velux style roof lights and listed building consent had been granted at **5 Court Street** for (retention of) conversion of existing basement to habitable space; structural works to timber floor joists over basement; alterations to bathroom; conversion of existing bedroom to en-suite shower room; raise ceiling tie to front bedroom on second floor; repairs, maintenance and insulation to existing roof over three-storey section of building.

Discussing new applications councillors had no objections to the erection of ground and first floor rear extension and alterations at **10 Heycroft Way** or at **34 Bear Street** for conversion of existing shed and pagoda to form additional living accommodation, on condition that there is no occupation or resale as a separate dwelling.

Planning together and Community engagement is a local initiative through which the Parish Councils of Nayland with Wissington, Stoke by Nayland, Leavenheath and Polstead are meeting on 14 April. Parish Councillors have already met with the Rowley Almshouses trustees in Stoke by Nayland. In addition to the existing almshouses, they own two further parcels of land. To make it viable while running with no profit, they are looking to develop mixed tenure housing. The development would not be subject to possible legislation regarding right-to-buy. Under an ancient deed, Nayland with Wissington parishioners can apply for Rowley Almshouses housing.

RECREATION AND OPEN SPACES

The PC is finalising action on safety surfacing the Playground. Mary George congratulated everyone who took part in clearing rubbish from the parish as part of the Clean for the Queen campaign. The participants suggested carrying out another 'sweep' in the Autumn.

The PC is considering possible changes with the management of Caley Green.

HIGHWAYS

Mary George and Martyn Booth attended a January meeting of Suffolk Association of Local Councils (SALC). Councils complained about accident debris being left on verges, 'Road Closed' signs being left beyond their need, and mud, silt and gravel left on roads.

IN BRIEF:

Tricia Fuller reported that the VH had had another successful year. There are vacancies on the VH Management Committee.

The joint Community council and PC defibrillator project is ongoing. The CC now has a new Treasurer.

The potential development of the Allotment Field will be a main agenda item next month.

Broken planks on the footpath behind the scout hut have been repaired.

A street light in Heycroft Way was not working; councillors were alerted to https://www.suffolk.gov.uk/roads-and-transport/street -lighting-traffic-signals-and-pedestrian-crossings/street-lighting/ for reporting faulty street lights at Suffolk County Council.

ANNUAL PARISH ASSEMBLY

The date for the Parish Assembly will be Tuesday 17th May at 7.45 for 8pm in the Village Hall. Councillors discussed items for the agenda including the Housing Survey, cycle rack and potential plans for the Allotment field.

The Parish Council meeting to be held on 11th May, will be held at the <u>Church Hall</u> (not the Village Hall committee room).

CHAIRMAN'S REPORT: Neil Barbrook gave his report.

First of all I would like to thank all the members of the Community Council for all their efforts over the last year in organizing and helping with the running of various events and attending meetings. These events make a significant contribution to our finances which enable us to provide grants to various village organizations and groups.

Once again thanks to Lorraine for all her work in producing agendas and minutes, but especially for putting together and publishing the Community Times, which miraculously drops on people's mats bi-monthly. The CT also makes a huge financial contribution as you will see from our accounts.

The Calendar team also deserve special thanks for producing this 'must have' part of Nayland life.

On the subject of accounts, I would like to thank lain Wright for stepping forward at last year's AGM to fill the Treasurer's role.

Last year we organized our usual events - the Quiz, Bonfire night and Christmas Fayre and in addition the Picnic in the Park in July complete with duck race. Thanks to everyone who helped with those; Rachel Hitchcock and helpers for the Quiz, Iain Wright and Mandy Cook for the PIP with some good performances from local groups and individuals. I must also mention the Duck Race team who eventually overcame the fact that the ducks were travelling faster than the waders in the stream but a last ditch interception by someone jumping in at the finish line and catching the winning duck saved the day.

The rain that started during the afternoon of 5th November and continued throughout our Bonfire night had considerable impact on our evening. It not only caused problems for the firework team but also meant our food and drink stalls were set up inside the hall rather than outside. Numbers were down as was the profit made but we still had a good evening. Thanks to everyone involved in our Bonfire Night and to Fred Bugg for organizing the bonfire.

The final event was the Christmas Fayre when we eventually attracted a few more stalls than normal, and had a good musical performance from Nayland Primary School. Further thanks are due to the CT distributors and those who put up notices.

The Christmas tree once again took pride of place in the Village centre and looked good, despite a car being in the way when we arrived to put it up.

The following grants were awarded: £1000 Village Hall Endowment Fund, £250 Table Tennis Group for a new table, £250 Amy Napper for a charity trip to Malawi, £400 First Response for a new defibrillator, £150 towards holding a local history exhibition. In January, we agreed to give £3,500 to the VHMC towards the cost of their kitchen upgrade works.

We will continue to work with the Parish Council and others towards having a community defibrillator installed at the Fire Station.

Moving forward into 2016 it is an important year for the Community Council and we're all looking forward to the Street Fayre on 17th July. I want to thank Claire and the team for their ongoing efforts and very much hope that everyone supports this big village event marking 50 years of the Community Council.

My final comment is to request that members make an effort to reply to emails which request/invite a reply regarding issues we are considering.

TREASURER'S REPORT: Iain Wright distributed the accounts and asked if there were any queries. Claire Buller raised queries on the Quiz income and Street Fayre budget allocation, Lorraine Brooks queried Calendar income. The accounts had been examined by Sandi Patel of SHP, Chartered Certified Accountants, Colchester. The accounts for 2015 were adopted). Finances from 1st January to date was not available. Iain was thanked for standing in as Treasurer during 2015.

ELECTION OF OFFICERS: Officers were re-elected en bloc: President Ken Willingdale, Vice President Bryan Smith, Chairman Neil Barbrook, Vice Chairman Colin Ramsell. Secretary Lorraine Brooks, Parish Council Rep Martyn Booth, Legal Advisor Katie Wright. Committee members were re-elected en bloc: Executive Tricia Hall, Julie Clark, Iain Wright, Individual Claire Buller, Vicki Sargent, Rachel Hitchcock, John Parsonson, Colin Moule. Maggie Ryan was elected as Treasurer and welcomed to the CC.

MATTERS ARISING

Community Defibrillator: Iain Wright had agreed to take this project, for a proposed community defibrillator sited at Nayland Fire Station, forward in conjunction with the Parish Council. There is no progress to report.

GRANTS & DONATIONS

Village Hall Kitchen: A letter of thanks has been received from Peter Mann, VH Treasurer, thanking the CC for a £3,500 grant towards the kitchen refurbishment.

Nayland Archive Exhibition: Wendy Sparrow thanked the CC for a grant of £150 to cover the hire of the church hall for a local history exhibition. The event had been very successful, exceeding her expectations. Donations of £135 taken during the weekend had been presented to the CC.

Conservation Society: A grant request had been received for £500 towards historical investigation work at Court Knoll. The total cost would be approx £8,000; £4,000 from their funds and £3,500 grant from the Stour Valley Trust. They hope the work may take place in September. This grant would replace the grant we had previously agreed towards costs of a book which is not likely to come to fruition in the near future. The grant was agreed.

Mother & Toddler Group: A grant request had been received for £150 towards a shortfall in current running costs due to fluctuating attendance. Since a recent promotion drive numbers had picked up a little and promotion was continuing. Members felt it was important to support this group and agreed the grant. It was noted that the current leaders would be standing down in September when their children moved on to school. New leaders are being sought.

Grant Voting Policy: Members voted to formally adopt clarification of the voting policy which was discussed and agreed in September. This was that: in order to vote on proposals/grants Executive members should be present at meetings or submit their votes in writing or by email to the Chairman prior to the meeting; those with a vested interest are excluded from voting and from being present during discussions.

Grant Application Criteria: A draft grant guidelines and application form had been developed and circulated to members. In principal members were happy with the draft. This will be progressed with further input via email with a view to voting on this at the next meeting. Members were asked to respond to emails to enable the efficient running of the CC.

Community Times: Lorraine Brooks thanked everyone who supports the CT; Colin and the distribution team, the proof readers, Pat Bray for village news, Mandy Cook for helping with Parish Council reports, those who contribute copy and the advertisers. She thanked Graham Griffiths for hosting the village website.

She was grateful to those who have sent in photographs of CC activities for the CT and www.naylandcommunitycouncil.org.uk and would be pleased to receive lots taken at the Street Fayre.

Collation of the history of the CC continues; some interesting press cuttings have been added to the website.

Alex Murrison congratulated and thanked Lorraine for continuing to produced a very useful community news.

Our horticultural year began on 15th March with a very interesting talk to a packed Church Hall on 'A Year in the Life of a Cottage Garden' by Andrew Sankey, a garden designer, nurseryman and lecturer. It was difficult to believe at times that the beautiful photographs were taken in a Lincolnshire garden where the soil was very dry sand and gravel which was not irrigated. The secret to his success was to plant at the right time of year and digging deep

adding some good soil below the plant when planting. This would encourage the roots to go down deep. Spring favourites in his garden included Snowdrops, Hellebores and Erythronium Pagoda. He also recommended the variegated Honesty as this literally lights up a garden; folklore says this will only grow in an honest persons garden. As well as giving sound advice on choice of plants, planting situations and plant partners it was most interesting to hear origins and quaint nicknames of plants. He recommended many plants including the stately Eryngium giganteum (Sea Holly, Mrs Wilmott's Ghost), the carpeting Erigeron karvinskianus (Mexican fleabane) which flowers for most of the year and Salvia sclarea var. turkestaniana (European Sage or Clary) but warned to plant the latter to the rear of the border as it was called Housemaid's Armpit for a reason!

Our seventh annual Spring Show on the 19th March attracted 13 entrants displaying 68 exhibits in the 17 classes. It may have been rather grey outside but a steady stream of visitors popped in to enjoy refreshments and a chat in the cheerful and colourful atmosphere provided by the displays in the Church Hall.

The British weather always provides unpredictability for our Spring Show; this year we'd experienced a very mild winter, with daffodils blooming as early as December so we were more than a little concerned they'd be over early, but just in the nick of time a cold snap arrived to prolong their life so they could still take their star turn at the show. It is amazing how nature has a habit of righting itself.

The judges felt the quality of the exhibits were a credit to all exhibitors but the Olive Noakes Trophy for the most successful exhibitor was presented to Hazel Gardiner who gained 17 points.

THE LAVATORY/SERVERY/STORAGE IN ST. JAMES'

We are delighted to report that at their January meetings, both the Fabric Committee and, later in the month, the Parochial Parish Council itself, approved the scheme, with one modification: It is felt by the Fabric Committee that the Sink for the Flower Girls is not required, so we have omitted it. In

the interim, the Architects had consulted with Anglia Water to confirm that there were no problems in connecting a foul water drain to the main Sewer (other than cost - about £1200!).

Updated drawings have now been made to support an initial informal meeting with the Diocesan Advisory Committee - the D.A.C. - at which we hope to explore any planning difficulties that may be necessary to overcome. This Meeting is now being arranged. After that, we will prepare the necessary structural drawings and plans to support the Faculty application, which will be presented to the DAC by the Fabric Committee for approval.

This process we hope will take no longer than 2 months. Given that we have approval, we hope to go out for estimates for the works in September. However, we must remember that there are many outside Agencies who may take an interest in what is, after all, a Grade 1 Listed Building. They will may well add delay if little else.

Garden Notes

by The Old Muckspreader

Despite the lack of any lengthy period of cold weather it seems that the season has now almost returned to normal.

The Snowdrops are almost over, so if you want to spread them out (and a drift is always more effective than scattered clumps) then now is the time to do it. A clump of, say, twenty bulbs can be dug up and split into groups of four or five bulbs before replanting. If, as now there has been no rain for some time, it's a good idea to water them in, for Snowdrops don't like drought, and will be perfectly happy under deciduous trees, should never be planted under evergreens. Some planted several years ago under the big Yew in the churchyard have disappeared.

At a recent lecture to the HortSoc by Andrew Sankey, whose garden was in dry sandy Lincolnshire, a talk which was full of gardening love and good advice, the OM/S was particularly impressed by the following tip, so he is passing it on herewith.

If you are planting something in a really dry location, dig a hole at least twice as deep as the roots of the plant, fill it half full with compost and/or manure and some good soil and fill it with water. Allow to drain then settle the plant on top; you can then surround it with the dry soil of the area, even with sand and gravel. Water thoroughly again, and you should have no

need to water it again for the rest of the season. Obviously this will not work with a plant that needs amore or less permanently damp situation, but there aren't all that many in this category.

Incidentally, a plant that the OM/S always thought needed a damp spot was the Dierama, or Angel's Fishing Rods, but Mr Sankey pointed out that is was the opposite, coming from South Africa. It is usually grown next to a pond or stream, so that the flowers on their long stems droop into the water - hence the common name; however this is not necessary and it will flourish in a dry situation. The average garden centre won't sell it, but specialised nurseries should do. It comes easily from seed, but will take two years or more to reach flowering size.

If you haven't already done so, now is the last chance to prune Buddleias. To get good sized flower spikes prune the rods down to two buds or shoots, but if you want to prolong the flowering season leave a few for the existing branches which will flower earlier but with smaller flowers.

It appears that an act of vandalism has occurred in St James' Churchyard; readers are directed to a separate article describing this on page 34 of this magazine.

The Dierama is one of the Editor's favourites; having had varying success she will take heed. There are many varieties reaching different sizes - Pulcherricum (deep pink) being the one most likely to find, others include: Dracomontanum (pink), Argyreum (white), 'Blackbird' (rich purple), 'Merlin' (rich wine), Guinevere' (white), being just a few. Some varieties can be found at Beth Chatto (Elmstead Market), Place For Plants (East Bergholt) and sometimes Perrywood Garden Gentre (Inworth) stocks a range. They can be tracked down online and via the RHS Plantfinder. They are worth the search!

I would like to thank everyone who came along to the exhibition in the Church Hall over the weekend of the 13/14 February, despite the cold and wet weather. Quite unexpectedly I was given some further items by visitors to add to the village collection. These included photos of the Patrick family who lived in Bear Street during the 1920s and some of their interesting bits and pieces from that era, for instance, a Registration Card for the Girls Friendly Society, a popular organisation in Nayland for young ladies; bus tickets and timetables; an obituary for an original member of the Jane Walker Hospital and two fascinating autograph books. I was also pleased that Sir Bob Russell and his brother David, who both came to the exhibition, felt that a tennis medal won by their father Ewart Russell in 1932 should come back to Nayland. The Russell family lived in Nayland for a time on Gravel Hill and have many family connections with the village.

I would like to thank the Community Council again for paying for the hire of the hall and for the use of their display boards, also the Conservation Society and Art Group for the use of their boards and the group of friends who helped to set up the hall and provide the refreshments. Thank you all.

BABERGH COMMUNITY ACHIEVEMENT AWARDS 2016 RECIPIENT FOR NAYLAND WITH WISSINGTON: WENDY SPARROW

Wendy Sparrow has been a volunteer for almost fifty years in a wide variety of ways in the community of Nayland with Wissington both as an individual and as a member of local groups for the benefit of all ages. She was Clerk to Nayland with Wissington Parish Council for twenty five years until her retirement, a role that she carried out with enthusiasm, efficiency and integrity. Her local knowledge was invaluable to parish councillors and residents alike. After that she served for four years as a Parish Councillor.

Wendy is currently the Navland Parish History Recorder for the Suffolk Local History Society. In this role she records village events and news to future generations, writes regular articles on local history in the Nayland with Wissington Community Times and makes the parish local history archive available to anyone wishing to know more about local historic properties or family history. Over many years Wendy has recorded the memories of elderly residents to ensure that knowledge of village life in late 19th and early 20th century was not lost. Wendy has written or edited several local history books to raise funds for conservation projects organised by Nayland with Wissington Conservation Society. In 1974 Wendy was one of the founders of that Society whose aims are to protect and promote the heritage and natural environment of the parish. As a result, she has assisted with community projects including archaeological digs and surveys, tree planting, research for local history books, local exhibitions and fundraising for conservation for over forty years. In February she will be organising an exhibition to make the History Recorder's collection of documents, photographs and artefacts more widely available to the community.

However, Wendy's voluntary work has not been limited to her interest in local history and the environment. Many other organisations and individuals have benefited from her support. Over the years she has been a great support to elderly neighbours who knew that they could rely on her for help. She can always be counted on to lend a hand whenever asked, for



example at the Church Fete, Village Open Gardens or with Tendring Cricket Club Teas. She also supported events related to her son's activities and local schools.

For years Wendy has been one of the long term volunteers at the fundraising or social events organised by the Community Council. She is the WI representative on the Community Council, which raises thousands of pounds each year for the benefit of everyone in the community from toddlers to senior citizens. One of her roles is as a member of the team that organises the annual photographic competition for the popular calendar that matches up-to-date photographs with old photographs and history notes. This raises quite a profit every year.

She has assisted at fundraising events for a wide variety of societies and organisations in the parish. Rosemary completed over twenty four years as a highly respected Parish Councillor before retiring in May 2015. Welcome to this month's Police news item.

Sadly, my time in Hadleigh has been brought to an end with an official and chosen move to the Control Room at Headquarters from 21st March. This decision has been made based on the efficiency savings enforced on the Police by the Government, which has meant a cut in numbers for the Safer Neighbourhood Team based at Hadleigh. Hadleigh SNT have had to reduce its numbers from 2 PC's and 6 PCSO's to 2 PC's and 4 PCSO's, (force wide the numbers were 166 PCSO's down to 107 PCSO's).

I have totally enjoyed my time covering the villages over the past nine years and will miss being out and about, meeting and chatting to people. Here's some more crime reduction advice for your home.

PERIMETER SECURITY

FENCING

In many cases, the fences around your home are the first line of defence. The front, rear and side boundaries have different functions where security is concerned:

- 28% of domestic burglaries are committed from the front of the house.
- 7% from the side and 62% from the rear and 3% gain access via the roof. This should help to determine your priority areas.

CHECK YOUR BOUNDARIES

Walk round the whole perimeter of your property. Check your fences, gates shrubbery and hedges. Look for possible points of entry and hiding places.

Check for good visibility from surrounding houses and roads where appropriate.

Front Boundaries

Low boundaries at the front give maximum visibility. Burglars will feel safer if they can hide behind high fences/ hedges and be obstructed from the view of passers-by from the road.

Rear and Side Boundaries

The height of rear and side fences should be 1.8m. If your boundary is particularly vulnerable the height can be increased with trellis. This can be attractive and will act as a deterrent as it's difficult to climb over without breaking the fence or making a noise. Gates can also have trellis fitted above them. **GATES**

All gates should be fitted with lockable slide bolts and be locked with a sturdy padlock to stop someone reaching over to gain entry. If you use your side / rear gate to exit your property then a surface mounted mortise lock can be fitted which allows the gate to be locked / unlocked with a key from both sides.

ADDITIONAL MEASURES AND INFORMATION

Foliage against a fence can provide an effective barrier, especially if a prickly shrub is planted, and can also improve appearance. A four foot box hedge at the front is ideal as it provides natural surveillance as well as a wide barrier for anyone to cross over and makes a potential burglar feel vulnerable because he can be seen.

If you feel that you need something such as barbed wire or other topping along the tops of walls and fences, you are advised to get in touch with the Crime Reduction Officer for advice. They will be able to give you advice regarding your responsibilities under the Occupiers Liability

Act. So for the last time 'So long, Farewell, Auf Wiedersehen....Goodbye'

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Feedback from James Finch - Your Stour Valley County Councillor

SCC ANNUAL BUDGET AGREED AT COUNTY COUNCIL MEETING ON 11 FEBRUARY

It was good to be back at this meeting and play my part having been indisposed for nearly a month. The summary of the key elements of the budget agreed the council were:-

- Annual savings of £34.4m as a result of government reductions in funding resulting in a net budget of £493m for 2016-17.
- A freeze in general council tax for this period of £271m so that the Band D council tax for County Services remains at £1,126.53p
- The introduction of a new precept to fund Adult Social Care of £5.4m which is equivalent to 2% of Band D council tax (£22.50p) bringing the total Council Tax to £1,149. This was introduced to recognise the impact of the significant increases made by the government to the minimum wage and living wage over the next two years.

Your county council has faced some stiff challenges in the preparation of this budget plan but is confident that you will continue to receive the services you expect from a responsible county council administration.

SCC'S CHILDREN'S SERVICES ARE RATED GOOD BY OFSTED

Following the publication of its inspection report on 11th February, it praises the work of the council in protecting and looking after children and young people, with some areas of outstanding practice highlighted in the report. The inspection was carried out for 4 weeks between 23 November – 17 December 2015.

Ofsted's report highlights that "Leaders have a comprehensive understanding of what needs to be achieved and have made

sustained progress since the inspection of services for looked after children in 2010 and child protection in 2013, which both were judged to be adequate". It says "Suffolk County Council is led by dynamic and capable leaders and managers and is delivering a good service overall to children and their families."

£1BN DEVOLUTION DEAL ANNOUNCED FOR EAST ANGLIA IN THE BUDGET ON 16 MARCH

Following weeks of negotiation between Government and local councils and Local Enterprise Partnerships (LEPs), a deal worth over £1bn for East Anglia has been announced by George Osborne MP, Chancellor of the Exchequer in his Budget Speech on 16h March..

As part of the deal East Anglia would receive:

- £900m (£30m a year for the next 30 years) to invest in infrastructure
- £175m to invest in housing

The Deal, which sets out a fundamentally different relationship between Government and local public services, was negotiated by Leaders from councils across Suffolk, Norfolk, Cambridgeshire and Peterborough and the New Anglia and Greater Cambridgeshire and Greater Peterborough LEPs.

If ratified by the relevant councils and LEP Boards, The Deal would see decisions currently being made by Government on such things as infrastructure, growth, employment and skills being made locally in East Anglia in the future.

The result for 2015 shows a total income of £32,284 (£26,592 for 2014) and a total expenditure of £26,333 (£18,170 for 2014), giving a satisfactory surplus of £5692 (£8422 for 2014).

The very significant increase in income for 2015 is primarily due to an additional fundraising activity (Curry Night), as well as a very generous extraordinary grant of £3,500 from the Community Council, to go towards the upgrade of the Hall kitchen. Other sources of income such as Cinema, Village Lunch and Plant Sales generated significant funds, and we are extremely grateful to all concerned. In addition we had a £1000 grant towards our Endowment Fund from the Community Council.

With regard to expenditure, the reasons for the substantial increase in 2015 is due to 'Maintenance' and 'Miscellaneous'. Hall maintenance for 2015 was £9,884 (£3,364 in 2014). External painting, floor maintenance and improvements to the electrics contributed to this increase. The increase in 'Miscellaneous' is mainly due to the charges incurred at the Village Curry Night.

DO YOU CLEAN UP AFTER YOUR DOG? OR DO YOU BREAK THE LAW?

Nayland with Wissington Parish Council has had an increasing number of complaints about the amount of dog fouling in the parish, particularly on Caley Green, in the High Street, Socket Alley and Candy Lane. We are asking residents and responsible dog walkers to help catch the culprits.

Apart from being unsightly and a nuisance, dog fouling can be a health risk, as it often contains the parasitic roundworm Toxocara. Contact with Toxocara can lead to contracting the disease Toxocariasis which leads to flu-like symptoms and if untreated can lead to eye damage or blindness. Fresh faeces are not infectious so it's safe for owners to clean up after their dogs but if left for 2-3 weeks may become infectious. Each deposit can carry up to1 million Toxocara eggs.

Toxocariasis is contracted through contact, often through touching infected items such as shoes without washing hands adequately afterwards. For this reason the disease more common amongst children, so it is especially alarming that people are failing to clear up after their dogs in areas regularly used by children.

It is an offence under the Dogs (Fouling of Land) Act 1996 not to clear up after your dog. Babergh District Council is able to issue 'Fixed Penalty Notice' fines of \pounds 50 to those caught in the act as an alternative to prosecution when the potential fine is \pounds 1000.

Don't let the thoughtless actions of a few give the dog owners of Nayland and Wiston a bad name. If you have a dog please ensure that you always put faeces in a bag and either put it in a dog bin, or double wrap it and put it in your black wheelie bin. Please don't leave bags on footpaths or in hedges in the countryside. If you see anyone failing to clean up after their dog (many people fail to cleanup when they think there is no-one else around), please let the District Council know who they are - it is possible they could be issued with a fine. If you do not know who they are, but are able to give a description of them or the registration of their vehicle, please let us know so we can follow it up.
