NAYLAND WITH WISSINGTON PARISH COUNCIL

Meeting: 8th February 2017

(This is an extract from the draft minutes of the meeting)

Graham Walker chaired the meeting in Mary George's absence. PLANNING

Babergh had advised that application B/16/01536/FHA for erection of first-floor rear extension at 15 The Westerings had been withdrawn .

Planning decision by Babergh DC: permission has been refused on application B/16/01526/FLU/MECO at 1 Ash Rise for erection of single-storey dwelling with new access to serve two car parking spaces and retention of two car parking spaces for existing dwelling. Grounds for refusal include the application constitutes overdevelopment of the site, would affect neighbours' amenity, it is detrimental to the character of the locality; is out of keeping with adjacent dwellings.

ALLOTMENTS & THE GLEBE LAND

The contractor had been working on the PC's plan to cut back and improve the quality of the hedgerows. It was felt that a good job had been done in the first stage of fully cutting back, restoring and thickening the hedgerows, to create an ecologically diverse and thriving habitat. Councillors agreed that it was important to keep it maintained.

It was agreed that the new bare ground should be seeded with a 'conservation' mix of seed around the edge of the Glebe Land. This could be broadcast and then simply harrowed.

The next step, as part of the plan, will be to look into the purchase of a gate and then take stock.

In seeking grant aid, an award of £1,000 had been granted from the Tesco Charity Fund, towards the project.

CYCLE RACK

A location and site plan are now needed for the proposed cycle rack to be situated at Harpers Estate on land owned by Babergh. This will have to be submitted.

Gerry Battye would produce a scale plan of the site, on which he and Martyn Booth would plot the proposed concrete plinth. Councillors agreed that the plinth should meet the footway, be adjacent to the first lock-up garage and allow grass cutting at its rear. The budget for this would be on the March agenda. **HIGHWAYS**

SCC Highways has advised that replacement of the damaged bollard outside Butchers, Bear Street, is about to commence.

The Community Litter-pick will take place on 8th April.

The bushes on the Harpers Hill A134 verge need cutting back to ensure the safety of our litter-pickers. Mortimers have identified this as a hazard. James Finch (County Councillor) is aware of this hazard but Highways needs reminding urgently.

STREET LIGHTING

A site meeting with Adrian Last of SCC Highways/Street Lighting had considered:

• Removal of light fitting currently fixed to 1 Court Street: A number of other adjacent sites considered had proved



impractical. SCC would look at the underground services map to see if there were any other practical and cost effective options. It was recommended that the lantern be removed, after the installation of a replacement Court Street lantern, adjacent to Victoria Cottage. The removal would be undertaken by SCC with the Parish Council being liable for costs.

• Light/Lantern at Victoria Cottage, Court Street: SCC is still awaiting UK Power Networks to re-instate supply to prepare for installation of adjacent new lantern and post.

 Lantern at T Junction Bear/Birch/Mill Street. 49 Birch Street. The fixture for this light is inadequate. Estimated costs of an alternative site on a new post is £1,909.81. It was agreed to ask SCC to undertake this work.

• Lamp and post at Church Lane/Newlands Lane junction: The current siting of this lamp is no longer appropriate. Remedial action will be significant and consideration should await the higher priority lighting issues in the village.

FOOTPATHS

Councillors had received copies of correspondence concerning ongoing problems on Footpath 14 (Newlands Lane), including the kissing gate, Bell Meadow gate and way markers. SCC were investigating these issues.

The PC has received a proposal from Simon Peachey, to publish one of his 'Walks' leaflets focusing on Nayland, Wiston and Little Horkesley. The Council supported his proposal.

RECREATION AND OPEN SPACES

Driveway To Playground, Vicarage, Cemeteries and Nursing Home: A site meeting with the Diocesan Surveyor Paul Edwards and Michael George of Nayland PCC had taken place. They agreed on the extent of the damaged surface and road markings. 14 potholes and 11 cars passed by within the 40 minutes of the meeting. The Diocesan Surveyor had agreed that patching was necessary immediately. Meanwhile, Mr. Edwards would contact the Nursing Home concerning the matter. In addition, he would get quotations for re-surfacing and marking work.

Fairfield Recreation Ground: The contractor had highlighted the need for replacement wood for the two wooden/goal boards on the Fairfield Recreation Ground. The Council contractor had also submitted a proposal for repairing an area of subsidence within the safety surfacing on the cradle swing area. A site meeting will take place to assess need and specification of both above

VILLAGE HALL

A request has been received from Nayland Village Hall Management Committee for a grant of £5475.84 inc. VAT to cover the cost of a new boiler, that has had to be installed at short notice. The Council considered the submitted contractor's estimate for the work. Tricia Fuller mentioned that the boiler had been identified as needing eventual replacement for some time. Councillors were concerned that it did not have sight of any competitive alternative quotations. Having considered the estimate, it was agreed that in this instance, the requested grant be made and be drawn from the Capital Investment Fund.

Councillors heard a detailed account of the events surrounding the recent hiring of the hall for a private birthday party. A large number had attended and things had got out of hand. Ten police officers, five police cars and two ambulances had to attend the scene to control the frightening situation. The party had allegedly been advertised, by some attendees using social media.

BURIAL GROUND

Tricia Fuller identified the need for remedial action to the Old (Babergh) Cemetery wall. Bricks were disjointed, mortar crumbling and there had been an ingress by ivy. Babergh will be contacted.

The Council agreed to the design of a stone memorial application to replace two existing memorial stones and add an inscription to one of them.

NAYLAND WITH WISSINGTON PARISH COUNCIL

PLANNING

Reviewing planning application decisions by Babergh; permission had been granted at 48 Bear Street [B/16/01736] for a single storey extension at rear of the property and at Westwood, Harpers Hill [B/16/01580] for erection of replacement two-storey dwelling, two-bay cartlodge and store with ancillary living accommodation. Listed building consent had been granted at Guinea Wiggs, Wissington [B/16/01496] for installation of glazed bi-fold doors.

Discussing new applications councillors had no objections to an application at Hilltop Farm [B/17/00150] for replacement of 3 antennae and other telecommunications equipment and installation a 1 dish, at 109 Bear Street [B/17/00119] for erection of a single storey and two-storey rear extension and at 11 Gravel Hill [B/17/00087] or to listed building consent for an external boiler sited at the side of the house.

ALLOTMENTS

Graham Walker gave detailed proposals for the next stage in managing the allotment field including: reseeding with mixed grass and wild flowers, providing a new locked gate with open pedestrian access between Candy Lane and the allotments to prevent unauthorised vehicular access and parking (as agreed with tenants); way-marker posts to guide walkers away from the hay crop and grazing. These are all within the agreed budget. The existing field gate will remain for the time being but will be replaced and moved in due course. The gate from Candy Lane into Webb's meadow is to be repaired concurrently though this will be paid for from a separate budget. The state of Candy Lane will be reviewed in the next financial year as the hoggin laid down a few years ago is beginning to lose its battle with the mud.

HOUSING SURVEY

Councillors were frustrated at the lack of progress from Babergh DC on the housing need survey. The responsible officer had been on sick leave and Babergh appears not to have passed the issue on to another officer to develop.

Councillors here and at Stoke by Navland along with the Stoke Alms House Trust have all contacted Babergh and received no response. Councillors are working in liaison with Melanie Barrett, District Councillor, who is investigating the next step.

HIGHWAYS

Flooding in Birch Street had occurred twice in a week in spite of assurances from Suffolk CC Highways that drains would be cleared. SCC is changing contractors and this might improve

the quality of work when it takes place. Online reporting was not working on either the SCC or Essex CC websites.

Gerry Battye had reported fly tipping on the hill up towards London Road glasshouses (Geat Horkesley) to ECC. Mary George raised concerns about the state of the bridge over the Stour. Debbie Hattrell will contact ECC again regarding the Essex County road sign.

Residents of Nayland and Stoke by Nayland had raised concerns about an increase of motorbikes speeding through the villages.

FOOTPATHS

Complaints had been received regarding the state of the swing gate on the footpath where Newlands Lane joins the field. The gate is not an official public structure and Kevin Verlander (Rights of Way Officer, SCC) had advised the PC to approach the owner. A nearby resident has further concerns regarding ditch drainage. Gerry Battye suggested that a conversation between the gate owner, the resident and the PC would be productive. Mary George will follow this up.

RECREATION AND OPEN SPACES

The PC has asked Suffolk CC to remove a cut-down tree that is 'sitting' on Caley Green.

Kathleen Cannings has been examining archive reports and documents regarding Caley Green and creating a timeline of past ideas and recommendations since the green was created when the by-pass was built in 1968.

It is hoped the timeline will be available to view at the Annual Parish Assembly.

Babergh DC confirmed they would empty a proposed dogwaste bin sited near Wiston Church.

The Wiston Parish Notice Board is deteriorating. Councillors still plan to provide a notice board at Fairfield (the new play area).

ANNUAL PARISH ASSEMBLY

Items on the agenda include: River Stour management and parishioners' role in maintaining a healthy environment for riverside diversity. Parish Assembly posters will invite questions and comments on this and other topics from the floor.

Neil is very much missed by us all.

Thank you: Thanks are due to all members of the Community Council for their valuable contribution throughout the year and to the Officers and Executive Committee in particular – Ken Willingale, Bryan Smith, Julie Clark, Maggie Ryan, Lorraine Brooks, Claire Buller, Tricia Hall, Vicki Sargent, Colin Ramsell, John Parsonson, Colin Moule, and Iain Wright as well as Parish Council Rep, Martyn Booth and Legal Advisor, Katie Wright.

Father Christmas was in attendance as always, along with a good number of village societies (who were able to raise funds for their organisation) and external stallholders. The school choir and ukulele group also performed as they do at many Community Council events – a big thank you for helping to get the Christmas festivities off to a good start.

Village Christmas Tree: Christmas in Nayland wouldn't be the same in the village without the sparkling display in the Post Office window and the village Christmas tree twinkling across the road. Thank you to Fred Smith for supplying an excellent tree and to Nayland Dental Surgery for supplying the electricity – as well, of course, to the team who put it up and took it down! **Village Calendar**: Always popular and a great reminder of all that Nayland has to offer, along with an opportunity to compare Nayland past with Nayland present. Many thanks to the team who put the calendar together and on their behalf I will take this opportunity to ask you to get snapping for next year's calendar as it is your photos that make the calendar possible.

Grants: One of the roles of the Community Council is to provide grants to village organisations and individuals whose activities support our constitution.

This year, amongst others, grants were awarded to Nayland Baby and Toddler Group, the Conservation Society: Court Knoll Project, the Village Hall and the Nayland Community Post Office Company – all worthy causes and well deserving of our support. Going forward: I am looking forward to another positive year for the Community Council. Please do feel free to get involved. This year we are supporting a charity running event – the Nayland 10k (plus 5k and 3k fun run) -organised by local resident Luke Rumbelow. Profits will go to support the Colchester Hospitals Charity and Community Council projects; so not only will it be a great event for people to be involved in but it will benefit the village too. It is always good to have new ideas so if you have an idea for a new event or fundraiser or would simply like to be involved in the work of the Community Council, don't be shy, just get in touch. We look forward to seeing you.

TREASURER'S REPORT: Maggie Ryan gave her report.

Current Position: The accounts show reserves at 31 December of £19,829 (compared to £22,152 in prior year) represented by: deposit a/c monies £15,557, current a/c monies £4,221, cash in hand £51. The sum of £603 has been given towards setting up Nayland Community Store Limited, with a further £1,897 available to support the transfer of the Post Office into community ownership. **Unencumbered assets are therefore £17,218.** Amounts held on behalf of the First Response Team (£444) and Services Fund (£270) are unchanged.

Profit & Loss: The most successful event of 2016 was the Bonfire Night, with an overall profit of £1,524. The Quiz Night made a £250 profit, and the Christmas Fayre was nearly as successful with a profit of £236. The Community Times has made £2,517 and the Calendar £1,127 towards our reserves.

Grants awarded over the year are over three times those awarded in the previous period – a figure of £6,713; we should be proud of our contribution to good causes but mindful that this success means that the Community Council is running a £2,323 deficit for 2016. We are looking at fundraising to restore reserves in 2017.

Administrative matters: Bank signatories have been updated on each account. An online banking facility is available on the current account and is subject to appropriate checks and controls over authorising payments.

The accounts had been examined and approved by Andrew Gowen. The accounts for 2016 were adopted by the meeting.

FUN RUN TO SUPPORT CANCER CENTRE CAMPAIGN

The Cancer Centre Campaign is hoping for a £20,000 cash injection from an off-road fun run being held in Nayland this summer.

Half of the profits from the 3K, 5K and 10K events on Sunday 2 July will be donated to the £3.25m campaign to create an integrated cancer centre at Colchester General Hospital.

And Colchester Hospitals Charity (CoHoC) is hoping that as many people as possible taking part will make a donation to its campaign or raise money through sponsorship.

The "Nayland 10K" event, which will also include the two shorter distances, is the idea of Luke Rumbelow, a games designer who works for GFM in Hawkins Road, Colchester, and is being sponsored by Runners World, the sportswear store at the Peartree Business Centre in Stanway.

Luke, 32, who lives in Court Street, Nayland, has been involved in many fundraising events and is fulfilling an ambition to organise a run.

"Every ability of runner can take part – let's have some fun and raise some money!" he said.

"As well as having a passion for running, I also love cycling and organise the annual Tour de Norfolk which attracts about 1,500 riders and raises funds for The Big C Appeal cancer charity in Norfolk and Waveney.

"I'd prefer to support a local rather than a national cause. That's why, after meeting up with Colchester Hospitals Charity, I decided





that half the profit from 2 July will go to the Cancer Centre Campaign and the other half to Nayland Community Council."

Caroline Bates, CoHoC's Head of Charity and Fundraising, said: "We are delighted to be involved with the first Nayland 10K run and hope that Luke will be able to reach his target of raising £20,000 for the Cancer Centre Campaign.

"We^{-III} be giving a running vest to anyone who raises a minimum sponsorship of £250 before the run and look forward to seeing hundreds of runners in CoHoC colours."

All three distances will start and finish at Nayland Village Hall and Luke is hoping it will become an annual event. A total of 400 places will be available this year and the plan is to add 200 more in 2018.

Individuals who raise £50 for the Cancer Centre Campaign at least a week before the event will be given a free CoHoC T-shirt and anyone who raises £150 will receive a running vest. Participants who raise £250 will be given a running vest and an invitation to a "Runners Reception" and a tour of cancer facilities at Colchester General Hospital.

The 10K run is perfect for regular runners and costs £12 to take part; the 5K event (£8) is aimed at beginners and people wanting a challenge; and the 3K run (£3) is pitched at complete novice runners and children. All finishers will receive a medal and soft drink.

SAVE NAYLAND POST OFFICE CAMPAIGN REPORT OF PUBLIC MEETING: held on 6th March 2017

Simon Carter, Chairman of the Community Post Office project, welcomed everyone and introduced the committee:

Simon Carter – Chairman, Director Maggie Ryan – Vice Chair, Director Mike Hunter – Company Secretary Liz Mellon – Grants and strategy, Director Karen Newton – Retail Stuart Bradshaw – Treasurer Luke Rumbelow – Website & publicity Frank Warren – Members' Secretary

The purpose of the evening was to inform, answer questions, and to invite residents of Nayland-with -Wissington and surrounding areas to participate in a future share offer for their Community Post Office.

The aim of Nayland Community Store Limited is to save the Post Office from closing after more than 100 years in the village. We are not permitted to use the name 'Post Office' in our brand because it is registered to Post Office Limited, hence the name 'Nayland Community Store'. We are committed to preserving the high street, supporting - not competing - with existing retailers.

WE WANT TO WORK TOGETHER TO KEEP NAYLAND'S COMMERCIAL HEART ALIVE

Maggie Ryan gave the background to the project.

The current Postmistress plans to retire and with impetus from the Community Council and after a Public Meeting in March 2016, a steering committee was set up to explore whether Nayland residents could run their own Post Office and keep this vital service.

This group focused on how a community co-operative effort might work, and the financial strength of the business. It

sought support from Post Office Ltd and took advice from the Plunkett Foundation, a charity that supports rural businesses.

The group also questioned the village residents as to how much support there would be for running a community Post Office, and what we use our branch for. We received an overwhelmingly positive response. 87 questionnaires were returned, with volunteers to both set up the company and to help in the shop. Three quarters of us use the Post Office at least weekly. 80% of respondents believed it to be a very or extremely important part of village life. It is something we value highly, along with our pub, our butcher and other small businesses.

We looked at the range of services offered – all generate fee income for our branch. The Post Office counter revenue is not enough on its own to make the business viable. The retail sales from the shop are key to sustainability. The goods that are on sale currently would provide that revenue. So preserving 'business as usual' would mean we could operate into the future.

Other ideas for the retail offering will be explored as time goes on, and ideas have included the sale of local arts and crafts, advertising, confectionery, coffees, and a changing range of gifts. The idea of a cobblers was raised and seemed popular. We have also been asked to include a community notice board, a societies' calendar and to continue the sale of tickets to local events. We are open to your ideas.

Once we identified that the business could run sustainably, we talked more to the Post Office Limited about contractual obligations, services that we could provide as a 'Local' branch (99% of those currently provided), refitting the shop, and Post Office Ltd's contribution to capital costs under the national Network Transformation Programme. We also successfully applied for a seed funding grant from the Community Council that enabled us to join the Plunkett Foundation and launch the Community Company – the Community Benefit Society (CBS).

Simon Carter explained that the CBS is set up with a model legal structure that means that, although it has similarities with a limited company, it can be run by the community, for the community with all shareholders having equal voting rights irrespective of the size of their shareholding.

Post Office Limited have agreed to contract with the Company (in previous years it had to be with an individual). Our CBS is registered with and regulated by the Financial Conduct Authority.

Community businesses are successful, and we expect ours to be.

- In 2014 UK community shops showed average gross sales of £164,310
- Average net profit £5,152 up 30% since 2013
- The total gross sales for UK community shops were £53m up 13.1% on the previous year
- Total UK net profit £1.7m up 22.8% on the previous year
- 30% of net profit was invested into shop reserves and 28% into running costs and improvements
- Over £316,000 (19% of net profit) was distributed for community use and benefit
- 325 community shops provide services to over 1000 rural communities across the UK

Whilst we aim expect to run on a not-for-profit basis, if we were to make profits, we are bound by our rules to put surplus funds back into our community to support other charitable projects.

Where are we today?

- · We have established Nayland Community Store Ltd as our trading company
- We have agreed lease terms with the freeholderPatsie Ford so we can remain in the existing High Street premises
- Sylvia Bond has agreed to stay on and lead the PO business with support from certain trained volunteers
- Premises have been surveyed for refit and that work is out to tender with local contractors
- · Post Office Ltd will cover some refurbishment cost
- Application for LEADER grant, Suffolk CC, to also help with refurbishment cost
- We are building our retail strategy and stock profile to complement that of other village providers
- We are developing our business plan which has to be agreed with Post Office Ltd.
- We are seeking contract with Royal Mail for the continuation of the sorting office

We are at the critical stage now where residents will need to come forward if they wish to save the Post Office, in what we consider our best (and perhaps only) chance, so we are:

Seeking 'pledges' from the community towards the refit, stocking and start-up of our Nayland Community Store

These are pledges - not promises - to buy shares in the Company at a price of £25 each. One share means you are a member of your Community Company and have the right to vote in how it is run.

Mike Hunter elaborated on the Company structure and share issue, the detail of which will be included in a formal share prospectus (and business plan) before the planned share issue in May. A summary is included here.

- · Each share has a value of £25
- The minimum holding is one share, and you have one vote.
- The maximum holding is 800 shares, but you would still only
- have one vote. You can claim tax relief under EIS
- · Shares cannot be sold, nor can they be transferred save in

the event of death or bankruptcy

- Shares cannot be redeemed without the approval of the Executive Board
- The Society is managed through its Executive Board
- Members have the right to be heard at members meetings
 - If we cannot raise enough shareholder funds:
 - ° Call a public meeting to get a fresh mandate
 - ° Decide on options to proceed or not
 - ° Refund shareholder capital
 - If we raise far more share capital than is needed:
 - ° Restrict individual investment limits
 - ° Our desire is for a large number of smaller investors rather than a few large investors
- Will we pay a dividend?:
 - · No financial dividends are intended
 - This is an investment in our community for our community
 - Only a 'social dividend' in benefiting from having an active Post Office and community store

Making a pledge

- A pledge is an intention, not a commitment
- · Having a sense of how much you might invest helps us scale and scope our fundraising
- We anticipate start up costs, refurbishment, PO and retail stock and initial running costs are around £60,000
- In early years trading we anticipate retail and PO sales will be around £70,000 - £80,000 of income
- Pledge Forms available at the meeting, from the Post Office, and from our website.

Raising funds by share issue is considered the best way for communities to raise capital. We would encourage every individual and business in Nayland to contribute whatever they can. We are confident Nayland can raise this sum, and as an example, the village of Lamarsh has just raised in excess of £400,000 to keep their pub.

Next Steps

- We will select from a minimum of three quotations for refit by March 2017
- We will submit our business plan to Post Office Ltd by March 2017, then interview with them in London
- We need you to complete Pledge forms by 31st March 2017. The pledge forms give directions on how to complete them and where to send them There is a box in the Post Office where you can deposit your completed form
- · We hope to make the formal CBS Share offer by May/June 2017
- · We need to finalise all legal issues and sign leases by July 2017
- Refit of premises August/September 2017
- Training volunteer PO staff
- Open for business by 1st September 2017!

The committee opened the floor to questions:

What guarantee is there that the sorting office will stay? There is no guarantee. Royal Mail and Post Office Ltd have both said that they have no plans for closing the sorting office, especially if the Post Office remains in the existing premises.

Who is the post office rented from? It is being rented from Patsie Ford

Will the annual income cover the expenses? Yes, that is the plan, to make this a viable business.

Will the store make a profit in the first 2 years? If people continue to use the store and the post office, we could make a small profit.

What happens if the store makes a loss? We have a responsibility as company directors to trade only while solvent. We would have the option to ask for donations, apply for grant funding, raise more share capital, or cease trading. Financial data indicates we would run the Post Office on a break-even basis. Plunkett Foundation data indicates that community ventures are usually successful.

How long is the lease? 5 years and renewable after that Will we get the grant that has been applied for, even though Britain is leaving the EU? If we are successful in our application, we should get the money. We understand that the money is already in the UK available to be granted. There will be no final decision until July and to qualify, we mustn't start refurbishment work before a decision is taken.

If we get the grant, could we then have an excess of funds? Yes that is possible; the excess funds would be used to cover running costs and stocking over a period of time. It is never a bad thing to have funds to fall back on if required.

How much would the grant be for? It depends upon a number of factors, including the number of jobs created and the costs we incur in refurbishing the premises and setting up. We do know grants of up to £50,000 can be available but do not yet know to what extent our application will qualify.

Will people who live outside of Nayland and Wiston be allowed to hold shares? Yes, that is allowed under the company rules.

What is the rateable value of the shop? The rateable value of the Post Office, shop and sorting office is $\pounds 2750$ in this current year, expecting to rise to $\pounds 3335$ next year

Have we got volunteers who can cover for Sylvia when required? Yes we have 3-4 people who have volunteered to assist and be trained specifically on the post office systems.

Would tax have to be repaid if someone passed away during the three year period when the shares must be held to claim tax relief? It is believed that tax relief is not lost as a result of the death of the shareholder however no warranty is given in this respect and each shareholder must seek their own advice upon this issue.

What is the minimum amount we need to raise? $\pounds 60,000 - \pounds 70,000$ to cover the building works necessary, refurbishing the shop, stock, fixtures and fittings, and initial lease and

What happens if we don't raise the money? We may lose the Post Office. We will have to hold another public meeting and get a new mandate from the community but without community investment, Nayland may not succeed. This is our best chance.

Could the money received for the shares be gift aided? $\ensuremath{\mathsf{No}}$

Are there other shops in villages that have been successful? Yes, quite a few. Rocklands All Saints in Attleborough is a very good example and we will be going to visit.

Will the team be asking people who were not at the meeting to pledge? Yes, we will be asking as many people in the village to pledge as is possible.

If we lost the Royal Mail sorting office,would that be detrimental? Yes, it would, as we would lose the rental income.

Will there be a follow up meeting to this? Yes, we will arrange one, based on the interest at the meeting. A flyer will come out and we will advertise it as we have before. Updates will also be available on the website <u>www.naylandcommunitystores.co.uk</u> and in the Community Times.

ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING

on Monday 6th March 2017 CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

Firstly, I have to thank the Parish Council for their continued support and their contribution for the replacement central heating boiler.

It is most important that the Village Hall Management Committee receives additional funding for major projects. This helps keep the hire charges down.

Our thanks go to Andrew Gowen for auditing of the Accounts.

We also have to thank the local plumber Brian May for his many visits to the Hall during the time when the water leak was not diagnosed and the heating system required frequent re-setting. Not all of these visits were charged for.

I must also publicly thank all the ladies that assist with the Village Hall lunches and Curry Nights and the evening event in February, particularly Gale Scott and Jo Murrison. I know these events take a great deal of effort on the part of the ladies and they all deserve our gratitude.

Johnny and Yvonne Spooner do an excellent job looking after minor maintenance and the cleanliness of the Hall. They come in early in the morning and between hires to ensure the Hall is maintained in its usual high standard of cleanliness.

My thanks also go to the Parish Council, especially Patricia Fuller, who attends our meetings.

Also thanks to the Hall users for their help in maintaining the Gardens and their continued support.

Last but not least, I must thank my fellow members of the VHMC for their never ending hard work. This includes regular fire inspections, maintenance inspections and a general willingness to see the hall kept in good working order.

During the year we unfortunately lost Sara Strover as our Bookings Secretary. Sara did an excellent job making many people aware that the hall was available for hire. There followed a short period of our Secretary, Christine Thompson, acting as Booking Clerk until Jane Hastie, a newcomer to the village who agreed to take over the role and we are very thankful to her for this.

During the year, as you will have gathered from the earlier thanks, the VHMC had the boiler replaced as emergency works, made the upstairs meeting room more habitable by a change of furniture, installed by courtesy of the lunch ladies, a glass washer in the bar, and Patricia Fuller arranged for the bar area to be re-decorated and hung some pictures on the wall, which I am sure you will have all seen and agreed is a vast improvement on what was there.

TREASURER'S REPORT

The result for year ending 31 December 2016 shows a total income of £26,180 and a total expenditure of £20,815, giving a satisfactory surplus of £5,365.

Total bank balances and cash at the end of 2016 stand at \pounds 43,265 (including £14,604 in the Endowment Fund). The figures 2015 were £37,939 (£13,546 in the Endowment Fund).

Village Hall bookings continued to be good during 2016, and our thanks should go to our booking secretary Sara Strover and her replacement, Jane Hastie. Other sources of income such as the Village Lunch and other fund raising activities generated substantial funds, and we are extremely grateful to all concerned for their sterling efforts. In addition, we received a £1000 grant towards our Endowment Fund from the Community Council, which was very well received.

Expenditure during 2016 was broadly in line with expectations, although it should be recognised that the hall is a significant village asset, which does require a high level of ongoing maintenance.

It is worth noting that the actual hall building and land are not included in the accounts, as they are owned by the Nayland with Wissington Parish Council, but leased and managed on their behalf by the Nayland Village Hall Management Committee.

ELECTION OF VHMC

Committee and officers were re-elected: **Chairman** Iain Wright, **Secretary** Chris Thompson, **Treasurer** Peter Mann, **Bookings Secretary** Jane Hastie, **Committee** Nick Moriarty, Tricia Fuller, Will Hitchcock and Frank Warren.

A.O.B.

Alex Murrison praised the kitchen as being one of the best equipped and wondered if training could be given into the use of the dishwasher. Iain Wright replied that there are instructions clearly displayed in the kitchen and he was happy to show anyone how the dishwasher is to be operated.

Roy Chapman wondered if there was any possibility of reintroducing the cinema. Iain Wright replied that there were ongoing problems with the unpredictable sound quality of the DVDs. Several different speakers were tried. The equipment would soon need replacing at considerable cost and there was a danger of making a loss.

Claire Buller asked if it would be possible for the community to organise a Film Club. Iain Wright replied that it would be possible.

Garden Notes by The Old Muckspreader

By the time you read this the early Spring bulbs such as Snowdrops and Scillas will probably be over, but there are several other species to follow on that are well worth growing. The OM/S has never had much success with the large flowered Dutch Crocus, possibly due to marauding squirrels, but the little Crocus Tomasinnianus seeds itself all over the place, even in gravel, and opens its purple flowers in the sun. If all the Scillas, S. Bifolia is probably the best, if the least known; a great self-seeder.

To follow are Chionodoxa (Glory of the Snow) and Muscari (Grape Hyacinths). All flourish here in sunny positions, but poor dry soil; the sort of situation of Beth Chatto's Dry Garden.

The OM/S was recently asked by a friend what to do about non-flowering clumps of Narcissi; the school solution is to wait until the foliage withers dig them up and split into single bulbs and replant, adding some bonemeal. Easier said than done if they're all in grassland, and in vast numbers as here, where they tend to have alternate good and bad years.

Last June we talked about Lathyrus Vernus, the Spring Pea; it was really too late then, as it was more or less over. Now it's just reappearing and always causes comment here.

Many years ago the OM/S bought from one of the sales run by the late Christopher Lubbock, of Great Horkesley, a plant of Calceolaria Integrifolia. Some years later it died, probably of old age, and he never replaced it. Last year however, after research in the Plant Finder he found that Langthorne's Plantery (near Dunmow) had just one for sale and a kind friend drove him there to collect it.

Most people think of Calceolarias, commonly known as Fisherman's Baskets, as tender annuals and indeed they are. But C. Integrifolia is a perennial sub-shrub, growing to 3 feet or so in height. It's strong suit is a long flowering season, and the brilliant yellow flowers will go on until there's a hard frost, certainly here where it's protected by the wall of the house. Despite its comparative rarity it's easy to propagate from soft cuttings throughout the year. There may be one or two for sale at the coming Church Fete.

Talking of Beth Chatto, she was recently interviewed on TV (Gardeners' World), and in her mid-nineties was still giving good advice. Surely she should be at least a Dame, if not a Life Peer, in place of some of the nonentities that are thus honoured.

NAYLAND WITH WISSINGTON COMMUNITY TIMES

NAYLAND YOUTH CLUB IN THE 1940s

Like many clubs and societies Youth Clubs come and go, depending mainly on demand and the availability of adult volunteers to run the club. At present, sadly, there is no Youth Club in Nayland but no doubt at some time in the future another will start up. I have recently been given some press cuttings and documents about the Youth Club which was flourishing in the 1940s, due to a great deal of enthusiasm by the young people themselves and no shortage of adult helpers.

In 1943 the press reported that Nayland Youth Club held their first and very successful entertainment on Saturday, 11 December, at the Queen's Head Hall when they raised £7 for club funds. The West Suffolk Youth Organiser who was present said the club had attained a high standard since it had only been formed 9 months previously.

The programme consisted of plenty of singing, including an amusing and topical song "*Der Feuhrer's Face*", sung by the 'Nasties' wearing swastikas; Bill Jackaman took the part of Hitler (with appropriate moustache!), Freddie Westgate was Goebbels, and Peter Richards, Goering. There were also sketches and two plays – *The Pie and the Tart*, set in Paris, and *Laughter* set in a circus tent. Many well known Nayland names appear in the programme and Bill Jackaman (now 91) tells me he was Secretary of the club and remembers typing and duplicating the programme whilst working for Colchester Council, just 3 months before he joined the Army. I have a copy of the programme if anyone would like to see it, including perhaps anyone who remembers taking part in the event!

At this time the hall at the rear of the Queen's Head was the venue for many such events. Long before the village hall was built in 1970 the White Hart Hall, the Church Hall in Bear Street (then known as the Mission Room) and the Queen's Head were well used for community events of all kinds. People still remember the Queen's Head Hall being used as a cinema until the pub closed in 1958.

Another press cutting describes an Old Folks' Entertainment by the Youth Club in the Mission Room. This included singing, wartime poems and stories and a humorous sketch acted by Bill Jackaman and Miss Ruby Norris. Later that year, together with the Scouts and Cubs run by Mrs Macbeth, the club raised £2 3s 2d from carol singing for the Prisoner of War Fund.

In 1944, at the Sudbury District Drama Festival for Youth Organisations, 7 plays were produced and the press reported that the "unique contribution of the day" was that of Nayland Youth Club who acted in a play called *The Turtle Dove*, a Chinese story with a beautiful setting and choice costumes. The acting was described as "absolutely splendid". Later at an Eisteddfod in Bures, the Youth Club acted again the 20 minute circus sketch "*Laughter*" and gained 1st place.

Also that year at the Queen's Head, the Youth Club presented a two hour variety concert when the hall was full to capacity. The whole show was planned and produced by club members, the committee and the "energetic" secretary, Miss Ruby Norris (who had taken over from Bill Jackaman after he joined the army). Col AA Fenn of Alston Court thanked the members on behalf of the audience and said he was pleased to hear the Club was organising events to raise funds to help give a holiday in England to some Dutch children who suffered under enemy occupation during the war.

It seems the club must have lapsed for a while as in 1948 the press reported that the former club had petered out and in 1946 it had been decided to begin again. The club, for 14-21 year olds, had outgrown its headquarters and more room was needed. It had first met in the Mission Room then the

Congregational Church Schoolroom. The club met 3 times a week and the average attendance was nearly 40. Older ex-servicemen were giving their time and energy to the programme; a Police Constable and ex-naval PT Instructor taught boxing one evening; a professional producer instructed a Drama group; there were dancing lessons by a teacher and games, lectures and brains trusts. In the summer months the club enjoyed cycling, rambling, boating and swimming in the river.

In March 1948 there was An Evening of Drama at the Queen's Head. There were plays by Nayland School, the Nayland Branch of Young Conservatives, the Nayland Branch of GFS (Girls' Friendly Society) and the Youth Club who performed *The Long Christmas Dinner*. The handwritten programme also lists some well known names. Again, let me know if anyone would like to see this.

Later in 1948 at the Sudbury District Drama Festival when 8 youth clubs took part, there was a "fine contribution" by Nayland Youth Club who performed again *The Long Christmas Dinner*. The young people gave a "first rate rendering, with beautiful timing, clear emphatic elocution and good poise". It was noted that they were extremely fortunate in having a producer with professional experience. On the same occasion there was a "meritorious" performance of *Abu Hassan* by Nayland GFS, a repeat of their earlier performance at the Queen's Head.



The Girls' Friendly Society was a club exclusively for girls. It was a national Christian organisation, established in 1875 by an Irish clergyman's daughter and still exists today. During the thirties and forties the local branch in Nayland met in the Mission Room and was run by Miss Corry and Miss Edgeley who both lived on Gravel Hill. Miss Edgeley was the School Secretary. Some of the members belonged to the Youth Club but also produced their own plays and concerts.

Today Nayland still has many organisations but during the 1940s the clubs and groups were particularly well supported; the effects of the war no doubt brought communities together, there were fewer people with cars and everyday life was completely different.

Conservation Society AGM by Pat Bray

Warm tributes were paid at the annual meeting of Nayland with Wissington Conservation Society to Andora Carver who retired after 34 years as secretary.

Chairman Mike Hunter said her resignation brought to an end three decades of work and dedication, the like of which would not be seen again.

President and former chairman Barry Wakefield said his years of working with Mrs Carver had given him great pleasure. Her thoroughness and enthusiasm had made a massive contribution to maintaining and developing the society.

Another former chairman John Alexander said during day to day dealing with potential adverse developments, particularly the Horkesley Park scheme which lasted more than 10 years, Mrs Carver had shown a "steely reserve" and the village owed her a massive debt.

On the society's behalf he presented her with a dual five-year membership of the Royal Horticultural Society. Mrs Carver said the society had achieved a huge amount over the years, culminating in the Court Knoll dig and it had been a great privilege to be part of it.

In his report Mr Hunter said the Court Knoll Project was one of the largest undertaken by the society and until her recent illness was controlled by Mrs Carver helped by numerous volunteers. He especially mentioned Sally Bartrum, who attended the dig daily for six weeks providing a link with the volunteers who continued to help analyse the finds. He also mentioned Dr Tim Dennis whose expertise was crucial in obtaining consent for the excavations from Historic England, He had spent much time and effort during the dig now in its second phase. James Carver was thanked for supporting his wife.

Mr Hunter added he was delighted so many villagers had taken part in the project and thanked the Colchester and Stour Valley Archaeological Societies for their help. Analysing the finds was already bearing fruit and the most exciting news arose from the radio carbon dating of a small piece of bone found on the last day. There was a 68 per cent chance the bone dated from 989 to 1010, the first supporting evidence of a late Saxon settlement.

Members heard the project was going to cost more than the original £12,000 estimate and the committee was trying to raise more funds. The Dedham Vale Sustainable Development Fund, Nayland Community Council and the Tendring Hall Estate had all made substantial grants. Professional advisers, Suffolk Archaeology led by Jo Caruth and Linzi Everett, had reduced their fees. It was hoped to produce a report on progress by the end of March 2018.

Mr Hunter said open meetings had been well attended and membership was now about 260. The committee continued to study all planning applications for Nayland and Wiston, making comments or objections where appropriate.

Treasurer David Heigham presented the accounts which were approved. Officers elected were: chairman Mike Hunter, vice-chairman Martin Wright, secretary Jill Slater, treasurer David Heigham.

Following the business meeting leading architect Francis Terry gave an illustrated talk on Architecture and Design in AONBs.

Dear All,

As usual I've left it to the last minute to start thinking about this month's pastoral letter. In my defence, I have just returned from leading a group of Christians on an Inter-Faith Tour of North India, as well as beginning to finalise the details of an Advent Pilgrimage to the Holy Land at the end of this year (there are still places available – so do get in touch if you would like to join us!) – and of course Easter is fast approaching.

But as everyone keeps telling me, "It'll be worth it in the end".

They are *(probably)* right, in fact "It'll be worth it in the end" could well be the subtitle of the Easter Passion Narrative. There is something wonderfully dramatic about the story of Holy Week, the way the story moves from triumphal entry into Jerusalem, with the Hosannas of Palm Sunday, to the confusion of Maundy Thursday, with a last shared meal, foot washing, and betrayal; to the darkness and disbelief of the trial, crucifixion, and burial. Ultimately the end is worth it, with the glorious resurrection on that first Easter Sunday morning.

But in reality, and to borrow the words of Sir Winston Churchill, that "isn't the end; it's not even the beginning of the end; but it might just be the end of the beginning." Perhaps, everything from the beginning of creation, all the way through to that first Easter, was in reality just the first chapter of God's eternal plan.

Come that first Easter Morning, God turned over the page, sharpened his pencil, and metaphorically wrote at the top of a clean page, "Chapter Two".

That new second chapter, includes you and me, it includes all of us - each walking with Christ in the knowledge that our sins are forgiven, any debt we might have owed have been written off, paid in full, and in return, we are asked to acknowledge and love God, to worship him, and to make him known to others!

When was the last time you spoke to a friend or a family member about your own faith – about what Jesus achieved for <u>YOU</u> on that Cross? My challenge to you this Lent and Easter time is to speak to someone about your relationship with God, and perhaps even invite them to come to church this Easter with you – you'll be surprised how many will say YES!

DO YOU CLEAN UP AFTER YOUR DOG? OR DO YOU BREAK THE LAW?

Nayland with Wissington Parish Council has had an increasing number of complaints about the amount of dog fouling in the parish, particularly on Caley Green, in the High Street, Socket Alley and Candy Lane, the allotments and public footpaths. We are asking residents and responsible dog walkers to help catch the culprits.

Apart from being unsightly and an anti-social nuisance, dog fouling can be a health risk, as it often contains the parasitic roundworm Toxocara. Contact with Toxocara can lead to contracting the disease Toxocariasis which leads to flu-like symptoms and if untreated can lead to eye damage or blindness. Fresh faeces are not infectious so it's safe for owners to clean up after their dogs but if left for 2-3 weeks may become infectious. Each deposit can carry up to1 million Toxocara eggs.

Toxocariasis is contracted through contact, often through touching infected items such as shoes without washing hands adequately afterwards. For this reason the disease more common amongst children, so it is especially alarming that people are failing to clear up after their dogs in areas regularly used by children.

It is an offence under the Dogs (Fouling of Land) Act 1996 not to clear up after your dog. Babergh District Council is able to issue 'Fixed Penalty Notice' fines of £50 to those caught in the act as an alternative to prosecution when the potential fine is £1000.

Don't let the thoughtless actions of a few give the dog owners of Nayland and Wiston a bad name. If you have a dog please ensure that you always put faeces in a bag and either put it in a dog bin, or double wrap it and put it in your black wheelie bin. If you see anyone failing to clean up after their dog (many people fail to clean up when they think there is no-one else around), please let Babergh District Council know who they are - it is possible they could be issued with a fine. If you do not know who they are, but are able to give a description of them or the registration of their vehicle, please let us know so we can follow it up.

Feedback from James Finch - Your Stour Valley County Councillor

As this is nearly the end of a 4 year term of administration of your county council, this report summarises the achievements over that period with some key messages for the future.

Council Tax Frozen from 2011 - the county council has lived up to their pledge of freezing Council tax since the last election, meaning that the residents of Suffolk are not paying a penny more than they did in 2011. That's a 6 year freeze! For the future we are committed to running a low-tax county council and maintaining services by being more and more efficient and investing in better technology.

Roads - In 2016 we renewed more than 300 miles of roads across the county after an investment of an additional £10 million. We implemented an online reporting system for potholes which has seen over 70% of customers now using this service. We plan to invest over £250m over the next four years.

Caring for Suffolk's elderly and vulnerable - this has remained one of our highest priorities. With an ageing population, we have supported residents to live active and fulfilling lives. We have taken all opportunities to invest in adult care services. For the last two years we introduced the adult social care precept at 2% and 3% respectively. This money is ring-fenced and goes directly to these front line services.

School standards up - Since the last election in May 2013 Suffolk Schools have gone from 60% 'Good' or 'Outstanding' rating by OFSTED to 90%. This means that 9/10 children in Suffolk now have access to the highest standards of education. We are now ranked in the top half of all authorities in the country for GSCE results.

Transport - Over the past four years we have managed to work with partners to secure millions of pounds of improvement to the Rail network, with brand new rolling stock and reduced journey times under the new rail franchise with Greater Anglia. Our continued investment in community transport through our

Connecting Communities scheme has extended services in rural areas, allowing everyone to access public transport no matter how remote their location and no matter their age.

Infrastructure – we have worked closely with our MPs to secure money for two large bridge projects in Ipswich and Lowestoft. These nationally significant projects will help to ease congestion and attract economic investment. The Upper Orwell crossing will be a bridge of international architectural significance after the announcement of Lord Norman Foster of Foster and Partners designing it. This is a real coup and will truly be a legacy bridge for all the residents of Suffolk to be proud of. In addition plans are being developed for a Sudbury Relief road.

Waste Disposal - The county's energy from waste plant has enabled us to save money on landfill tax, generate electricity and earn income. The plant was built to budget and on time. It takes all Suffolk's domestic waste for incineration and powers 30,000 homes. As a result, waste going into landfill in Suffolk has been cut from 44% to just 1% !

Summary - Over the past four years, services have been not only maintained but in many cases improved. We have greatly improved Suffolk's Schools and protected those most vulnerable in our society. We have invested heavily in our road and transport network, ensuring that they are fit for purpose for growth in the future. We have protected all of our libraries, secured nationally significant infrastructure projects and taken huge steps in preventing damage to our environment. We have achieved all of this without raising our base Council tax by a single percent. My priorities for Suffolk.
