NAYLAND WITH WISSINGTON PARISH COUNCIL

Meeting: 14th June 2017

(These are extracts from the draft minutes of the meetings)

PUBLIC FORUM

The Parish Council were advised of a new group called 'The friends of Caley Green'. Nearby residents and others maintain an interest in the green and have undertaken some litter collection and graffiti removal. Mary George and Kathleen Cannings explained the work so far in collating information and starting to research different options. Caley Green is owned by the County Council and maintained by the Parish Council under licence.

DISTRICT COUNCIL REPORT

Melanie Barrett confirmed a Cabinet rather than Committee model is now in place at the District Council. On Planning, a new system of good quality pre-planning advice, for a fee, is now in place. The lack of 5 year land supply continues to affect decisions on applications. Members asked Cllr Barrett to ensure that this Council is consulted on the Konings expansion application. Cllr Barrett believed the location on the edge of the AONB may be a material consideration. Members expressed some concerns about not routinely receiving paper plans any more.

NOMINATION OF PC REPRESENTATIVES

Nobody put themselves forward as Vice Chairman. Highways responsibilities will be shared as before. Village Hall - Tricia Fuller. Community Council - Martyn Booth. Recreation Ground - Gerry Battye and Ian Harris. Walsh Trust - Tricia Fuller and Gerry Battye. Allotments - Ian Harris and G Walker. Open Spaces - Kathleen Cannings, Tricia Fuller, Russell Badrick and Ian Harris. Finance - Mary George, Graham Walker, Tricia Fuller, Kathleen Cannings. Burial Ground - Mary George assisted by Gerry Battye. SALC representation to be advised.

PLANNING

Decisions from Babergh: permission had been granted for change of use of residential extension to part residential and part holiday let at **Little Bulmer Farm**, **Wiston Road** [*B*/17/00537/FUL], and at **15 The Westerings** [*B*/17/00421/ FHA] for a two storey rear extension over existing single storey extension. Listed Building Consent had been granted for extensions and alterations at **The Mill House**, **Wiston Hall Lane** [B/17/00532/FHA and 533/LBC].

It was agreed to arrange an extraordinary meeting to consider an application at **The Bungalow**, **Harpers Hill** [*B*/17/01128] for 5 residential units so the discussion could be held in public and residents would have the opportunity to express their views.

It was agreed to discuss proposals for the **Konings Expansion** when the Planning consultation is received.

ALLOTMENTS

The recent vandalism at the Allotments was discussed. Ian Harris gave a progress report on the installation of a gate which was be completed over the following week. In respect of the allotment field, Ian Harris agreed to liaise with our grounds maintenance contractors to ask them to remove vegetation to allow him to seed in the autumn. It was agreed to ask Tom Gardiner to put out the allotment numbers ahead of the competition judging.

BURIAL GROUND

Memorial applications in the names of Gladwell and Cousins were duly approved. It was agreed to chase the driveway surface works and confirm a large pothole is located on the bend.

HIGHWAYS

Mary George continues to follow up on the flooding and drainage issues. She had an informal meeting with Suffolk Highways and pointed out the areas of concern. James Finch agreed to assist further to try to resolve. The Clerk explained an engineer from County Highways attended to assess the reported pothole in Church Lane and couldn't find it. Kathleen Cannings confirmed it was directly outside her house. Martyn Booth agreed to report an issue on-line of road edges falling away.

RECREATION & OPEN SPACES

The Caley Green working party had met and had looked at the historical information. They identified some areas which could be modified. Their proposal was to put a letter together to go out to Village Organisations, the School, Tree Warden, the Nursing Home and various other people who may have a view to share. This approach was approved. They can now include the Friends of Caley Green. So far the views expressed have been diverse with some suggesting no change and others wanting to see certain changes taking place. Nothing has been proposed so far and Kathleen Cannings confirmed she was happy to explore funding options to accompany any potential proposals.

VILLAGE HALL

Clearance was awaited from the Village Hall Insurers in respect of the floor repairs. Ian Harris raised encroachment of Webbs Meadow on the Fen Street side. Tricia Fuller agreed to include a walk around at their next quarterly inspection. There had been a request from a neighbour to access the rear of their property to erect a shed via Webbs Meadow. This was approved. **IN BRIEF**

Work was being carried out on the footbridge near Pop's Piece.

A meeting had been held regarding the Housing Needs Survey and a further meeting scheduled. The cost of the survey was being calculated but the aim was to issue it during the autumn this year.

Two nettle patches were to be removed at the Horsewatering. A nearby householder had offered to organise gravel once she has finished building work. This was approved.

Positive progress had been observed in response to the authorised street lighting work, however, a written progress report had not been provided from the County Council.

EXTRAORDINARY PARISH COUNCIL MEETING

held on 28th June 2017 PUBLIC FORUM

A spokesperson from the Conservation Society spoke in respect of the Bungalow, Harpers Hill application and added his own personal views as resident. He spoke against the application. Concerns were expressed about the outline nature of the proposal in the AONB and dangerous access to and from the properties.

PLANNING

The Bungalow, Harpers Hill [*B*/17/01128] - Mary George directed each member to share their initial views to start the discussion. A detailed discussion followed. Concerns expressed included outline planning being insufficient for such a sensitive site. The proposal lies within the AONB and outside the village envelope on a green field site. Members were concerned about a precedent being set especially ahead of a full evaluation of Housing Needs. Vehicle access onto the A134 gave considerable safety concerns in addition to the safety of pedestrians walking between the site and facilities in the village. These areas were debated further and Ian Harris proposed this Council objects to the outline application and gives detailed reasons supporting the objection and includes a list of errors identified. This was seconded by Kathleen Cannings and unanimously carried.

Jasmine Cottage, 32 Newlands Lane: Councillors had no objections to the erection of garden store.

Planning Consultations: Councillors were reminded of 2 consultations - one from Colchester Borough Council and one from Babergh District Council on the Local Plan in the respective areas. Members agreed to research the documents for discussion at the July meeting.

PUBLIC FORUM

Will Hitchcock explained that coinciding with the original Nayland with Wissington village hall webpage manager leaving the village and webmaster Graham Griffiths stepping down, there is an opportunity to update the website. Nayland resident Justin Dowding has begun designing an up to date website ensuring it is tablet and smartphone friendly and can display events on the homepage. Justin's prototype has been very favourably received. The cost would be £2,000 and Will asked the Parish Council to contribute a third of this (£635) the remainder met by the Community Council and Village Hall. Councillors planned to discuss the contribution to the upgrade after the meeting closed.

Mr Chris Hunt asked what publicity there had been prior to the extraordinary parish council meeting held a few weeks earlier. He was assured that posters were placed on noticeboards.

PLANNING

Reviewing recent planning applications an application for Listed Building Consent for alterations to interior of the **Old Post Office 19 High Street** [*DC*/17/03099 & *DC*/17/02376] as per drawings and schedule of works was not discussed as there were five abstentions and the meeting was not quorate.

Discussing an application at **11 Wiston Road** [*DC/17/02359*] for erection of a single storey side extension councillors heard neighbours were concerned that there were plans for windows overlooking their garden, preferring no windows or frosted glass; the Council will suggest this is considered.

KONINGS, BRICK HILL, POLSTEAD

The company proposes expanding operations and councillors discussed potentially increased traffic. Gerry Battye remarked there was a need for a 'robust attitude' by SCC Highways regarding the effect on roads but councillors decided there were no planning grounds for making any comment.

HOUSING SURVEY

Gerry Battye and Graham Walker attended a meeting including members of Stoke by Nayland Parish Council and the Lady

PARKING IN THE VILLAGE



A resident spotted this vehicle at the entry to Church Lane causing a partial obstruction on the morning of the 26th May. As a number of residents in Newlands Lane encountered difficulty in getting past the vehicle the incident was reported to Suffolk Police.

Recently there have been a number of parking problems in Nayland involving other vehicles. When parking please consider other road and pavement users and also whether emergency services, such as fire engines can get past your vehicle. Anne Windsor Charity (Almshouses in Stoke by Nayland), Melanie Barrett and officers from Babergh District Council.

Devised by Community Action Suffolk and Babergh Housing, the survey is due to arrive with the Parish Clerk this month. Those completing the survey will be anonymous and the analysis cost will be met by Babergh DC. Each dwelling will receive a survey in October and the PC will advertise at the school, Woodland Corner and in the Community Times.

Mary George raised the possibility that the Nayland Charity Almshouses might like to be involved as observers.

Tricia Fuller and Mary George had attended a district-wide liaison meeting with parish councils. Babergh plans to build 226 new shared ownership/rental homes spread over the district in the next three years.

ALLOTMENTS

The best kept allotment competition has been held and winners informed. A notice advising that the allotment gate will be locked will be placed for one month before the gate is actually locked. **HIGHWAYS**

Babergh DC cleared debris responsible for flooding on Birch Street and Gravel Hill. A road closure in Bures is planned for August.

FOOTPATHS

Kathleen Cannings was very pleased with the work on footbridge at Pop's Piece while Gerry Battye had concerns as some planks were cracked. The PC will follow up.

OPEN SPACES

No further meetings about Caley Green are planned before September.

Every effort is being made to deal with bird mess on the play equipment on Fairfield recreation ground. The swings have been 're-spiked' to help with this.

Unauthorised parking is still a problem at both sites.

VILLAGE HALL

Tricia Fuller reported that the VHMC is looking at re-roofing the hall. A meeting is planned for October to discuss potential grants.

COMMUNITY COUNCIL MEETING

They are applying for Lottery funding for a community defibrillator. A grant application and listed building planning application has been submitted for the Community Post Office by Nayland Community Stores Ltd.

AUGUST PC MEETING

The next full meeting will be on 13th September; the PC will meet on 9th August only if urgent matters require discussion.

Nayland Community Stores (NCS Ltd) Post Office Report 5th July 2017

We had a well-attended public meeting on 15th June 2017 and have since received an increase in our pledges now totalling in excess of £44,700. The July LSPN reached residents from a wider area and they have responded. We have had confirmation from HMRC that our shares will be eligible for Social Investment Tax Relief at 30%.

We currently have a funding gap. We have identified launch costs of £79,418. Patsie Ford has kindly agreed a contribution of £8,000 by waiving our first year's rent. Our funding from Share Pledges, the Community Council and Transition Nayland amounts to £46,966. We are working hard to secure LEADER (Rural Development Agency) grant funding of £24,098 to bridge the remaining gap and are currently in the final stages of preparing our LEADER Grant full application following a successful Round 1.

In parallel to the grant application, we have submitted our business application to Post Office Ltd. This is a fully costed business plan detailing our legal structure, identity and credit checks on CBS Directors, property plans, business activities, trading hours and funding model, etc.

Once up-and-running the Post Office should be self-financing, breaking even on a turnover of around \$85,000 pa.

Our draft lease is with our Landlord's solicitor (terms agreed back in January). In essence we have a 5-year term with statutory right of renewal for the whole premises at a cost of £8,000 per annum and no provision for rent review. NCS Ltd may terminate at any time on one year's notice. Application for Listed Building Consent has been submitted for the refurbishment (and backdated following Babergh's recent IT problems).

Our probable timeline 2017/18:

- July Grant Application; Post Office Ltd Application; Listed Building Consent
 - Sept Grant confirmation; appoint contractor
 - Oct Share Prospectus issue
 - Nov Confirm funding and prepare all legal papers
 - Dec Sign leases; staff training
 - Jan Commence refurbishment
 - Feb Fully Open for business

Meeting: 5th July 2017 Chair: Rachel Hitchcock 263169 www.naylandcommunitycouncil.org.uk

Rachel Hitchcock welcomed members to the meeting. **MATTERS ARISING**

Executive Committee: Rachel Hitchcock updated the meeting regarding a legal representative. The situation remains that we need to seek another person with a legal background who can offer advice or point us in the right direction if needed for 2018. This position is stipulated in our Constitution but does not require any regular commitment or attendance at meetings. Please contact Rachel if you may be willing to help.

The Community Council Executive would welcome more members of village groups to join them as members of the CC. **Fundraising Activities & Events:** The CC are focused on events for 2018 but future ideas and/or support with running events to benefit the CC funds are always welcome.

Community Defibrillator: This was a proposal for a community defibrillator sited at the Fire Station, which has been given approval by the Fire Service.

Rachel Hitchcock updated the meeting on progress. She has been liaising with the Community Heartbeat Trust (CHT) for advice and a quote for a complete package (the defibrillator, installation, maintenance, training, ongoing support, etc). The cost would be $\pounds 2,200$. CHT have recommended applying for Awards For All Lottery Funding, which Rachel will pursue.

Community Post Office: Maggie Ryan reported on the current situation. See page 7 for a full update.

Nayland 10km Fun Run Fundraiser: Rachel Hitchcock gave a report on the event as Luke Rumbelow was unable to attend this meeting. Luke's full report will be circulated to the Exec.

Rachel said it had been a super event that went really well and had such a buzz on the day. Luke had done a marvellous job organising the event and was to be congratulated.

Financial aspects are not yet finalised. There were some start up costs this year so there is potential for a higher profit in future. There will be a de-brief meeting with Luke.

Feedback from runners has been very positive and provided some constructive comments. There was rather more work involved at a local level than anticipated, but we now know what is needed and have the goodwill of helpers. Rachel, Claire Buller & Julie Clark were thanked for their hard work.

Members feel Nayland 10k complements other village events and that plans for a 2018 Fun Run should go ahead.

Correspondence:

Parish Council: A letter was received from the Parish Council expressing concern that at the last CC meeting members of the Community Council implied a lack of openness about Caley Green and that decisions might be made without full public knowledge. Rachel Hitchcock has assured them queries had been raised by individuals at the meeting and not by the Community Council as a whole.

Community Website: Graham Griffiths is standing down from managing the village website and because it is now on out of date technology there is an urgent need to replace the website with something that is easier to maintain and better suits the current needs of the village. Justin Dowding has been looking at this at the request of the Village Hall Committee - obviously the booking systems for the village hall and church hall are of key importance but the site also has a much wider purpose as a village amenity. There are however one off costs involved in this work and it has been proposed that the Village Hall Committee, Community Council and Parish Council contribute a third each to these costs - £635 per organisation. Members appreciate Justin's willingness and feel the cost is competitive; with his local knowledge Justin would be ideal as webmaster. Members agreed to support one -third of the cost.

TREASURER'S REPORT: Maggie Ryan gave her report. **Current Position:** The accounts show reserves of £18,545.15 represented by: Deposit a/c monies £15,568.41, Current a/c monies £2,950.74, Cash in hand £26. From these reserves, we hold £188.50 for the Services Fund. **Unencumbered assets are therefore £18,356.65.**

A grant application of up to £646 has been agreed this evening for Baby & Toddler Group and a contribution to the Community website for £635.

Administrative matters: A Charities Aid Foundation account has been registered to process a donation. The bank reconciliation revealed some Community Times income (£227.50 in cheques) had not cleared. This has necessitated contacting a number of our advertisers to ask them to reissue their cheques.

Grants & Donations:

Donation for Fireworks: A letter has been received congratulating the CC on a magnificent firework display together with a donation of £200 toward the cost from Mrs Pamela Neighbour. This was much appreciated.

Nayland Baby & Toddler Group: An application has been received to help cover the cost of hiring the village hall to the end of 2017. The amount required, including £316 currently owed, would be £646. Members felt continuation of the group was important and agreed to fund the arrears and future costs to a maximum of £646.

Community Times: Lorraine Brooks mentioned the loss of 7 annual subscription advertisers this year with only one gain (numbers reduced from 59 to 53). Adding it is not as alarming as it sounds; 2014/15 saw a high increase in advertisers taking figures to a record high. The CT was originally introduced as a facility for the community rather than producing income. However, please recommend the CT to potential advertisers.

Village Calendar: Lorraine Brooks said some lovely photos have be included in the calendar. Files have now gone to the printer for a first proof. The calendar will be available for first sales at the Flower Show on 5th August. The calendar team are grateful to the local businesses who are sponsoring the calendar.

Forthcoming Activities:

Bonfire & Fireworks: *Sunday 5th November.* Iain Wright had previously agreed to order fireworks in July in order to qualify for discount with Dynamic Fireworks. It had been agreed to order the same quantity as last year, he will liaise with Claire on quantities of sparklers and glo-necklaces as the quantity of sparklers would need increasing. Iain did not feel new recruits for training would be required this year.

Christmas Fayre: *Saturday 2nd December.* Rachel Hitchcock said she would begin contacting potential stallholders.

Village Quiz: *Friday 2nd February.* Rachel Hitchcock will be co-ordinating the event.

SOCIETY REPORTS

Art Group: Colin Ramsell said they held an Art Group Day with visiting tutor Keith Whitlock, spending the afternoon sketching and painting as guests in Andrew and Sue Gowen's beautiful garden. To celebrate the end of their Summer session members will enjoy their traditional Cream Tea at Newton Green's clubhouse.

Parish Council: Martyn Booth said an extraordinary meeting was called to discuss a planning application at The Bungalow, Harpers Hill for erection of 5 residential units with associated garages, parking, private drive and access to the field beyond. The PC have objected to this application. No decisions have been made regarding the future management of Caley Green; a PC working party is collecting information, further discussions and consultation will take place before a decision is made, probably well into next year.

A query was raised regarding notice of the extraordinary meeting; several members said they hade been unaware of the meeting. It had not been posted on the website. Martyn said that notices had been posted on the usual notice boards.

Royal British Legion: Alex Murrison said the outing to the National Heritage Centre for Horseracing and Sporting Art in Newmarket was well received. On 2nd August they will be embarking on the river craft *Orwell Lady* for a cruise from Orwell Quay Ipswich to Shotley Gate for lunch and a visit to HMS Ganges Museum. Their next bi-monthly meeting will be on 17th July in the Church Hall, 7.30 for 8pm.

HortSoc: Trevor Smy said their Garden Party at Parkers will be on 14th July, on 26th July they have an outing to Sandringham Flower Show, the Nayland Flower Show takes place on 5th August and on 10th September they have a coach outing to Hever Castle.

Friends of Caley Green: Sally Dalton introduced this new group, although for some time they have performed litter-picking, cleaning graffiti from signs and kept an eye on the welfare of Gordon the Goose, ducks and swans etc in the area.

St James Church & Bellringers: Chris Hunt said repairs to the church tower, costing in the region of £100,000, should be completed by the end of the month. Bellringing will then be able to resume. Alex Murrison added scaffolding has not been seen on the church for many years; the cost on this occasion is £20,000.

Conservation Society: They had a record Open Gardens with final figures close to £3,000. Around 70 people enjoyed an excellent talk by Darren Tansley of Essex Wildlife Trust on *Otters on the Stour.* A visit to West Stow Hall is planned for 6th September and some places are still available.

Nayland Choir: Rob Swan said singing Mendelssohn's Elijah with Bury Bach Choir to a packed cathedral was a massively rewarding choral experience for the Nayland Choir members who took part. By contrast the 'Sizzling Summer Singing' barbecue and concert is just a few days away and should be fun. Planning for the "Manchester Carols" concert in the church on Saturday 9th December is advancing. Rehearsals start on 14th September in the school hall, new singers are very welcome. They are hoping to raise money to replace the village hall piano.

Women's Institute: Wendy Sparrow said at the May annual meeting they agreed the Resolutions which would be passed on to the National Federation of the WI would be alleviating loneliness and eliminating plastic in the oceans. In August they will have their annual Garden Party and a River Stour boat trip from Sudbury to the Henny Swan where they will have lunch is being planned.

Book Club: Wendy Sparrow said they recently read and discussed *The Comfort of Others* by Kay Langdale and they are now reading *Wild* by Cheryl Strayed.

Village Players: Bryan Smith said auditions for 5 females and 3 males of various ages take place this week for the next production 'The Game's Afoot', an entertaining whodunnit by Ken Ludwig. Performances will be 30th November, 1st & 2nd December. Volunteers to help backstage would also be welcome.

Village Hall: Iain Wright said replacing flooring damaged by leaking plumbing is taking place; this may be an insurance claim. They are currently budgeting for replacement of the concrete roof tiles which have served beyond the recommended life span. The cost may be in the region of £60,000 for the whole roof (original and extension areas). During the works it is hoped the hall can be covered to allow continuation of regular use. The VHMC will be investigating grants but they will require help with raising funds.

Baby & Toddler Group: Karen Tranter thanked the CC for approval of the grant. They now have a regular attendance of between 7 and 12 families and hope that this number will be sustainable - although obviously there will be a natural progression of children to Woodland Corner and other settings as the children get older. They have a good relationship with Woodland Corner which makes for a nice transition for the children. The group is now attracting families from further afield and have been doing some great craft activities and messy play amongst other things. **Date of next meeting:** will be **on Wednesday 6th September 2017** at 8pm (*Exec 7.30*) in the Church Hall.

PLEASE DON'T CHANGE CALEY GREEN

The Green is much more than just a green. It is the only place in the village where young and old, the able and less able have access to and are able to enjoy the river and adjacent views. Whether that is sitting on the grass or the benches it is a place where all can meet to feed the swans, ducks or resident goose or just pass the time of day in friendly chatter which has benefits for health and wellbeing especially for older residents.

The beauty of the green is in its greenness, its openness and the trees of which there were almost 30 at the last count. The green is appreciated and well used by villagers and visitors alike, and is the first sight that greets you as you enter the village from Bear Street. In the summer local workers sit on the grass to eat lunch, travellers rest and contemplate before continuing their journeys, the primary school children walk to the green sit on the grass and have lessons. During the weekends the green is a hive of activity; families picnic, young people sunbath, canoeists and paddle-boarders embark on their journeys; these are just a few of the many users.

Others will say that's all very well but what about the invertebrates, small mammals and birds who would benefit from letting the green go wild. To them I say look at what surrounds the green, the conservation meadow a haven for wildlife to be admired but not accessed by humans, the area either side of the flood channel, the large dense reserve adjacent to the pumping station, these are just a few of the sites dedicated to wildlife and all are in close proximity to the green.

The green was man made as an open green space for the residents to enjoy. Please leave it as it is. *J Dalton, Nayland*

CALEY GREEN

I would like to remind everyone that Caley Green was once part of a meadow grazed by cattle, full of wildlife and flowers before the bypass swept through it. We live in the countryside and despite many attempts by conservation experts and residents since the 1970s to return Caley Green to a more wildlife friendly area, today we still have an open space which looks like a municipal park.

Recent research by wildlife charity Plantlife shows that since the 1930s Britain has lost 97% of its meadows, one of the biggest tragedies in the history of UK nature conservation. Urgent action is needed to save vanishing meadows and their wildflowers for the sake of future generations. Chris Packham in the Springwatch programme recently lamented the loss of butterflies, saying that there has been a 70% decline since the 1970s. These are statistics of great concern.

There are many organisations warning us that the countryside is disappearing but still the message just doesn't get through. Most people mourn the loss of birds, butterflies and wildlife but do nothing about it. We are all encouraged to help by not concreting over our gardens and by having small wild areas in them. Farming practices in the past have not helped the decline but many farmers are now doing their part to reverse the trend.

Nayland is a conservation area and in the AONB but Caley Green contributes nothing to this status, it is a sea of mown grass where there is nothing whatsoever to attract wildlife. The outside world must think that Nayland is completely out of touch with modern thinking. When I look at Caley Green I am reminded of Colchester Castle Park and regret Nayland's part in the national decline of wildlife and wildflower meadows, but it is not too late. We should all get behind the Parish Council and support them in their proposals to once again consider making changes to the green for the sake of the planet and future generations.

The Caley Green ducks have had several broods of ducklings this spring/summer. They have been raised with varying degrees of success. One duck has managed to raise six ducklings, while others have averaged two or none. One mother managed to bring her recently hatched brood all the way from their nest site by Wiston Road across the A134 without mishap. This was during the morning rush hour so there was some delay to traffic!

The pair of resident swans have raised five cygnets although sadly one has gone missing in recent weeks, however the others are maturing well. The adult male has been busy protecting his territory which stretches from the A134 bridge down to the weir from invading swans. His habit is to fold his wings back and up in a threatening manner and walk the interloper towards the A134 this can take up to ten minutes and he does this repeatedly until he is satisfied there will be no more incursions.

Towards the end of August / beginning of September the grain lorries will be coming through the village dropping grain all over the road this provides a banquet for the ducks who will be foraging. We will endeavour to keep the road swept and free of grain, however be aware that there may be ducks on the road during this time.

Garden Notes by The Old Muckspreader

At the time of writing the promised rain has never really arrived, though one or two heavy showers during the night have been of some help. When watering by hose or can it is best to give one's favourite plants a real soaking, i.e. $1\frac{1}{2}$ or 2 gallons each rather than to try to water the whole garden lightly. If you want to go the latter route it's best to spray the foliage, after sunset.

The question is often asked: when should one prune shrubs. There is no one-size answer; in fact if a plant is healthy and has plenty of room for expansion it may not need pruning at all. However, there are one or two basic principles which may be of some help. Most of the Spring and early Summer flowering can be pruned now, any really old wood with weak growth on it can be cut out, leaving new healthy growth to ripen and bear next year's flower.

Examples of this class of shrub are Deutzia and Weigela. In contrast later Summer and Autumn flowering shrubs should be pruned in early Spring; they will then put up new growth which carries the flowers - example Buddleias. Incidentally, if you don't prune a Buddleia it will still flower, but the spokes are much smaller.

Many shrubs don't need pruning at all, except to cut out dead wood in Spring; incidentally it's best to leave the old flower heads of Hydrangeas on until then, to provide protection in Winter.

When pruning, one should always cut to a growth point, hereby not leaving a length of old wood, which may well become diseased.

Despite his previous experience, the OM/S failed to strike any of the last batch of cuttings of Calceolaria Integrifolia about which he waxed enthusiastic in the April issue of this magazine.

To make matters worse the parent plant is looking distinctly sick - not exactly cutting material. The OM/S will have to fall back on the plantsman's Last Refuge, and beg for cuttings from someone to whom he has given a plant. Regrettably he probably won't be able to supply a plant to the customer at the Fete Plant Stall to whom he promised one in the Autumn.

This month's plant is Kolkwitzia Amabilis, or Beauty Bush. Well named, it should be better known. There was one here for many years, bought as a small rooted cutting from John Smith of Sudbury, it flourished until it was killed by the dreaded Honey Fungus.

Until then it was regularly covered with its pink flowers in early Summer. On one occasion when the garden was open to members of the Essex branch of the Hardy Plant Society a visitor exclaimed that it was the best plant he had seen all that afternoon - but then he was a bit of an old flatterer.

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THE OLD BAKERY, MILL STREET

Many houses and cottages in Nayland have interesting histories, some having been shops and businesses which have long gone. One of these is No 7 Mill Street, now the home of Mike and Margaret Almond. With its attractive front window it is easy to see it was once a shop and some people still remember it as Taylor's bakery which closed in the 1950s. Documentary evidence proves there have been at least 5 bakers there since 1838.

On the Tithe Map of 1838 William Roberts was listed as being a tenant of William Stammers in Mill Street, the premises then being described as a "House and Bake Office". William Stammers owned the existing mill at the Fen Street corner and also a second mill which occupied the site between 7 Mill Street and the Bear Street corner. This mill was originally a fulling mill for the woollen cloth trade which flourished in Nayland between the 14th and the

17th centuries, then later a leather mill before ending its life as a corn mill. Charles Gowing, a baker in Birch Street in the 19th century, recalled seeing this mill being pulled down around 1850 and soon after this the four Victorian cottages we see today were built. The existing garage on the right of No 7 was built at the same time, probably to provide access for the bakery, but the rest of the house, which has been altered over the centuries, has been dated by English Heritage as being from the 17th/18th century and may have been part of the old mill premises.

The Tithe Map also shows a stream behind Numbers 1-11 Mill Street which would have provided access from the main river for boat and barge traffic to the demolished mill. The stream then went under the road, behind the houses in Birch Street and met up with the Fen Street millstream at the bottom of the street. It can no longer be seen as it was piped in many years ago.

In the 1851 Census William Roberts was still listed as a Baker at 7 Mill Street. He was 52, unmarried and living with his niece Sara Finch who was his Housekeeper. He was the son of William Roberts, a baker at the Guildhall. George Roberts, another son, lived in Fen Street and was described as a baker journeyman who no doubt worked at one of the two family bakeries.

Thirty years later the 1881 Census lists Joshua Last described as a "Confectioner" at 7 Mill Street with his wife Kate. Joshua was born in Colchester and more research might well reveal that he was related to the Henry Last who established the H J Last bakery business in Colchester High Street in 1900.

By the 1901 Census William Cook was the resident baker at 7 Mill Street with his wife Mary. They were in their forties and were both born in Nayland. The late Bill Norfolk who lived near the corner where the old mill had been told me that he knew his near neighbour Billy Cook well and also the two bakers who came after him.

The next baker at 7 Mill Street was G Day and Mike Almond knows that he kept his pony in a stable in the garden and the

trap was kept in what is now the garage. He found a part of Day's sign which came from the trap. From the garage there was a rickety stairway where the bags of flour were probably brought down when required for bread making. The front of the house shows evidence of pulleys where the bags were probably hoisted up to be stored on the first floor.

The last baker who lived there from the 1930s was Herbert Taylor, known as Herbie, and his wife Sarah. They lived there from the 1930s until Herbie retired in the late 1950s and went to live in Little Clacton. Several people in the village remember Herbie, some of whom as young boys helped with delivering bread round the area. Bill Jackaman remembers that Mrs Taylor held whist drives in a room off the shop in aid of the Welcome Home Fund for soldiers returning from the war and that Herbie was Captain of the Home Guard.

Herbie Taylor is also remembered for forming the Nayland & District British Legion Silver Band in 1935. He was an ex-military bandsman and was previously bandmaster of the Boxted Silver Band. He taught some of the Navland boys to play instruments and the band was in great demand, playing at functions such as flower shows, fetes and British Legion rallies in the area. However, when World War II came several members joined the forces and the band folded up. Unfortunately when peace returned the band never reformed.

After the Taylors left Cyril Holden lived at the old bakery in the 1960s with his wife Dorothy and son Paul where they ran an antiques shop. When his wife died and his son left the village Cyril went to live in Fen Street with his father Arthur, a Churchwarden and Lay Reader at St James's Church for many years. He then moved to Wales to be with his son after retiring from the Windyridge Probation Home at Horkesley Park (now Littlegarth School).

Mike and Margaret bought the old bakery in 1996. They remember it being in considerable need of repair as it had been unoccupied for 5 years. The old bread ovens had already been removed but there is still a swing window between what was the front shop and the bakehouse behind to provide light and ventilation, and also a small window to allow bread to be passed through to the shop, otherwise there were no windows in the bakehouse.

After the war Nayland was fortunate to still have three bakeries; as well as Taylor's in Mill Street, Roberts' Bakery was at the Guildhall and Butlers' was in Birch Street but these all closed during the 1950s, Taylor's being the last. What a sad day that must have been. Residents could no longer buy their bread straight from the oven and the wonderful aroma of freshly baked bread no longer filled the streets of Nayland.

This is the equivalent of about 7 fundraising fetes, so you can see just how important the fete is. Hopefully the work will be complete by the end of July.

This was Revd Mark Woodrow's first Nayland Church fete and he was pleased to meet so many people enjoying the day. He very kindly even volunteered to go into the stocks for the sponge throw!

So heartfelt thanks to all those who visited the fete, provided donations and sponsorship and those that worked hard to ensure it was a huge success. Hope to see you all again next year!

How To KEEP YOUR TECH SQUEAKY CLEAN

Our tech is something we use every day, but did you know it's also the most disgusting? Your screen may look clean, but studies show that a mobile phone can be 18x dirtier than a public restroom - ew! It gets worse (sorry)...that keyboard you tap at while eating your morning toast? It's probably the biggest bacterial threat in your house, with about 20 000 times more germs than a toilet seat, more if you share it with children.

It's not just sickness we're up against, because as dust builds up inside gadgets, they also slow down, malfunction or overheat. Your device essentially chokes, as vents and filters are clogged by sucking in pet hair and floating debris. Here's how to clean your essential tech items without damaging them: 1. Skip the household cleaners: Most cleaning products are too harsh for our technology and can end up causing permanent damage. You want something that can kill germs and remove everyday grime, without scratching or leaving behind a scented residue. Your best bet is Isopropyl Alcohol. You'll find it in the first aid section of supermarkets and pharmacies, or at the hardware store.

2. Power down completely: Turn your tech off all the way, not just sleeping, and unplug from any power sources. Switch wireless keyboards, mice, etc off underneath or remove the batteries.

3. Remove any cases or covers: Undress your device as much as you can, but leave screen protectors on (unless there's grime underneath). If your screen protector needs replacing, have a new one ready to apply.

4. Grab a microfiber cloth: Dampen the cloth with Isopropyl Alcohol and wipe screens and external surfaces gently. Older build-up may require extra effort.

5. Go deep: You can use a toothbrush or cotton tip to clean between most crevices, but some areas will need a bit more 'oomph' to clear. You've probably seen people use vacuum cleaners on their keyboard, but these are often TOO powerful and may suck keys or internal parts loose. They also generate damaging static electricity. Another option is to use a techspecific vacuum, but these are usually underpowered. Insider tip: Use a can of compressed air to blow the dust out. You can get these from many stores and they come with a long nozzle so you can really get in and direct the pressure. You'll be surprised what flies out, so it's best to do this outside! We don't recommend using compressed air on your computer's internal fans though, as this can make them spin too fast and damage them.

How often you clean your tech is up to you and your lifestyle. But it's a good idea to blow out computer internal dust at least twice a year and wiping your tech down 1-2 times per week will definitely reduce germs and grime.

NAYLAND WITH WISSINGTON PARISH COUNCIL

CALEY GREEN

Letters published in the last issue of the Community Times about the maintenance of Caley Green imply that the Parish Council will "sneak through" changes thinking that residents "won't notice" and that decisions will be made "by the back door". This is not the case. All decisions are the result of resolutions and formal voting by elected members of the whole Council at meetings held in public with an agenda published in advance. All residents are entitled to attend any monthly Parish Council meeting as observers and to raise concerns about any council matter during the public forum before the meeting. Minutes are published and extracts or a report is included in the Community Times. The telephone numbers and email addresses of the Parish Clerk and all Parish Councillors are widely publicised. Residents often contact us individually with queries.

No new plan for Caley Green has been drawn up, discussed or approved as yet. In 2016 one Parish Councillor worked through extensive parish archives. This research started at the creation of the bypass in 1968 and included previous plans and reviews. A summary was displayed at the Annual Parish Assembly in April this year. The chairman's annual report (2015 and 2016) mentioned that maintenance of the Green is due to be reviewed again and welcomed general comments, for example on replanting or leaving some areas uncut for part of the year. A working party was set up by the Parish Council on 10th May to investigate all possibilities. As in the past, there will be site meetings and negotiations between statutory authorities, i.e. Parish Council, Suffolk County Council, the Environment Agency and possibly the Dedham Vale and Stour Valley Project team before any recommendations can be made for discussion by whole Parish Council or made available to residents for comment.

Reviewing the management of Caley Green is nothing new or unusual. Areas of responsibility are regularly assessed and linked to long term financial planning, whether it is Fairfield play area and recreation ground, burial ground, allotments and Glebe Field, Pops Piece, street-lighting, war memorials, litter collection or village hall. All of these have been reviewed, renewed or updated in recent years as part of ongoing asset management. The reduction of income over past five years because of capping limits on council tax and withdrawal of local government grants needs to be balanced annually against increasing costs. Alterations to maintenance and expenditure for Caley Green, *if any*, cannot be included in long term financial plans before the 2018 precept is agreed.

We hope that this dispels any misconceptions and clarifies the current position.
