

NAYLAND WITH WISSINGTON PARISH COUNCIL

Meeting: 14th December 2016

(This is an extract from the draft minutes of the meeting)

District Council Report

Melanie Barrett confirmed she has been chasing the Housing Needs Survey and there were encouraging developments. Sheltered housing was being reviewed, however, this did not affect Parkers Way. The District Council have launched a new website. The new Chief Executive is due to start in the New Year. The Chairman questioned about the lack of information about next year's Community Achievement Awards.

Planning

Decisions by Babergh DC include: work can proceed to willow and magnolia at Butchers, 5 Bear Street (B/16/01245/ TCA) and permission had been granted for annexe and garage at Ricklands Bungalow, Wiston (B/16/01504/FHA).

Between meetings councillors had raised no objections with Babergh DC regarding insertion of a window following removal of garage door at Kingfishers, 108 Bear Street (B/16/01528) or at Ricklands Bungalow (B/16/01504) for erection of annexe and garage subject to a condition to ensure the residential annexe cannot be used or sold separately from the host dwelling.

Discussing recent applications councillors had no objections to the proposed erection of replacement two storey dwelling and 2 bay cartlodge and store with ancillary living accommodation at Westwood, Harpers Hill (B/16/01580) subject to a condition that ties the cartlodge to residential use ancillary to the main building or at 15 The Westerings (B/16/01536) for the proposed erection of first floor rear extension.

The Parish Council objects to an application at 1 Ash Rise (B/16/01526) for the erection of single storey dwelling with new access as the proposed mass and scale is considered unsuitable in the size of the plot. The design is inappropriate in the streetscape and would have a negative impact on the amenity neighbours could expect to enjoy. In respect of the highways considerations, County Highways should re-visit the application in view of local knowledge about parking to check the new access is compatible with safety near a Doctors; Surgery, School and Nursery School. An inspection was suggested by the Planning Committee to fully appreciate what is proposed. This response was copied to our District and County Cllrs and had been agreed by majority of members. During the discussion it was noted that the application form was incorrect in respect of item 6 as there is a new access proposed onto the highway. The best inspection time would be school drop off and pick up times to demonstrate the issues involved.

HIGHWAYS

Melanie Booth reported on the site meeting where a zone was agreed for the siting of a cycle rack.

Topics discussed included the Stoke Road speed pole, the resurfacing in Birch Street, Bear Street and Stoke Road and the finger post sign in the vicinity that is repeatedly hit. The Chairman agreed to follow up the latter.

A further consultation was expected in respect of further speed reduction proposals for the A134.

STREET LIGHTING

All the upgrades had now been ordered. It was agreed to request a site meeting with County Council Engineer to consider the decommissioning of a light on a property as permission has been withdrawn for the light to remain. The reduction of light in the vicinity will be considered once it has been switched off. It was agreed to keep the Parish Council lights on all night on both Christmas Eve and New Years Eve. It was noted that the new pole in Court Street is now in place. The light in the vicinity can be assessed when the new lantern is in place and the light on 1 Court Street decommissioned.

BURIAL GROUND

The Chairman explained the up to date plan at the Burial Ground and members were supportive. It was agreed to chase the Diocese regarding the condition of the driveway surface. It was agreed to get additional quotes for the extension to the path in the Burial Ground.

FOOTPATHS


By follow up to last meeting a new waymark post is on order by the County Right of Way. The permissive path situation is being followed up in respect of the Glebe land (Allotment Field).

ALLOTMENTS

It was confirmed the tap issue has now been resolved. Letters have been issued to landowners along Candy Lane to seek on-going permission for hedge cutting. Graham Walker was pleased to advise that some money will be allocated via Tescos towards the Glebe Land improvements. A response was agreed to letters from a dog walker concerned about the treatment of rabbits. **IN BRIEF**

The Fairfield playground safety report was handed to Gerry Battye to review and it was agreed to deal with minor issues between meetings.

A new Village Hall bookings secretary has now been appointed.

DISTRICT COUNCIL REPORT

Melanie Barrett confirmed that Julie Abbey-Taylor (Corporate Manager, Strategic Housing) from Babergh District Council (BDC) would like to meet with Nayland, Leavenheath and Stoke by Nayland Councillors regarding a joint Housing Needs Survey. Councillor Barrett will also attend. It was felt that Leavenheath Parish Council would not wish to take part at this stage. Unlike previously, the new Housing Needs Survey will include references to low-cost, affordable housing for purchase.

Babergh DC is looking for a new sponsor for the Community Awards scheme. There had been discussion about reducing the scale of the awards evening but maintaining some kind of recognition by Babergh of the contribution of its residents to our quality of life.

PLANNING

Reviewing applications approved by Babergh Mary George said permission has been granted at '**Kingfishers' 108 Bear Street** (B/16/01528) for insertion of window following removal of a garage door and at **20 Fen Street** (B/16/01664) for the removal of six fruit trees and replacement with seventeen English woodland trees.

Discussing recent applications councillors had no objections to listed building consent for the proposed erection of a single storey extension at the rear of the property at **48 Bear Street** (B/16/01737).

Discussing listed building application at **Guinea Wiggs**, **Wissington** (B/16/01496) for installation of glazed, bi-fold opening doors some councillors commented that no preapplication advice had been sought from the Heritage Officer; the application is for grey, powder-coated, aluminium folding doors and councillors queried whether wood might be more appropriate.

The PC's objections relating to an application for the erection of single storey dwelling with new access at **1 Ash Rise** (B/16/01526) had been submitted to Babergh; on the grounds the proposed mass and scale is considered unsuitable in the size of the plot. The design is inappropriate in the streetscape and would have a negative impact on the amenity neighbours could expect to enjoy. In respect of the highways considerations,

County Highways should re-visit the application in view of local knowledge about parking to check the new access is compatible with safety near a Doctors' Surgery, School and Nursery School. We would also suggest an inspection is appropriate by the Planning Committee to fully appreciate what is proposed.

CYCLE RACK

It is planned to provide a cycle rack on the grass verge near the row of garages at the foot of Heycroft Way. Martyn Booth had researched the various shapes, sizes and materials of reasonably-priced cycle racks. He recommended stainless steel and concreted in (rather than bolted) as being the most durable. Councillors preferred design can accommodate adult and children's bicycles. Further research will be completed so that a comprehensive plan can be put to Babergh whose permission is required.

RECREATION AND OPEN SPACES

Gerry Battye read from the current safety inspection report of the new playground equipment. Some corrective action is required and it was agreed to go ahead with them.

The driveway up to the nursing home is Diocesan property and there is an agreement in place between the Nursing home, the Parish Council and the Diocese to share the cost of repair. Mary George had walked the driveway and counted thirteen potholes. The PC will contact the Diocese to urge that repairs are carried out.

The PC will prompt Babergh DC for a decision as to whether a proposed dog waste bin near Wiston Church may be sited. IN BRIEF

Landowners neighbouring Candy Lane have agreed to on -going permission for hedge cutting along the lane.

A bollard sited outside 'Butchers' in Bear St has recently been knocked down, removed and not replaced. This would be followed up.

Tricia Fuller reported that Jane Hastie has taken over as bookings secretary for the village hall.

The new Chair of the Community Council is Rachel Hitchcock with Deputy Chair Julie Clark. The community defibrillator project is moving forward and funding possibilities are being sought.

COMMUNITY COUNCIL REPORT

Colin Ramsell welcomed members to the meeting. MATTERS ARISING:

Executive Committee: Members were delighted that Rachel Hitchcock kindly volunteered to take the role of Chair and Julie Clark will relieve Colin Ramsell as Vice Chair . This was proposed by Bryan Smith, seconded Claire Buller. Bryan Smith proposed a vote of thanks to Colin Ramsell, current Vice Chairman who has been acting Chairman.

The Community Council Executive still requires more members of village groups to join them as members of the CC.

Fundraising Activities:

10km Run/Cycling Fundraiser: a proposal for an event to benefit a major charity as well as the CC/local organisations has been made by Luke Rumbelow but he was not able to attend this meeting to give further details.

Further ideas and/or support with running events to benefit the CC funds would be welcome.

Community Defibrillator: This was a proposal for a community defibrillator sited at the Fire Station (not to be confused with the First Responders), which had been given approval by the Fire Service.

Rachel Hitchcock has kindly taken this project forward and updated the meeting on progress. She has been in touch with the Community Heartbeat Trust who offer practical advice on sourcing a defibrillator, their installation, ongoing cost, maintenance, training, etc. They have suggested Lottery Funding may be available which Rachel will investigate.

Save Our Post Office Campaign: Simon Carter reported on the current situation - *see page 9.*

A public meeting is being held on on <u>Thursday 23rd February</u> at 7.30pm in the Village Hall to provide a detailed update and launch our Share Offer Prospectus.

Village Hall Garden: The CC section of the village hall garden is tidy. The next VH gardening morning will be on Saturday 18th March.

Recent Activities: <u>Colin Ramsell expressed thanks to all</u> who had helped with the very successful recent events. **Event Guidance Lists & Risk Assessments:** These were

compiled and filed for a guide for 2017 events.

Bonfire & Fireworks - *Saturday 5th November:* Iain Wright, who was not present kindly coordinated the event. It had been very successful and profitable. Claire Buller said 350 sausages were served and more could have been sold, the mulled wine, was the most profitable item despite selling out early. Positive comments have been received saying what a lovely community event it was.

Christmas Fayre - *Saturday 3rd December :* The team of coordinators - Rachel Hitchcock, Claire Buller and Julie Clark reported feedback was positive that it had been another very nice community event. Village stallholders had all done well this year and holding it on Saturday morning had been preferred. Thanks to Nayland Primary School for providing entertainment, and Father Christmas for finding time to be there. Rachel said there would have been room for a few more non-village stallholders.

Village Christmas Tree - Claire Buller and the team did an excellent job once again. Claire said it went up very quickly. Three sets of lights are currently used; a single extendable string of lights would endure better and she will raise that next autumn. She added Fred Smith of Boxted, who provided the tree at an excellent price gave very good service. Positive comments had been received about the tree and it was enjoyed at the Carol Singing.

Grants & Donations:

Village Hall Endowment Fund: A letter of thanks for the \pounds 1,000 grant awarded towards this fund had been received from Peter Mann, the VH Treasurer.

Callum Kennedy: volunteering placement

Callum, who received a £100 grant towards costs for his volunteering placement, has emailed his gratitude.

TREASURER'S REPORT:

Maggie Ryan gave her report on the draft accounts for the year ending December 2016. A full set of accounts with the finalised figures will be available for the AGM. Meanwhile:

Current Position: The accounts show reserves at 31st December of £19,736 (compared to £22,152 in prior year) represented by: Deposit a/c monies £15,543, Current a/c monies £4,147, Cash in hand £46, Total assets £19,736.

An amount of £603 has been given towards setting up Nayland Community Stores, with a further £1,897 of grant funding available to support the transfer of the Post Office into community ownership. Amounts held on behalf of the First Response Team and Services Fund are unchanged at £444 for First Response and £270 for the Services Fund. **Therefore**, **unencumbered assets are £17,124** allowing for grants not drawn down and monies held on behalf of third parties.

The most successful event of 2016 was the Bonfire Night, with an overall profit of £1,524. An analysis is available for the organisers but the best margin was to be found on Mulled Wine sales. The Christmas Fayre so far stands at £290, with the Quiz night nearly as successful, with a £250 profit. The Community Times has made £2,402 and the Calendar £1,021 towards our reserves.

Grants: Grants awarded over the year are over three times those awarded in the previous period – a figure of $\pounds 6713$ – as follows: Village Hall Kitchen $\pounds 3,500$, Village Hall Endowment Fund $\pounds 1,000$, Baby & Toddler Group $\pounds 150$, Nayland History Exhibition $\pounds 110$, Conservation Society Court Knoll $\pounds 1,000$, Callum Kennedy charity work $\pounds 100$, Community Post Office $\pounds 603.28$, St Helena Hospice tribute in memory of Neil Barbrook $\pounds 250$.

We should be proud of our contribution to good causes but mindful that this success means that the Community Council is running a £2416 deficit for 2016. We should look to a fundraiser to restore reserves in 2017.

Administrative matters: The CCLA Deposit Fund signatories have been changed. The current account is online and signatories updated.

Community Times: Lorraine Brooks gave the usual plea for contributions for the next issue.

She was very grateful to Claire, Vicki and all who sent in photos of the recent CC activities. These have been added to the website. Much of the CC's history, including the large albums, is also on the website.

Village Calendar: Lorraine Brooks said there are a few calendars still available at village shops - Post Office, Blue Owl, Hatten's Village Stores and Forget Me Not. Thanks are due to all who support the calendar and the shops that sell them.

The number of 2017 calendars sold so far is on a par with last year. Sales have generated $\pounds 632$ profit with some more to come.

Lorraine said if the CC wish four members of the team are willing to continue and produce a 2018 calendar, but the CC may be asked ask for some help with the selling stage and asked for more support of the photo competition. The print cost has increased again but it was felt the calendar price of £5 could be maintained. The CC agreed that another calendar should be produced.

Forthcoming Activities:

Annual General Meeting: *Monday 6th March 2017* at 7.30pm *(Exec 7pm)* in the Village Hall. This will be followed by the Village Hall Management Committee AGM at 8.30pm.

SOCIETY REPORTS

Conservation Society: John Partridge said Andora is home recuperating and will be taking a sabbatical. Work continues sorting finds from the Court Knoll dig for assessment and analysis. Francis Terry will talk on 'Architecture and design in AONB's' at the AGM on 13th March.

Parish Council: Martyn Booth said they still have a vacancy on the Council, a £1,000 grant from Tesco has been awarded towards work on the Allotment Field. Asked when speed restrictions will be applied on the A134 Martyn said he did not know the timescale; discussion was ongoing regarding extending the location of the speed restriction.

Village Players: Bryan Smith said the pantomime Cinderella

had been a great success and was thoroughly enjoyed by all ages. **Royal British Legion:** Alex Murrison said the Armistice gathering on 11/11, the Poppy Appeal Coffee Morning, Remembrance Service and their Christmas party were well received and attended. The 2016 Poppy Appeal raised £3,319.07, almost a record, with all due thanks to organisers, collectors and contributors. Their next meeting is 16th January in the Church Hall.

HortSoc: Trevor Smy said their stall at the Christmas Fayre had been successful. They hoped to find a replacement speaker for 21st March as sadly Barry Kauffman Wright passed away in December. The Spring Show is scheduled for 25th March, their AGM on 18th April. Their next outing is to Sandringham Flower Show on 26th July.

Women's Institute: Wendy Sparrow said December had been busy with a successful stall at the Christmas Fayre, a talk on *Tales from a Rural Police Sergeant*, an outing to Monks Eleigh

Corn Dolly Centre and Carol Services in Bures and Bury St Edmunds. On 16th January Wendy will be showing a film of *Nayland in the 1990s*.

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



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VILLAGE CHRISTMAS TREE



VILLAGE PLAYERS: CINDERELLA

Cinderella, the Village Players' Christmas offering, was a real treat. Pantomime can bring a community together in ways unknown to other types of theatre, and this production, led by first-time director Emma Wallis, gave actors, choreographers, musicians and backstage creatives the chance to shine.

Cinderella was built on a strong foundation: a script with plenty of traditional panto features that were developed for full effect by a fine cast of actors (some of whom were on the Nayland boards for the first time). The Ugly Sisters (Jim Bond and Brian Spalding) and incompetent baddies Snatchit and Grabbit (Mark Russell and Mark West) were at the heart of the farce but while they were certainly grotesque they also clearly enjoyed themselves – a rather endearing combination. John McCarroll relished Baron Hardup's journey of discovery; his potential romance with the Fairy Godmother helped provide some contrast to the more high-energy sections of the show, while the Fairy herself was given a charming jolly-but-a-bitbossy persona by Maggie Ryan.

Becky Napper's Cinderella had the right blend of put-uponness and spirit, and made a good match for Emily Adkinson's passionate and hot-headed Prince Charming. Sidekick Dandini (Vahri Lane) had common sense but also a sense of fun: clearly a good friend as well as a good aide. Perhaps a wrong note in the script was no happy romantic ending for Buttons: Morgan Moriarty had so deftly milked the awww-factor as his love for Cinders was rebuffed. #JusticeForButtons

The script allowed for the usual ad libs, asides, and – from the Ugly Sisters – desperate flirting with the audiences. A particular highlight was the Harlequinade sequence during the Ball scene, which provided a respectful nod to traditional panto and also gave a thoughtful exposition of the Hardup family's story.

Much of the fun in panto comes from the opportunities it provides for wider involvement: the exuberant chorus and Harlequin participants, the talented house band, and also the creativity shown by the set, costume and prop teams. A simple -looking but actually fiendishly ingenious set took the audience from village green to domestic setting (where it must support both a spooky scene and a farce) to palace, and housed Cinderella's spectacular chariot. The costume team had licence to give us a riot of colours and styles most suitable for the characters, from regal and dashing to tasteless and loud. And props ran the range from a 'grotty potty' to a gorgeous slipper well worth fighting for. Bling ahoy!

Overall, the result was a celebration of community endeavour that thoroughly entertained the packed audiences. What a way to end the year.





The recent count of British Legion boxes included one that had been in the Post Office for some time. Correction from the last issue.

In a report on their October meeting, 'Court Knoll Past Present & Future by Tim Dennis and the survey team', it was mentioned that Dr Tim Dennis led the dig.

He has pointed out this was not the case and wishes to set the record straight: "I did run the geophysical surveys in 2014-15, with many local assistants, but my only contributions during the excavation itself were occasionally to do some digging, and take vertical photographs. The responsibility for directing the recent work was entirely due to Suffolk Archaeology, in the persons of Linzi Everett, who was on site nearly every day, and Jo Caruth. Sally Bartrum and Andora Carver were also present throughout and ran the day-to-day site logistics."





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DAPHNE

Garden Notes by The Old Muckspreader

It's a well known fact that old men (and probably old women too) are liable to repeat themselves so the OM/S, being true to his name, begs his readers' indulgence if he does.

It seems that in his first article, which was in December 1999, he wrote about winter flowers. There are in fact quite a number of plants which are only waiting for a warmer day or two before producing flower.

First off, Winter Aconites which should be more widely grown; put a few in a corner and forget about them, so long as you don't mow the foliage, and they will gradually increase.

Next, Snowdrops. The ordinary single and double are fine; don't pay vast sums of money to buy varieties some of which need to be examined with a magnifying glass to discern their difference. There are one or two large cultivars with big flowers which are worth growing - S Arnott is an example. Dry bulbs are seldom satisfactory; try to beg a clump or two from friends (or even the OM/S) after the flowers have died.

What about Iris Unguicularis, from Algeria? It's a mess for most of the year, unless you can be bothered to continue cutting out all the dead foliage, but from early December it starts sending up beautiful blue flowers, picked in bud they will open up indoors.

Cyclamen Coum in the smallest of a large family and is in flower now; incidentally it's a dyssyllable CO-UM, coming from the island of Cos, though actually it didn't, but it seems to be increasingly mispronounced even by broadcasting gardeners who should know better as COOM!

Now for some shrubs. One classic is Hamamelis Intermedia, the Witch Hazel. Don't make the same mistake as the OM/S and get a red-flowered one; it doesn't show up. The various golden cultivars provide good colour and scent. It's slow growing and difficult to propagate, and as a result expensive.

There are several good Mahonia cultivars providing spectacular heads of golden flowers. Sarcococca, the Christmas Box is now in flower; the foliage is rather dull, but the scent of

its flowers is strong and effective if planted near an entrance to the house. There are several Daphnes, and the star of the show (and most expensive) is D. Bholua Jacqueline Postil. But be warned; all Daphnes are liable to be short-lived, often dying suddenly for no apparent reason.

Finally, that good old standby Jasminum Nudiflorum, the Winter Jasmine. It's been flowering here since before Christmas, and will go on for a week or two more. Very easy to propagate, any length of stem stuck in the ground will root, as will the tips of new shoots that touch the earth. After flowering it should be tidied up with secateurs or shears. Wish that all plants were so easy!

NAYLAND IN 1935

NAYLAND WITH WISSINGTON COMMUNITY TIMES

An article written for the Essex County Standard in May 1935, the year of the Jubilee of George V

"I make no apology for including Nayland in this series of articles, since Nayland is on the borders of Essex and beloved by Essex people who know it. Who could help falling a victim to the charm of its river, its streets adorned by old-world buildings and its pleasant people? Take a peep at Gravel Hill with its picturesque houses, go down Fen Street, where the big mill-stone leans lazily near the street entrance, walk by the side of the old mill stream spanned at intervals by little bridges. Here are sights to delight you.

It was in Fen Street that I met Mr Edward W Lawrance at his home, Hollyhock Cottage. At one time Mr Lawrance, who is a Kentish man by birth, lived at Colchester and when I called upon him he was wearing a brooch bearing the Colchester arms. He used to work at Nayland Mill when it was associated with a leather factory run by Dickson [sic] Brothers. As time goes that is not so very long ago. There are Nayland people, however, who still talk of the time when Mr Jeremiah Stannard had the mill and some remember the burglary there when Mr Stannard was injured by a shot fired by the burglars. That is a good many years ago.


I had a chat with Mr Dan Spooner – incidentally he remarked that "Mr" Spooner was dead, Dan Spooner was alive – what a wealth of memories he has. It was Dan Spooner who told me about the burglars at the mill and that Mr Stannard was the first resident in Nayland to own a hansom cab in which he drove to Sudbury and Colchester markets. He remembered Dr William Daniells and showed me a photograph of the old doctor in a four wheeler. Dan Spooner's father walked from Leavenheath to Colchester to see the first train run from Colchester to see the first motor car go up North Hill. He spoke of Charles Parsons, who used

to drive the coach to London from Assington and called to mind the time when as a boy he lived at Leavenheath post office and carried letters to the residents for a penny a letter. As a post boy he earned 3s 6d a week. Local police officers of the past were mentioned – Messrs Pickers, Poll, Jessup, Alexander and George Frost. Did he remember the soap and candle factory conducted by Mr Winney? Yes, he remembered this and that they made rush eights and cotton tens. The rushes came from the river sides. Mr Cobert Mills, the veterinary surgeon, tall and thin, used to doctor the horses when he was a boy. Then Mr Thomas Goldsmith was at Shadilow's [sic] Farm and Mr William Brown at Perry Farm.

Conversation turned from one thing to another. Dan Spooner had been to school in Mr Grinland's day when it cost one shilling a week for the first child, sixpence for the second and threepence for any other children of the family. The first carrier he remembered was Mr Thomas Norfolk, who used to make the journey from Nayland to Colchester. If time had permitted I could have sat for hours listening to Dan Spooner.

Not far from his house is the smithy's shop. Mr W J Breeze is the smith here now and has been for 16 years. His predecessor was Mr Richardson, who was there for 27 years. Near this shop was the pound and here, this week, a tree to commemorate the Jubilee has been planted.

In the church of St James, of which the Rev F G Cliff is vicar, I was fortunate in meeting Mr Brooks Mills, the organist, who has been in Nayland since 1878. He knew the Revs James Honeybun, John Durban Gray, W T Farmiloe, L Durrant, John Sankey and J B Marsh. It was Mr Brooks Mills who told me about the organ and how a one-time vicar, the Rev William Jones, had secured the pipes for this organ from Canterbury cathedral.

I heard, too, from him a story of the fine painting by Constable which is in the church. It is said that Constable used to visit an aunt at Nayland and that he was not impressed by certain pictures of Moses and Aaron which were in the church and at the suggestion of his aunt he painted the picture of Christ to be seen there.

Near by the church is Alston Court, a residence of great charm and hereabouts stands the local War Memorial. Over the way is the shop of Mr Sergeant Roberts, the baker, whose father, George and his father before him were bakers in Nayland. Lovely oak beams grace the premises.

Mrs Roberts showed me a painting by Mr F Stannard of old Nayland, which showed the old flour mill, Mr Grimsey's, the harness maker's shop, the old vicarage, Mr Deaves the builder's, Mr Faiers, the Cabinet maker's, the White Hart and Mr Roberts' shop. The fine chestnut tree standing in the garden of Dr S Slade is shown. Mrs Roberts was a Mss Wilson and her father was a watchmaker at Nayland. Talking of the past, Mrs Roberts remembered the time when Mr F Blyth and Mr Harry Waters were grocers and when Mr John Roberts had a butcher's shop at Nayland.

At the post office I met Mr A Y Littlebury. All his life he has been connected with the postal service. His father was postmaster at Nayland. We fell to talking about days gone by when the postman walked from Colchester to Nayland each day, of the mounted postmen in their carts and the Boxford mail man who blew a bugle to announce his entry into Nayland. What a capital story of old-word postal times awaits the telling."

Feedback from James Finch - Your Stour Valley County Councillor

SUFFOLK SCHOOLS - OFSTED RESULTS

Educational standards across Suffolk continue to improve to make sure that every child has access to the best possible education. Provisional results show that the overall A-level pass-rate has continued to rise and for the first-time GCSE progress has risen above the national average. There has been a 3% rise in the number of students achieving the GCSE threshold in English and Maths.

Provisional results also show a rise in Suffolk children achieving a Good Level of Development in their Early Years Foundation Stage results and Suffolk are above the rest of England. While Key Stage 2 results, released in August, remain below the national average, Suffolk's ranking has significantly improved from 134 to 119.

In summary, 86% of Suffolk schools are now being judged 'Good' or 'Outstanding' by Ofsted, and this is the highest percentage we have ever had and it is improving twice as quickly as England overall. Suffolk County Council remain dedicated to supporting **ALL** Suffolk Schools to become "Good or Outstanding".

"CHATHEALTH" SCHOOL NURSING SERVICE

In December Suffolk's School Nursing Team celebrated one year of the 'Chat Health' service. It was introduced with the aim of allowing more people to access the School Nursing service as well as improving the efficiency of the service, to aid early intervention.

Young people in Suffolk can send messages to a dedicated number which delivers to a secure website. Texts are responded to within one working day. The service is available Monday to Friday 9am – 4.30pm excluding bank holidays. Outside of these hours anyone who texts the service receives an automated message with advice on where to get help if their question is urgent.

School nurses can support children and young people with enquiries relating to a wide range of health and wellbeing issues including self-harm, bullying, drug and alcohol use, smoking, healthy eating, sexual health and mental health. The text messaging service was first launched to secondary school aged pupils in November 2015 and extended to parents and carers of all pupils, including primary school aged pupils in April 2016.

The service has been positively received by staff, young people and clients, with over 3,000 messages sent and received within its first year. The service has also received a lot of positive feedback in this first year, with 74% of conversations rated as 5 out of 5 by users.

FLU VACCINATION

Health chiefs are urging people across the county to not miss out on flu vaccination. As winter bites there is still time to get a flu vaccination which is widely recognised as an effective way to reduce harm from flu. It reduces the risk of serious illness, hospitalisation and even death. People eligible for free vaccinations are: Carers; Pregnant women; People aged six months to 65 with an underlying health condition such as a heart problem, breathing difficulties, kidney disease, lower immune system due to disease or treatment, liver disease, stroke, diabetes, a neurological condition, for example multiple sclerosis, an issue that affects the spleen or for those who are seriously overweight; People over 65 years of age.

Children of aged two, three and four and in school years one, two and three have for the second year running been offered the vaccination as a nasal spray delivered in schools. Those not eligible for a free vaccination can arrange for a paid-for vaccination through participating community pharmacies.


