NAYLAND WITH WISSINGTON PARISH COUNCIL

Notes by observer of the meeting : 13th April 2022

DISTRICT COUNCIL REPORT

Melanie Barrett confirmed the £150 towards increased fuel costs would be straight forward for residents who pay their Council Tax via direct debit.

COUNTY COUNCIL REPORT

James Finch has confirmed that Suffolk County Council is the Riparian Landowner of the River Stour at Caley Green. The ditch from Bear Street into the river at Caley Green is also owned by the SCC and clearance is now on the job list.

PLANNING

Councillors heard that Babergh have granted permission at **Hillside 14 Stoke Road** [*DC*/22/00983] for works to trees in a conservation area to fell a chestnut tree and replace with a quercus fastigiata; for listed building consent at **10 Mill Street** [*DC*/22/00593] for installation of French doors and window and creation of downstairs WC; for discharge of conditions at **82 Bear Street** [*DC*/22/01006] relating to the front door.

Planning permission was refused at **Rushbanks House**, **Bures Road** [*DC*/22/00804] for erection of single storey side extension and two storey rear extension (following removal of existing conservatory) on grounds including: the design has many different components that would have adverse impact to the charter of the host dwelling by introducing multiple designs, forms, scales and openings that is at odds with the host dwelling; the scale of the proposal that extends in multiple directions at multiple levels does not respect the host dwelling; this would have an adverse impact on the character of the local area as the development will be clearly visible as a prominent feature from multiple vantage points.

Discussing recent applications councillors had no objections to listed building applications at **13 Birch Street** [*DC*/22/01731 & 01732] for single storey extension (following demolition of existing conservatory) and to replace first floor rear window with a larger window and re-render rear wall subject to approval by the Heritage Team; at **18 Court Street** [*DC*/22/01599] for damp proof course, replastering and repairs to external render subject to approval by the Heritage Team; or at **1 Fen Street** [*DC*/22/01271] for repairs to roof replacing 3 velux windows subject to approval by the Heritage Team.

Councillors objected to a part-retrospective application at **Harpers Hill Farm, Harpers Hill** [SCC/0099/19B/VOC] for erection of 4m high concrete fire walls (part retrospective) on the grounds the design and materials were considered inappropriate in the AONB. There was no evidence that the wall had or will minimise the noise and litter escaping from the site. The wall would look unsightly, even with extensive planting, and it is in a prominent and sensitive location in the AONB. The site should be afforded all the protections that this designation brings in planning terms. Further this Parish Council would like to see monitoring reports from the Environment Agency which so far have not been made available to the PC.

Councillors objected to an application at **New Farm, Harpers Hill** [DC/22/01538] for a new boundary fence and hedge on the grounds the inappropriate materials and design in the AONB. As the hedging in the original plans was removed the Parish Council considered a far better solution to be removal of the new inappropriate fencing and in its place a new mixed native hedge of mature plants is planted and protected on the inside with agricultural wire fencing to ensure the boundaries are secure. **HIGHWAYS**

It was noted the overgrown trees on Harpers Hill were being investigated. The Community Litterpick will be on 23rd April; this would include Wiston, so a risk assessment was being undertaken. It was noted the original contractor hadn't responded to our request for a quotation to restore the memorial, milestone and horse trough. Another two stonemasons had been approached. Historically a plate was on the horsetrough which has been found and the successful contractor will be

asked to include the fitting of the plate within the works. **RECREATION AND OPEN SPACES**

Work to improve the turning circle on the recreation ground was completed ahead of the financial year end. The Play Park surfacing had also been completed at the start of this financial year. It was reported that funds in the region of £4,000 have been raised in memory of Margaret Underwood; this is to be put towards new play equipment at the Fairfield in her memory. It was agreed to thank the family for this kind donation.

None of the contractors have responded to a request for further information to help inform the planting scheme at Caley Green; it was agreed for the working party to re-visit the request and consider the next steps.

Recent power cuts caused problems with the sluice gates particularly affecting the Wiston side; the Environment Agency would be asked for assurances on contingencies covering future power cuts.

ALLOTMENTS

It was agreed to ask PC contractors to quote to remove vegetation and repair the chestnut pale fencing. Correspondence is on-going regarding the proposal for a long low slope to replace the steps on the PROW path at the Allotments.

In Brief:

Charity Payments: The charities debated were the Community Pantry in Nayland that also supports hardship in other nearby villages, Sudbury Citizens Advice Bureau, Homestart, Suffolk - Providing volunteer support to families throughout Suffolk, Age Concern and Suffolk Accident Rescue. It was agreed to give Councillors further time to research and also to issue a shared form for comments.

A site meeting was carried out to examine 3 Prunus trees in the village hall car park; an independent tree specialist was appointed and the report from the tree specialist is awaited.

It was agreed to get quotes to pollard Burial Ground trees identified in the tree specialist's report.

Laura Erith agreed to investigate the condition of Dead Lane following work due from the landowner; this will be discussed at future meetings.

NAYLAND WITH WISSINGTON PARISH COUNCIL

Notes by observer of the Annual Meeting : 11th March 2022

PARISH COUNCIL

Gerry Battye was elected as Chairman and Laura Erith as Vice Chairman; councillors are Mary George, Tricia Fuller, Patricia Wilkie, Ned Cartwright, Robin Thorogood and Dawn Harris. The Council remains one councillor short.

BABERGH'S COMMUNITY GOVERNANCE REVIEW

The review is a statutory process to review the whole of the district to consider creating, merging, altering, abolishing, naming or grouping parishes and electoral arrangements. It was agreed that this Council would submit that at the present time they would like to continue as they are.

PLANNING

Councillors heard that Babergh have granted listed building consent at **1 Fen Street** [*DC*/22/01271] for repairs to roof replacing 3 roof windows (Velux windows) and some old slates on part of the eastern lower elevation roof and permission at **Nayland Village Hall Church** Lane [*DC*/22/01286] for replacement of the existing concrete roof tiles, replacement comprising additional depth of rafters and insulation, new slates, valleys and ridge/hip tiles, altered eaves and verge details.

A notification for prior approval for a proposed larger home extension at **2 Ash Rise** [*DC*/22/01534] for erection of single storey rear kitchen/diner extension with timber frame walls and flat roof was refused on the grounds that the plan exceeds the 3-metre height limit, therefore a formal application for an extension must be submitted.

HIGHWAYS

It was noted that phase 2 of the drainage works, with road closure of Mill Street commences on 12th May. SCC has liaised with Babergh regarding refuse collections but James Finch will be asked to confirm details.

Gerry Battye expressed concern regarding the SCC reporting tool as items reported seem to disappear. Debbie Hattrell should receive a follow up notification when reports are added relating to this parish. Gerry Battye will ask James Finch for clarification.

Babergh have approved the Council's proposed sites for new litter and dog bins and relocation of the dog bin previously located at the Horsewatering. The sub-committee and Clerk will implement this project. It was suggested that a map showing locations of the bins is included in a future issue of the Community Times.

Correspondence from a resident enquired about SCC funding for improving the bus stop (wheelchair access, etc). Councillors were updated that SCC's application for funding had not been successful. It was agreed to write to SCC Transport Manager, copying in James Finch, asking what SCC intend regarding improving the bus stop provision in Nayland.

Revisiting the subject of speed monitoring and the survey to ascertain parish needs, it is not viable to conduct a survey until the planned phases of roadworks are completed.

Correspondence had been received about the condition of verges in Wiston. Debbie Hattrell felt this should be reported using the SCC reporting tool and suggested the report reference number should be forwarded to her so she can chase progress with James Finch.

RECREATION AND OPEN SPACES

Gerry Battye said thanks to a recent memorial donation, and potentially use of CIL money, a new piece of equipment can be added at Fairfield Recreation Ground. It was felt that it was important to ask schoolchildren what they would like.

It was suggested that a previous decision to trim the overhead boughs of trees along the boundary with properties in Heycroft Way and Larch Grove in July would be deferred.

At a recent site meeting at Caley Green with SCC to discuss the long reed bed which is hampering the use of fishing rights SCC have agreed to cut back some of the reeds this year. They are creating a long term management plan for the reed bed in future years and will forward this to the PC but have given no timescale; the Clerk will chase this up. Gerry Battye suggested the PC have been here before; this will be on the agenda for the next meeting.

Regarding the Caley Green riverbank protection project Patricia Wilkie said they were at an impasse as no contractors/ suppliers had responded to their request for advice. A working party meeting will be organised to discuss where we go now.

Gerry Battye pointed out work on replacement of the circular memorial bench round a tree at Caley Green is progressing. This is being organised by the Fryer family and the bench is being made by Dylan Pym.

FINANCIAL MATTERS

The end of year accounts were agreed. It was noted that monies included CIL money received and money set aside for the street lighting which we had not yet been invoiced for.

The charity payments were agreed; £100 would be donated to each of the following five charities: Sudbury Citizen's Advice Bureau, Nayland Community Pantry, Homestart Suffolk, Suffolk Accident Rescue and Age Concern.

FOOTPATHS

Laura Erith said she was investigating who carried out work to the Dead Lane footpath; the work is not appropriate to this footpath. One landowner has responded that it was not him, another has not yet responded. Kevin Verlander (PROW Officer) and James Finch have not yet responded to emails.

ALLOTMENTS

The Clerk will book the judge for the allotment competition.

Debbie Hattrell confirmed there are 5 people on the waiting list for allotments. Councillors discussed the possibility of extending the allotments; it was pointed out the Council do not provide allotment fencing but may consider fencing the outer boundary of a cluster of new allotments. The allotment committee with consider a proposal to take forward.

VILLAGE HALL

A site meeting was carried out to examine 3 Prunus trees in the village hall car park; an independent tree specialist suggested that the reduction should not be below 5 metres.

Mary George raised the issue of someone using the Candy Lane end of the Village Hall playground to park and cut though to the allotment field; this was not a right of way. It was agreed to ask the PC's contractor for the cost of installing chestnut paling fencing and some hedging.

Many of us remember Margaret as wonderful mum, neighbour, local teacher at the Primary and Middle Schools, Parish Councillor and all-round wise lady. Above all, she loved and empathised with children.

Constraints include, extra safety measures, cost, space and adjacent neighbours etc. but for starters, we'd welcome your ideas. The current equipment was similarly chosen by residents some years ago. Given the constraints, all suggestions and opinions will be considered, particularly from children. Email your ideas to:

Rachel Hitchcock welcomed members to the meeting.

Executive Committee: Rachel Hitchcock said we have a fabulous team on the Exec and it is lovely to be able to meet in person again. However, as always we welcome new members to join our enjoyable friendly committee.

Fundraising Activities/Events: We have a good deal of activities being planned currently but as always future ideas and support are welcome.

Community Defibrillator: Defibrillators are located at the Village Hall and at the Fire Station.

A training session has been booked for Weds 29th June at 7pm in the Village Hall. Tracy Le Grys helpfully found a provider, a charity called Gryphon First Aid Unit, who will run the event for us. They don't charge but ask that we make a donation to the charity. The session will cover use of the defibrillator, CPR and basic first aid.

River Stour Water Level Gauge: Rachel said that work on riverbanks is probably best carried out in autumn and this project will be picked up again nearer the time. Other works may occur which could be tied into this.

Nayland 10k Fun Run: <u>nayland10k.co.uk</u> on Sunday 10th July. It will be starting again from Littlegarth School. Luke Rumbelow said tickets are going well; currently 400 runners are booked. As usual about 30 volunteers from the Nayland community will be required to help with marshalling from about 9.30-11.30am; there is a feel-good vibe and volunteers as well as runners enjoy the event. Village Hall Garden Morning: A small group of volunteers donned tools for the spring gardening session held on 2nd April. Tracy Le Grys was thanked for representing the CC. Recent Activities:

Annual General Meeting - *2nd March:* Rachel Hitchcock said the meeting had gone well. *The minutes were distributed and are available on <u>naylandcommunitycouncil.org.uk/Meetings</u> TREASURER'S REPORT: Matt Cable gave his report on finances.*

Breakdown of profits: Community Times £549.50, Village Quiz £393.96, Calendar £158.88.

Grants paid: Nayland Choir £128, Village Hall replacement doors £10,000. We received £270.36 as a return of grant funds provided to the Post Office Project.

Expenses: £1,561.21 for the Jubilee Street Party, of which \pounds 1,047.44 was for mugs which will be for sale. Village Hall hire for Christmas Fair £54.

Current Position: The accounts show reserves of £22,682.26 represented by Deposit a/c monies £10, 732.94, Current a/c monies £11,375.28, Stripe a/c £117.12, Cash in Hand £456.92. We hold £268.50 for the RBL Services Fund and grants are pending for: VH roof £10,000, Lizzie's Fund Walk £201. **Therefore, unencumbered assets are £12,212.76.**

GRANTS & DONATIONS: There had been no grant applications or donations.

Community Times & Websites: Lorraine Brooks thanked all for contributing to recent issues. Heading towards deadline; early submission of copy and/or reservation of space would be much appreciated.

Matt Cable has kindly offered to assist with advertising; payments will begin going direct to him. Spingold's print cost is increasing from £226 per issue to £300. The origins of the CT were to provide good communication within our village and

for years advertising did not cover costs (income from an annual Grand Draw paid for printing), then it eventually become profitable, peaking in 2015. It may be useful to have a few more advertisers but it's about balance, the CT should not become an advertising rag like some others.

Village Calendar: Lorraine Brooks said the competition and display of 150 photos will be back in the Church Hall on Saturday 14th May, 1pm-4pm as it used to be and also available to view online on 14th/15th – via <u>naylandandwiston.net</u> - as it has been for the last 2 years. Residents will be able to vote for their favourite photos.

Jo Metson and Gill Boardman kindly agreed to help set up at 9.30am, Kate Bevan and Matt Cable will assist in taking down the display from 3.50pm and Jane Matthews will kindly help with refreshments and chatting to visitors from 1pm.

As previously reported the cost of printing has increased to 300 copies = \pounds 579 +vat, 250 copies = \pounds 499 +vat. Matt Cable has kindly agreed to assist with sales and the CC hope to have a stall in the High Street and consider other selling opportunities. The calendar team were thanked for their hard work.

FORTHCOMING COMMUNITY COUNCIL ACTIVITIES:

Calendar Photo Display - Saturday 14th May: 1pm-4pm Church Hall and online. This will include a display on the History of the Community Council.

Queen Elizabeth II's Platinum Jubilee: Nayland Street Party on Sunday 5th June.

Deadlines: for ordering the mugs was 30th April; for reserving table seats 5th May.

<u>Commemorative Mugs</u>: Deadline has passed but there are a few mugs left.

Street Party: seat bookings stand at 400.

Claire Buller said the location of the tables will be from the War Memorial to Church Lane. At midday there will be a Jubilee Peal of the Church bells, Revd Stéphane will open the Street Party. A young 'Queen Elizabeth and Princess Margaret' will lead a parade of children in Kings & Queens fancy dress – all participating children will receive a gift. There will be a soloist singing 1950s music before the BYO picnic. To entertain children there will be magic, balloon modelling and Punch and Judy. At 1.30pm there will be 1950s entertainment by the Choir, the School Choir and Ukes. The street will be adorned with red, white and blue as well as party goers to add to the celebratory atmosphere. The village hall is booked in case of bad weather and for toilets, parking, etc.

Screening of the Jubilee Pageant and refreshments: The VHMC are leading on this. At the end of the Party, an announcement will be made, asking those going to take a chair with them to the village hall. (*This is not now taking place*)

The committee meet next on 9th May. Letters will be sent to local residents regarding parking. The bunting will be put up on the Friday; chairs will be taken to the High Street on the Saturday. Julie Wilkinson will be taking photographs of the event.

First Responders: Tracy LeGrys said they now have a third responder on board, Jenny from Little Horkesley, and a fourth one accepted on to one of the next training courses so they will soon have four active members of the group.

Art Group: Kathryn Niven reported that the art group is doing well and that we have around a dozen members, with weekly attendance at the church hall usually around 8 - 10. They have two artists who each come along monthly and teach watercolour painting/ drawing skills. They went on a trip to Ipswich before Easter to see the John Constable exhibition at Christchurch Mansion and really enjoyed it. They used the community minibus (based in Hadleigh) who were a pleasure to deal with and offered a very reasonable price. They are hoping to go out again some time.

St James' Church: Chris Hunt said with Easter out of the way we can now look forward to the next major Christian festival -Christmas!! Services continue at the churches in the benefice and short services on weekdays are also held, full details are in the CT and the church notice board. The Community Pantry at St James is being well used and is regularly stocked up. Our thanks to all who contribute and help with this project. The Wednesday coffee morning is popular and again, the help given to this in providing cakes which are delicious!! and helping is much appreciated. The main recent event has been the Church Fete on Bank Holiday Monday. Earlier than usual because of Jubilee celebrations and indeed the first Fete for three years. Visitors turned up to make the day a success - the 2022 Nayland Church Fete was a credit to the organisers. At the recent annual meeting of the Parochial Church Council Chris stood down as Churchwarden and member.

Nayland Land Co: David Slater said the second section of hedge laid in the autumn has begun growing well; 14 nesting boxes of varying size have been installed, including an Owl box near the weir. They are looking into installing new information boards on the footpath relating to 1) planting of wild flowers, and the stag beetle castles in Richards wood, and 2) the Pond. They hope to tap into a mains water supply for the livestock rather than having to rely on the pond.

Parish Council: Laura Erith said the Annual Parish Assembly had been poorly attended; Highways, Caley Green and the Village Hall roof were the main topics - the documents will be uploaded to the website. Dead Lane (a footpath part of St Edmundsbury Way running through Wiston) has been brutally improved! A complaint will be made to SCC about the use of the road plainings and the flints and how they have ruined an ancient country byway. SCC are looking into the issue of the tall reeds on Caley Green; their Ecologist, Andrew Murray Wood, visited the site and agreed they are out of control and need topping, funding for the work will be considered by another SCC department. Ned Cartwright will temporarily step back as PC rep on the CC due to a family bereavement but would like to be kept informed. The Council remains one councillor short and issued a plea for residents to consider joining the PC.

Royal British Legion: Andrew Gowen reported they had an enjoyable lunch at the Anchor on Friday 22nd April to celebrate St George's Day at which he tried to explain why a saint from Turkey ended up as our English Patron Saint. On 3rd May they visited the Boxford Fruit Farm and the Stoke-by-Nayland Hotel's impressive facilities. Both Fruit Farm and Hotel are still owned and managed by the Peake family. Konings is their tenant and just produces the fruit juice. We were all impressed by their modern green approach to farming and managing their hotel. They produce their own electricity and the majority of their fertilizers. David Pryor will be giving us a talk about Sutton Hoo at our meeting in the Church Hall at 7.30pm on Monday 23rd May. We are happy for non members to join us at our meetings or on our visits.

Conservation Society: Mike Hunter reported that National Grid have yet another public consultation on a new grid line from Norwich to Tilbury passing through the eastern part of the DVAONB and across land to the south of the village close to Little Horkesley; Babergh District Council have finally agreed to take action at the Society's request upon the breach of planning use at the site on the far side of the A134 from Caley Green where commercial storage has been taking place on agricultural land.

RIVER WATCH

WATER LEVELS

On the whole water levels seem to have maintained their seasonal norm and the flood channel doing its job when necessary of diverting water levels away from the village when they rise. Although there was an incident of the level dropping suddenly on14th April temporarily.

During the recent dry spell water levels have not risen. It is concerning though given low levels in recent summers how this low rainfall may affect the river this summer.

Following a problem with the sluice gates following February powercuts the Parish Council said they would ask the EA to ensure the sluice gates are properly maintained to prevent this problem arising again. There does not appear to be an update on this.

AZOLLA BLOOM AT WISTON

At the end of March a stretch of the waterway near Wiston Mill appeared to become red. Passers by on the footpath wondered what the cause could be. It was indentified as being Azolla filiculoides, aka Fairy Fern, an invasive nonnative species. which floats on the surface of the water and can form large mats. It certainly looked dramatic!

WILDFOWL & SWANS

Beginning with the concerning news.... There seem to be far less ducks at Caley Green, and on the river, than there used to be. It has been suggested that the growing number of Herons are taking them.

In April there was considerable activity with swans and geese. There have been no end of swan visits to the pond; first a pair, then a whole family appeared for a while. A greylag goose seems to have taken a shine to Caley Green and he (it) has been joined on and off by several other greylags. It would be lovely if he made it his new home, although the legend that was Gordon will not be forgotten. On 14th May some Egyptian geese called by.

The resident swans built their nest in the long reed bed at Caley Green, which is a first, swan usually nest near to the Horseshoe weir. They hatched 7 cygnets, which at the time of going to print remain safe. Unusually one of their cygnets from last year remains on the river, although the parents are ensuing it keeps its distance from the young cygnets.

Judging by the popularity of the photos of swans in the Calendar photo competition and how many photos are taken of them, our village swans are very much loved.

In the last issue of the CT Swan Upping was mentioned; this time their reproduction may be more apt.

SWAN REPRODUCTION

It takes around one to two days for a swan to create an egg, after mating has occurred, with only one egg produced at a time it can take some time for the pen for a complete clutch of eggs. It is not until all the eggs have been laid that she will start her long vigil of incubation.

Ahead on incubation the pen swan will eat to take on as much in the way of nutritional reserves as possible.

Incubation averages around 35 to 36 days; during this time she will be dosing, preening, building/arranging the nest and turning the eggs this time she will be dosing, preening, building/ arranging the nest and turning the eggs.

To bring the temperature of the eggs up to a sufficient level to enable the development of the offspring inside the shell the pen brings her body into thermal contact with the egg's shell. This temperature is about 38 degrees Celsius; the swan's body temperature is about 41 degrees Celsius.

To facilitate the transfer of heat, she will fluff her feathers

up on her breast and belly, just before she sits down on the clutch, to bring the eggs shell closer to her skin so the eggs will be heated more efficiently. By the end of the incubation, the pen will have lost about one third of her normal bodyweight.

The cob's main role is to protect her and his future offspring and he will do so vigorously.

The swans will know that the incubation period is coming to an end by the faint callings from the cygnets inside the egg shell; the pen swan will often call very softly to its young still inside the egg.

CALEY GREEN

The Green has been looking lovely in the spring sunshine. It has been well used, including by children and almost daily by residents of Nayland House.

The Friends have been checking the Green, litterpicking and emptying bins when necessary. Many thanks to them, There is a tendency for visitors to keep an area which is well kept as they found it; this seems to be the case here.

PARISH COUNCIL UPDATE

At the May Parish Council it was stated that the Caley Green Working Party had not met to discuss the riverbank protection project. Patricia Wilkie said they were at an impasse as no contractors/suppliers had responded to their request for advice. A working party meeting will be organised to discuss how to progress.

The Friends had submitted further research to the Working Party which it is hoped will be useful.

THE LONG REED BED

At the May PC meeting Councillors received confirmation from SCC that they are riparian owners of Caley Green.

During a site meeting with SCC's Ecologist and Land Manager to discuss the long reed bed which is preventing the use of fishing rights; they agreed to cut back some of the reeds this year, but this may be done in stages due to nesting birds.

SCC will create a long term management plan for the reed bed ensuring maintenance In future years; this will be forwarded this to the PC but they have given no timescale.

THE CULVERT

Early spring storms had exposed just how much silt and vegetation has accumulated in the mouth of the culvert - the Parish Council have asked SCC to clear the debris; this has not been attended to yet.

Many residents have expressed their gratitude for this bench which was suggested and donated by Roy Chapman.



SLUICE GATES

Storms in February resulted in power cuts caused problems with the sluice gates particularly affecting the Wiston side which flooded. The Parish Council will be writing to the Environment Agency asking for assurances on contingencies covering future power cuts.

In the meantime the Friends and other residents eagerly await the next steps taken and further proposals by the Parish Council and Suffolk County Council.

A small but dedicated group of volunteers donned tools for the spring gardening session held on 2nd April. It is always a cheerful occasion but all the better for the sunshine.

ROADWORKS FOR MAJOR DRAINAGE IMPROVEMENTS

Nayland's drainage improvement scheme is on schedule.

Since the drainage improvement scheme commenced on 4 April 2022, the teams have progressed very well within the rear gardens of two residential properties. The work involved drilling through a heritage wall for the outlet of the new surface water sewer and the installation of a new flap valve, which is visible from Fen Street. This was the first phase and the team managed to complete over a week ahead of programme.

The second phase of the works then commenced on 12 May 2022 with the closure of Mill Street. The team will first complete the works required within the access of the private property before laying pipes and gullies in Mill Street. Mill Street will remain closed until 9 June 2022 before moving on to Bear Street and Birch Street. There will be a period of up to one

week where the entire junction of Mill Street, Bear Street and Birch Street will have to be closed to traffic. As always access to businesses and properties will be maintained. This will take place after Her Majesty, The Queen's Jubilee celebration weekend and require a slightly longer diversion route. The exact dates, duration and diversion route are to be confirmed and will be updated on the web page linked below.

Beetlemania

Recent visitors to the Conservation Meadow will have noticed the appearance of some vertical structures constructed from logs. Three are located in Richard's wood, and a further two in our rewilding area. Although they might be mistaken for modern sculptures, their main purpose is to provide habitat for stag beetles. The stag beetle is our largest land beetle, growing up to 7cm in length, and is considered to be nationally scarce. The females lay eggs in soil adjacent to decaying timber and the larvae typically develop within the timber for three to four years before the adults emerge. The male has strange antler shaped appendages in its head, hence the name stag beetle. The adults can most usually be seen on warm still evenings in early summer.

The stag beetle 'pyramids' are each constructed of twenty or more lengths of timber with the base buried 0.5m into the ground. All the timber for their construction was derived from the recent hedge management work. The pyramids were all built by volunteers from the village and local area. As well as helping our local population of stag beetles, the pyramids will also provide additional habitat for other invertebrates, fungi and mosses amongst other wildlife. **Bird boxes**

With spring in the air we have installed an additional ten bird nesting boxes around the field. These comprise six nest boxes for smaller species such as blue and great tits, three boxes for larger species such as starling and stock dove, as well as a barn owl box installed in the mature ash tree beside the river. We will be monitoring the use of these during the coming breeding season.

It was sad that at the recent village assembly only 13 - yes thirteen - people turned up to hear reports on the activities of the County, District and Parish Councils. The loss of local shops and businesses is sad as this results in fewer people using the village centre and our society becomes more remote - we just don't see people anymore. NAYLAND WITH WISSINGTON COMMUNITY TIMES

NAYLAND IN THE 1950s

The whole nation will soon be celebrating the Queen's Platinum Jubilee and those old enough will be remembering Coronation Day in 1953. Most of us living in Nayland now wonder: What was life like in Nayland at that time? Residents who have lived here before and since then have seen many changes in those 70 years.

At the beginning of the 1950s the country was still recovering from the war but communities were gradually coming back to life. Nayland had plenty of shops and businesses and many people still worked in the village. One of the largest employers was William Deaves & Sons, builders and undertakers, in the High Street. Walter Breeze was the blacksmith in Bear Street and Harold Sidney-Wilmot, haulage contractor, had lorry depots in Bear Street and Mill Street. The old

was then an animal food factory until it was demolished in the 1960s and next door was a company making concrete blocks. At the top of the street Fred Biggs had his cycle shop and petrol pump. The old mill on the corner which was sold in 1950, became a clothing factory providing jobs for about 50 workers. Thompson's garage was in Stoke Road and in those days Norfolk's buses had drivers and conductors. Whilst agriculture was becoming more mechanised a lot of men still worked on the land and, of course, the biggest employer was the Sanatorium at Wiston which in 1959 was renamed the Jane Walker Hospital when it was taken over by the NHS.

Residents used to say that in days gone by it was possible to buy everything you wanted in the village, there was no need to go outside. As the 50s progressed, however, with more cars and a more mobile population, the number of shops and businesses gradually fell. The two butchers, Kerridge's in Court Street and Webb's in the High Street carried on but by the end of the decade the three bakers who had served the village for many years had all gone - several generations of the Roberts family had been bakers and dairymen at the Guildhall in the High Street, Butler's were in Birch Street and Herbert Taylor in Mill Street. F W Beaumont, ironmonger, in Birch Street, established in 1899, eventually closed in the 1980s. There were several general stores: the largest was R G Barker, also a drapery, opposite the Post Office (now Church Mews); Hatten's and Faier's shops in Bear Street: Shepherd's store was in the High Street (now the Dentists); in Mill Street there was Frank Johnson's shop opposite Norfolk's garage, and Austin's shop on the Mill Street/Bear Street corner.

Living conditions and amenities improved considerably during the 1950s. More homes came with the building of Harpers Estate and the village was provided with proper sewerage and mains water, Norfolk's buses and the Eastern National provided a good service to Colchester and Sudbury 7 days a week and some days to Ipswich. In the 1950s Dr McMichael was the village GP living and working at the Old Vicarage in the High Street. The village policeman lived in Bear Street and in 1954 the fire service, based at the White Hart, moved into a new purpose built station in Bear Street.

In the 1950s there was an urgent need for a recreation and sports field and negotiations began to compulsorily purchase Webb's Meadow, but it was nearly 15 years before the Parish Council finally acquired the field in 1969. In 1958 the primary school moved to Bear Street from the old Victorian building in Church Lane. Prior to this most children had received their entire education in Church Lane but in 1950 the over 11s who had not qualified for grammar school, went to the new secondary school at Stoke-by-Nayland. In 1950 there were six pubs in Nayland but by the end of the decade there were only three. To no avail residents protested at the closure of the Queen's Head as the hall at the rear was used as a cinema and for many social events. The Butcher's Arms in Bear Street also closed, Mrs Maud Boon, 75, having been licensee there with her husband for 46 years. She was assisted by her daughter, Mrs Norah Popps, who was responsible for sounding the fire alarm at the pub when fire broke out and for sending the firemen off with their instructions. The third pub to close was the Victoria in Court Street, kept by Ted Stammers and his wife Ida. All these pubs became private houses.

Wiston still had the Fox Inn and in Nayland the three pubs left were the Star & Garter in Bear Street, the White Hart, which also had a hall for social events, and the Anchor which John and June Curtis took over in 1956. They were tenants there when the old hump-backed bridge outside was rebuilt. Suffolk Highways had decided to rebuild the bridge as it was only 16 ft wide and formed a bottleneck on a road where traffic was increasing. Whilst working on the foundations of the bridge workmen found a tin of dynamite and a bomb dismantler from Colchester Garrison was called in. It was believed that the Army had laid the dynamite during the war as a precaution against German invasion and it had never been taken away – the workmen proceeded with great care!

On the 2nd June 1953 the village celebrated the Queen's coronation with the crowning of its own Beauty Queen who presented prizes to the winners of the fancy dress and children's sports. There was a tea party for the children and their parents but the planned community singing and dancing in the High Street had to be held in the White Hart hall because of wet weather.

Longstanding residents agree the village has changed a great deal since 1953. However, while there is sadness and regret for the loss of some of the many good things about life at that time, many of the changes have undoubtedly improved the quality of life for everyone living here and in this Platinum Jubilee year there is much to celebrate.

WEATHER SUMMARY: March & April 2022 Weather Report by David Lowe

The weather in **March** was dominated by high pressure to the east. This meant it was drier and sunnier than average. In some winters, it would also have meant it would be cold - but not this one. There was an absence of cold air on the continent.

Perhaps the most exciting occurrence was snow falling on the 31^{st} , I believe the first and only occasion this winter, save for a repeat performance on 1^{st} April.

Mean temperature was 7.6° C (6.79) with a high of 18.1° C (17.11) and low of -1.7° C (-1.77). There were no days on which 5° C was not reached (0.79) 11 when 10° C (12.07) was not reached. 15° C was reached on 5 occasions (3.5). There were 2 air frosts (4.64) 7 ground frosts only (9.29) and 1 grass frost only.

Bright sun hours were 228.2 (213.42) and solar energy 760 Ly (6425). Evapotranspiration was 56 mm (48.84).

Rainfall was 24 mm (34.81) with 1 day over 10mm (1). There has not been a day with 20 mm or more in the 14 year record period.

Average wind speed was 5.5mph (4.86) with highest gust of 35 mph (40). Highest average daily wind speed was 13.8 mph (11.77). Mean wind direction was East - not unusual for March.

To the end of March, we have had the driest start to the year in the 14 year record period.

Figures in brackets above are 14 year averages.

What has happened to **April** showers - we don't seem to have had any for several years? They are borne on a NW wind which has been lacking - April winds have been from a broadly easterly direction for the past three years. This has contributed to these Aprils being dry compared to average. And last year, to an unprecedented number of frosts. It also leads to higher average wind strengths, as wind arrives across the North Sea rather than being reduced by friction over land.

Apart from these points, most April statistics were close to average, which may be surprising. This has much to do with continental Europe having a mild winter.

Average temperature was $9.2^{\circ}C$ (9.22) with a high of $18.9^{\circ}C$ (21.09) and low of -2.23°C (-0.97). There were 4 air frosts (2.71) and 5 additional ground frosts (5.5). On 4 days the temperature failed to make $10^{\circ}C$ (4) and on 18, $15^{\circ}C$ (18.07).

Bright sun hours were 301.7 (285.63) solar energy was 10750 Ly (10596). Evapotranspiration was 82.5 mm (75.41).

Monthly rainfall was 16.8 mm (26.9) with highest daily amount of 7.6 mm (7.71) and highest rainfall rate of 40 mm/hr (28.79).

Average wind strength was 6.4 mph (4.35) and highest daily average 13.6 mph (9.59). Highest gust was 42 mph (33.07) with 6 days over 30 mph (1.71). Predominant wind direction was NNE.

The year to date continues to be dry - but has lost out as the driest to 2017, which had less April rain. 2022 rainfall to date is 119 mm, while 2017 had 103.4 mm at this point (average 155mm).

Dear All,

This might be an unusual pastoral letter that I write to you this time. I am going to talk to you about vocations. I don't know if you ever had the curiosity to look at the résumé of the disciples of Christ. You would be surprised, they weren't all fishermen. There was actuality a variety of skills among them. First we have to mention that Christ himself wasn't just a preacher or a healer, he used to be a carpenter. Judas Iscariot was entrusted with the common purse as he was known to be good at accountancy. Matthew was a publican, i.e. a tax-collector, a civil-servant working for the occupier, while Simon the Canaanite was a zealot i.e. a resistant for the Jews, a terrorist for the Romans.

Since the beginning of Christianity, the variety of occupations and skills was reflected in the organisation of the communities. There were door-keepers, like our side-persons today, preachers, teachers, deacons i.e. the bursars of the charity, elders etc... Nowadays, the same variety of vocations exists in the Church with different forms and categories. Volunteers commit themselves freely to help in different duties of community life. Officers are elected to take more formal tasks. Licensed ministers have a longer term commitment supported by the community. And ordained people are kind of life-sentenced in their vocation. Your rector had the blessing to go through some of these different functions before ordination.

If you want to have an idea of what kind of roles exists in the Church, I have asked the churchwardens to publish the rota of duties in each building. You will see some names like 'readers', 'intercessors', 'refreshments' etc... Other duties are not displayed but are the usual one you would see in any association, like 'treasurer' or 'secretary'. Not everybody wants to spend time on a Sunday morning in a church but some of you cherish the idea of having a church in the village that is not just a building but a hub of life and social interactions for all. So if you're interested in giving some time for the life of the community, I give you the vacancies that need to be filled at the moment. If the names are unclear for you, it will be a good opportunity to crack on a discussion with any member of the Church during our various events like coffee mornings or fêtes. For all these different roles, you don't need to be baptised in the Church of England, you just need to be willing to serve the community. The interesting part of it, is that you will be provided with a safeguarding training, which is a very valuable topic to be aware of.

- Nayland is looking for a churchwarden, a treasurer (urgent) and an independent auditor (for the accounts).
- Wis(sing)ton hasn't got any immediate vacancy but is always open to welcome volunteers.
- Leavenheath is looking for a churchwarden and has got space for a PCC (Parish Church Council) member.
- Stoke-by-Nayland is looking for a churchwarden, a maintenance-manager, side-people and has got space for a PCC member.
- Polstead is looking for a churchwarden, side-people, refreshment hosts, readers, intercessors and has got space for a PCC member.
- Stoke-by-Nayland Church of England Primary School hasn't got any immediate vacancy, but will need in future terms new reading assistants, governors and foundation governors.

By volunteering for your Benefice, you're not only helping dedicated people who are running the life of the Church, you are also bringing life at the heart of our villages.

NAYLAND WITH WISSINGTON ANNUAL PARISH ASSEMBLY Extracts from reports for the meeting : 25th April 2022

The meeting was held Village Hall where Zoom facility have not proven viable. However, monthly PC meetings held in the upstairs conference room do have Zoom facility.

Attendance for the Parish Assembly was very low, approx 13 residents attended to hear reports and raise questions with members of the Parish Council, District Councillor Melanie Barrett and County Councillor James Finch. There was a report on the Love Caley Walsh Charity Trust.

The display boards included photographs of flooded streets, broken drains, the Highways map of road closures, Caley Green, the blocked culvert/ditch, a selection of comments from residents illustrating wide variety of opposing views, Village Hall Treasurer's report, with a display on roof proposals provided by the Chairman, PROW Warden report, SCC and BDC reports, map of additional dog waste and litter bins proposal, maps for proposed pylons route and the PC response to the consultation.

PARISH COUNCIL

Mary George's report included:

Finance: The high end-of-year estimated balance of \pounds 76,244 is distorted as we have not received the invoice for the new street lights installed during the year or annual electricity costs for 2021 to 2022 and some of the extensive maintenance and work at the Fairfield Recreation Ground carried out near the end of financial year, so these will be paid from the carry forward figure.

Highways: The major new drainage scheme should alleviate the constant flooding. Construction works and road closures will obviously have an impact on residents but any inconvenience should be over by early August. Speed control measures and a 20 mph limit in the village are being investigated in partnership with Suffolk County Council and the Conservation Society. HGV signs installed on the two entrances from A134 appear to have reduced the number of large container lorries taking short cuts through the village to the A12.

Streetlighting and waste bins: The replacement streetlight project is now complete, with the exception of one light in the centre of the village. A schedule of new locations for additional dog waste bins has been approved and will be paid for with CIL income.

Planning: Parish Council was consulted by Babergh Planning Department on 61 planning applications, 33 were full planning applications including the at the White Hart change for of use to residential.

Village Hall: We all owe thanks to the Village Hall Management Committee.

Allotments: Council approved the proposal to increase the allotments by four half plots as needed, subject to the number on the waiting list. A resident donated a bench seat so that people could take a break on walks at the field.

Footpaths: We have been working with other parties towards improving the access on the PROW path between the allotments and Bell Meadow.

Fairfield Recreation Ground and Playpark: This has had extensive and expensive refurbishment this year. The turning circle and parking for the Burial Ground had been badly damaged so a new parking area has been created using CIL funding.

Caley Green: SCC have accepted that their riparian responsibilities for the long reed bed; they will conduct an ecological survey and examine budgets to see whether some reed removal can be done. The culvert and ditch at the edge of the green is becoming blocked with vegetation and this has been reported to SCC. The investigation of remedies to protect the riverbank near the bus shelter from further erosion and damage by kayaks and paddle boards has reached a stalemate as we are still awaiting additional technical advice requested from suppliers in January.

Mary thanked councillors and the Clerk for their hard work and support during the past year. There is still one vacancy.

She thanked all the volunteers in the parish, especially those who had helped uothers during the past two very difficult years. **DISTRICT COUNCILLOR**

Melanie Barrett's report included:

- Council tax will increase this year by 2% which on a typical band D house is 7p per week or £3.48 per year.
- Under the Housing Revenue Account agreed in February there was an increase 4.1% in Council house rents, equivalent to £3.72pm for social rent and £5.23pw for affordable rent. Sheltered housing service charges stayed the same.
- The new Joint Local Plan (Town and County Planning) is not complete as the Inspector found serious problems with its compilation.
- Parking charges proposed for council owned car parks have been postponed until further notice.
- The results of a review of all Babergh owned garage sites is due to identify sites suitable for redevelopment [ownership allowing]. Discussions are taking place with stakeholders in the next months.
- An £20k interest free loan has been launched to help owners improve and renovate vacant homes and bring them back into use ie to repair a roof, install central heating.
- Suffolk is one of 9 counties where negotiations are taking place on a new devolution deal. This will affect transport and infrastructure and address regional concerns.

COUINTY COUNCILLOR

James Finch's report included:

- SCC plans to spend more money on Children's Services & Adult Care public services in 2022/23, including: more money to support children with special educational needs and disabilities (SEND); extra resources for adults in need of care with a new Cassius service for an improved home care; and additional funds to prevent flooding and fix footpaths. Under the proposals, the council's budget for 2022-23 would rise by 4.5% (from £598.2 to £625.4m). This additional money is generated by a 2.99% increase in Council Tax, and an increase in grants received from the Government.
- It was announced in late June 2021 that a significant investment of £6.238m was approved to support Suffolk's long-term recovery beyond the Covid-19 pandemic.
- In April 2021, 99% of children were offered a place at one of their parents' three preferred schools and 95% were offered a place at their first preference school.
- In May 2021, Suffolk Fire and Rescue Service unveiled three new vehicles, packed with the latest technology, to support firefighters at emergency incidents.
- The Hold, a new archives and heritage centre on Ipswich's Waterfront, was opened in September 2021; this is home to more than nine centuries of history safely preserved by Suffolk Archives.
- In October 2021, the Offshore Electricity Grid Task Force (OffSET) was set up to review and respond to the Government's Offshore Network Transmission Review (OTNR).
- MPs from Norfolk, Suffolk and Essex and County Councillors, under the chairmanship of Sir Bernard Jenkin, unite to protect the countryside and communities from the worst impacts of new pylons and cables. Much time has been spent regarding National Grid's Consultation on the Bramford – Twinstead Reinforcement of the Cables and Pylon connection through South Suffolk and the AONB.
- In December 2021 SCC endorsed far-reaching recommendations to improve Suffolk people's mental health and wellbeing.
