NAYLAND WITH WISSINGTON PARISH COUNCIL

Notes by observer of the meeting: 14th February 2024

Laura Erith chaired the meeting.

PUBLIC FORUM

Mike Hunter expressed his support to a resident who had offered to co-ordinate a local voluntary Speed Watch group; this would provide evidence and statistics about the speed of traffic within the village centre.

An owner of land adjacent to the burial ground raised his concern regarding 8 overgrown trees on the northern boundary of the cemetery; work commenced had been interrupted by Storm Babet in October and had not been completed. He felt the condition of the boundary fence required a maintenance plan.

DISTRICT COUNCILLOR

Isabelle Reece is continuing to follow up the untidy state of land by the Old Bus Shelter at the junction of Heycroft Way/ Harpers Estate.

COUNTY COUNCILLOR

James Finch said SCC remain united against the Norwich to Tilbury onshore pylons option. He provided a potential traffic calming programme for Nayland as requested.

HIGHWAYS

Laura Erith reported that the crumbling road surface edge, adjacent to the ditch, opposite Little Bulmer Farm remained a danger to drivers particularly now that bollards/cones had been removed. James Finch was asked to pursue this; he pointed out that there were limited resources available.

Jonathan Pearson has offered to set up a voluntary Community Speed Watch group; this would operate under the guidance of Suffolk Constabulary. Councillors agreed to support this proposal. James Finch agreed to speak to the co-ordinator at Newton Green and obtain useful advice.

As requested James Finch had been exploring suitable traffic calming equipment available at SCC that was suitable for Nayland. He confirmed that Horkesley Road would qualify for a Temporary Vehicle Activated sign (TVAS) which would be shared on a rota with other locations. This should be sited just outside the 30mph limit within the 40mph zone.

Stoke Road will qualify for a Speed Indicator Device; experience suggests a battery unit would be more reliable than a solar panel and did not require a tall pole. The PC would be required to fund this.

Councillors agreed to look into purchase options. Isabelle Reece would look into potential grant funding for speed management. PARISH COUNCIL FINANCE

The Finance Committee's recommendations, which were approved, include: A Precept increase of 7%; to increase allotment rents by 10% and burial fees by 7%, that CIL monies are to be used towards a new Defibrillator for Wiston supported by a grant from the Community Council.

Other new capital projects to be prioritised for CIL (Community Infrastructure Levy) monies as there is still no confirmed timescale for completion of the Village Hall roof. The funds need to be spent within 5 years of allocation. The detailed CIL returns can be viewed on the PC website.

Adam Sedgwick, Community Hardship and Community Pantry Fund management, asked whether Nayland with Wissington PC would consider allocated charity monies to the Fund within the benefice; it was agreed to invite him to the January meeting. PLANNING

Councillors heard that Babergh had no objections at Lower Courtwood, 13A Court Street [DC/23/04878] for works to trees; to remove to ground level an Ash tree and a Sycamore tree.

Discussing an application at Harpers Hill Farm [DC/23/05311] for advertisement consent councillors object on the grounds that the size of the proposed signs was too large for this site, adjacent to Gladwin's Farm entrance and within the AONB. The need for two signs was questioned. Signage in itself was appropriate, as with the neighbouring business, but the number and design, as per application should be refused.

Councillors had no objections to listed building consent at 72 - 74 Bear Street [DC/23/05458] for variation of conditions relating to materials providing the Heritage Team ensure the integrity of the heritage asset should not be compromised by the choice of materials; or at 52 - 54 Bear Street [DC/23/05592] for repair of lime render on the front elevation and replacement of concrete render on brick plinth with lime render, replacement of plain tiles on the north facing roof slope and introduction of a pentice board over raised band along the front elevation as long as Heritage Team approve materials.

Owen Brown reported that investigation into future affordable housing was on-going.

The benefits of Neighbourhood Development Plans (NDP) was discussed; Isabelle Reece pointed out that Babergh's Planning Team placed great emphasis and weight on NDPs.

Tricia Fuller felt the PC should pursue whole council planning training; it was agreed that enquiries should be made at SALC and with Babergh.

RECREATION AND OPEN SPACES

The Royal Memorial project was coming to fruition: the copper beech tree with railings around and the bench are in place. A plaque is to follow. Thanks were expressed to Dawn Harris for coordinating the project, the contractors and the Community Council for their financial contribution.

SCC's work at the culvert between Bear Street and the river is completed; the rotten wooden safety rail over the culvert, adjacent to the bus shelter has been replaced.

Sally Dalton said that work on the wooden revetment isn't likely to happen in the near future but it's hoped reduction of the long reed bed will be undertaken.

Gerry Battye reported that the Fairfield Playpark equipment had been repainted. The sub-committee would need to resolve signage, both in the Playpark and the field and parking areas.

Councillors were very disappointed by the delay to the repair to the Fairfield/Cemetery driveway by the Diocese. There are safety concerns for cars carrying children, visitors to the care home, funeral vehicles and ambulances using the drive with one particularly deep pothole. The Diocese will be chased again . VILLAGE HALL

The Council has received correspondence expressing an interest in the possibility of free EV Charging points at the hall. This has been discussed by the VHMC; the electricity supply would need to be updated to make this possible. Such updating is already part of the Roof Project. Separate costings for the points themselves would have to be sought.

BURIAL GROUND

Dawn Harris reported that some individual metal crosses were being repaired and new ones being made for marking the graves of former Jane Walker residents. It will be necessary to liaise with our grass-cutting contractor concerning the crosses. IN BRIEF:

Councillors congratulated the Community Council on their Christmas Fayre and other festive activities.

The allotment rents have been requested. There are currently two people on the waiting list; one from this parish and one from a neighbouring parish.

Signage has been damaged at both ends of the permissive path, created by the Conservation Society, between Nayland and Stoke; Mike Hunter agreed to liaise with the Tendring Hall Estate regarding this.

Suffolk Constabulary have re-organised local policing and a Community Policing Team has been created; PC 1293 Niall Johnson and PCSO 3092 Jo Adams are our new allocated officers.

Robin Thorogood chaired the meeting. Tim Leach was welcomed as a new councillor; the PC is now at full complement.

PUBLIC FORUM

James Carver explained that the reduction of a Yew tree at 12 Mill Street was greater than the expected 30% as it was found to be diseased. Councillors noted there had been no objections to the original planning application [*DC*/24/00067].

Two residents asked why the two temporary bus stop signs on Harpers Hill had disappeared; the PC did not know but were updated during the meeting (under Highways).

HIGHWAYS

Isabelle Reece had been asked to request a sweep of the Bear Street cul-de-sac by the A134 as the double yellow lines have been obscured by leaves, etc. If Babergh can give a date for the work residents will ensure the road is kept clear. It was pointed out the lines were experimental to prevent the driveways of residents living there being blocked; the trail was successful and the yellow lines are permanent.

Tricia Fuller raised the issue of repairs in January to a small patch of Harpers Estate (below the junction with Heycroft Way) although resurfacing had been expected. James Finch said this in unlikely to be a priority but will look into it if the reference number of the report is supplied.

Gerry Battye queried if the criteria for maintenance was available; he was advised it can be found Googling SCC HMOP (Highway Maintenance Operational Plan).

James Finch advised that the two temporary bus stop signs on Harpers Hill, and some in other villages seem to have been stolen. He said new stock has been ordered but it may take some time before they are replaced.

Issues on the by-pass were discussed with James Finch. Councillors felt the area was a mess and needed attention. He was asked if a more effective weedkiller, than the glyphosate free alternative product the SCC have been using since 2022, could be applied to the traffic islands. He said surface dressing of the island will not be done in the short term. He confirmed SCC will not provide illuminated bollards as they were previously for the central islands; they will be reflective.

Robin Thorogood raised the issue of a ditch along Bures Road (opposite Old Maltings Farm) was not draining.

James Finch said he is pushing hard for the closure of Boxted Bridge to be resolved. Robin Thorogood pointed out that while the Bridge is closed it is creating higher traffic through Nayland. **FINANCE**

Councillors heard that installation of metal fencing to replace the wooden fencing at the Fairfield Playpark would be costly and CIL monies were currently spoken for. It was felt the renovations to the area look lovely and it would be nice to finish it off and it could be a safety issue. It is not known when further CIL money may be available (NwW receives a lower percentage as there is no Local Plan). It may be necessary to look for grants. Isabelle Reece said some funding may be available from her locality budget after April. **PLANNING**

Councillors heard that Babergh had no objections at **Roziers Wissington Uplands** [DC/23/05891] for erection of pool plant room with changing facilities (following demolition of existing) or for works to trees at **85 Bear Street** [DC/24/00486] to reduce the crown of a Silver Birch with a TPO by 2 metres (back to previous pruning points); at **Vine House 1 Court Street** [DC/24/00576] to reduce all branches on Cherry overhanging the neighbouring property by 1 metre back to natural pruning points; at **8 Jane Walker Park** [DC/24/00625] to reduce a Walnut tree with a TPO back to framework branches top allow it to continue carrying the climber already on the tree. It had a thin, weak crown last summer, large lesions in trunk and cavities in base of tree and bark starting to leave trunk in places.

Discussing recent applications at **5** Elm Grove [DC/24/00995] for erection of 1.5 storey side extension (following demolition of attached garage) and construction of front and rear dormer

extensions, including widening driveway (re-submission and amended scheme to DC/23/04998) councillors had no objections overall, however, to help preserve neighbour amenity, suggest a smaller window to the rear and the French doors may not be necessary as there is already an outside door in the kitchen.

Councillors have no objections at **52-54 Bear Street** [*DC*/24/01052] for erection of single storey rear outbuilding for use as artist studio/store (following removal of existing summer house) or at **11 Gravel Hill** [*DC*/24/01128] for listed building consent to repair and/or replace existing slate tiles and Installation of 2 roof lights, however, councillors note there is an error in the Design and Access Statement still showing 3 roof lights.

Tricia Fuller expressed concerns that the PC's comment sheet for planning applications had limited feedback. It was pointed out the comments are useful for many reasons for current, resubmitted and future applications as well as if responses need to be submitted to Babergh between meetings. Debbie will make enquiries about planning training sessions; training would be useful to new councillors and provide information on changes to policies.

RECREATION AND OPEN SPACES

Sally Dalton was asked for an update on works at Caley Green. Due to a complaint by a resident regarding the work due to take place to cut reeds in the long reed bed Matthew Lee at Suffolk CC is obtaining additional ecological reports; the time taken to for this put the work back beyond the 1st March which is the official bird nesting deadline, so work will be delayed. SCC has funding in place to carry out installation of the wooden revetment and it will be done at some point.

The poor condition of the Fairfield driveway remains of urgent concern; as previously discussed quotes have been obtained for patching and resurfacing. Responsibility for the drive lies with the Diocese and shared with Nayland Care Home; the PC share responsibility up to the burial ground. The decision on whether the drive will be patched or resurfaced is yet to be agreed. The PC's funds are limited. A meeting between the Diocese and AgeCare (Nayland House) has taken place.

Dawn Harris raised the issue of the old bench on the high ground of Caley Green being in need of repair; it was agreed to go ahead with this at a cost of £245.

A resident has raised concerns regarding parking at the spaces near the burial ground; they have frequently been unable to park when wanting to tend family graves due to cars parking there for long periods or all day. They have requested the possibility of signage to remind drivers of the purpose of the parking spaces. Councillors commented the problems of parking in the wider area are historic but have been exacerbated with two additional years of school children and the success of Woodland Corner. It was gueried why Woodland Corner installed a back gate which encourages use of Fairfield drive. It is thought the origins of the parking spaces were to cater to the burial ground and playpark. During discussions the idea of designating one space for the burial ground and putting up a laminated notice was suggested. However, it was finally agreed that the spaces are not specifically for the burial ground and no further action be taken but the situation would be monitored.

Following discussion at the last meeting and final proposals being made available between meetings, councillors had no objections to a 'Woodland Corner' sign being erected at the entrance to Fairfield Drive.

Laura Erith updated councillors on a quote for work proposed by residents at the Horsewatering on Bear Street; there is a budget for this. It was agreed to cover the cost of £150 per year for 3 treatments of weedkiller to the gravel area. Gerry Battye said the Horsewatering is an area of common land which the Council maintained, although not very satisfactorily, until a group of nearby residents refurbished the area with monies donated by local residents.

Following a site meeting regarding the land at the Harpers Estate/Heycroft Way junction by the Old Bus Shelter it was felt the possibility of a low maintenance planting plan should be explored. Dawn Harris is moving this forward. **IN BRIEF:**

Dawn Harris said allotment inspections had been carried out; two in particular are in a poor condition but others have been reported as needing attention. Not all rents have been paid. The allotment sub-committee will visit on Saturday to check and speak to allotment holders before any decisions are made. There are two people on the waiting list for allotments.

Dawn Harris reminded councillors that the Village Hall spring garden tidy is on Saturday 6th April at 9am. Iain Wright said the VHMC are still pursuing their grant application with the National Lottery to help fund a new roof for the village hall.

A flickering street light outside 101 Bear Street was reported; it has now stopped working.

Fencing work in the burial ground had been carried out. Progress on the making and installation of the Jane Walker memorial is in the hands of the project group; councillors have previously approved their proposals.

Work to the tree in Star Alley is the responsibility of SCC; their risk assessment found the tree is healthy and no work is required. **ANNUAL PARISH ASSEMBLY**

Rachel Hitchcock welcomed members to the meeting.

Chair's Report: 2023 was another positive year for the Community Council (CC).

Thank You: Thanks as always to all members for their many contributions throughout the year - we couldn't operate without the support and participation of members from many different village societies - and to the Officers and Executive Committee: Bryan Smith, Julie Clark, Lorraine Brooks, Matt Cable, Claire Buller, Iain Wright, Vicki Sargent, Jo Metson, Luke Rumbelow, Maggie Ryan and Heike Ellwood. Special thanks to Lorraine for her continued perseverance in ensuring the smooth running of the CC machine! We are sorry to lose Luke from the committee - he has been a supportive participant in our activities despite having moved out of the village - and for several years has organised the very successful Nayland 10k Fun Run.

I must also take this opportunity to acknowledge Ken Willingale, founder member and long-standing President of the CC, who sadly passed away in January 2024. Ken and his wife Olive contributed a huge amount to the CC (and indeed the village as a whole) over the years. He was there at the start, when he was appointed Treasurer at the inaugural meeting of what was to become the CC on 20th June 1966 (the aims of the group being to take forward the project of providing a recreation ground and village hall for the village). Ken remained a valued part of the organisation; he remained supportive of all that we do and always offered encouragement for our ongoing work. He will be missed and remembered fondly by so many including members of the CC Exec who remember a lovely, kind man who was at the heart of the organisation and was a stickler for protocol and 'doing things properly'. Thank you to Ken for paving the way. Our love and condolences go to Ken's family.

What does the Community Council do? Represents and brings together a membership of over 20 village societies; Fundraises to support village activities and organisations; Funds and co-ordinates projects that are of benefit to the community; Organises key events in the village calendar; Communicates village news through the Community Times.

Community Council events and activities: Thank you to everybody who helps with all the CC events, especially the committee who organise them and all the village organisations who ensure that our community has such a full diary.

Bonfire Night: 1400 people attended our community firework display which took place, as usual, on 5th November. Once again, professional display company Firework Crazy, did a fantastic job, especially in light of the fact that the display end of the field was under water! Everybody rose to the occasion and the event was a huge success with the impressive display beautifully reflected in the large 'puddle'. This event continues to provide a lovely, traditional start to our Christmas activities.

Father Christmas, Christmas Eve Village Tour: We were delighted to welcome back Father Christmas for his Christmas Eve tour of the village - this year in a slightly different mode of transport, Foster Jones having retired his wonderful vintage Humber. Huge thanks to George Pratt for providing perfect transport in the form of festively decorated tractor and trailer much to the delight of Nayland and Wiston residents, young and old! Thanks too to Father Christmas and his willing helpers for this very special visit on what is a very busy day in his calendar!

Christmas Trail: We were delighted to bring back the Christmas Trail of trees, wreaths and advent windows for its fourth year. Once again it brought sparkle, colour and Christmas cheer to the village throughout December and we are incredibly grateful to everyone who participated and helped make this such a success.

Over the course of 2023, the Community Council's principle sources of income were Bonfire Night (net income of £4,369), the Community Times (£722) and the Village Calendar (£605). The Village Quiz (£563) and Christmas Fayre (£220) also made helpful contributions and the Council was grateful to receive a generous donation from the Nayland 10K run (£425).

Grants were made to support Nayland First Responders (\pounds 2,165) and the Parish Council tree and bench commemorating the late Queen and coronation of the King (\pounds 1,538). We also paid \pounds 100 to support the 'Nayland Bear'.

The Community Council spent £566 on the Coronation party and £448 on activities around Christmas. £631 was spent on purchasing the annual insurance that covers events run by the Council.

At the end of the year the Community Council held $\pounds 28.1k$ in cash, mainly in its current and deposit accounts. After net accruals of $\pounds 11.3k$ this left unencumbered assets of $\pounds 16.8k$ as shown in the accompanying financial statements and footnotes.

Parish Council representation continues to be shared between Laura Erith and Sam Treharne.

MATTERS ARISING:

Recent Events: The *Fun Village Quiz* on 2nd February had been a great evening. It made over £600 for CC funds. Rachel Hitchcock thanked everyone for their help and support.

Community Defibrillator: Defibrillators are located at the Village Hall and at the Fire Station. The defibrillator at the Village Hall which is managed by the CC is regularly checked and there have been no problems. There has been no progress on provision of a Defibrillator in Wiston; consideration will be given to the best location. The First Responders were thanked for holding 3 AED training sessions in January which

help build confidence.

River Stour Water Level Gauge: Rachel Hitchcock met Danny Thurlow on site; he is willing to install the gauge. Matthew Lee (Suffolk CC) has agreed in principle; Rachel will send him the proposed positioning and email confirmation from the EA that a permit is not required. Rachel will check the current costs with Shelley Signs; with the change of location to the south bank it may not be necessary to have a gauge on both sides of the post which would reduce the cost.

Nayland 10k Fun Run: Luke Rumbelow will be taking a break from organising this fabulous event. Thanks were expressed to Luke for the sizable donations each year to the CC and other local charities, and to all the volunteers who helped with marshalling and other valued tasks.

Village Hall Gardening Morning: The next gardening session will be on Saturday 6th April from 9am - please support this if you can; it is a pleasant social activity and refreshments are provided.

Community Council report continued.....

Community Involvement: This is aimed at encouraging residents to participate and/or volunteer with village groups and organisations. An article is included in the Community Times; if any groups need specific volunteers let Lorraine know details to include.

The Fete Committee are currently appealing for volunteers to take shifts manning the gates, to help with stalls and in particular to help with teas in the hall.

Resident Volunteer List: This is a request for residents to put their names forward to assist other residents who at times are unable to get out for themselves and would benefit from having a prescription collected, an errand run or some shopping dropped off. No names will be published; Lorraine will co-ordinate volunteers and requests for help. If you can help please let her know.

Community Times & Websites: For over 34 years, and 207 issues the CT has been keeping residents informed of what is going on in the parish. New technologies have enabled some changes and content differs slightly but it's hoped it continues to fulfil its role and be useful. New ideas and content are always welcome.

There is quite a team behind producing the magazine. We are very grateful to: all those who take the time to contribute articles, copy and reports on their societies, village happenings, letters and photographs; to members of the local Facebook group who raise awareness of issues and permit use of their photographs for inclusion; the dedicated team of distributors led by Trevor Smy; Pat Bray for her contributions of village news and for proof reading; our long standing editor, Lorraine Brooks who tirelessly puts together every issue; the advertisers who cover printing costs and provide much valued income for the CC. Many thanks to all.

Thanks also to Justin Dowding for managing the website <u>www.naylandandwiston.net</u> and for establishing the online ticket sales facility at <u>www.naylandevents.org</u> which has become increasingly beneficial to village organisations.

Village Calendar: The NwW Calendar, has proved very popular with residents, since it was first published 15 years ago. We are enormously grateful to the small team for their commitment and hard work in producing the calendar.

The calendar team are very grateful to: local businesses that sponsor the calendar, all those who enter their photographs and those who help with sales at local shops or village activities. And last but certainly not least, those who buy the calendars.

We are delighted that Wendy Sparrow and Lorraine Brooks have agreed to continue with this project for another year, with support from Claire Buller and Jo Metson. Plans are in hand for the next photographic competition to generate images for the calendar. This is conducted online and we ask residents to be the judges and select their favourite images for inclusion in the calendar. Further details will be available in the Community Times and at <u>www.naylandandwiston.net</u>. Deadline for entries will be 21st April with voting the following weekend. **SOCIETY REPORTS**

HortSoc: Trevor Smy said their first event for 2024 will be the Spring Flower Show on 23rd March; their AGM and Fun Quiz with horticulture in mind is on 16th April; and the Morning Market and Coffee Morning on 11th May. They are taking bookings for a coach outing to Hyde Hall on 12th June; the cost for travel and entry is £18. Schedules for the Spring and Summer Flowers Shows, AGM documents and the booking form for the outing can be found on *naylandhortsoc.co.uk*

Art Group: Kathryn Niven said they had another enjoyable year. Watercolour painting was applied to landscapes and still life and they have explored some different art styles, they revisited life drawing and tried some other art forms such as acrylic painting. They turned some drawing into lino prints. They visited a watercolour exhibition and went to Blue Owl Pottery to paint some Christmas decorations. They participated at the flower festival and the Christmas tree festival in St James.

First Responders: Tracy Le Grys said they are continuing to grow in numbers and a sixth person attending the next training sessions with the Trust. They are continuing to provide CPR

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training to the local area. The third kit which the CC funded will be soon be in use. Thanks to a generous donation from a resident we have been able to purchase Trust Issue trousers and jackets; we are truly grateful to them.

Friends of Caley Green: Sally Dalton reported that unfortunately the long reed bed won't after all be cut this spring, hopefully it will be able to take place in the autumn. The female swan has continued to visit our resident male but we still wait in anticipation as to whether they form a proper pair; there has been no sign of nest building. The daffodils on the Green are providing some welcome colour.

Royal British Legion: Rober Dossor reported that the Branch lost its President oldest and last surviving WW2 veteran Ken Willingale. On 1st March there was a short service at the War Memorial to commemorate the anniversary of the death of Lt Charles Gumm, who was killed steering his failing aircraft away from the Village. On 11th March the speaker will be Richard Turner from the Boxted Airfield Historical Association. They are organising a St George's Day lunch at The Anchor on 23rd March and a visit to Stephen Walters & Sons' Silk Mill in Sudbury – all are welcome to book.

St James' Church: Chris Hunt said a rota of services has been maintained including a monthly family service. Wednesday coffee mornings are well attended. The Annual Fete is on 6th May; if you can spare an hour or so to help you will be most welcome. The Annual PCC meeting will be held on 11th April.

Parish Council: Laura Erith reported that the Annual Parish Assembly is on 24th April with a speaker coming to talk about low cost housing; the development of a Local Neighbourhood Plan will also be on the agenda. They are trying hard to get the drive up to the burial ground repaired; a sign asks people to please keep their dog on a lead in the burial ground. A Community Speedwatch team has applied for their training with the Suffolk Constabulary.

Nayland Land Company: David Slater said a further 435m of improvement to the permissive path has been added to the 200m completed last year. It was necessary to temporarily close this length because heavy rain has washed out a lot of the soil from the plastic grids. Once the weather allows the grids will be filled with a mixture of topsoil and grass seed.

Conservation Society: Mike Hunter said the speaker after AGM business on 12th March will be Mick Inkpen talking about his career as a writer and illustrator of children's books.

To celebrate their 50th anniversary there will be a feature in the June CT, and a champagne reception for members; four speakers will share their memories and there will be am exhibition of the Society's activities over the years. In October Nigel Amies will speak about the Home Guard and in November David Pryor will talk about the reconstruction of a Viking Longship. Open Gardens will be on 9th June; it's hoped some gardeners on the Heights may consider opening their gardens. The community litter pick will be on 20th of April and the Spring Footpath walk on 12th May.

Baby & Toddlers: Gillian Manser reported sessions have been well supported, averaging about 16 children each week. They have enjoyed some lovely activities, going on a gruffalo hunt, enjoying the local policeman's visit.

Nayland Choir: Emma Bishton said they are rehearsing for 'Requiem' by Mozart in readiness for their 30th Anniversary concert on 24th March in St James' Church. There will be an orchestra accompanying the Choir. She thanked the Community Council for their contribution towards this event.

Village Players: Nick Moriarty said there are preparing for the spring play 'On Golden Pond' with performances on 18th-20th April. This follows on from their success in 2023 in the North Essex Theatre Guild Awards. Their December production is yet to be decided.

AOB: Thank Yous: Bryan Smith thanked the committee for their work throughout the year for the benefit of the village. Claire Buller expressed thanks to Rachel Hitchcock for her enthusiastic commitment in leading the CC on for another year. **NEXT MEETING:** will be the AGM on <u>Wednesday 1st May</u> at

WATER LEVELS

As highlighted last issue and as reported in David Lowe's weather report on page 37 the rainfall continued to be very high. Consequently river levels have been high and flooding continued on and off.

Drawing on a positive from this, at least levels in the groundwater chalk aquifier should stand us in good stead whatever the summer throws at us... and our poor undermaintained river shouldn't stop flowing.

REED GROWTH AT THE WEIR

With spring on its way the well established reeds around the Horseshoe wier, which had died down and been dormant during winter, will be romping away to claim more of the river, capture more silt and reduce its water holding capacity.

The likelihood of the EA undertaking any much needed reed management or removal seems unlikely given their previous broken promises.

WILDFOWL & SWANS

After losing his mate the resident cob swan overwintered on the river and Caley Green alone. A pen swan started visiting him regularly on 16th January, but they seem to be maintain a rather casual relationship. Despite an early sighting of mating, they seem to have 'cooled off' and there is no sign of nest building activity. Swans mate for life; we will have to wait and see if in time they will form a bond.

However, this aloofness with the opposite sex brings back memories of Nayland's beloved 'Gordon the Greylag Goose'; it's hard to believe we lost this legendary character three years ago. He is still talked about and missed.

Cormorants have been spotted along the river and Kingfishers continue to delight passers by.

BIRDWATCH

The results of the RSPB Big Garden Birdwatch won't be available until mid April, however there remains concern for some species. <u>https://www.rspb.org.uk/</u>

There has been a decline in the numbers of many birds, including the song thrush, skylark, lapwing, house sparrow, lesser spotted woodpecker and willow tit.

Sometimes there are perfectly natural reasons for not seeing some species; the weather, the amount of natural foodstuff available will affect their behaviour. Cold winters can kill a lot of birds, especially the smaller species, through starvation. The amount of food available in May and June is a key factor in deciding how many chicks survive to fly the nest. Owls, for example, cannot hunt in the rain to feed their chicks; faced with starvation the weakest owlet may be sacrificed to feed the stronger.

Some believe that changes in the natural food chain have had a considerable effect; there is an increased number of raptors preying on smaller birds. We have seen distressing scenes ourselves in

Nayland with the herons literally waiting to pick off cygnets on the Meadow pond, which they did systematically in 2020. Ducklings also fall prey to herons, gulls, crows and other birds; also foxes, otters and from beneath the water surface pike.

A school of thought is that densely overgrown habitat causes problems; some species are unable to flea from their prey when habitat is very congested.

Diseases are another threat facing bird populations; avian flu, trichomonosis and salmonella.

So birds in general, as well as those whose habitat is along our river have a hard time of it. It is obvious, and sad, that there are far fewer ducks resident in Nayland in the least few years.

CALEY GREEN

The Friends continue to keep an eye on the Green and the wildfowl. It is lovely to see it being enjoyed even during the early spring months.

BENCHES

The Parish Council have agreed to carry out maintenance to the four-seater memorial bench on Caley Green.

THE LONG REED BED

The work to cut some of the reeds in the long reed bed was scheduled to take place on 12 February. However, at the last minute there was a complaint from a resident and the work postponed. In view of this SCC ecologists suggested a mitigation and method study report is completed by a professional independent ecologist before the reed cutting takes place. SCC is going to bear the cost of this. However, the delay in getting this in place means the work could not be done before the 1st March (the start of bird nesting season).

RIVERBANK LITTER BY SLUICE GATES

As confirmed previously SCC are the landowners of the triangle of land between the A134 and the fork in the river adjacent the sluice gates. They were alerted to a considerable amount of litter and flytipping; their appointed contractor did not carry out the rubbish clearance properly. The SCC Properties Officer said he will look once again at getting the matter rectified but there is no progress to date.

ALL RIVER CRAFT NEED LICENCES

All craft must be registered to take to the water on any part of the Inland Waterway network of England.

The Environment Agency takes enforcement action if it finds any boat moored or in use if it is not displaying a current, valid registration plate.

The **River Stour Trust** can issue craft registrations for private unpowered craft. Register at: <u>https://www.riverstour</u> <u>trust.org/boat-trips/paddling-the-river-stour/craft-registrations/</u>

Alternatively, membership of **British Canoeing** includes a licence - but it covers the member and not the craft, individual adult costs £47.

RIVERBANK PROTECTION UPDATE

SCC have indicated that they will fund and take forward installation of wooden revetment around the bay at Caley Green to protect it from future erosion. There is no update on when this work is likely to take place.

IT IS NOW FISHING CLOSED SEASON NO FISHING SHOULD TAKE PLACE ON THE RIVER

The closed season, when you cannot fish on rivers and streams, is 15th March to 15th June 2024.

At any time of year a rod licence must be carried if you are aged 13 or over and you fish for freshwater fish, smelt or eel or you could be prosecuted and you can be fined up to £2,500.

A yearly 2-rod course fishing licence costs: £33 for adults, £22 for over 65 or the disabled and is free for 13-16 year olds. 1-day or 8-day licences are also available.

As a skilled water colour painter, each commission was accompanied by one of his ingenious 'red books' to illustrate his proposal. He produced a red book for Tendring Hall Estate at Stoke by Nayland.

PERMISSIVE FOOTPATH IMPROVEMENTS

We have recently completed phase 2 of resurfacing improvements to the permissive footpath. The improved section, 435 metres in length, starts near the bench close to the Horkesley Road/A134 junction, runs between the two sheep grazed fields and then loops back to the River Stour. It adds to the 200 metres of footpath that we improved last year. The new path has been top dressed with soil and seeded. We have temporarily closed the path to allow the new grass to get established.

A huge thank you to all concerned. These works were largely (but not exclusively) funded by DEFRA and the input of the Dedham Vale National Landscape and Stour Valley, and in particular Simon Amstutz and Emma Black, has been much appreciated. Danny Thurlow and his team have carried out the works on time and on budget.

SITE MANAGEMENT

We are grateful to the Stour Valley Volunteers who spent a productive day removing the invasive poplar suckers that were spreading into our rewilding area. The growth of the suckers was beginning to shade out the wild grasses, flowers and insects which we are aiming to encourage, and sucker removal should enable the target vegetation communities to flourish.

We have recently completed annual management of the sections of hedgerow that were laid and coppiced. We cut these so that they are a little wider and higher each year. This management ensures that the hedges develop into dense habitat suitable for nesting birds and other wildlife. Ongoing management is needed to prevent the hedges

reverting to a line of trees.

A small number of additional trees (alder, field maple and white willow) have been planted between the A134 culvert and pond, and also downstream of the weir. These are to replace a small number of failures from the original planting, and also to help compensate for the two mature alders close to the A134 that were blown over during the winter storms.

If anyone is interested in helping out with future practical management of the site then please get in touch. NEST BOX USAGE

We have a total of 14 bird nest boxes attached to

trees throughout the site. These comprise a "barn owl" box, two large nest boxes, a "starling" nest box and 10 small nest boxes. In the 2023 nesting season nesting was attempted in 10 boxes. Eight of the boxes, including the starling box and one of the large nest boxes, were successfully used by blue/great tits. One of the old nests was particularly interesting in that it was lined predominantly with coarse mammal hair, probably that of deer or badger. The barn owl box and the other large nest box were used by wood pigeons or stock doves, but the presence of old eggs in the boxes when inspected in February indicated that these nests had not been successful. Over this winter some of the nest boxes have been utilised by small mammals, almost certainly wood mice. During a clean out of the boxes prior to the bird breeding season a number were found to contain large accumulations of leaves, used as bedding material, as well as the shells of eaten hazelnuts.

ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING

CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

lain Wright welcomed the audience and thanked them for coming to the meeting.

We come to the end of another year within the life of the Village Hall and I am pleased to note that the use of the Hall is continuing apace with additional bookings, together with those regular village users.

This year was a very interesting year with four events being sponsored by the Village Hall Management Committee to help raise funds for the replacement roof. These events were:

- The Beatles Tribute band
- Afternoon Tea
- Proms in the Park
- Fun and Food Festival

The total profit for these events was approximately £7,500 and my thanks go to my team of helpers, Patricia Wilkie, Claire Buller and Emma Bishton. Currently there may be a repeat of the Beatles Tribute Band, depending on the health of the lead singer and this will be confirmed later.

During the year we have continued with updating the maintenance of the Village Hall with the replacement of light fittings to the upstairs meeting room and a battery replacement for the emergency lights, and further works in progress.

The cinema made a profit during the year of £673. This includes drinks sales, ice creams, pizzas and ticket sales. I note that the last two films have been well attended, showing a good profit. Our thanks go to Karen and her team for the film selection and for organising the cinema bar and pizzas, together with our thanks to Lorraine Brooks for producing the posters.

The VHMC is looking into replacing the curtains for the main hall as these were fitted in the year 2000 and are beginning to show signs of age.

I must thank the whole of the Village Hall Management Committee for their diligent and excellent work throughout the year. The Management Committee now comprises 5 people, with all the Committee tackling at least two jobs. It would benefit the Village if we had some new members of the VHMC to assist with the workload and, in that respect, I am looking for volunteers.

Peter will speak later about the year's accounts. He has steered us through another difficult year and I hope, when you read his presentation, you will understand a bit more about the Hall's finances.

During the year we received several complaints about noise emitting from the Village Hall during some of the parties held. To act in good conscience and respect for our neighbours, a sound limiter has been installed within the Village Hall and hopefully there will be no further complaints about noise emitting from the Village Hall.

Although I am no gardener myself, I am always very pleased to see the results of the Village Hall Gardening parties and huge thanks from the Committee to those who take part.

We also have the benefit of the Village Lunches which run twice a year, and which rely on several ladies, and some gentlemen, to assist with the production and delivery of the food and the setting out of tables and chairs. The lunches raised £6183 and some of these funds have been used to purchase two new under-counter fridges for the kitchen.

Our thanks go to them and their contribution to the well-being of the Village Hall finances is very important.

Our thanks go to Amy and her team for their contribution to the cleaning and well-being of the Hall. The time spent keeping the Village Hall ship-shape is very important to the Committee and its many users of the Village Hall to enjoy clean and tidy premises.

We continue to liaise with funders and are cautiously optimistic that we should be able to achieve a significant grant from the National Lottery towards our goal.

TREASURER'S REPORT

The results for the year ending 31.12.2023 show total receipts of £46,267 and expenditure of £32,846 (including £1895 depreciation), giving a surplus of £13,421. Balance sheet items are as follows:

The very satisfactory surplus for 2023 was greatly enhanced by the fund raising activities and donations in aid of the roof replacement, which together contributed £10,686. The cinema and Village Lunches also made healthy contributions, for which we are very grateful. Bookings for the Hall were also good, although 2 regular hirers have ceased.

With regard to expenditure, costs were in line with expectations. The hall does need regular maintenance, and this is reflected in the amount of £4280 spent during the year.

Finally, it should be noted that the hall building and land (which are very significant village assets) do not show in these accounts, as they are owned by the Parish Council but leased and managed on their behalf by the VVHMC.

The VHMC were re-elected: Chairman Iain Wright, Treasurer Peter Mann, Secretary Christine Thompson, Committee Nick Moriarty and Dawn Harris.

KENNETH GEORGE WILLINGALE

(June 1926 - January 2024)

Ken, as he was known to most, was born in Loughton, Essex, the child of Harold and Nellie and brother to Alan, Jean and Margaret.

Even as an infant Ken was more than useful at English and Maths. He went to Beale school for boys and also played cricket for Ilford boys. In 1939 Ken and Alan were evacuated to Ipswich and this is where they first went to the cinema to see a George Formby film; their father was not in favour of this form of entertainment but they went to the flicks many more times. This period of time is known as the 'Phoney war', so their mother brought them home.

The Beale School evacuated Ken again to Kennylands Camp in Buckinghamshire. He was in charge of the pigsty there when King George VI and the Queen visited and they

shook his hand; it was a moment of fame as the occasion was recorded on newsreel and he had his picture in the Daily Mirror.

His first job was as a cub reporter for the Daily Express, but he did not like the hours and lifestyle so he became a messenger for an American merchant bank in the City of London. He was to stay there for 40 years, albeit with one authorised break to do his duty and join the Royal Navy.

Ken moved down to Portsmouth and the Navy recognised he was capable in English and Maths; after initial training he went to Scarborough to be trained as a signaller. He majored in Morse Code, Semaphore and the Aldiss Lamp. From there he went to the Isle of Man where he learned the new techniques of Sonar and Radar before starting his active service on a Corvette, HMS Dahlia.

6th June 1944 is an important date in the annals of world history. HMS Dahlia was on escort duty but received orders they were to patrol off the Omaha landing beach where the Americans had incurred high casualties. That event increased Ken's Christian faith as he saw the effects of man's inhumanity to man.



The following year he was posted to Ceylon, Sri Lanka as it is now, as one of the personal signallers to Commander Louis Mountbatten. He then served in Burma and Malaysia and in Singapore where he became as motorcycle despatch rider.

Eventually he received his de-mob orders and returned to the bank. Here he was promoted and more importantly found the love of his life, Olive Emery, and they were married in June 1950. They lived in south Woodford and along came Andrew in July 1953 and Malcolm in April 1956. Ken supported the British Legion, he played cricket for Woodford Green and volunteered to raise funds for anew charity called Oxfam. He gained more promotion at the bank and journeyed abroad to gain new banking customers.

In 1966 while attending the Ideal Home Exhibition Ken and Olive bought a new build house in Willow Grove, Nayland. This was the start of their long dedication to community life in the village.

They both took up golf and were founder members of Stokeby-Nayland Club. Ken also played cricket for Tendring Park CC.

They arrived in Nayland at a time of great change and expansion

and a requirement for greater recreational facilities and amenities. Ken and Olive supported this enthusiastically with Ken being appointed Treasurer of a Steering Group (which became the Community Council) to take forward the project of providing a recreation ground and village hall for the community; this was achieved when the hall opened in 1972. As founder member and long-standing President Ken remained a valued part of the Community Council until his death in January.

They moved a short distance to live in Fen Street. Ken became a director of his bank, Singer & Friedlander, where he was in charge of staff as it was his forte to help and look after people.

Over the years Ken and Olive contributed to many village groups. Ken did a stint as

Chairman of the Parish Council and became a Lay Reader of St James Church. They were both members of the Royal British

Legion, later being honoured as Presidents of the RBL and the Women's Section. While Olive was the force behind, and eventual President of the Horticultural Society, Ken gave his support and enjoyed entering the annual Flower Show with his baking.

In 1982 the bank was taken over and Ken was fortunate to retire after 40 years service.

Shortly after that they moved to Church Mews and also bought a small apartment in southern Spain where they could spend the winter in a warmer place. They became grandparents with the births of Chloe and Sam.

Expert bakers both - Ken and Olive Willingale took first prize in the men's and to be outputed a Debareh and women's fruit cake classes

honoured to be awarded a Babergh and women's fruit cake classes Achievement Award recognising community heroes; the citation described "the list of organisations who have benefited from their commitment is endless and many of the things we take for granted in our village owe their existence, in part, to their work."

Sadly Olive passed away in 2011 but Ken coped very well and even went cruising on his own; his last being a round the world cruise, which lasted three months. He continued his independence and it was only on reaching 97 years of age last June that he finally gave up driving.

Ken left his mark on Nayland and will be fondly remembered by many. He will be greatly missed by his family including his great-grandchildren, Finn, Allegra and Arthur, but they will find inspiration and comfort that he had a life well lived.

MORE ABOUT OTTERS

It was interesting to read in the February Community Times about the otter spraints recently seen on the fallen willow by the culvert on Nayland meadow. Some people have been lucky enough to see these fascinating animals along the river in Nayland but having lived here for over fifty years I have still not managed to catch even a glimpse of any.I think I will have to take an evening stroll in the hope of seeing one as otters are secretive animals and are more likely to be seen at dusk.

Ambrose Waller writing in his book *The Suffolk Stour* in 1957 said that at that time otters were still fairly common on the Stour and recalled that the Eastern Counties Otter Hounds had occasional meets at various places on the river. From that time, however, otters were in decline, due to hunting and the destruction of their

riverside habitat, pollution and diminishing fish stocks. In 1971 the Otter Trust was established at Earsham near Bungay, Suffolk, to encourage the conservation of otters throughout the world but with particular emphasis on the British Otter. It opened to the public in 1976 and during a visit there in the eighties I was pleased to see otters for the first time living in a completely safe environment. They were part of an extensive breeding programme carried out on behalf of the then Nature Conservancy Council which was very successful, the 117th otter being released into the wild in 1999. The programme was then scaled back and the centre was closed to the public in 2006 but still exists. Work also goes on locally to encourage the return of otters to the Stour Valley and there have been many sightings in recent years.

Readers might be as shocked as I was to see this disturbing photograph of Frederick Lucas who was the landlord of the White Hart in the 1920s. He is in the middle of the group and if you look closely you will see that the men either side of him are each holding a dead otter. I understand from Mr Lucas's



grandson that these otters were caught in the river behind the White Hart. Since otter hunting was outlawed in 1978, and under the 1981 Wildlife and Countryside Act it was made an offence for otters to be killed, injured or disturbed or to obstruct their access to places of shelter or protection, we shall never see anything like this again.

YET ANOTHER ANNIVERSARY!

There are several anniversaries to celebrate in Nayland this year and one which should not be missed is that of the first known archaeological dig of Court Knoll which took place 100 years ago in 1924. Major Dick, who lived in Little Horkesley, was the first local history enthusiast on record to discover Roman materials in the remains of what was believed to be manorial buildings on the site. It has taken a very long time for the Major's discoveries to be investigated further but with modern technology, local enthusiasm and cooperation with professionals in recent years much more is now known.

REMEMBERING Lt Charles Francis Gumm Jnr.



On the 80th anniversary of the death of this heroic A m e r i c a n fighter pilot the Royal British



Legion remembered the gallantry and ultimate sacrifice made by Lieutenant Charles "Chuck" Gumm Jr. They held a short ceremony at the War Memorial and adjacent memorial bench to recall the event, lay a wreath and present and lower their Standard followed by a 2 minute silence.

For those who are not aware....on 1st March 1944 Lt Gumm's career ended unexpectedly. The P-51 Mustang he was flying on a cross-country flight to Goxhill lost power at 800 feet shortly after becoming airborne from Boxted Airfield. He realised he was over the built up area of Nayland and that if he bailed out to save himself his plane would crash into the village and claim innocent lives. He decided to remain with his plane to steer it away from the village and attempt a forced landing but it crash landed into a tree on the banks of the river Stour near Court Knoll and claimed his life when he was thrown from the cockpit and killed instantly.

The Charles Gumm memorial bench was installed next to Nayland War Memorial in 2001. He was just 23 years of age when he died, leaving a wife Muriel and 10 month old daughter Toni.

Lt Gumm is buried in his hometown of Spokane, Washington. He received the air medal and three oak leaf clusters and was awarded, posthumously, the silver star, the soldiers medal and distinguished flying cross for gallantry in action. He was the leading ace for his squadron with 7.5 victories to his credit.
NAYLAND WEATHER SUMMARY: January & February 2024 by David Lowe

January started and finished mild and wet, but had a cooler two weeks from the 5th, culminating in five days with mean temperatures close to, and in one case below, freezing. Shallow residual flood water permitted ice skating in the valley in the 18th and 19th, a rare occurrence at all in recent times – and rarer still on two consecutive days. However, this was only possible because of the persistence and extreme shallowness of the flood water – a few inches – the ground close beneath giving considerable support to the ice.

Mean temperature was 5.5° C (4.46) with a high of 14° C (12.74) and minimum of -4.4° C (-4.3). There was one day with a mean temp sub-zero (2.53). There were six days with air frost (9.8) thirteen with ground frost (14.47) and eighteen with grass frost.

There were six days with a max of less than 5° C (9.13) and eighteen less than 10° C (23.67). So, overall, not a cold month.

Bright sun hours were 75.2 (66.26) solar energy 2040 Ly (1833.33) and evapotranspiration 24.8 mm (16.07) a record, probably down to the high average wind speed.

Monthly rainfall was 57.6 mm (49.89) with highest daily rainfall 17.8 mm (11.03). Highest rainfall rate was 19 mm (38.2). There were 3 days with over 10 mm (1.2) equal record and none over 20 mm (there never has been in January over the 16 year record period).

Average wind strength was 6.6 mph (4.53) only beaten in 2018, with highest gust at 63 mph on the 2nd, against an average of 38.5. No. of days when 30 mph or more was reached, was 7 (4.87) 35 mph, 6 (1.87) and over 40 mph, 4 (0.53). The over

35 mph and over 40 mph figures are both records. The dominant wind direction was WSW.

February was a record for both warmth and wet. The mean temperature was 8.8 $^{\circ}$ C (5.42) 1.6 $^{\circ}$ C higher than the previous record of 2022. Rainfall was 99.2 mm (45.82) more than double the average and 22mm more than the next highest.

The cause was low pressure areas surging into the UK from the Atlantic pretty much un-interrupted, with the normal 'channel' north of Norway generally blocked, and the absence of any high pressure area keeping them at bay.

The highest temperature was $16.1 \,^{\circ}$ C (14.42) not, in fact, a record and the lowest, $-1.3 \,^{\circ}$ C (-3.16). The lowest maximum was 7.9 $\,^{\circ}$ C (3.25) which was a record. There were only 2 air frosts (6.44), 3 ground (10.56) and 7 grass.

There were no days with a maximum of less than 5 $^{\circ}$ C (5.56) five of less than 10 $^{\circ}$ C (16.81) and twenty-seven of less than 15 $^{\circ}$ C (27.62).

Bright sun hours were 117 (119.34) solar energy was 3080 Ly (3242.81) and evapotranspiration 27.5 mm (25.71).

The record monthly rainfall of 99.2 mm featured a high rainfall rate of 46.2 mm (29.99) and a record three days of over 10 mm (0.81). Over the 16 year record period, there has never been a day of 20 mm or more.

Average wind strength was 5.9 mph (5.22) and highest gust 38 mph (38.75). The highest day average was 13.5 mph (11.61). There were 4 days over 30 mph (4.19) 2 over 35 mph (2.12) and o over 40 mph (0.94). The dominant direction was WSW.

SEEN IN NAYLAND – BE ON THE LOOKOUT **ASIAN HORNET** (Vespa velutina)

It's a highly effective predator of insects, including honey bees and other beneficial species, which can cause significant losses to bee colonies, and potentially other native species. The Asian hornet is active mainly between April and November peaking during August/September. May be seen on flowering plants, around beehives, around rotting / fermenting fruit and protein. Nests are usually high in trees or man-made structures, sometimes closer to the ground, pear shaped up to 60x80cm. The entrances are on the sides (*European hornets have an entrance at the base*). Do not disturb or provoke a hornet's nest, check from a safe distance before reporting. They have poisonous venoms which can be painful if stung; human life is usually only threatened by multiple stings, or anaphylactic shock.

Following a riotous and tuneful 'Christmas Carol' Village Players' BOYCE • HANDEL • BACH post-production party in December 1991, I was persuaded to set up a women's choir in Nayland.

> With the first rehearsal on 9th January, 1992 and quickly named 'Tapestry', rehearsals were in members' homes until the November when we arrived at the Church Hall (which I noted at the time had an acoustic resembling St Mark's Venice). Tapestry then sang Heinrich Schutz 'A Christmas Story' at St James Church. Fulfilling twelve public engagements during the

two years and raising funds for causes and charities within and outside the village, Tapestry's repertoire ranged from Music Hall to madrigals, Palestrina and Purcell and included a recital at Holy Trinity, Long Melford. We were even featured on Anglia TV when they visited Nayland. I particularly loved the performance of 'The Lady of Shalott' (set for two sopranos and alto by Armstrong-Gibbs) at Wiston Mill, with a beautiful accompaniment from Emma (Bishton, of course!) on keyboard and viola, Jayne Kennedy (flute) and Jeremy Hughes (cello). Absolutely the right setting and the right sound. Then - our former vicar, the Rev David Stranack asked if I could teach 'Something in which we could all take part' - that meant adding Tenor and Basses to the sound.

Tapestry had given me the confidence - so from January 1994, Nayland Choir started rehearsing Vivaldi's 'Gloria' in the Church Hall where I played a recording of the work. Some fifty people had turned up, were not deterred and so we clearly had to find larger premises. By kind permission of the Easts, Nayland Choir was fortunate to relocate to the Old Chapel on



Palm Sunday, 27th March 1994 saw a full afternoon rehearsal followed by the concert. The church was packed and it was a joy to hear the (then) Nayland Orchestra perform works by Boyce, Handel and Bach. Following the interval, the singers rose to their feet. The sense of energy was palpable and I thought 'Here we go!' The first choral piece was the solemnly beautiful 'O Sacred Head' from Bach's St Matthew Passion. A serious tone had been struck. But then came the introduction to 'Gloria' from Vivaldi with its bright trumpets tootling along, and away we went. It was quite wonderful to hear the confident, open singing that evening. When we reached the end, Rev Stranack asked if we could sing the final chorus, 'Cum Sancto Spiritu' (a rousing fugue) a second time - which we did with even more enthusiasm. Being a 'one off' no costs venture, the concert raised £515, shared between Nayland Primary School and Parker's Way.

Tapestry and Nayland Choir came about because everyone wanted to sing and there was enormous support from the singers and community. I was very privileged to be in the right place at the right time; having attended a girls' school (where I'd gleaned almost all the Tapestry music) and to have had a lot of choir experience as a music student and singing locally helped too. Sharing conducting responsibilities with Jeremy and Trevor

Hoskins, I conducted in Nayland on and off from 1992 till 1999. Alas, my singing days are over but the Choir has invited me to conduct 'something Shakespeare-themed' at their Summer Concert 2024.1 am delighted to be asked and am scouting already.

Nayland Choir now flourishes under the inestimable baton of Emma from whom much terrific music flows. I know the Choir will continue to delight us all in the years ahead and would like to wish everyone many crochets and quavers, even if they're not necessarily in the right order at rehearsals. Bonne chance!
