

#### NAYLAND WITH WISSINGTON PARISH COUNCIL

#### Notes by observer of the meeting: 9th October 2024

(Minutes will be available on PC notice board in the High Street or https://naylandwithwissington-pc.gov.uk after the next meeting)

Gerry Battye chaired the meeting.

#### **PUBLIC FORUM**

Lorraine Brooks asked whether online access to PC Minutes could be restored going back to 2005. It was agreed to upload 10 years of PC minutes on the PC's new website and make it clear how to request copies from further back.

#### **DISTICT COUNCILLOR**

Isabelle Reece enquired whether the planting plan for the old bus stop had been completed as she was looking to agree a sum from the Locality Budget. She has been pursuing the cemetery wall matter but had not got as far as she would have liked and is awaiting a response. She is trying to get Public Realm to say whether the pavement weeds schedule next year will be more effectively scheduled than this year's. The proposed new refuse collection issue is growing; Isabelle welcomes residents' views; contact <u>Isabelle.Reece @babergh.gov.uk</u>

#### **HIGHWAYS**

James Finch is chasing the issues on the A134 including the reflective bollards and condition of the traffic islands. Babergh will be asked to book a mechanical sweep on and around the traffic islands. Councillors agreed to express concerns to SC Highways regarding their inadequate response and unsightly appearance of the A134 in relation to these matters which fall short of the requirements in an AONB.

#### **FINANCE**

Councillors agreed to contribute 50% of the cost of a new defibrillator for Wiston from PC CIL funds – in the region of £1300. The Clerk is to write to nearby homeowner regarding the proposed siting of the defibrillator. The date for the Finance Sub Committee meeting will be 27th November.

Gerry Battye confirmed progress was being made regarding establishing the PC's commitment to the Model Publication Scheme (Freedom of Information).

#### **PLANNING**

Councillors heard that Babergh had no objections for works to trees at **The White House 16 Church Lane** [DC/24/03666] to reduce T1 Hazel by 3ft-4 ft, prune sides to maintain balanced and natural shape; at **9 Court Street** [DC/24/03707] to reduce a Tulip tree to previous pollard points; at **39 Fen Street** [DC/24/03976] to fell a Walnut tree T3 to stop crowding of old apple tree and to replace it with a heritage damson fruit tree; at **The Cartlodge Lower Courtwood 13A Court Street** [DC/24/03706] to crown lift an Oak tree T2 with a TPO by 1-2m and remove deadwood and thin crown.

Planning Permission was granted at **Hill Farm Business Centre Harpers Hill** [*DC/24/03661*] for 6 separate secure storage spaces subject to conditions including landscaping, operating times, loading stipulation and construction hours.

Regarding an application at **2 Gravel Hill** [DC/24/03691] for erection of double carport/machinery store councillors had concerns whether neighbours were being consulted, that the required statutory notice is not displayed and incorrect information on the plans. They suggest consideration is given to the scale of the building in relation to neighbour amenity.

Councillors discussed an application at **11 High Street** [DC/24/04395] listed building consent for retention of pub sign bracket (without the sign). Councillors were reminded that a condition of the Appeal to reinstate the sign and bracket at the former White Hart. Whilst some councillors were sympathetic to this argument, it was resolved on a casting vote not to object subject to full consultation with the Heritage Team.

Councillors will look at a recent listed building application at **5 High Street** [DC/24/04420] for replacement/alteration of windows and external doors, new roof lights, internal and external alterations to rear extensions including replacement roof and render finish to rear lounge.

A date will be arranged for councillors to view the Webinar recordings of planning training sessions. It was agreed that

Councillors are free to chat on WhatsApp, however, any official communication should be confirmed via email.

#### PROPOSED CHANGES TO REFUSE COLLECTIONS

The changes proposed are a central government requirement for uniformity across the country. Babergh have adopted the new weekly collection of food waste and 3 weekly collections in rotation of; general household waste (black bin), paper/card (new green bin) and plastic/tins/glass (blue bin).

The move to three-weekly general waste collection is not part of the legislation but Babergh are currently proposing this.

Concerns have been expressed about the 3 weekly frequency; the PC will not make a comment at this stage.

#### **RECREATION AND OPEN SPACES**

There were no objections in principle for Woodland Corner to erect their own sign discouraging people from driving all the way around the corner to their entrance. This would be subject to the PC approving the position and size.

The potential design of a planting scheme for the old bus shelter green area at the entrance to Heycroft Way/Harpers Estate had been considered and the consensus seemed to be to keep it simple for the District Council to maintain. Councillors will look at the site for further discussion.

Tendring Hall Estates asked the PC for suggestions regarding potential future use for the old scout hut. It has some historical significance and on the local list. Tendring Estate do not wish to maintain it; there is only footpath access; a dwelling is to be built in front of the hut; it's in need of repair. This would be raised at the Community Council meeting and in the Community Times. **VILLAGE HALL** 

The grant application with the National Lottery is proceeding made and tenders for the replacement roof are being sought.

A site meeting with the PC's grounds maintenance contractors will be held to obtain quotes for tree work on Webb's Meadow and maintenance of the Burial Ground.

#### **IN BRIEF**

It was confirmed that all but one allotment rent was received for last year; the current year rents have just been requested. There are two half allotments to be reallocated to people on the waiting list.

Owen Brown arranged a polite notice requesting that glass and breakable vases are not left on graves.

Laura Erith chaired the meeting. Kevin Sheath was co-opted onto the Council.

#### **PUBLIC FORUM**

Following an update from Matthew Lee (Suffolk CC) for the Community Times Lorraine Brooks said the Environment Agency are dragging their heels processing a permit to enable the reduction by cutting of the wall of reeds along Caley Green; she asked the PC if they would express their concern to the EA over the delay in processing the permit for this work.

A representative of the Lady Anne Windsor Charity, which provides almhouses for local people, is hoping to move a local project forward with collaboration of Leavenheath and Nayland councillors; Tricia Fuller who had experience with past Nayland projects agreed to assist.

#### **DISTRICT COUNCILLOR**

Isabelle Reece said she has been pursuing repair of the cemetery wall but has encountered queries where the responsibility lies. Debbie Hattrell said she is looking through PC archives for proof it lies with Babergh, however, for many years Babergh have taken responsibility which seems to indicate they are responsible.

Debbie Hattrell said the PC would finalise proposals at this meeting for land around the old bus shelter at Harpers Estate/ Heycroft Way junction to submit an application for funds from the locality budget and the PC's finance committee will meet on 27<sup>th</sup> November and will then be in a position to apply to her for funds if they have any other projects proposed. Isabelle explained that applications for funds from her locality budget are no longer items specific.

Councillors asked her to chase the mechanical sweep of the by-pass islands to help prevent the return of weed growth.

Isabelle welcomes residents' views on the new refuse collection proposals; further details on page 7 & 39.

#### **HIGHWAYS**

James Finch was pleased to report that reflective bollards on the A134 traffic islands have been installed to replace the old units; a mechanical sweep by Babergh is awaited.

The PC had received an enquiry regarding a cycle/pedestrian pathway alongside the A134 from Horkesley Road to Park Road, and a possible crossing at Water lane. It was pointed out this would be a matter for Essex Highways.

#### **FINANCE**

The date for the Finance Sub Committee meeting will be 27th November.

Laura Erith had met with the Council's grounds maintenance contractor to determine work required and budgeting for the year ahead. This included: that considerable work was necessary to hedges and trees at Pop's Piece to bring them under control for easier maintenance in the future; overhanging vegetation needed taking back on the allotment field, tree work on the boundary of Webb's Meadow was required, maintenance along Candy Lane; continuing the usual regime at the Burial Ground; fencing on Fairfield Playpark.

#### **FAIRFIELD DRIVE & PARKING**

Councillors are concerned that the construction traffic for the new dwelling to be built near the turning circle will cause problems to this already congested area and potentially damage the recently patched up driveway. The rights for additional or change of use was questioned; Gerry Battye suggested that when the Roley Estate gifted the land to the Parish they probably retained

a right of way to the old scout hut. The Clerk will advise the Diocese's surveyor of the situation as they own the drive (with shared responsibility of Nayland House and the PC). It was agreed any plans for resurfacing the drive should be delayed until construction of the dwelling is completed.

Woodland Corner (WC) have expressed concerns regarding parking for access to their facility; they put forward a suggestion that current two parking bays beyond the Playpark are extended up to the turning circle. Councillors are concerned for safety and maintaining the charitable aims of Fairfield which is recreation. It was suggested the expensive idea would do very little to relieve congestion in Bear Street and more spaces will invite more traffic to the drive and junction; it is not the PCs responsibility to provide or fund parking for WC or the school; the school should provide their own parking; have they considered using their own side of the drive.

#### **PLÁNNING**

Councillors heard that Babergh had no objections at **72 - 78 Bear Street** [*DC/24/03739*] listed building consent for erection of single storey rear extension (following part demolition of conservatory), including glazed link between house and garage, new garage roof and part conversion of garage into additional living accommodation and internal alterations; at **The Coach House 86 Bear Street** [*DC/24/04477*] for non-material amendment relating to *DC/23/04127* for a new French door to replace an existing window, to extend the patio area and revise the patio steps; at **39 Fen Street** [*DC/24/03976*] for tree works to fell a Walnut tree (T3) to stop crowding of old apple tree and to replace it with a heritage damson fruit tree; and at **Smokey Farm Campions Hill** [*DC/24/04778 & 80*] for discharge of conditions relating to *DC/24/02437 - 4* biodiversity enhancement strategy and 6 manure management.

Between meetings councillors had no objections to listed building consent at **5 High Street** [DC/24/04420] LBC for replacement/alteration of windows and external doors, new roof lights, internal and external alterations to rear extensions including replacement roof and render finish to rear lounge subject to thorough consideration by the Heritage Team and by stipulating appropriate conditions. Materials should be sympathetic, and colours appropriately selected. Windows and Door need to be appropriate, blending with elevations and linking old with new. The Heritage Officer must be convinced that internal wall alterations does not detrimentally affect the heritage assets of the house.

Discussing a recent listed building application at **16 Court Street** [DC/24/04752] for works to form WC on first floor as detailed in the heritage design and access statement councillors had no objections providing the Heritage Officer is content with the proposed studwork.

Councillors will meet on19th November to view the Webinar recordings of planning training sessions.

It was agreed that plans for land around the old bus shelter at Harpers Estate/Heycroft Way junction should be kept simple and future maintenance responsibility left with Babergh. The Clerk will put forward to Isabelle Reece and Babergh the proposal that the weeds around the edge of the site are removed and the area grassed and ask Babergh for the commitment to mow the site on a regular basis. Some maintenance to the bus shelter is required; Dawn Harris will investigate potential costs.

The parish tree risk assessment (excluding Suffolk CC's responsibility on Caley Green and Horkesley Road) usually takes place in spring with a councillor, tree warden and tree surgeon present.

#### **OLD SCOUT HUT**

Tendring Hall Estates asked the PC for suggestions regarding potential future use by the community for the old scout hut adjacent the burial ground. It has some historical significance and on the local list. Tendring Estate do not wish to maintain it; there is only footpath access; it's in need of repair; a dwelling is to be built in front of the hut. This would be promoted in the Community Times – see page 11.

#### IN BRIEF

There are 3 allotment vacancies which will be allocated to those on the waiting list; one in a poor condition with fencing missing will be offered to the third person on the waiting list if they require it "as it is" rent free fior the first year.

Owen Brown confirmed notices requesting that glass and breakable vases are not left on graves are in place.

Owen Brown explained that our Footpath Warden wishes to step down by May. While much of the reporting of problems is now done online there are aspects of the job that would benefit by having a warden. A vacancy for the role will be promoted in the CT; see page 2

At Babergh District's Full Council Meeting in September we were asked to endorse the Cabinet's chosen new recycling and waste collection scheme. The scheme will see the introduction of two additional outside bins per household – and an indoor 'food waste' caddy - and a reduction in the frequency that black bins are emptied, to only once every three weeks instead of every other week.

At the meeting, together with my Group colleagues Cllrs Paul Clover, Margaret Maybury and Brian Riley, I questioned the administration leaders on financial costs and lack of logistical detail as well as the effect the new scheme would have on residents. We spoke and voted against the motion.

Rachel Hitchcock welcomed members to the meeting.

**Executive Committee:** As always we welcome new members to join the team – please spread an encouraging word to anyone who may be interested in joining us. It is an enjoyable friendly village committee that provides positive events and facilities for the community. **Fundraising Activities/Events:** As always future ideas and support are welcome.

**Community Defibrillator (AED):** AEDs are located at the Village Hall and at the Fire Station. The AED at the Village Hall is managed by the CC and regularly checked. The AED at the Fire Station is being serviced and currently not in situ.

Regarding the proposed public access AED in Wiston. Community Heartbeat Trust (CHT) confirmed a defibrillator could operate without a power supply. The cost would be in the region of £2,600; the PC have agreed to contribute 50% of the cost (approx £1,300) via CIL (Community Infrastructure Levy) funding. A location by the Parish Council noticeboard in Wiston is being considered; the PC are writing to a nearby householder to advise of the proposal. We are awaiting confirmation on the status of the AED at the Fire Station (whether it is registered with the Ambulance Service) prior to finalising a location for one at Wiston.

**Online Ticketing Facility:** NaylandEvents.org – This is extremely useful for selling tickets to village events. If village organisations wish to use this facility to sell tickets for their events contact Justin Dowding at jpdowding@gmail.com.

**Village Hall Gardening Morning:** The autumn gardening session was on 26th October; there were a good number of volunteers helping but a CC member was unable to attend.

**Community Involvement:** Ideas to help raise participation in village groups and events are welcome. 'Volunteer Vacancies' is an item included in the Community Times; please let Lorraine know if you have vacancies, along with an idea of the level of commitment needed.

It would be helpful if everyone, when they see promotions for Nayland events on Facebook, could make a comment (however brief) and not just click on 'like' which is no help. All village groups would benefit from the additional publicity.

Plaque to mark the contribution of Ken Willingale: Members had agreed a plaque to commemorate the contribution of Ken Willingale to the CC and for this to incorporate an existing tribute of his wife Olive in the HortSoc section of the village hall garden. A slate plaque will have the wording: "Ken Willingale, Community Council Treasurer, Chairman and President 1966-2024 and Olive Willingale, Horticultural Society Secretary & President 1980-2011. Commemorating their many contributions to the village". Tony Fryer will engrave the plaque. This was agreed in principal at the September meeting; a quote has been requested.

**TREASURER'S REPORT:** Matt Cable gave his report on finances to 30th October.

**Breakdown of profits:** Community Times £543, Calendar £134, Quiz £664.20, profit recognised for Bonfire night so far £689. **Grants paid:** Nayland Village Choir £1,500, Nayland School Choir £400, Baby & Toddler Group £300.

**Expenses:** £974 for water gauge at Caley Green, £180 for permissive path mowing (along Stoke Rd), £270 for hall hire, £94 for web hosting, £198 for annual defibrillator maintenance, £633 for insurance, £119 for post office closure event.

**Current Position:** The accounts show reserves of £25,208.99 represented by Deposit a/c £11,748.13, Current a/c £10,738.62, Stripe a/c £1,472.92, Cash in Hand £1,249.32. We hold £143.51

for the RBL Services Fund and grants are pending for: VH roof £10,000, Lizzie's Fund £153, VH coffee machine £280.

Therefore, unencumbered assets are £14,632.48.

#### **GRANTS & DONATIONS:**

Permissive footpath maintenance: Members previously agreed to maintain a popular stretch of path from Court Knoll to the allotments at a cost of £600; the work is due to be done by Daniel Bowman on 4th November with a volunteer from the Tendring Estate helping with the clearing up. Going forward, with regular maintenance, the cost would be less; Rachel will consider asking the Parish Council if they would be able to contribute to the future cost of vegetation management. There is a section of this path that is prone to flooding so possible solutions to make this more passable may be worth considering as well as whether any grants may be available. Matthew Hague of the Tendring Estate wanted to wait until the maintenance work had been completed before exploring that possibility. (As reported by the Conservation Society, they have arranged for another nearly permissive path to be cleared, also on 4th November.).

Nayland First Responders: Members previously agreed to cover the cost of hiring the village hall for a NFR fundraiser; Anthony Roberts has donated one of his 'Dickens' Christmas Carol' performances which will be held on 19th December. The cost for hire of the hall will be £155.

**Community Times & Websites:** Lorraine Brooks thanked all for contributing to recent issues, adding we are heading towards another deadline.

She said advertising income has reduced about a third from its 2015 all time high and printing expenses have risen. However the original aim of the CT was for communication, not profit.

**Village Calendar:** Lorraine Brooks said the the calendar project is currently £195 in profit, although £185 of that is income from the 2004 calendar, so the 2025 calendar is £10 in profit. 

#### THE OLD SCOUT HUT: A CONUNDRUM

The Parish Council has been approached by the land owner, concerning the future of this abandoned timbered 'Babergh (2004) Local List' structure.

As the Babergh site relates, it is thought that the 4m x 6m hut "was originally used by Miss Oates, (sister of Captain Lawrence Oates of Scott's ill-fated Antarctic expedition, 1910-12), as her studio/house for several years when her family home, Gestingthorpe Hall, was sold in 1946, until she moved to Liston a few years later. She offered the hut to Sudbury Scouts in the early 1950s".

It was members of our Nayland Scout group that dismantled it and re-erected it, at its current cramped and hidden site near the cemetery entrance. This pocket of wooded land, belongs to the Rowley Tendring Estate and is adjacent to the perpetual stream.

Of course, over time and since the closure of the Scout Troop, run over many years by the wonderful Macbeth family and boys' parents, its lack of use has led to

Nayland, we have seen the creation of our wonderful Village Hall, its major rebuilding around 2000 and its current re-roofing project. The excellent Church Hall has also seen major refurbishment. Both halls are used extensively by groups small and large. Sadly, the Old Scout Hut, now boarded up and overgrown was left behind, unfit for further community use

No services were installed. In addition, permission now exists for a house is to be built on the adjacent former allotment. There is no parking or wheeled access available for the hut, situated as it is, adjacent to the cemetery, on a much used


public footpath, with no lighting and no parking......

#### **WATER LEVELS**

Early autumn saw substantial rain followed by a dry spell but water levels have be fairly stable, although as seen here they dropped for a while in mid November.

There has been no real need to refer to the newly installed water level gauge at Caley Green but have a look next time you're passing. The gauge provides two water level readings: the river bed depth (useful for the school projects and locals) and the above sea level (for official recording) in line with the EA and river trusts.

So if you have any concerns they can be reported to the EA hotline and Lorraine would be pleased to be advised in order to keep a note of incidents (details as above).

#### WATER QUALITY & SEWAGE

There is currently no news on water quality and testing results.

#### REED & VEGETATION GROWTH

The situation with reeds around the Horseshoe weir (and other areas of the river through Nayland) remains disgraceful.

A nearby resident has once again contacted the EA requesting either work is carried out or consideration given to other options towards a solution. The EA are the riparian owners around the weir.

It's mostly about financial and manpower constraints, not as they often claim, in the interests of biodiversity. Reeds and other bully species thrive at the expense of biodiversity, as they squeeze the less robust species out.

It is unfortunate that a patch of nettles and shrub suckers near the weir is attracting some undesirable activity. Being near the portage points it's been providing river users with somewhere to relieve themselves (and they aren't bagging and binning it!). Some use it as an area to have a barbeque. There's probably no point in appealing for it not to be used in this way in the CT; the culprits probably don't live in the village.

#### WILDFOWL & SWANS

For those who may not know, the original Nayland cob swan (ring No F4GV) has an injured wing; advice sought recommended no action but to continue monitoring. He has been holding his own with his pen and was fine when checked on 17th November.

This pair and the new unringed pair have been toing and froing their territory; each moving from the river to the Meadow pond. This may well continue during the winter until it's time for them to mate, when they may get serious about claiming their space.

The pair here last spring failed to breed; hopefully, one way or another cygnets will be raised here in 2025.

#### NAVIGATION

The EA issued warnings on 12th November that large trees are restricting navigation in Nayland.

#### **CALEY GREEN**

The Friends continue to keep an eye on the Green and wildfowl. They empty the bins when necessary between Babergh collections. Caley Green has brought much enjoyment again this year especially to local families; as predicted the number of visitors has decreased over post-Covid years although some rivercraft users travel some way to access the river.

#### THE LONG REED BED

The long running saga regarding reduction of the enormous and expanding wall of reeds along Caley Green continues still! Suffolk County Council is very aware of the overwhelming desire of residents to have management of them undertaken. You may recall that the work was about to take place in February when a resident complained and work halted. SCC have the funds in place, a contractor ready to undertake the work; the delay is with the EA who are dragging their heels granting a permit.

The season whereby this work can be undertaken is rapidly passing. A letter will be sent to the EA asking them why this matter is not being dealt with for publication in the CT.

#### RIVERBANK PROTECTION UPDATE

Suffolk CC confirm they will fund and take forward installation of wooden revetment around the bay at Caley Green to protect it from future erosion, but have no update on the time-frame.

#### LITTER BY SLUICEGATES

Clearance of litter and flytipping on SCC's triangle of land adjacent to the sluice gates was reported to them in late 2022; clearance by their contractor is still awaited

#### FLYTIPPING: HARPERS HILL WILDLIFE SITE

It is astonishing that flytipping of garden waste continues to occur on the Harpers Hill county wildlife site. SCC and Babergh, at considerable cost to public funds, removed a huge amount of garden waste and grass mowing from the site recently. New deposits soon appeared; as this photo taken on 29th September shows.

It was amazing to hear what was involved, from design of the notes and coins, including the materials selection, to the construction of an entirely new Royal Mint and the politics involved in selecting a site and placating the Unions.

Officers for next year will be: President Andrew Gowen; Vice President John Partridge; Chairman Robert Dossor; Secretary Kathy Hunt; Treasurer and Membership Richard Cave; Poppy Appeal Organiser Mark Shirley; Standard Bearer Kathy Hunt, deputy David Wiles; Welfare Officer and Community Council representative Chris Hunt, David Slater.

The Chairman reported that the Branch had an active year with outings to Sudbury Silk Mills, Thorpe Abbotts 100th Bomb Group and 95th Bomb Group at Horham's Museums and Boxted Airfield Museum. Regular meetings had also been held with a wide variety of speakers. The meeting was reminded that 2025 was the 80th anniversary of the end of WW2 and thoughts should be given to how this would be celebrated. The Chairman thanked all the Branch officials for their work and Mark Shirley for organising

the Poppy Appeal. The total raised for this year is just over £3,000, which is lower than last year.

Remembrance was observed as usual, starting with the Coffee Morning on Saturday 2nd November, when over £300 was raised for the Poppy Appeal. The main event was held on Sunday 10th November at Nayland War Memorial with the usual Church Service, when a large crowd paid their respects to the fallen. Wreaths were laid by the Branch, Suffolk Fire & Rescue Service Nayland Station, the Community and Parish Councils, the First Responders' Group and a representative from the Boxted Airfield Historical Society.

Our programme for 2025 is not yet arranged, but meetings will be held in March, May, June, August and December. 2025 is the 80th anniversary of the end of WW2 with both VE and VJ Days to be commemorated, so the Branch will join with whatever other village events are organised. As always, everyone is welcome to our meetings in the Church Hall.

Moviola who provide us with the DVD and Licence are a not for profit organisation who were, like many other organisations, greatly affected by Covid. Restarting the business after Covid with a healthy bank balance meant that they were are to subsidise community cinemas, however the increase in costs to provide this service, film distributors increased returns, a hike in postal charges and a decrease in audience figures has had a huge impact on the business.

Moviola have pared down their costs as much as possible including the salaries for those who work for the organisation. They have done all they can and inevitably therefore this means an increase in costs to us. It is possible to obtain a DVD and Licence from other organisations but these have a minimum guarantee (Moviola's film distribution costs are a third of the box office takings) and we just cannot guarantee attendance to support this.

We currently don't have any plans to close the community cinema but we do need your support. We have so much more to offer than just the film so come along and give us a try. The food and wine are great and the atmosphere convivial. If however you don't fancy the film you can always come along and just have supper.

Our last film for the year is on Friday 13th (lucky for some) December simply titled 'Wilding' a review of this film is below. For all Archers fans this will be all too familiar.

- Friday 13th December: 'Wilding' (2023) is a documentary based on Isabella Tree's best-selling book of the same name. Having inherited Knepp Castle, a 3,500-acre estate in West Sussex, aristocratic farmer Charlie Burrell (Sir Charles Burrell) and his wife, Isabella made the decision in 2000 to turn the land over to an experimental rewilding project along the lines of an experiment being carried out in Holland. The film now follows the reclamation of the space by wildlife; fences were removed, they introduced red and fallow deer, pigs, cattle, storks, beavers and creatures that would have roamed the land freely a few hundred years ago.



#### Nayland with Wissington Crime Review 6/9/24 - 17/11/24:

As the nights draw in, criminals have longer periods of darkness to operate in. This unfortunately means burglaries are more likely to occur and these crimes can happen much earlier than in other parts of the year and can sometimes include homes. Early November saw a garage broken into in the Wissington area where a petrol mower and garden strimmer were stolen. Then, mid evening on the 11th November

two properties in Nayland on Harper's Estate have been entered, both via the back door and items stolen from within one of them. On the same date a vehicle was broken into near Bear Street and a handbag and contents stolen from within. With these incidents in mind, here are some tips for general crime prevention in relation to your garden and house perimeter:

- On your front door, have a door chain or door bar and viewer (spy hole)
- Front boundaries should be less than 1m high (Your neighbours and passers-by clearly should be able to see the front of your property).
- Rear boundaries should be 1.8m high with locked gates (to prevent easy rear access also remove climbing aids).
- Remove tools/bricks from the garden that could be used to force entry.
- · Always lock garages, sheds and outbuildings.
- Have dusk to dawn lighting at the front and back.
- · Always lock your doors with the key and keep your windows secure, even when you're at home. •
- Install an alarm/CCTV.
- · Leave lights on timers.
- Register your valuables at <u>www.immobilise.com</u> and mark your property with UV pen (I have these available at my monthly events)
   Avoid keeping cash at home
- Hide car keys. You can now buy TV light simulators as well, which flash lights as if there is a television on in your house, I
  would recommend one of those, they are around £10-15. Also the video doorbell that police now recommend is called a
  Defender Video Doorbell from defendersecurityproducts.co.uk and is £100, it has no subscription fee.

In addition to the crimes above there has only been one other crime reported within the crime review date range, which was a domestic assault report. Police have also dealt with a handful of incidents involving adults and children which resulted in safe-guarding referrals. There have not been any reports of anti-social behaviour. If you spot any suspicious vehicles or persons out and about make note of registrations and descriptions and call police if you feel they are up to no good, especially given recent burglaries in the area.


During the waste management session, we found out so many useful things such as which bins we should be using for different products and what happens when you put things in the wrong bin (contamination and incineration!)

We learnt about the types of materials that can be recycled


from home and which need to be taken to recycling centres.

#### NAYLAND WEATHER SUMMARY: September & October 2024 by David Lowe

**September** was a wet month – particularly the last week – with mean temperature a little over average. Rainfall was 77 mm (42.33) 3.3 mm short of the 2015 80.3 mm record. Totals of 15.0 mm on the 23rd, 7.6mm on 25th, 14.0 mm on 26th and 13.8 mm on 30th were significant. Highest rainfall rate was 56.8 mm per hr on 23rd. Lawns, which were looking brown at the end of August, were soon green again!

Once again, this above average rainfall was caused by slow-moving low pressure areas and fronts over the southern UK – rather than the norm, which is driving through fairly quickly, to the north

Mean temperature was  $15.6^{\circ}$ C (14.92) with highest max  $26.4^{\circ}$ C (26.15) and lowest min.  $3.1^{\circ}$ C (4.99). Lowest max was  $14.5^{\circ}$ C (14.99). There were 17 days over  $20^{\circ}$ C (12.41) with 1 over  $25^{\circ}$ C (2.18). There were 3 days when the temp failed to reach  $15^{\circ}$ C (1.35) and 13 when  $20^{\circ}$ C was not achieved (17.47). There were 2 grass frosts, which are uncommon in September.

Bright sun hours were 239.5 (244.22) and solar energy was 7600 Ly (7677.94). Evapotranspiration was 63.5 mm, giving a net moisture gain with the 77mm rainfall total. Only once before during the 17 year record period has there been 3 days or more with 10mm or more of rain.

Average wind speed was 5.1 mph (3.06) equal highest with 3 days over 30 mph (1.06) again equal highest. There were none over 35 mph. Highest gust was 34 mph (31.18).

**October** finished up pretty much as an average October, though it certainly didn't look as if it was going to at the halfway stage. Persistently anticyclonic dry weather resumed then – with the weather thus following the pattern of 2024 to date – either very wet or very dry.

Mean temperature was  $12.4^{\circ}$ C (11.78) with a high of  $20.09^{\circ}$ C and low of  $1.4^{\circ}$ C (1.92). The lowest max was  $11.2^{\circ}$ C (10.67). There were no days with less than  $10^{\circ}$ C as a max (1.06) and 7 with less than  $15^{\circ}$ C (12.65). There was only 1 day of  $20^{\circ}$ C (2.23). There were 2 grass frosts and 1 ground frost.

Bright sun hours were 165.5 (166.43) solar energy was 4475 Ly (4644.12) and evapotranspiration 31.8 mm (36.55).

Rainfall was 70 mm (67.31) with highest daily rainfall of 19.8 mm (16.55). Highest rainfall rate was 65 mm/hr (80.84). There were 2 days of over 10 mm (1.88)

Mean wind speed was 3.5 mph (3.44) with highest daily average of 6.1 mph (7.38). There was only 1 day with a gust over 30 mph (1.23). Predominant direction was SW.

#### CHANGES AT THE MILL

The Nayland Deli has become a hub of the village, a popular place to shop and meet for coffee, since it took over the mill in October 2022. It is the latest business there in a long list of occupants since the mill ceased functioning as a corn mill at the end of the 19th century. As well as industry and businesses of many kinds the mill has provided employment and services and even entertainment in the days before Nayland finally had a proper purpose-built village hall in 1969.

It is not known when milling started in Nayland but it was certainly before Domesday. In 1086 the entry for Nayland states: "At Eiland (Nayland)

the same Robert, father of Suane, held in King Edwards time two carucates of land as a manor with Soche. Always six villans. Then twenty bordars now seventeen. Then six slaves now two. .... Always one mill ...." Whether this mill was on the site of the existing one is unknown.

A conveyance dated 1823 refers to the "newly erected or re-edified capital water cornmill" which gives no clue as to the age of the former mill but an earlier deed in 1613 concerned a property "lying between the two mills in Nayland. The second mill was across the street near the corner of Mill Street and Bear Street until it was demolished around 1850. This one was sometimes referred to as a fulling mill, a leather mill or a corn mill so it could have been in use as far back as the 15th century when Nayland was prosperous with its woollen cloth trade. It is almost impossible to imagine how industrial and busy Mill Street must have been in those days.

At the end of the 18th century the two Nayland mills were owned by the Stammers family who were prosperous millers owning mills all over Essex and Suffolk. In 1846 Jeremiah Stannard who owned Wissington mill took over the current mill but by the end of the 19th century corn milling had ceased and the mill stood empty

From old photographs we can see the existing mill was a huge building which dominated the street with a gantry crossing the street to the millstream where barges came to collect the flour. The gantry and top storeys of the mill were taken down around 1920 and Bill Norfolk who was born in 1911 remembered watching the demolition. The mill had provided much employment and it was said a thousand sacks of flour were sent to London in a week.

After playing such an important part in the village the mill then took on a new life. In 1897 the mill was bought by a prosperous leather manufacturer from London called Carl Cette Bendixen. He and his family lived next door at Mill House but he died in 1915 and the plant and machinery were put up for auction. It seemed the mill had not proved to be suitable for the leather trade and

the business had mainly taken place at the old silk factory in Fen Street. Mr Bendixen owned several properties in Nayland and a further auction was held in 1919. The lots included the mill premises, Mill House which was let to Dr Jane Walker, the Factory in Fen Street (site of the flats) and Lock Cottage.

In 1924 after the sale of the mill and its partial dismantling the building became the Nayland Electric Light and Power House, set up by William Hindes, an enterprising retired grocer. He had previously owned the gas works in Newlands Lane since 1903 until it closed. He saw the power of the water running through the old mill and decided to set up the electricity company which provided power for the village until 1938 when the East Anglian Electric Light Company took over.

It was during the time when the mill was the Power House that it became a social centre for the village. Whist drives and other social events were held there and residents danced on a specially installed maple wood floor on the first floor. When the Power House closed it was purchased by the first Mr Kerridge for £180 at an auction sale in 1938. His wife was keen to provide activities for young people in Nayland and organised dancing classes there.

A few years later Mr Kerridge sold the mill to Ernie Douglas, landlord of the Queen's Head who used it for storage. During World War II when the mill was unoccupied there was a canteen upstairs which was sponsored by the YMCA. It was manned by several lady volunteers in the village who provided food and drinks for troops based in the local area.

A handwritten note on a 1950 sale catalogue for "Warehouse Premises" situated in The Street, Nayland, says the mill was sold for £680. The premises were stated to be "eminently suitable for storage or light factory purposes." The next owner was a Wivenhoe textile company, Gainsborough Products, who used it as a clothing factory providing local employment.

In 1978 the mill became home to an electrical business run by John Oakes on the lower floor and a popular self-service grocery shop upstairs. Later with new owners the shop moved downstairs and a well received café was incorporated into the shop but when the next owners retired the mill stood empty once again.

From 1999 the mill's new owners carried out major building works which included a new roof and an extra floor. The first floor became 2 flats and the top floor a penthouse while on the ground floor an antiques centre carried on for a time before becoming offices. An interiors business followed and then for a few years the popular Blue Owl ceramic painting, gifts and coffee enterprise provided a lot of enjoyment until it relocated to Great Horkesley. Another period of closure then led to the opening of the Nayland Deli in October 2022.

There can be no other building in Nayland which has served the village so well, giving employment, entertainment and essential services to the whole community. It almost became a cinema for a week in 1995 when it was given the outward appearance of one for the film called *The Affair* in which many residents took part.



## The Nayland Land Company have been named winners of the 2024 Robert Erith National Landscape Award.

The award is given out annually to the individual, group or organisation that has made an outstanding impact on the Dedham Vale National Landscape and Stour Valley.

It is named after Robert Erith BEM TD DL, the former Chairman of the Dedham Vale National Landscape and Stour Valley Partnership, a lifelong advocate for the special landscape.

Nayland Land Company was set up in March 2004 to hold ownership of a substantial field on the River Stour in Nayland which was purchased using public donations having been under threat from developers.

Since then, the Land Company has cared for the land, which sits adjacent to the river providing many benefits to the community in Navland.

The past two decades have seen the creation of a new permissive footpath, which has become one of the most popular walking routes in the village and is in the final stages of installing a wheelchair accessible surface.

The land has become a haven for wildlife thanks to several initiatives to increase biodiversity, such as the creation of a new pond in which otters and water vole have been sighted, laying new hedgerows, installing bird and bat boxes, and building stag beetle pyramids, in addition to sheep which graze in the meadow.

The Land Company has also created opportunities for local volunteers to help with projects, planted native trees alongside

the riverbank, installed information boards to educate walkers on some of the features in the land, as well as seating for the public overlooking delightful views across the field to the Stour.


Nayland Land Company said: "We are hugely honoured to win the Robert Erith National Landscape Award for 2024. Nayland Meadow is for the community and it has certainly established itself as a favourite walk. There is much to see on and around the meadow for all. This award is recognition of much hard work by many dedicated people over 20 years. Without the support we have had this would not have been possible. A big "thank you all". The award will be a great encouragement for the future."

Robert Erith said: "I am delighted that Martin Wright and his colleagues at the Nayland Land Company have won the award this year. They have done a superb job in maintaining and enhancing the beautiful meadows along the Stour which will be kept free of development in perpetuity."

#### NAYLAND MEADOW WILDLIFE MONITORING

This year we have begun monitoring the wildlife present on the meadow using camera traps. These cameras are triggered by Infra-Red motion sensors and record single photographs or video clips depending on the setting used. They are capable of operating during both day and night-time conditions. As a trial we placed one camera along the river margin facing a fallen log, and another at the edge of the pond. The cameras were in position for a few weeks this spring. Even though each camera covered only a few square metres of ground and water, we have been surprised by the abundance and variety of wildlife recorded. Pride of place for "Log Cam" were three video clips of otter. Although the log had previously been identified as an otter sprainting site (a place where they regularly deposit droppings), it was gratifying to get visual proof of otters using the river. Otters regularly move up and down the Stour, but their secretive nature and largely nocturnal existence means that they are seldom seen. Predictably, all three otter records were during the night when the risk of disturbance is lowest. Otters are superbly adapted to an aquatic life, with webbed feet and a strong, rudder-like tail for swimming, a dense, waterproof fur, and prominent bristles around the mouth to help detect prey in water with poor visibility.



Another species we were pleased to see was water vole (above). Like otters, water voles receive strict legal protection under the Wildlife and Countryside Act 1981. For water vole this means that it is an offence to damage or destroy a structure or place that voles use for shelter or protection, or disturb them in a place used for shelter or protection. Over recent decades water vole populations have been in very steep decline due to habitat loss and predation by the non-native American mink. Voles have no defence mechanism against the mink, which are small enough to enter water vole burrows and predate both adults and young. However, water voles are now making a comeback on many of our East Anglian rivers due to co-ordinated mink control by landowners and wildlife conservation organisations. More sympathetic river management has also helped, as this ensures there is adequate

shelter and an abundance of vegetation for voles to eat. Over the past year or two water voles have colonised the meadow side of the river and the connected pond as well as the section of the Stour bordering Caley Green. "Log Cam" also recorded moorhen, mallard, brown rat and house sparrow. The sparrows were observed collecting newly hatched river insects such as mayflies and caddis flies. Insects are an important component of the diet of sparrows in the summer, providing a nutrient rich food source for feeding the chicks whilst they are in the nest. Although both species can be found in wetland habitats, brown rats can easily be distinguished from water voles by their longer tail, more pointed snout and conspicuous ears (the ears of water vole are largely hidden within their fur). In the United Kingdom water voles almost exclusively occur in wetlands, though there are a few isolated populations, such as in Glasgow, where they live in purely terrestrial habitats.

"Pond Cam" also captured plenty of wildlife action. Water voles were repeatedly recorded swimming busily back and forth with a clockwork-like "doggy paddle" as they made trips to forage for vegetation in the interior of the pond. Moorhens and mallard, together with their young, were regular visitors too. Reed bunting was also captured by the camera. Reed buntings are a small sparrow-sized bird, with the males, in summer, having a black head, white collar and drooping moustache. In springtime, the males deliver their simple, repetitive song from reed stems or shrubs along the river. A surprise additional species caught on camera was water rail (photo below). This is a rarer relative of the moorhen, with spotted olive brown markings on the upper side, a blue-grey breast and long red bill. Water rails tend to be very secretive, skulking within reedbeds and river margins. This year we have been lucky to spot them in the Caley Green reedbed as well as the pond. Because they are so secretive, their presence is more usually made known by their calls, often described to be similar in sound to a piglet squealing.

### FORTNIGHTLY REFUSE COLLECTION TO **MOVE TO THREE-WEEKLY**

Every authority in the land has to adopt this legislation which was introduced by the Government and will see the standardisation of waste collections nationwide.

The legislation, through the Environment Act 2021, aims to make items collected for recycling consistent across England and Wales and improve national recycling rates.

Under the new legislation all local authorities in England must collect the same recyclable waste streams for recycling or composting from households. From 2026 the recyclable waste streams include paper and card, plastic, glass, metal, food waste, and garden waste.

It is claimed this additional recycling, combined with new weekly food waste collections, would have a significant positive impact on recycling rates. Food waste bins will be used for leftovers, meat, fish bones, tea bags, eggshells, fruit and vegetable peelings.

Councils state they will be sympathetic to those with exceptional needs on a case-by-case basis, such as those with larger families, with medical needs or without available space for the new bins.

Each household will have up to 5 bins on their doorsteps:

However, the move to collect black bins (general rubbish) from 2 weeks to 3 week collections is not legislation, it's a choice being adopted by Babergh.

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
