NAYLAND WITH WISSINGTON PARISH COUNCIL

Notes by observer of the meeting: 10th April 2024

Robin Thorogood chaired the meeting.

PUBLIC FORUM

Mike Hunter (Conservation Society) raised the issue of a public consultation on removal of restrictions on night flights at Stansted. He confirmed arrangements were in hand regarding the forthcoming spring litter pick on 20th April.

HIGHWAYS

Correspondence had been received regarding damage to a road sign at the bottom of Campions Hill which had been knocked by HGV; the pole has been reinstated but the sign is missing. The Chair agreed to investigate further.

The road sweep of the Bear Street cul-de-sac had been carried out very successfully with the double yellow lines now visible again.

Dawn Harris will be further discussing the issues on the by-pass central island - including weeds, surface dressing and the previously illuminated bollards - with James Finch.

PLANNING

Councillors heard that Babergh had no objections at 3 Gravel Hill [DC/24/00578] for replacement roofing and extensions.

A planning appeal had been raised, following Babergh's refusal for erection of a single-storey detached dwelling with carport and garage on land adjacent to Nayland Primary School, Bear Street (next to Burial Ground) - APP/D3505/W/24/3336897. [Babergh's original planning reference DC/22/05339]. Councillors agreed to submit an objection to this application Appeal.

Discussing recent applications at the **Doctors Surgery 93** Bear Street [DC/24/01508] for erection of single storey rear extension (for an office) councillors had no objections but it was agreed for the Clerk to contact the Surgery seeking their cooperation in relation to a complaint about their lighting.

A response to the Council's letter to the Chief Planning Officer regarding the site adjacent to Paddock Grove had been received; councillors had no comments.

The Clerk confirmed she has made enquiries with SALC (Suffolk Association of Local Councils) seeking information about training sessions on planning for the full Parish Council. **RECREATION AND OPEN SPACES**

A weed barrier and chippings have been installed around the Royal Memorial tree for ease of maintenance.

The Play Park Safety Inspection had been carried out; it considered the Play Park was in a well-kept condition, a matter of concern has been roped off and is being dealt with. Gerry Battye said it had been disappointing not to have met the inspector in person as arranged.

Dawn Harris agreed to liaise with Isabelle Reece in relation to a planting and maintenance scheme for the old bus shelter green space. In the meantime just mowing is required; this needs to be calrified with Babergh as they cut grassed areas on the Heights.

The bus shelter itself needs some maintenance; Dawn Harris will look into this and circulate details.

The PC expressed compliments and thanks to Bear, Fish and friends for a charming Easter display in the old bus shelter.

The wooden rail above the Caley Green culvert needs painting. The Clerk will contact SCC Properties to chase them regarding installation of the wooden revetment at Caley Green.

ALLOTMENTS

Some allotments are currently in a poor state of upkeep and cultivation, some rents remain outstanding; letters will be sent to tenants in this regard. There remain two names on the waiting list.

VILLAGE HALL MANAGEMENT COMMITTEE

Dawn Harris said County Broadband had offered a free internet connection for the Village Hall which was being considered.

They were grateful to those helping at the spring tidy of the VH garden. A tree in the Village Hall car park will need attention; a meeting will be arranged with the PC's grounds maintenance contractor. The Village Hall Roof Project was to be discussed in committee after the meeting.

BURIAL GROUND

The patching repairs to the Fairfield Drive are scheduled for 7th May and our grounds maintenance contractors have been advised

The contractors will be asked to remove and dispose of the Jean Griggs memorial bench at the burial ground which is beyond repair. The new Jane Walker Memorial is now in place; the unveiling ceremony will take place on 18th April.

Sam Treharne was approached by a resident concerned by the condition of the old Burial Ground; concerns will be raised with Babergh who manage the old Cemetery.

It was noted that the new fence panels installed by the PC contractors are a great improvement in the new Burial Ground (which is PC responsibility)

Following discussion on complaints received regarding the difficulties experienced in parking in bays at the Fairfield turning circle to visit the burial ground it was agreed that: the Chair would speak to the School and Woodland Corner about their use of the spaces and one of the bays will have a notice stating it is for burial ground parking only.

The 'dogs on leads' sign at the entrance to the burial ground will be laminated.

ANNUAL PARISH ASSEMBLY

Owen Brown confirmed that Sue Downs from Community Action Suffolk, would attend the Parish Assembly on Wednesday 24th April and will talk about community or affordable housing. Graham Walker will give a report from the Lady Anne Windsor Charity which manages the Almshouse at Stoke. Parish councillors will each highlight an aspect of PC responsibility and questions would be answered. Gerry Battye will update on the Walsh Trust. It's hoped residents will come along to the meeting at 7.30pm for 8pm in the Village Hall.

PARISH COUNCIL

Officers were confirmed as follows: Chairman Robin Thorogood. Sub-committees were confirmed - as included on page 7. Village Hall representative Dawn Harris; Community Council representatives Laura Erith, Sam Treharne.

PUBLIC FORUM

Stuart Davis raised the subject of low cost housing following the talk by Sue Downs of Community Action Suffolk during the annual Parish Assembly.

Sally Dalton raised several points: she advised that the PC's contractors had not been strimming as close to the riverbank at Caley Green as usual and nettles were beginning to get established again; she asked if the PC will be submitting an objection to National Grid's final consultation on the Norwich to Tilbury Pylon proposals; as the reed cutting at Caley Green had originally been at the request of the PC and as the complaint of a resident had resulted in additional work and expenditure by the SSC she suggested an email of support and thanks be sent to the officer dealing with this issue.

Sally also advised that over the Bank Holiday weekend what appeared to be considerable amounts of human excrement had been noticed in the river. Paddle-boarders had mentioned there were greater amounts up river from Nayland. On 7th May water flowing down the culvert from Bear Street into the river was orange suggesting some sort of contamination. The Environment Agency had been informed and had 'logged' the notification. **DISTRICT COUNCILLOR**

Isabelle Reece will put the PC in touch with Imogen Tink, Community Officer for Grants at Babergh who may be able to help in getting funding for various projects including installation of metal fencing to replace the wooden fencing at the Fairfield Playpark.

Dawn Harris will explore low maintenance and biodiversity planting options for the old bus shelter site at Harpers Estate which may qualify for funding.

Some grounds maintenance work had been carried out by Babergh at the old cemetery; further work will be carried out on a regular basis. Removal of overgrown vegetation has revealed some damage to the boundary wall which needs investigating and repairing. The lych gate, walls and cemetery are included in the 'Local List' (of buildings and structures of significant importance) adopted by Babergh in 2004. Isabelle will take the issue regarding the wall forward.

Gerry Battye asked if there was any update on central government's plans for consistency across counties for waste streams and refuse collections Babergh are considering what they can do to meet this requirement.

HIGHWAYS

Dawn Harris raised the ongoing issue of the poor state of the by-pass central islands island (weeds, surface dressing and the previously illuminated bollards) with James Finch; he said resurfacing work on the A134 at Nayland is due to take place on 12-14 June. Tricia Fuller again raised the number of unfilled potholes in the parish; he said they are being dealt with on priority.

Problems with two road signs (on Campions Hill and Cawley Road) have been reported.

FINANCE

Consideration of charity donations. A donation of £1,000 had already been made to the Nayland Community Pantry. It was agreed to give £100 each to Sudbury Citizens Advice Bureau; Homestart Suffolk; Age UK and Suffolk Accident Rescue.

PLANNING

Councillors heard that Babergh had no objections at **5 EIm Grove** [*DC*/24/00995] for erection of 1.5 storey side extension (following demolition of attached garage) and construction of front and rear dormer extensions, including widening driveway; at **52-54 Bear Street** [*DC*/24/01052] for erection of single storey rear outbuilding for use as artist studio/store (following removal of existing summer house) or at **11 Gravel Hill** [*DC*/24/01128] for listed building consent to repair and/or replace existing slate tiles and installation of 2 roof lights.

It was noted that an advertisement consent application had been refused at **Harpers Hill Farm Harpers Hill** [*DC*/23/05311] for retention of replacement entrance signage. It was agreed that the large blank sign at the entrance would be photographed and raised with Babergh's Enforcement Officer.

Between meetings councillors had no objections at **Stourview 34 Stoke Road** [*DC*/24/01774] for works to trees to reduce 1 Sycamore to previous pruning points, reduce 1 Conifer to previous pruning points and trim garden side, reduce height of 1 laurel hedge and trim garden side, reduce 1 Cherry to previous pruning points, reduce height of 1 Magnolia, reduce 1 Cherry to previous pruning points and reduce 1 to previous pruning points.

Discussing an application at **27 Harpers Estate** [*DC* 24/01791] for construction of single-storey extension (following demolition of existing single-storey flat roof building and covered way), construction of new vehicular access, hard-standing and car port and retention of close boarded fence to the north boundary councillors had no objections to the proposed plans but they had concerns that the curtilage of the property needs clarification. It is adjacent to the old bus shelter site, owned by Babergh and rented by the PC and where landscaping work is proposed.

Tricia Fuller was asked to arrange the purchase from SALC (Suffolk Association of Local Councils) of recordings of planning training sessions; arrangements will be made for councillors to view them together.

The Clerk would be submitting the Council's objection to the current Norwich to Tilbury pylons project consultation.

RECREATION AND OPEN SPACES

The patching repairs to the Fairfield Drive were carried out on 8th May. It was suggested that financial allocation for future maintenance should be budgeted for. Robin Thorogood has reminded Woodland Corner that the parking spaces on Fairfield are for use of the community. Dawn Harris is organising an A3 polite notice dedicating one of the spaces for use of the burial ground.

The Clerk will email Matthew Lee, Properties Officer at SCC for an update on the cutting of reeds along Caley Green and contact the Environment Agency to report the incidents of possible sewage in the river and contaminated water flowing into the river from Bear Street culvert.

ALLOTMENTS

There remain two names on the waiting list. After discussion it was agreed to postpone sending termination letters to allotment holders who had still not paid rents or have not kept allotments in cultivation; they would be given another opportunity to respond to letters. However, next year the PC will expect payment within one month.

A MONTH ON THE PARISH COUNCIL

This is just a brief insight about what we do in this voluntary role. I joined the PC several years ago – my children had left school and I felt I should 'put something back'. Nayland with Wissington has nine councillors and our amazing Parish Clerk Debbie – without her the wheels would come off. Debbie is a font of knowledge – amazingly efficient and very good at dealing with the huge amount of emails that come her way - a lot from me!

We have a Chairman but have agreed that we will do a six month rotation as no one wanted the onerous task of being labelled Chairman. We also have a Vice Chair who is incredibly supportive. At the moment we have a full council – 3 from Wiston and 6 from Nayland. The PC is the link between the village and the District and County Council. We try our best to deal with highways, footpaths, burial ground, playground, various open spaces, trees, street lighting, allotments; each area has sub committees that meet up when there is an issue and then it is reported to and discussed with the full council in the monthly meeting. I am on the burial ground, allotments and finance sub-committees and am a PC representative on the Community Council.

The PC are informed of planning applications; we read the applications and look at the documents on line, neighbours opinions are also sought. An online form is used to collate and record comments for discussion at the next meeting when the PC decide whether to object and on what planning grounds. During the month we also answer correspondence from people as it comes in. Some months may be busier than others.

We meet on the second Wednesday each month in the village hall and have a zoom facility for those who cannot attend personally. The meeting starts at 7.30pm when there is a public forum where residents can raise issues or ask questions. The Babergh and District Councillors then give their reports and answer our queries before the agenda business is discussed. The meetings can last until 9.30pm. Progress with issues can often be rather slow as the PC has hoops to jump through and red tape to combat. We would encourage residents with any concerns to come along to our meetings; it can a better way of raising issues with us than correspondence.

COMMUNITY COUNCIL REPORT

Rachel Hitchcock welcomed members to the meeting.

Executive Committee: As always we welcome new members to join the team – please spread an encouraging word to anyone who may be interested in joining us. It is an enjoyable friendly village committee that provides positive events and facilities for the community. Contact Rachel on 07788 954309 or rachel_hitchcock @hotmail.com if you would like to know more.

Members were in favour of a suggestion for a plaque to mark the contribution of Ken Willingale, founder member, Treasurer, Chairman and President of the Community Council (from 1966-2024). Rachel will liaise with Trevor Smy with a view to organising a tribute in the HortSoc section of the village hall garden alongside an existing one for his wife Olive for her contribution to HortSoc (Secretary & President 1980-2011).

Fundraising Activities/Events: A always future ideas and support are welcome.

Community Defibrillator: Defibrillators are located at the Village Hall and at the Fire Station. The defibrillator at the Village Hall is managed by the CC; is regularly checked and there have been no problems.

Regarding the possibility a public access defibrillator in Wiston. There has been no recent progress; consideration will be given to the best location. The PC has confirmed they will be able to assist financially via CIL (Community Infrastructure Levy) funding. Community Heartbeat Trust (CHT) confirmed a defibrillator could operate without a power supply; the cost would be in the region $\pounds2,300$; a location by the Parish Council noticeboard in Wiston has been mooted.

River Stour Water Level Gauge: Rachel has made progress. Danny Thurlow is happy to install the gauge in the revised position. This will be out of the way of the yet to be installed revetment and craft entering the water but won't be shrouded by the reeds! Suffolk CC has confirmed that they are happy with this. The surveyor confirmed change of location to the south bank would not affect the datum mark for the above sea level gauge. A revised quote from Shelley Signs with gauge only on one side of the post is £355. It was agreed to purchase the gauge; go ahead for installation will be confirmed via email.

Online Ticketing Facility: *NaylandEvents.org* – This has become increasingly useful for selling tickets to village events. If village organisations wish to use this facility to sell tickets for their events contact Justin Dowding at jpdowding@gmail.com.

Village Hall Gardening Morning: The spring session was on 6th April achieved a reasonable turnout with lots achieved. Some CC members who were unable to attend will pop down to do some maintenance; a low level shrub is needed for the CC section.

Community Involvement: Ideas to help raise participation in village groups and events are welcome. An item '*Volunteer Vacancies*' has been added to the Community Times, listing the various volunteers needed by different groups; please let Lorraine know if you have vacancies to be included along with an idea of the level of commitment needed.

It would be helpful if everyone, when they see promotions for Nayland events on Facebook, could make a comment (however brief) and not just click on 'like' which is no help. All village groups would benefit from the additional publicity.

Resident Volunteer List: This is a list of residents prepared to assist other residents who at times are unable to get out for themselves and would benefit from having a prescription collected, an errand run or some shopping dropped off. Eight people have kindly come forward to help; two of them have been put in touch with nearby residents who would benefit from occasional assistance.

Recent Activities:

Fun Village Quiz: *Friday 2nd February.* The quiz was a great evening and a sell-out which made over £600 for CC funds.

Rachel Hitchcock thanked everyone for their help and support. **TREASURER'S REPORT:** Matt Cable gave his report on finances to 30th April.

Breakdown of profits: Quiz £664.20, Calendar £80.

Grants paid: Nayland Chior £1,500.

Expenses: Defibrillator annual maintenance £198, Hall hire charges £64.

Current Position: The accounts show reserves of £26,235.45 represented by Deposit a/c monies £11,308.86, Current a/c monies £14,165.27, Cash in Hand £761.32. We hold £43.81 for the RBL Services Fund and grants are pending for: VH roof £10,000.00, VH coffee machine £280 and Lizzie's Fund £153. **Therefore unencumbered assets are £15,713.94**.

GRANTS & DONATIONS:

Nayland Baby & Toddler Group: A grant for £300 to assist with the cost of hall hire was agreed.

School Choir/Music Group: A grant for £400 to assist with re-establishing school choir for year 2 and above and maintaining the cost of choir provision at affordable subscriptions for the summer term was agreed.

Community Times & Websites: Lorraine Brooks thanked all for contributing to recent issues. Heading towards deadline; space is extraordinarily over subscribed this issue but a good sign the village has lots going on. The Conservation Society will be funding the 4-page colour insert to celebrate their 50th anniversary.

Village Calendar: Lorraine Brooks said end of year sales in 2023 for the 2024 calendar amounted to a profit of \pounds 766 but recent additional income of \pounds 178 takes the profit on the 2024 calendar up \pounds 944.

The Calendar Photo Competition was held as usual online with voting from 26th-28th April. 34 people submitted photos and 44 people participated in the voting. The most popular photo overall, voted for by almost 70% of voters, was of swans by Caley Green in frost taken by a 10-year-old resident. Not far behind was a scene of lambs at a Wiston farm, then a rainbow over Lock Cottage. To date 12 Nayland businesses have agreed to sponsor again, confirmation is awaited on the final 2. The draft calendar has been assembled, Wendy will be writing the captions.

The extended calendar team - Wendy and Lorraine now plus Claire and Jo - met on 24th April with a view to gaining final sponsors and optimising and organising sales. The 2024 print quote was again £695 for 300 calendars or £599 for 250; it's likely that we will reduce the number to somewhere between the two. They will be printed in June/July and on sale at the Flower Show as usual.

Bonfire & Fireworks: *Tuesday 5th November.* Rachel Hitchcock, Claire Buller & Jo Metson leading. Firewark Crazy is booked this is our final year at the pre-agreed price of £2500 which is extremely good value.

Christmas Fayre: Saturday 7th December. Rachel Hitchcock & Vicki Sargent leading. Village hall is booked.

SOCIETY REPORTS

HortSoc: Trevor Smy said the number of Spring Show entries had been hindered by the weather but the event went well and was enjoyed, including by those calling in for refreshments or to buy cakes. Attendance for the AGM & Fun Quiz in April was very poor, which was disappointing. The Morning Market with refreshments and raffle is on 11th May; plants and cakes and preserves will be on sale. There will be a coach outing to RHS Hyde Hall on 12th June. The Flower Show is on 3rd August schedules are available.

Friends of Caley Green: Sally Dalton reported there are two swans on the river but there is no sign any cygnets will be produced, no ducklings have been seen but a couple of Moorhen

chicks spotted... but the herons are hanging about to prey on them. The Green and river has been busier with locals and those from further afield: adventure groups from Brantham, a Norwich school and Essex University.

First Responders: Tracy Le Grys reported the responders continue to grow in numbers and the newest member of the group will start her training this month (May) and be on the road with us as soon as possible. They continue to give the area as much cover as we can. They also continue to support the ambulances by volunteering extra hours to cover a dedicated CFR car which operates in the Essex area.

Parish Council: Laura Erith said the Parish Assembly clashed with another village event resulting in a turnout of just 8/9 residents. Sue Downes s from Community Action Suffolk gave a very interesting talk about Low Cost Housing in the county and Graham Walker talked about the Lady Anne Windsor Trust, which provides Alms houses in the local area.

One of the parking spaces by the turning circle at Fairfield will be signposted as being for burial ground only – it's hoped this will be respected; Babergh DC have tidied up the old cemetery and will hopefully keep more on top of maintenance; the unveiling of the memorial stone for residents of Jane Walker Hospital was well attended and featured on TV, a roses was placed on each iron cross which mark the individual graves. The next PC meeting is on 8th May, they encourage residents to come and raise issues or ask questions during the Public Forum.

St James Church: Kathy Hunt reported weekly services continue; at the end of Lent we held the Maundy Thursday Service, on Good Friday the Service was the Objects of the Passion which is a very quiet and reflective, on Easter Eve we held the first Communion of Easter where the Paschal Candles are lit and taken into a dark Church. There has been 1 baptism, 2 more plus 3 weddings in the next few weeks. At the Annual Parochial Church meeting Kathy Hunt was again elected as Churchwarden and members of the PCC remain, except the minute secretary who has resigned. Reports were given by those who help the Church to run. The Wednesday Coffee Mornings continue to be popular. The Community Pantry is well used but due to some abuse it is being locked at night. Nicola Thorogood is resigning as Benefice Administrator and Sam Bridgeman will be taking over the role. There are vacancies for volunteers to help with day-to-day running of the Pantry.

Conservation Society: Mike Hunter reported this year's Open Gardens takes place on 9th June and have 26 gardens participating; a number featuring for the first time. The Spring Litterpick on 20th April was successful with around ten people taking part. Chris Hunt is leading our annual Footpath Walk on 12th May; meeting at St Mary's Church, Bures at 2.15pm and taking a circular walk to Mount Bures. On 25th June the Society will be celebrating its 50th Anniversary; members only are invited to a celebratory glass of fizz before hearing four members reminisce their favourite memories of the Societies activities. Wendy Sparrow is preparing a substantial display on the Societies activities activities over the years. The June Community Times will contain a special colour feature on the history of the Society.

Land Company (Nayland Meadow): David Slater said the persistent rain necessitated keeping the improved section of the permissive path closed for longer than they had hoped. Unfortunately damage caused by those who ignored the very obvious closure signs had to be repaired. The recent weather has helped establish the grass in the path. They have received many favourable reports from walkers since reopening. They have ambition to do more next winter subject to funding being available. They are grateful to the PC for adding mowing of the paths to their contractor's schedule. The trees and hedges have benefited from the rainfall. The sheep have plenty of grass and it's hoped everyone will enjoy the cowslips and other wildflowers.

RBL: Robert Dossor reported that 40 people attended the St George's Day lunch at The Anchor. Their next meeting is 13th May to listen to David Wiles, they have planned a fully subscribed visit to Stephen Walters & Sons' silk mill in Sudbury.

They may be present at the Nayland War Memorial to commemorate 80th Anniversary of D-Day, details to be posted on our Board in the village. An outing to the 100th & 95th Bomb Group Museums near Diss is on 24th July; this USAF force was featured in the Apple TV series 'Masters of the Air'. Anyone (not restricted to RBL members) is welcome, the cost will be approx £25 plus lunch.

Baby Toddler Group: Gillian Manser reported they have recently welcomed some new families and the group remains well supported. As the weather has finally improved we have been able to enjoy some outdoor play in the sunshine.

Village Hall: Iain Wright said that they are still pursuing Lottery grant application and meeting their demands. The noise limiter has been installed and seems to have resolved the problems with noise reported by neighbours.

Nayland Art Group: Kathryn Niven reported they have been enjoying some more sessions, both self-guided and with their tutors who have recently focussed on landscape and still life. They looked at the work of Georgia O'Keeffe and used pastels to make over-scaled representations of tree bark. They're pleased to have a couple of new members and attendance has been more regular; they would be pleased to welcome new people. They have the summer term planned and looking forward to some more life drawing and maybe another trip out to visit a gallery.

RIVER WATCH

WATER LEVELS

With rainfall remaining high the river levels remained normal until 18th May when they dropped very briefly and the horseshoe weir stopped flowing; presumably that was due to maintenance.

Low levels had been reported in Dedham the preceding week.

WATER QUALITY & SEWAGE

Over 7th/8th May what appeared to be human excrement was seen in the river at Caley Green. Paddleboarders said there were greater amounts up river from Nayland. It seems release of sewage into our rivers is a nationwide issue.

On 8th May a bright orange discharge from the Bear Street culvert was spotted. It has been suggested that this may come via the spring on sandy soil on land above the Heights.

Incident were reported to the EA.

REED GROWTH

Reeds around the Horseshoe weir, will be romping away to claim more of the river, capture more silt and reduce its water holding capacity.

It appears, however, that the EA have cleared vegetation around both entrances to the A134 tunnel.

WILDFOWL & SWANS

The current pair of river swans, after a somewhat aloof relationship, appeared to build a nest but it has not been used and no eggs have been laid. Sadly, ducklings have become something of a rarity. Moorhen chicks have been seen... but herons were hanging about waiting to prey on them.

Cormorants have been spotted again along the river and Kingfishers continue to delight passers by.

BIRDWATCH

The results of the RSPB Big Garden Birdwatch are available at: https://www.rspb.org.uk

Looking through the results for Suffolk and thinking of our own garden in Nayland it's surprising to see Blackbirds are down -11%; nesting pairs here entertain us at much the same level as usual, likewise the drop in Wrens of -8.6% as they too nest here, several times under our porch. We rarely see a Starling so their drop by -15% cannot be argued, neither can a drop of -12% for Collared Doves - they frequently seem to fall victim to Sparrow Hawks here. Goldfinches are frequent visitors despite their drop by -12%. Seeing a drop in Jackdaws of -14% is a surprise - at times our garden is like a scene from Hitchcock's 'The Birds' with the number of Jackdaws, Crows and Rooks bullying other birds. The drop for the Song Thrush by -32% is extremely sad - last year, for the first time in many years, we were lucky to witness a pair bringing up their brood but there is no sign yet this year. Greenfinch and



We are lucky (or wise) enough to live in a charming village in the countryside which can bring much enjoyment and recreation. However, this does bring with it a few responsibilities and rules and regulations to be aware of....

- Rivercraft: All craft (kayaks, paddleboards, etc) must be registered to take to the water.
- Fishing: Once the closed season is over, on 15th June, and fishing on rivers can resume a rod licence must be carried if you are aged 13 or over. Ensure all line, hooks, etc are not left to endanger wildlife.
- Livestock: Leave gates as you find them, keep dogs under control and on lead near sheep and lambs.

Stick to designated paths and open spaces; take your litter home or bin it; bag and bin dog waste; don't have BBQs or fires. Enjoy and protect our natural environment.

Chaffinch numbers used to be high on our feeders, but they have dropped dramatically in recent years. Although the Suffolk figure for Pheasants is 33% with Tendring Estate no longer raising them for their shoots visitors to our garden have dropped from ten or so making a couple of visits a day to perhaps just one visiting a couple of times a week.

Like many others, in these times of high inflation and bird food prices sky rocketing we have to be more frugal in the way we help the birds, especially as the Corvidae family (including rooks, crows and jackdaws) and squirrels were emptying the feeders soon after they were filled each morning. Yet with the threat of Avian Flu and the increased number of creatures preying on them, birds need all the help they can get.

CALEY GREEN

The Friends continue to keep an eye on the Green and wildfowl. It is lovely to see it being enjoyed, however, it is concerning that there has been an increase in the number of people not picking up after their dogs. The Green is an area where children play and people enjoy picnics and relaxing on the grass.

THE LONG REED BED

The long running saga regarding reduction of the enormous wall of reeds along Caley Green has currently hit a stalemate due to a last minute complaint by a resident. A mitigation and method study report could not be completed before bird nesting season arrived. It's hoped this will be in place and a solution arranged for autumn.

SCC will be meeting an EA Waterways Officer on 22nd May concerning 'River Stour Aquatic Vegetation Management'; the PC also have the opportunity to meet the Officer.

At this stage the EA Officer is looking at summer weed cutting... not reed cutting or silt accumulation which is what concerns many residents!

This rather goes to show if the PC's original idea to plant more vegetation round the bay had gone ahead how long might it have been before residents lost enjoyment of the river there too.

RIVERBANK LITTER BY SLUICE GATES

SCC are the landowners of the triangle of land adjacent the sluice gates. Flytipping and litter was reported to them in October 2022; their appointed contractor did not carry out the rubbish clearance properly; SCC said they will look at getting the matter rectified.

In early April this year campers were seen on the site, when they departed on 9th they left behind a considerable amount of rubbish. SCC were advised of this, and reminded of the previous outstanding issue; the Properties Officer will visit the site on 22nd May and take the appropriate action.

While SCC have indicated they will fund and take forward installation of wooden revetment around the bay at Caley Green to protect it from future erosion, there is no further update.

EUROPEAN FIREBUG

Thanks to Karen Saunders for this photo of a Firebug - spotted in a Porch in Bear Street on 21st April.

Until relatively recently, the common European firebug - Pyrrhocoris apterus wasn't commonly found in the UK, but recently they have been spotted in the southern counties of England.

Firebugs have wings but are unable to fly. Thyey are a very distinctive species that should be unmistakeable, but the Cinnamon Bug, Corizus hyoscyami, is superficially similar.

These small, 8.5-10mm long bugs may look dangerous with their blood-red and black shells, but they're actually harmless to humans and feed on seeds from a wide range of plants, aphids, using a piercing-sucking stylet that is inserted into a food source to feed. So, they can help control aphid infestations. Their most common host plants are the Malvaceae family, which includes mallow, hollyhock, hibiscus and linden.

June: the season for swarming Honey Bees

Swarming is a natural process. It is the colony reproducing by the old queen leaving with some of the bees. They leave their hive and find somewhere to hang in a cluster until the scout bees decide on their new home.

Swarms are not usually aggressive or sting but it is wise to stay away from the swarm and keep children and pets indoors. They normally settle into a cluster within 15 minutes.

Should you be in need of a beekeeper to collect a swarm; Simon Cousins - 07845 900 614 - is a helpful, very experienced bee keeper, just up the road at Wormingford.

Please note: Beekeepers will only remove honey bees; they do not deal with bumble bees or wasps; Bumblebees are best left alone as they are valuable pollinators, some are endangered, Wasps may require a pest controller if in a dangerous position.

ASIAN HORNET: be on the lookout

It's a highly effective predator of insects, including honey bees and other beneficial species, which can cause significant losses to bee colonies, and potentially other native species. Eradicate them with care; like other hornets and wasps they have a nasty sting. It is important to report any suspected sightings of this species as soon as possible at: https://www.nonnativespecies.org/non-native-species/species-alerts/#Species 53 or by iPhone and Android recording app: Asian Hornet Watch

FAIRFIELD DRIVEWAY & PARKING

The long awaited patching repairs to the Fairfield driveway were carried out by Wellham Surfacing Ltd on 8th May. The Diocese have ownership of the driveway but responsibility, including financial, is shared with Nayland House and the Parish Council.

Following complaints regarding parking spaces near the burial ground frequently being taken up all day the PC have agreed to erect a sign dedicating one space for use by visitors to the burial ground. It is hoped that those who work nearby will respect that.

STAG BEETLE

Kevin Sheath spotted this male Stag Beetle (Lucanus cervus) when it flew into his garden near Harpers Hill on 16th May. Famous for their fearsome jaws, the stag beetle does not have the bite to match; males display their massive jaws to attract females and duel with their rivals. Female stag beetles lack large mandibles (jaws) and are smaller. They prefer oak woodlands, but can be found in gardens, hedgerows and parks in SE England. The larvae depend on old trees and rotting wood to live in and feed on, and can take up to six years to develop before they pupate and turn into adults.

OLD BURIAL GROUND

It has been very good after such neglect to see Babergh transit type trucks on site over several days with work being carried out to improve the poor state of the old section of the burial ground. (The new section being regularly maintained by the Parish Council). Considerable improvement has been achieved but it seems they could have gone further towards uncovering a few more graves, the old wall and removing brambles and saplings, etc. There remains some debris too. The foreman of the working team said they had been hampered by nesting season.

Some damage has been uncovered to the old stone wall surrounding the burial ground which is included in the Local List (of buildings and structures of significant importance) adopted by Babergh in 2004. At a recent PC meeting the District Councillor said the site would be regularly maintained in future and said she would request the repair to the wall.

NORTHERN LIGHTS OVER NAYLAND

Residents were amazed on the evening of 10th May as the skies above Nayland and Wiston turned shades of pink, purple and green. (view the colour version of the CT for dramatic full effect)

The impressive Northern Lights, also known as Aurora Borealis, are usually only visible from very northern parts of the British Isles. The rare phenomenon of them being seen further afield was due to an 'extreme' geomagnetic solar storm which caused them to be more visible.

Intense aurora displays are generated following massive explosions on the Sun's surface known as 'Coronal Mass Ejections'. These explosions release clouds of hot plasma and when the clouds reach the Earth's atmosphere, they interact with the Earth's magnetic field to cause geomagnetic storms. The Sun's activity fluctuates, with activity reaching a peak every 11 years. The last time solar activity peaked was in 2014, and the cycle is now reaching its solar maximum.

CELEBRATING THE 50TH ANNIVERSARY OF THE NAYLAND WITH WISSINGTON CONSERVATION SOCIETY

HOW IT ALL BEGAN

In the 1960s there was public concern over the pace of development in historic towns and villages and in order to protect them many were designated areas of special architectural and historic interest. They were called Conservation Areas and Nayland was designated a Conservation Area in 1973.

About this time the late Blair Lees who lived at Stour House in Court Street was appointed Parish Recorder for Nayland by the Suffolk Local History Council. Discussions in the Anchor Inn with his neighbour Wendy Sparrow led to the creation of the *Nayland Record*, a quarterly historical journal which they produced for about ten years. They discussed how Nayland was changing and decided to find out if there was interest in the village for a "preservation" society.

In the first edition of the *Nayland* Record which was put through every door in the village readers were invited to return a slip if they were interested in forming a society. In all, 57 replies were received and an inaugural meeting was planned to be held in the Village Hall on the 6th June 1974. Meanwhile discussions were taking place with friends in the Anchor and the first recruits were found. In the beginning there was a group of five who subsequently formed the original committee. These were Blair Lees, Joan Moore, Francis Fowke, John Randall and Wendy Sparrow.

Michael Archer, Secretary of the Dedham Vale Society, came to the inaugural meeting in June to give advice on setting up an amenity society. There was much enthusiasm for the idea and it was agreed there was a need to preserve and improve the charm and antiquity of Nayland. A motion was therefore carried that an amenity society should be formed. It was felt that the society would encompass more than just preservation and it was agreed it should be called the Nayland with Wissington Conservation Society.

The original group of five were proposed for the committee and Blair Lees was elected Chairman, Francis Fowke, Treasurer, Joan Moore, Secretary, John Randall and Wendy Sparrow, committee. Two more committee members, Fred Hammond and Roy Berry, subsequently joined them.

The Society was registered with the Civic Trust and Charity Commission. Its aims were and still remain: (a) to stimulate public interest in Nayland, (b) to promote high standards of planning and architecture and (c) to secure the preservation, protection, development and improvement of features of historic or public interest.

During the first year membership increased to 109 and the number has steadily increased to nearly 300. Of the founding members there are now only 4 surviving, namely, Jean Dryden who was on the committee some years ago (her late husband Angus was an early treasurer), June Freeman, Linda Clapham and Wendy Sparrow. Ken Willingale, who sadly died earlier this year was also a founder member.

COURT KNOLL

Over recent years Court Knoll has been the subject of a major project but back in 1974 when the Society was established, few people knew much about its history. To walkers on the footpath it appeared to be just a field with a ditch around it. The committee decided to erect an information board and after gaining all the necessary information and permissions it was finally erected in 1978. In 2021 it was decided by the current committee to refurbish the sign and it was removed and renovated. Two committee members who attended the original unveiling in 1978 also did the unveiling of the restored sign some 40 years later!

In between these events a great deal happened at Court Knoll. In 1924 a group of local historians had carried out an archaeological dig there when they discovered the remains of a Norman building which was rich in Roman and medieval material. The site was scheduled as an Ancient Monument in 1962.

Despite periodic interest after that first dig in 1924 there was no further action until 1998 when The Dedham Vale and Stour Valley Project instigated an Archaeological and Historical Study, carrying out a survey to identify what remained on the site. Eventually in 2001 a Fieldwalking Project was organised with the Conservation Society which involved a geophysical survey, a search of documentary sources and systematic fieldwalking by many village volunteers. There was no actual digging on this occasion. Some prehistoric, Roman and medieval pottery was found as well as building materials such as roof tiles, Roman tile, limestone and sandstone, medieval glass, clay pipes etc. The large quantity of Roman tile found suggested that this came from a high status Roman building in the area and was used in the construction of later buildings on Court Knoll.

The Society's Secretary, Andora Carver, promoted the idea of a major excavation which took place in 2016 involving more experts and more than 70 volunteers from Nayland and beyond. A licence to excavate was granted by English Heritage for six weeks. Seven trenches were dug on the knoll and there were a huge number of finds which were analysed with the help of volunteers. The project, which is still continuing, has cost in excess of £35,000 to date. An exhibition was held in 2018 when the project leader gave a detailed report on the progress of the enormous amount of work involved in analysing the finds, some of which were on display. They included late Saxon fragments, early medieval pottery, metalwork, Roman tiles and 2 silver coins, one dating from 1216.

On the final afternoon of the dig in October 2016 evidence of a human burial was found and a particle of bone taken from the grave was sent for carbon dating – it was dated as being between 969 – 1018, i.e. the late Saxon period. As the licence for the dig expired that day no further excavation could be carried out to find out more. The trenches were then filled in, much to the frustration of many people! Analysis of the recovered finds is still being undertaken but it is hoped that a final report will be published within the next eighteen months and in due course an information board will be erected within the vicinity of Court Knoll.

EXHIBITIONS & PUBLICATIONS

In 1974 the committee immediately set to work and many ideas for working party projects and activities were discussed. In the first month of its existence the Society held its first exhibition of old photographs and documents of Nayland at the August Community Council Fair on Webb's Meadow. Norfolk's Buses loaned the Society one of their vehicles which was fitted out with display boards. Visitors went in the front door and left through the emergency door at the back. This created a lot of interest and was great fun for the committee.

There have been many exhibitions in the past 50 years. In 1976 the bicentenary of the birth of John Constable was celebrated by the village and the Society contributed a display. In 1985 a successful photographic competition and display was mounted and in the following year an art competition was organised and judged by the Royal portrait painter, Richard Stone.

In 1987 a major Past and Present exhibition was held in the Church Hall during the Civic Trust's National Environment week. Many interesting items were loaned by residents and the Suffolk Record Office. By then the Society had acquired its own display boards which are still in use today!

The1980s was a busy decade and it was decided that it was time Nayland should have its first printed history book. Many people know that Dr Sidney Slade, our GP in the early years of the 20th century, (1911–1937) did a vast amount of research into Nayland's history but his work was never published. The booklet, Nayland, published by the Society in 1984 was a slim volume written by several residents and its contents owed much to Dr Slade. This was followed by a larger publication in 1991, Nayland Suffolk Town and Village, again written by several residents, some of whom were invited to the newly created Radio Suffolk studio in Ipswich to talk about it. This led to A Walk Around Historic Nayland, in 2000 and The Portrait of Nayland published in 2002. Memories of Nayland in 2006 is a collection of memories from members of many old Nayland families.

As part of the Society's 40th Anniversary celebrations in 2014 these postcards of Nayland were added to other family collections kindly donated to the Society over the years to form a historic archive and are available to view digitally on the Society's website or in albums at some meetings.

Also included in the archive is a collection of deeds and documents donated by Usha Taylor on behalf of her late husband Keith.









OPEN GARDENS

One of the Society's major achievements has been the annual Open Gardens event. The committee were discussing ways to raise funds in the Spring of 1978. Fred Hammond suggested asking residents if they would like to open their gardens. It was agreed this was an excellent idea and it was decided to hold the event on Sunday 16th July. In that first year there were 11 gardens open: Mr and Mrs Randall at 18 Heycroft Way, Mr and Mrs Gordon Padget on Harpers Estate; Dr and Mrs Cloudsley-Smith at Sargeants, Bear Street; Mr and Mrs Findlay at 54 Bear Street, Mrs Southall at 38 Bear Street, Mr and Mrs Dryden, 30 Stoke Road, Mr and Mrs Horlock at Stream House, Fen Street; Brigadier and Mrs Litton at The White House, Church Lane; Mr and Mrs Hines at the Post Office and Mr and Mrs Fowke at Knollgate, Court Street. The ticket to visit all the gardens cost an exorbitant 50p. The eleventh garden was Parkers in Bear Street where Mr and Mrs Milne-Redhead lived and, as well as opening their garden, which they did for the next seven years, they very kindly offered the use of their barn for the teas.

An important part of the day was, and still is of course, tea and cakes. The three lady members of the committee (Joan Moore, Linda Clapham and Wendy Sparrow) remembered baking for days before and the almost medieval conditions of the barn - a far cry from the modern conveniences of the village hall. In that first year there was no idea what the response would be. However, the sun shone and the crowds came! Needless to sav the cakes ran out!

Many people will remember Edgar Milne-Redhead, a distinguished botanist and conservationist who worked at Kew for many years. He was made an MBE for his work and lived at Parkers for about 20 years. He and his wife Olive were great supporters of the Society from its inception and Edgar became a Life President.

The committee agreed the occasion had been a huge success and a net profit of £90 had been made which was used to pay for a spirit duplicator for office use. It was decided to hold a similar function the following year and over subsequent years many different gardens have opened in all parts of the village including Wiston.

As the years went by the number of visitors and profits have increased. People come from far and wide and many still return year after year. Donations from the proceeds have been made to various conservation bodies and projects, including the Suffolk Wildlife Trust, restoration projects for Nayland and Wiston churches, Pakenham Mill, Colchester Castle, Hadleigh Deanery Tower and others. To celebrate the Millennium a record 30 gardens were open when about £2,000 was raised.

For over 40 years this event had taken place until Covid struck when for two years the event went online. In 2022 there was a welcome return to many village events including Open Gardens but the following year the event was cancelled for the first time ever because for various reasons there was a shortage of gardens being offered. In the Society's 50th year it is hoped the event will be a special occasion.

HORKESLEY LOCK

One of the first aims of the newly formed society in 1974 was to clear up the old lock site but it was not until 1995 that the site was restored with the help of the society.

In the 1970s Horkesley Lock pool was just a muddy pond near Court Knoll. Few people were aware of its history. The official right of way from Court Street ended at the pool but until the early part of the 20th century it was possible to cross the river into Horkesley.

Horkesley Lock was one of several built as a result of the Stour Navigation Act of 1705 when the river was made navigable from Sudbury to Manningtree. Commercial barge traffic was a common sight through Nayland until the navigation declined, partly because of the railways. There were two bridges, one from the footpath onto the island where the Lock keeper lived and the main one over the lock connecting the footpath to Horkesley on the Essex side of the river. When the navigation ceased about 1920 the locks gradually fell down. From 1919 Nayland Parish Council wrote several times to Great Horkesley Parish Council about the dangerous condition of the bridge across the river appealing for its repair, to no avail. The matter was raised again in the 1960s but the County Surveyor of Essex said the cost could not be justified.

When the Society was formed in 1974 it began by clearing up the site and consulted with the water authority and other bodies but the scheme had to be abandoned because of the lack of finance and voluntary help. However, in the 1980s the Dedham Vale and Stour Valley Project which had been set up to promote the AONB were interested in carrying out a scheme at the site and during 1994 and 1995 the site was restored by the then National Rivers Authority at a cost of £70,000: the trees were thinned and pollarded and the central area was dredged and reconnected to the river by digging out the inlet and outlet channels. Two new bridges were built, almost in the same positions as the old ones. The larger one went over the river where the lock had been and the smaller one onto the island where the lock cottage had been. As soon as the bridges were in place the old footpath was restored creating a circular walk which is now well used by walkers.

At the conclusion of the project the Society's volunteers and many residents including families and children planted many trees around the pool. Since 1995 the society has kept a watchful eye on the site and some necessary repairs have been carried out to the main bridge by Essex County Council. However, sadly the pool seems to reverting to the condition it was in before it was rescued.



MEETINGS

At the first general meeting in October 1974 a talk was given by the Chairman of the River Stour Trust, and ever since then there have been many talks by local and national guest speakers, on topics including planning, history, art and architecture, nature conservation to name but a few. Films from the East Anglian Archive have also been shown.

One highlight was a talk by David Walsh about the Stour Valley Railway and a proposed extension to go through Nayland which never happened, another by John Slater on the relationship between Modern Farming and Conservation. One entertaining evening was about the History of Morris Dancing with a live demonstration by Mount Bures Morris Men. There has been no shortage of interesting talks. The Society continues to hold four speaker meetings each year in the village hall.

As well as talks, since 1974 members have enjoyed outings to places of local interest, such as Sutton Hoo, historic churches and houses and the annual guided footpath walks also continue each Spring.

PLANNING & HIGHWAYS

One important aspect of the society's activities has been planning and by 1976 it was establishing a good working relationship with local authorities, landowners and farmers. The committee review every planning application in the parish and it has commented on hundreds of planning applications from proposed new development to trees and in 2003 contributed to a project to survey unlisted buildings and other features of historical and architectural interest which formed the basis of the Babergh District Council Local List which was adopted by the Babergh Planning Committee in 2004.

In 1980 the society conducted its first traffic survey, monitoring heavy lorries which travelled through Nayland. It was felt that heavy lorries were endangering property and were a danger to residents' safety and a petition campaigning against them was organised which was signed by most residents. The society also wrote to the Common Market Commission opposing the EEC proposal to increase the maximum load for heavy lorries from 32 – 40 tonnes. Through the years it has worked with the Parish, District and County Councils on environmental matters including traffic calming. Attempts to reduce the speed of traffic to 20 mph have not as yet been successful but this issue is ongoing.



1995 – 21st ANNIVERSARY

In June 1995 the Society celebrated its 21st birthday with an exhibition in the Church Hall over the weekend 10th/11th June, Open Gardens on Sunday, the 11th, and a reception and meeting on the 13th in the Village Hall. The exhibition described how the society began and its first 21 years. A commemorative mug was on sale. For the Open Gardens event in this anniversary year there were 18 gardens open to the public in Nayland and Wiston and £800 was raised.

During recent years the Society has continued to support various projects connected with the environment and wildlife conservation, some examples are:

- Funding the resiting of the George V trough in the High Street back to its original position;
- Contributing to the cost of entrance gates to Webb's Meadow; funding gates at entrance to Court Knoll from Court Street;
- Repairs to Scout Hut; Donations to Village Hall refurbishment in 2000.

Regular donations have also been made to the Suffolk Wildlife Trust and the Suffolk Preservation Society, St Marys Church Wiston for repairs to church fabric and to St James' for security of the Constable painting and window guards. Also, the Society arranged conservation of Coronation Altar Frontal and the William IV coat of arms over the north door of St James'. Donations have been made to St Edmundsbury Cathedral Tower Appeal.

When what was believed to be a Doodle bug was dredged from the river in 2000, the Society arranged for storage until it was housed on permanent loan to the Flying Bomb Museum near Southend.

For the Millennium the Society participated in the village's celebrations with a major history exhibition in the Village Hall, coinciding with a special Open Gardens weekend when 30 gardens were open.

Other miscellaneous activities include:

- In 2011 following the unexpected removal of the K6 telephone box in Bear Street negotiations led to the decommissioned box from Wiston being adopted by the Society; it was restored and is now used as a book and magazine exchange in Bear Street.
- In 2012 the Society purchased by auction an original sketch of the design of the stone reredos made for the John Constable painting in St James's Church, a copy hangs in the church.
- In 2014 the Society initiated a popular and well used permissive footpath alongside the Nayland to Stoke Road on Tendring Hall land which has added greatly to walkers' enjoyment and safety.
- In 2020 the Society organised the erection of 31 Swift boxes on residents' houses.
- In 2021 a 15-minute film about the 'History of Nayland' was commissioned by the Society.
- In 2022/23 the Society acquired two books written by the Reverend William Jones, Nayland minister in the 18th century who was a musician and theologian of national importance, one by auction and the other was donated by a member. A display case was specially made for the books to be displayed in St James's Church.

TEST PITS

Another interesting archaeology project took place in 2012. The Society's Secretary, Andora Carver, arranged for Nayland to be one of 6 locations in the area chosen for research by Cambridge University in collaboration with the Dedham Vale & Stour Valley Project and the Society. One metre square pits were dug in 33 gardens and open spaces all over Nayland by local volunteers and all finds processed by the University. It was a very enjoyable and successful community event which was followed by a second in 2014 when 16 more pits were dug. There were many interesting finds, which revealed evidence of Neolithic, bronze age, Roman and late Anglo Saxon settlements. More than a

It can be seen that in the first 50 years of its existence the Society has been very active and can be proud that it has achieved all its aims for Nayland and Wiston which it set out in 1974. From small beginnings it has gone from strength to strength and hopefully will continue to do so, keeping a watchful eye on Nayland and Wiston's welfare and ensuring that they both retain their unique character.

The Society's first Chairman and Life President, Blair Lees, sadly died in 1989 and did not live to celebrate the Society's 21st anniversary but he would undoubtedly be very proud of what the Society has achieved and that it has become such an established part of the community.



NAYLAND MEADOW

Perhaps the biggest project undertaken in the Society's history was the purchase in 2005 of the seventeen acre field beside the River Stour after a very well supported fundraising campaign. Over 90 villagers and friends raised the purchase price of £65,000 in a little over 4 months. The Nayland with Wissington Land Company Ltd, a registered charity, was formed to own and manage the land for the parish in perpetuity. It was decided that the land should revert to grassland under the DEFRA Suffolk River Valley ESA scheme. This involved seeding with a meadow mixture and an annual regime of hay cutting following by sheep grazing. A mixture of flowers and grasses was sown on the margin between the fence and the river bank.

In 2012 a further area of land adjacent to the meadow was acquired with funding supplied by many residents of the village.

Nayland with Wissington Crime Review 13/3/24 – 4/5/24

Within this 7 ½ week period in the Nayland and Wissington area, there have been the following incidents reported to police (or that police have been involved in) – A domestic non crime incident, an adult safeguarding referral related to fraud, two child safeguarding referrals, a domestic coercive and controlling offence, criminal damage to a car and two assaults on children (people known to them). Also, between Friday 19th and Saturday 20th April there were burglaries at three business premises at Nags Corner.

Here are some crime prevention advice tips for general theft prevention and security in relation to your garden and house perimeter: • Create layers of security • On your front door, have a door chain or door bar and viewer (spy hole) • Front boundaries should be less than 1m high so your neighbours and passers-by can clearly see the front of your property • Rear boundaries should be 1.8m high with locked gates, to prevent easy rear access - also remove climbing aids • Remove tools/ bricks from the garden that could be used to force entry • Always lock garages, sheds and outbuildings • Have dusk to dawn lighting at the front and back • Always lock your doors with the key and keep your windows secure, even when you're at home • Install an alarm/CCTV • Leave lights on timers • Register your valuables at <u>www.immobilise.com</u> and mark your property with UV pen (I have these available at my monthly events) • Avoid keeping cash at home • Hide car keys.

NAYLAND WEATHER SUMMARY: March & April 2024 by David Lowe

March saw a pretty well constant run of depressions running in from the Atlantic over the UK, and thus it was a very mild month - the mildest over the 16 year record period - and also damp. There was no cold weather at all - and only one air frost. It was the 7th month in a row with above average rainfall.

Mean temperature was $9.2^{\circ}C$ (6.97) with a high of $18^{\circ}C$ (17.12) and low of -0.9°C (-1.79). There was one ground frost and two grass frosts. There were no days of less than 5°C max (0.75) five less than 10° C max (11.81) and twenty-six less than 15°C max (27.31).

Bright sun hours were 203.3(210.41) solar energy was 5800 Ly (6309) and evapotranspiration 45.75 mm (48.06).

Monthly rain was 46.8 mm (40.8) with one day over 10mm (1.12). Highest rainfall rate was 14.6 mm/hr (27.78). Evapotranspiration slightly exceeded rainfall.

Average wind speed was 5.7 mph (5.01) with the highest day average, 12.2 mph (11.92). There was one day with a gust over 35 mph (1.87). The dominant direction was south.

April was a warm and wet month - albeit with a notable cold period between the 20th and 26th. It was the seventh consecutive month with above average rainfall - more than double.

Mean temperature was 10.4°C, third highest over the 16 year record period, with a max of 21.8 °C (20.84) and minimum of 0.2 °C (0.93). There were two grass frosts - no air or ground frosts.

The temp failed to reach 10 °C on one day only (3.69) with eighteen less than 15 °C (18.56) and twenty-seven less than 20 °C (27.75). First day over 20 °C was the 6th – three days in all (2.25).

Bright sun hours were 283 (285.6) and solar energy was 9350 Ly (10524). Evapotranspiration was 71.75 mm (74.97).

Monthly rain was 66 mm (31.36) more than double the normal of 31.36 mm and the second highest over the 16 year record period. Highest rainfall rate was 28 mm/hr (31.69) and highest daily amount 14.6 mm. there were two days with over 10 mm (0.56).

Average wind speed was 6. 4 mph (equal highest) with highest daily average 10.0 mph (9.69). Max gust was 39 mph with six days over 30 mph (2.5) two over 35 mph (0.81). Predominant wind direction was SW.

What news from Nayland Meadow ?

The sheep and lambs are all over much in evidence on the meadow giving universal joy! There have been a couple of sheep incidents and we will be putting up signs shortly with the shepherd's mobile number for reporting any issues - to Trevor Street on 07885 745074.

Following completion of phase 2 of the path (i.e. the new 400 metre section of permissive path) at he beginning of 2024 I am delighted to be able to report that this has all now greened up as the new grass cover gets established. We thank people for their patience and understanding during the installation of the new surface and the temporary path closure that this necessitated. Sadly some ignored the closed signs, walked along the closed newly laid grassed route and caused some damage.

Now for the photo. We have installed a new deluxe bat-box on one of the riverside trees - out of the way hanging from the branch. (Not all bats know Bruce Wayne or live in a cave ...!).

We are very grateful to The Anchor Inn, Nayland for sponsoring the purchase of this bat-box. Bat-boxes provide secure sites for bats to roost in during the day and can sometimes be used as a maternity roost for breeding females. Bat-boxes are especially important in areas which have few natural roost sites. Much of the tree cover within or near the meadow is guite recent and the trees have few holes or crevices in which bats can roost. In future we will be installing additional boxes around the site to try and encourage more bats to the area.

VILLAGE PLAYERS: 'ON GOLDEN POND'

Nayland's Village Players served up a real treat with their spring production of Eric Thompson's 'On Golden Pond'. The play's single set meant that Nick Moriarty, Mandy Cook and Lorraine Coombes, with assistance from Roy Norfolk, Alice Gurden and Mark West, could really go to town on constructing and dressing the living room of a New England summer house - and they did not disappoint. The lighting from Elliot Mo also helped to provide the desired charming ambience. Visiting director Liz Mullen's inspired decision to have a live pianist (Helen Walder) playing the wistful theme tune before the start and during inter-scene setting put the audience in the right frame of mind for the play's main theme – Norman and Ethel Thayer coming to terms with the autumn of their own lives. John McCarroll and Jackie Grant have both won awards for their individual acting, and together they were formidable. Norman - irascible, tactless but ultimately loveable; Ethel the mainstay and calming influence for this force of nature.

There were certainly lighter moments too. Tim Dotchin was perfectly cast as the hapless mailman Charlie "Mackinarley" Martin, whose every utterance melted into infectious laughter.

Norman ultimately showed his gentle side when being reconciled with his estranged daughter Chelsea (superbly played by Emma Wallis) and was firmly taken to task by Chelsea's lover and, eventual husband, Bill Ray (played by Mark Russell in an unassuming way as befitted the character) when he had overstepped the mark once too often. This showed that Norman was ultimately as vulnerable as the rest of us and we felt for him as he showed signs of aging and memory loss. The bright light for him, though, was a new force in his life- Billy (a strong performance by young Alex Walder) with whom he became the firmest of friends.

All was well cast and superbly executed, but the plaudits must go to the main two characters and the actors who played them – Norman and Ethel, John and Jackie. They had us in the palm of their hand throughout, including the moment we thought Norman

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MEMORIAL FOR JANE WALKER HOSPITAL PATIENTS A memorial to honour disabled patients of the former Jane Walker Hospital has been unveiled

Organisers of the 'My Iron Cross' campaign have lauded the public's generosity in helping to raise over £3,000 for a permanent memorial for residents of the former Jane Walker Hospital in Wissington which closed in 1991. Many of the patients had been left and forgotten by their families.

Forty-eight residents of the institution, which housed and cared for people with learning disabilities, are interred at Nayland cemetery, with each of their burial sites marked with a small inscribed iron cross but they had become damaged or had disappeared prompting the fundraising campaign.

The unveiling ceremony, with a blessing and speeches, held on 18th April was very moving. Small roses were placed on the iron crosses that mark the graves in the cemetery.

The headstone was made by Hunnaball Funeral Directors and features the names of the patients as well as an image of the former hospital.

Jennie Hunnaball was very involved and supportive in making the memorial, as was Nick Tindle Stonemason and Jason Tipple of Essex Forge who made and donated 15 new iron crosses.
