NAYLAND WITH WISSINGTON PARISH COUNCIL

Notes by observer of the meeting: 11th September 2024

(Minutes will be available on PC notice board in the High Street or https://naylandwithwissington-pc.gov.uk after the next meeting)

Laura Erith chaired the meeting.

HIGHWAYS

Dawn Harris raised the ongoing lack of response to weeds, road surface and bollard replacement on the by-pass. The old illuminated bollards are due to be replaced, but with only reflective bollards, only a section of the road surfacing has been improved and nothing done about the weeds. It's a poor looking entrance to the village. Councillors are dissatisfied and find it difficult to know who at what department to contact for various problems. It was felt James Finch should be asked to pursue this with Highways.

Gerry Battye has reported the overgrown trees on Harpers Hill. FINANCE

Autumn is the time to consider whether council projects require budgeting for, ahead of the Finance Committee meeting; i.e. future work at the playpark, allotments, old shelter site on Harpers Estate, Horsewatering, etc. The budget will include half the cost of a community defibrillator for Wiston which the Community Council are proposing and also funding.

PLANNING

Councillors heard that Babergh had no objections at Smokey Farm Campions Hill [DC/24/02437 for change of use of agricultural land and creation of fenced manège and at 14 Church Lane [DC/24/02935] concluded that continued use of entire property as residential dwelling was lawful.

Applications for works to trees were granted at Lower Courtwood 13A Court Street [DC/24/02989] to reduce a Willow by 30-40%; at The White House 16 Church Lane [DC/24/03085] for crown reduction of 1-1.5 metres) Norway Maple, crown reduction of Holly and severing of ivy and climber at base of Hawthorn and pruning branches but maintaining the natural shape, and removing accessible mistletoe from crown; and at Park House Wissington Uplands [DC/24/03472] to thin out new growth on Holm Oak, cut back Yew raise crown of Macrocarpa and reduce canopy of Oak by up to 40% and remove deadwood.

Discharge of conditions were granted at 52 - 54 Bear Street [DC/24/03479] relating to DC/24/01052 for cladding and roofing materials, brickwork sample panel, eaves and verges, rainwater goods, and door and window details; also at 52 - 54 Bear Street [DC/24/03529] relating to DC/23/05592 for backing materials and insulation: and at

The White House 16 Church Lane [DC/24/03076] a nonmaterial amendment was granted relating to DC/22/05721 to adjust the location of the proposed cartlodge 600mm in a north easterly direction so that the proposed Cartlodge is 1000mm from the boundary wall, not 600mm as currently approved.

Between meetings councillors had no objections to works to trees at The White House 16 Church Lane [DC/24/03666] for height reduction of a Hazel by 3-4 ft and prune sides to maintain balanced and natural shape; at 9 Court Street [DC/24/03707] to reduce a Tulip tree to previous pollard points; at The Cartlodge Lower Courtwood 13A Court Street [DC/24/03706] to crown lift an Oak with TPO by 1-2m and remove deadwood and thin crown.

Regarding listed building consent at 72 - 78 Bear Street [DC/24/ 03739] for erection of single storey rear extension (following part demolition of conservatory), glazed link between house and garage, new garage roof and part conversion of garage into additional living accommodation. and internal alterations councillors had no objections subject to a thorough inspection and advice from the heritage team as this is an important riverside property and the heritage features of this property must not be compromised.

Councillors had concerns at 2 Gravel Hill [DC/24/03691] for erection of double carport/machinery store; that the usual planning display notice is not evident, the neighbours in Birch Street have not been consulted and important items are missing from the site plan including a large ash tree. The proposal is on rising ground behind Birch Street, and it is difficult to comment on the impact on neighbour amenity with missing consultations and information.

Discussing an application at Hill Farm Business Centre Harpers Hill [DC/24/03661] for erection of a storage building, comprising of 6 separate secure storage spaces (re-submission of DC/23/04190) councillors reviewed this application against the previously withdrawn application and still object.

Debbie Hattrell said the purchase had been made from SALC (Suffolk Association of Local Councils) of Webinar recordings of planning training sessions; arrangements will be made for councillors to view them together. This will provide them with greater knowledge of the current planning laws.

Councillors discussed further the suggestion of community led housing which arose from the Parish Assembly and various points raised, including changes in planning laws under the new government, conducting another housing needs survey and whether that was needed to unlock funding and a local plan. Further fact finding is needed. This will be a long project. It was felt the first issue to be looked at should be potential land that abuts the built up area.

RECREATION AND OPEN SPACES

Dawn Harris provided her low maintenance planting plan for the land around the old shelter on Harpers Estate. Councillors discussed the options. The grass cutting schedule is with Babergh; would a planting plan work in conjunction with that. Alternatively the Council could apply for a licence (as they did with Caley Green) to manage the site themselves, whereby the grass cutting would be more frequent and they could determine any planting and maintenance. This would be considered further.

Following the request of a neighbour and a site visit by Laura Erith PC contractors attended to boundary bushes and trees at Pop's Piece. The neighbour has requested more to be cut back; Laura Erith will revisit.

Dawn Harris said there was a pile of tyres on the Essex side of the sluice gates; she will alert the Environment Agency.

Councillors heard that a resident had complained to SCC about fires/barbecues occurring on Caley Green. However, there had been no fires and only an infrequent gas barbecue by a local family and no damage had occurred. Because of the complaint SCC feel they have to erect permanent signage on the Green.

The issue of advertising banners on Caley Green and along Horkesley Road was raised. A policy is in place; originally agreed in liaison with SCC, the landowners whereby banners/signage are only permitted with authorisation of the PC, following an application submitted with a risk assessment and proof of PL insurance to the PC Clerk who will check availability. Village groups may apply for display periods of 2 weeks, anything commercial may apply for periods of 1 week per month. However, only 2 banners can be displayed at any one time. There have been incidents this year where banners have been removed. Last winter seasonal banners were displayed without proper authorisation. Any unauthorised banners may be removed.

ALLOTMENTS

Dawn Harris updated councillors regarding tenants who were still outstanding with their rents, and those whose allotments were not being properly maintained. Despite saying they would work on their allotments some have not improved. Two allotments have been given up; these will be reallocated to the two people on the waiting list.

IN BRIFF

A neighbouring resident of the village hall has raised concerns about the condition of trees near their boundary. The location is dense and it is difficult to see what the problem may be; Dawn Harris will respond to the neighbour and identify any issue with the trees.

Owen Brown proposed a polite notice requesting that glass and breakable vases are not left on graves. This is due to health and safety concerns for contractors.

Councillors heard that work undertaken by the Land Company to improve the riverside PROW on Nayland Meadow had begun. PAGE 2

The Post Office has been a hugely important hub over the years offering villagers and societies a great service; going the extra mile helping to promote and sell tickets to village events, selling society merchandise and having their collection boxes. It has been where many stopped to chat and has kept the High Street alive.

Patsie has been at the Post Office since March 1981, for over 43 years, so deserves a break and a huge thank you. I'm sure many wish Patsie a very happy retirement.

This area of the village will certainly feel different; there has been a Post Office at 19 High Street for over 100 years.


Looking back at archives about the postal service in Nayland they reveal that up until his death is 1842 Thomas Marshall, a tailor living at 17 Court Street, was Postmaster; from his own home he would have sold postage stamps to the public. The next postmaster was William Littlebury, a shoemaker; his family continued the postal service for almost a century. The Littlebury family bought the building which is currently the Post Office (19 High Street) in 1910, prior to that it had been situated at 9 Court Street (from1925 until recently that was Kerridge's Butchers shop).

GARDEN WASTE & BONFIRES



With winter approaching and gardens in need of a final tidy the question of what to do with our garden waste comes to the forefront. There are various options for disposal; composting at home, using Babergh's Brown Bin Scheme, taking the rubbish to Household Waste and Recycling

Centres such as:

- Colchester: Maldon Road, Shrub End CO3 4RN

Another option is to have a bonfire...

The bonfire takes its name from the medieval 'bon-fire of animal bones'. While modern day bonfire ingredients are on the whole less gruesome, burning waste materials can cause pollution and local nuisance.

Occasionally a bonfire is the best practicable way to dispose of woody or diseased waste that cannot be composted. If you chose this option please adhere to the guidelines:

• Speak to your neighbours, see if you can agree a time and site for the fire.

- Do not light it when your neighbours' washing is out or their windows are open.
- Avoid lighting a fire in unsuitable weather conditions smoke hangs in the air on damp, still days. If it is windy, smoke blows into neighbours' gardens and windows and across roads. In the evenings atmospheric pressure keeps the smoke down.
- Avoid burning at weekends and on bank holidays when your neighbours have a right to enjoy their gardens
- Never use petrol or oil to light a fire
- Ensure that only dry material is burnt. This will produce the minimum of smoke.
- Do not burn plastic, rubber, household rubbish, or other materials which cause dark smoke and noxious fumes
- Never leave a fire unattended or leave it to smoulder put it out

There are no specific controls, such as permitted times, over the lighting of domestic bonfires to burn waste. However, smoke and emissions from a bonfire (or any other process of burning) can be considered a Statutory Nuisance. Environmental Health is responsible for investigating complaints. **If You are Troubled by Bonfire Smoke...**

- Try talking to those responsible for the bonfire. They may not be aware that they are causing a problem and a reasonable approach may encourage a reasonable response.
- If this fails, environmental health at your local council should be notified. They must investigate your complaint and must issue a notice under the Environmental Protection Act 1990.

COMMUNITY COUNCIL REPORT Meeting: 3rd September 2024 Chair: Rachel Hitchcock 07788 954309

Rachel Hitchcock welcomed members to the meeting.

Executive Committee: As always we welcome new members to join the team – please spread an encouraging word to anyone who may be interested in joining us. It is an enjoyable friendly village committee that provides positive events and facilities for the community. Contact Rachel on 07788 954309 or rachel_hitchcock @hotmail.com if you would like to know more.

Fundraising Activities/Events: As always future ideas and support are welcome.

Community Defibrillator (AED): AEDs are located at the Village Hall and at the Fire Station. The AED at the Village Hall is managed by the CC and regularly checked .

Regarding the possibility a public access AED in Wiston. It was felt clarification on the status of the AED at the Fire Station was needed prior to considering a location for one at Wiston. The PC has confirmed they will be able to assist financially via CIL (Community Infrastructure Levy); Rachel will update them on the current cost. Community Heartbeat Trust (CHT) confirmed a defibrillator could operate without a power supply; they estimated the cost would be in the region £2,300; a location by the Parish Council noticeboard in Wiston had been mooted .

River Stour Water Level Gauge: Rachel is pleased to report that this project has come to fruition. Danny Thurlow did an excellent job installing the single sided water gauge on an oak post in the river at Caley Green (between the bench and reed bed) on 23rd July. The gauge provides two water level readings: the river bed depth (useful for the school projects and locals) and above sea level (for official recording) in line with the EA and river trusts.

Online Ticketing Facility: *NaylandEvents.org* – This has become increasingly useful for selling tickets to village events. If village organisations wish to use this facility to sell tickets for their events contact Justin Dowding at jpdowding@gmail.com.

Village Hall Gardening Morning: The next gardening session will be on Saturday 26th October from 9am. Please pop along to assist; it's a sociable morning and refreshments are provided. A low level shrub is needed for the front of the CC section.

Community Involvement: Ideas to help raise participation in village groups and events are welcome. '*Volunteer Vacancies*' is an item included in the Community Times; please let Lorraine know if you have vacancies, along with an idea of the level of commitment needed .

It would be helpful if everyone, when they see promotions for Nayland events on Facebook, could make a comment (however brief) and not just click on 'like' which is no help. All village groups would benefit from the additional publicity.

Resident Volunteer List: This is a list of residents prepared to assist other residents who at times are unable to get out for themselves and would benefit from having a prescription collected, an errand run or some shopping dropped off. There has not been great demand currently but this is helping a few residents.

Plaque to mark the contribution of Ken Willingale: Members had agreed a plaque to commemorate the contribution of Ken Willingale to the CC and for this to incorporate an existing tribute of his wife Olive in the HortSoc section of the village hall garden. The wording suggested on a slate plaque is *"Ken Willingale, Community Council founder member, Treasurer, Chairman and President 1966-2024 and Olive Willingale, Horticultural Society*

Secretary & President 1980-2011. Commemorating their many contributions to the village." A quote has been requested. This was agreed in principle and would be progressed between meetings.

TREASURER'S REPORT: Matt Cable gave his report on finances to 31st August.

Breakdown of profits: Community Times £410, Quiz £664.20. **Grants paid:** Nayland Village Choir £1,500, Nayland School Choir £400, Baby & Toddler Group £300. **Expenses:** £974 for water gauge at Caley Green, £180 for permissive path mowing (along Stoke Rd), £112 for hall hire, £94 for web hosting, £198 for annual defibrillator maintenance. **Current Position:** The accounts show reserves of £24,193.51 represented by Deposit a/c monies £11,601.62, Current a/c monies £11,468.57, Cash in Hand £1,123.32. We hold £143.51 for the RBL Services Fund and grants are pending for: VH roof £10,000, Lizzie's Fund £153, VH coffee machine £280. **Therefore, unencumbered assets are £13,617.**

GRANTS & DONATIONS:

Permissive footpath maintenance: Members previously agreed to cover the cost of mowing and strimming the permissive path along the right hand side of Stoke Road including an autumn hedge cut. As was also agreed a quote has been obtained for maintaining the stretch of path from Court Knoll to the allotments as that is another popular path that becomes overgrown. The initial cost would be £600 as the path is really quite overgrown. This was agreed. Daniel Bowman will carry this out soon as bird nesting season is coming to an end. Arrangements have been discussed with the Tendring Estate Manager, Matthew Hague, and he is hoping to provide a volunteer to help with the clearing up (which would otherwise cost an extra £200). Going forward, with regular maintenance, this would be less; Rachel will ask the Parish Council if they would be able to contribute to the future cost of vegetation management.

There is a section of this path that is prone to flooding so possible solutions to make this more passable may be worth considering as well as whether any grants may be available.

Nayland First Responders: Anthony Roberts (Director of Colchester Arts Centre) has agreed to donate a fundraising event for NFR; they need to supply the venue. This will be reading of *'Dickens' A Christmas Carol'*, by Anthony Roberts to music. Nayland village hall has been booked for this on 19th December; the CC agreed to consider between meetings a grant application to cover the cost of hiring the hall. Promotion Lorraine offered to help with poster/advert for the CT.

Community Times & Websites: Lorraine Brooks thanked all for contributing to recent issues. Heading towards the next deadline; please let Lorraine know if you have promotion or large items to include so adequate space can be reserved.



A REMINDER THAT PERMISSION IS REQUIRED TO PLACE BANNERS ON CALEY GREEN & ALONG HORKESLEY ROAD

In order for advertising banners or any promotional signage to be placed on Caley Green or along Horkesley Road permission must first be granted by the Parish Council. Those not authorised may be removed.

A banner policy was established in liaison with SCC, the landowners:

- Permission should be obtained prior to the banner being displayed. An application must include a risk assessment together with proof of Insurance.
- The Parish Clerk will check availability; there can be no more than 2 banners there at any time.
- Village groups may apply for display periods of 2 weeks, anything commercial may apply for periods of 1 week per month.
- A banner may not be erected more than 14 days before the event being advertised and must be removed no later than 48 hours after the event.
- The banner should be at least 2 metres from the A134, be very securely staked and tied and not be placed so that they obstruct visibility to users of the highway.



WATER LEVELS

Summer and its dry spell arrived late this year so there have been no notable low level issues, although there have been variations in flow over the horseshoe weir.

WATER LEVEL GAUGE FOR RIVER STOUR

Following fluctuations in the water levels, and occasions in recent years when flow in the river virtually ceased through Nayland the Community Council agreed to supply and install a water level gauge at Caley Green.

Permission was given by Suffolk County Council, landowners of Caley Green and the Environment Agency confirmed a permit was not required. A censored gauge was not possible but it was felt a simple gauge would help monitor the water levels and it would be a point of interest to have a gauge board located where residents can see it.

The gauge provides two water level readings: the river bed depth (useful for the school projects and locals) and the above sea level (for official recording) in line with the EA and river trusts. A local surveyor kindly provided the OS above sea level datum.

The gauge board was purchased from Shelley Signs, the oak post and installation was carried out by Danny Thurlow Landscapes on 23rd July 2024.

So if you have any concerns they can be reported to the EA hotline and Lorraine would be pleased to be advised in order to keep a note of incidents (*details as above*).

WATER QUALITY & SEWAGE

This Spring someone in our Parish began regular testing for E-Coli with the UoE.

They found that levels were higher in spring but once the weather become warm from July onwards the water quality has remained fairly good, But when it rains the ecoli level rises to an unsafe level. It rose to an unsafe level in July when the sewage point in Sudbury was opened for 4 minutes; testing took place 48hrs after.

As reported in the last CT the quality of the River water has not been good; there was a confirmed case of Leptospirosis in someone at Dedham. Local tests for E-Coli have had mixed results. The EA have circulated advise to reduce risks of infection whilst participating in river activities:

Before: cover up any cuts or abrasions as infection can enter the body through the nose, mouth and open wounds.

During: keep any open wounds covered and re-dress if necessary, practise good hand hygiene if eating or drinking during your activity. Be conscious where animals may frequent as they can be a likely source of infection.

After: practise good hygiene, sanitise hands, shower as soon as possible. If you feel unwell after being in contact with the river (severe cold and flu like symptoms) speak to your healthcare professional.

REED GROWTH

The situation with reeds around the Horseshoe weir is disgraceful. As the photos (right) show the Horseshoe weir is surrounded by reeds on three sides. Could this affect flow slightly there so that flow down Mill Lade and mill Stream in increased?

Reeds along the whole river continue to thrive at the expense of biodiversity, as they squeeze the less robust species out. They are so dense that they now inhibit easy access to/from the river by some species of wildlife.

WILDFOWL & SWANS

It has been sad this year to have no cygnets on the river at Nayland or Wiston. The Nayland cob swan had an injured wing; advice sought recommended no action but to continue monitoring. However as the CT goes to print it appears a new pair of swans have taken over the Nayland territory.

The number of ducks is still very small. A few ducklings were spotted briefly but very few survive as they have so many predators;

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Corvids (crow family), herons, gulls, otters, rats, stoats and weasels, foxes, snakes, pike, etc.

As there are currently so few ducks, it's not currently the case here but drakes may kill ducklings. Male ducks have very high sex drives, and a reputation for being very rough on females. They will kill ducklings of a female they want to mate with. If there are other drakes around when mating is occurring, they will compete and the female is often injured or killed in the scrum. This is why in some flocks management of the number of drakes is advisable.

PIKE & EEL

Thanks to Peter Jan Haqjduga who captured this photo of an eel at Caley Green in late August. It is unusual to see one in bright, shallow water.

They inhabit most waterbodies and can move across land but prefer dark waters, or waters with plenty of silt and mud at the bottom - there's silt aplenty in our river here!!! Eels scavenge for food, preying on dead and dying animals, fish and invertebrates.

Eels are born in the Sargasso Sea, within the Atlantic Ocean and migrate. After three years or so swimming the Gulf Stream, they reach the UK and Europe as tiny transparent elvers known as glass eels. Here they gradually mature, over 8-20 years, then they head back to the Sargasso Sea to spawn.

In the past when their numbers were high, it was common practice to take eels for the pot ; 20+ years ago morsels of eel, caught in the river by the landlord, were placed on the bar at the Anchor. However, removal of eels for any purpose is no longer permitted due to their endangered species status. All

eels caught on rod and line must be returned to the waterway. Also in August a youngster, who wasn't wearing protective water shoes was bitten on their foot by something in the river; the halfmoon shaped wound was painful, bled and resulted in a trip to hospital for a tetanus jab and antibiotics as the razor sharp teeth would have been coated with bacteria and the water also contain

germs. It's suggested that the most likely culprit for the bite was

a Pike; there are plenty of them in the river at Nayland. The pike (Esox lucius), aka freshwater shark or water wolf, is an ultimate, prehistoric looking, ambush predator that lurks in slow flowing waterways; it is the largest freshwater fish in the UK. Male pike rarely grow in excess of 10lb in weight, females will grow to 20lb-45lb. Their lifespan can be 10-25 years.

They are territorial and will aggressively attack any intruders; they have a broad flattened, duck-like snout and their huge mouth contains a fierce arsenal of backward pointing, razor sharp teeth to clamp onto victims. It is at the top of the food chain and it will eat other fish, frogs, small mammals, snakes, birds, ducks, water voles, etc. Despite their binocular vision

human limbs can be mistaken for prey.

CALEY GREEN

The Friends continue to keep an eye on the Green and wildfowl. They empty the bins when necessary between Babergh collections. The Green has brought much enjoyment again this summer especially to local families; as predicted the number of visitors has decreased over post-Covid years.

THE LONG REED BED

The long running saga regarding reduction of the enormous and expanding wall of reeds along Caley Green continues still! SCC is very aware of the overwhelming desire of residents to have management of them undertaken. It's hoped this autumn will see some action.

RIVERBANK PROTECTION UPDATE

SCC stated they will fund and take forward installation of wooden revetment around the bay at Caley Green to protect it from future erosion, there is still no further update.

LITTER BY SLUICEGATES

Clearance of litter and flytipping on SCC's triangle of land adjacent the sluice gates was reported to them in late 2022; clearance by their contractor is still awaited.

WISTON MILL PORTAGE

WaterwaysAnglian@environment-agency advised that long awaited works to repair and re-plank the portage at Wiston Mill were scheduled for July and August; the work was carried out just in time for the S2C event on 13th/14th September. Photo thanks to Kevin Sheath.

S2C - SUDBURY TO THE SEA

This annual event was back to being held over two days, having overcome the problem of Boxted bridge, and the navigation there being closed. It was held over the weekend of 14th/15th September. At Wiston 134 craft went through.

CORONATION ALE c1911

This charming photograph of a group of ladies was recently shared by Keith Slater on a very interesting Facebook group: https://www.facebook.com/ groups/oldphotosnaylandboxford buresstokebynaylandpolstead

He had no information about the photo other than it was taken by Gowing. The ladies in the photo are holding bottles of 'Coronation Ale' and there is a notice on the side of the cart displaying 'Coronation Ale'.

Bearing in mind the renowned Nayland photographer Charles Gowing photographed mainly from 1901-1920, the Coronation of George V was June 1911, and there are no leaves on the trees, it's likely the photo was taken in early spring 1911.

The location of the scene has been identified as the track to Sandpitts Farm, then part of the East Anglian Sanatorium (the San) aka the Jane Walker Hospital, at the back entrance to the San grounds, looking towards the main buildings. The ladies maybe patients of the San; treatment of TB was fresh air and good nutrition - the ladies in the photo were well wrapped up certainly getting fresh air.

Local historians have no knowledge of any brewing having been carried out at the San. The purpose of the photograph is not known and it is not known if the Coronation Ale was brewed locally. Cuddons Brewery, located behind St James' Church, closed in 1918 but it's not known if they produced Coronation Ale. HARPERS HILL WILDLIFE SITE: AUTUMN MAINTENANCE

On 11th September volunteers, guided by experts, attended to carry out their annual maintenance; however local Facebook went unnecessarily wild with alarm suggesting the area was being desecrated!

Suffolk has over 900 County Wildlife Sites which are often designated because they have particular characteristic or support threatened species or habitats. The small site at Harpers Hill, consists of a small area of species and supports a very good range of flowering plants; some of which are rare. The appropriate management and protection of these sites for wildlife is important as wildlife habitats can deteriorate if neglected or managed in an unfavourable way. The Dedham Vale Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty (AONB) and Stour Valley Project volunteers undertake a cut and rake every autumn removing all debris. This allows seeds to disperse and ensures no extra fertility is added to the grassland which if left would increase the soil nutrients and encourage the more vigorous grasses and wildflowers to grow and overpower others.

On 24th July we toured the 100th Bomb group museum at Thorpe Abbotts and then the 95th 'Red Feather' Bomb Group at Horham. The party stopped for a delicious lunch at The Swan Inn in Hoxne, scene of the capture and execution of King Edmund and the discovery of the Hoxne Hoard, largest find of buried treasure in the Country.

The two museums capture the heroism and technical achievements of the USAAF operating in the European Theatre of WW2, captured recently in the Apple TV Series 'Masters of the Air'. Both museums are operated by volunteers, who enthusiastically showed us round and offered refreshments. At Thorpe Abbotts, coincidentally, we met a group of people in period uniforms from all over the World, including Canada, the US and Germany!

Thorpe Abbotts still has its Control Tower and the museum volunteers have re-built the 'Glasshouse' on the roof to its wartime layout, complete with soundtrack of B 17 Heavy Bombers approaching the airfield - of which there is not much left, having been returned to agriculture. Officers would have watched as their squadrons left on missions and anxiously awaited their return, scanning the horizon and listening carefully for the sound of returning aircraft, many damaged and carrying wounded aircrew. Our imaginations worked overtime. At Horham the buildings have been largely re-constructed and there is very little remaining of the 700-acre site, even although a section of the main runway still exists; a Stars and Stripes flying proudly at the point where the public road crosses the concrete runway.

We all learned a lot about the individuals, their uniforms, aircraft weaponry and technical support, from radios to the famous, top-secret Norden Bombsight (which bombardiers were instructed to destroy if the aircraft was about to crash in enemy territory). Both museums had Rolls of Honour and the statistics of losses from both enemy action and accidents were salutary. From Thorpe Abbotts about 712 aircraft were shot down and 152 lost due to accidents!

These trips are annual events and are open to anyone interested. Our next meeting will be held at the Boxted Airfield Historical Society's Museum at Boxted airfield at 10:30am on Sunday 29th September, meet at the museum – all welcome.

Our AGM will take place on 14th October at 7.30 for 8pm in the Church Hall when Michael Callaghan will talk about the day of the change to decimal currency. All our meetings are open to everyone.

- Friday 25th October : 'Baltimore' (2023). aka 'Rose's War' is based on the infamous true story of an English heiress who became a revolutionary. Debutante Rose Dugdale (Imogen Poots) enjoys a life of wealth and privilege, but her rebellious nature soon leads her down a militant path. Amongst the political turmoil of the 1970s, her sympathy towards the IRA's conflict evolves into radicalisation.
- Friday 15th November: 'Vindication Swim' (2024). Vindication Swim depicts the inspirational story of Mercedes Gleitze (Kirsten Callaghan), the young Brighton swimmer of German parentage, who in 1927 became the first British woman to swim the English Channel. The film portrays struggle in overcoming both the cold waters of the English Channel and the oppressive society of 1920s Britain. However, her success in completing the crossing turns out to be just the beginning of Mercedes' trials. Her rival, Edith Gade's (Victoria Summer) scandalous fakery claiming to have accomplished the same feat contaminates Mercedes' honest efforts and arouses pandemonium in the press; Mercedes is forced to repeat her Channel crossing.
- Friday 13th December: 'Wilding' (2023) is a documentary based on Isabella Tree's best-selling book of the same name. Having inherited Knepp Castle, a 3,500-acre estate in West Sussex, aristocratic farmer Charlie Burrell (Sir Charles Burrell) and his wife, Isabella made the decision in 2000 to turn the land over to an experimental rewilding project along the lines of an experiment being carried out in Holland. The film now follows the reclamation of the space by wildlife; fences were removed, they introduced red and fallow deer, pigs, cattle, storks, beavers and creatures that would have roamed the land freely a few hundred years ago.

PATH IMPROVEMENT PROJECT

As you are all aware we carried out an extensive survey to ascertain whether local residents were happy with the work we had done in the last two years and would they be happy for us to complete the loop by doing the remaining sections around the riverbank.

We received overwhelming support from the survey for doing this work and I'm glad to say that we have made a start in early September.





The required permits from the environment agency and a formal closure notice of the public PROW footpath along the riverbank for three months from Suffolk County Council are in place.

An adjacent alternative route for walkers will always be available. The rough and uneven tarmac between the portage points on the river will be removed and be replaced by our path specification which should cause far less damage to the bottom of the boats and canoes that are dragged along it at the moment! The portage points will always remain usable.

A little patience and forbearance may be necessary in the short term for what we hope will be a welcome and well used community asset for many years to come.




In Wissington in July, there has been an affray offence within a family home, police responded, located and arrested a male who had left the address and he has since been charged for possessing a bladed article in a public place. In Nayland in August, at a different private address, an adult female has been arrested for an offences of threatening a person with an offensive weapon in a private place, a

criminal damage matter was also reported, the result of these being no further action. Both those incidents involved family members known to each other and there is not thought to be any ongoing concern for the wider public.

Also reported in Nayland were the following incidents, on 22nd August a cement mixer was stolen from a building site within a residential area. On 24th August it was reported an adult female punched a male in the face during parking dispute on Court Street in Nayland, the suspect has since been arrested and at time of writing this article they are on police bail whilst enquiries continue. There have also been some incidents resulting in adult protection investigations due to concerns identified and also a domestic non crime incident.

As you can read, some unpleasant incidents reported and my thoughts are with the people involved. From what I can see, these incidents have been responded to positively by police, making sure everyone is safe and reducing the likelihood of further issues.



NAYLAND WEATHER SUMMARY: May & June 2024 by David Lowe


After respite in June, rainfall was back in record territory in **July**, at 90.8 mm. this was the second wettest month over the record period – the highest being 110 mm in 2012. That record looked almost certain to fall mid-month, when the total stood at 81.6 mm. However, only 9.2 mm fell in the second half of the month. Most of the rain fell 6-8, 50 mm. With this amount of rain in July, and from preceding months, it seems remarkable that lawns are going brown on 23 August, even with little rain this month.

Temperatures were average 17.8°C mean (17.82) with a max of 29.7°C (30.08). Lowest temp was 8.4° C (8.15) with lowest max of 17°C (17.98). There were 5 days when 20°C was not attained (5.35) with 6 days over 25°C (8.18) and none over 30°C (0.81).

Bright sun hours were 343 (342.23) and solar energy 12400 Ly (12920).

Highest rainfall in a day was 20.8 mm on the 6th (15.16) and highest rainfall rate 57.8 mm/hr (97.94). There were 4 days with 10 mm or more (1.65) this has only happened once before in July. Days with 20 mm or more are scarce – our one day compares with 0.18 average. There has never been more than 1.

Average wind speed was 3.5 mph (3.08) with no gusts of 30

mph or more. Highest daily average was 6.2 mph on the 3rd (6.41). The prevailing wind direction was west.

<u>August</u> - at last, a summery month! Mean temperature was 19.1° C (17.59) second equal highest, behind 2022. The average daily max was 24.47° C and minimum, 13.46° C. Highest was 30.6° C (28.52) and there were 14 days over 25° C, none less than 15° C and only one less than 20° C.


Bright sun hours were 310.5 (305.71) and solar energy 11,500 Ly (10,600) with evapotranspiration at 105 mm (90.29). The highest dewpoint over the entire 17 year record period was recorded during the month at 23.3° C. The average max for August is 19.62.

Rainfall was sparse – with a total of 24.2 mm (60.34). There was one day with over 10 mm (1.94) and the max rainfall rate recorded was 51.8 mm/hr (112.06).

Average wind speed was 4.4 mph (3.07) with 2 days with gusts of 30 mph (0.76). Highest daily average was 7.9 mph on 23rd (6.48). The dominant direction was SSW.

Nationally, it has been held to have been a cold summer. However, here it has not been as bad as one might think, if you compare this year with the 17 year average. The tables below may be of interest.

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Edward Jenner, Discoverer of Vaccination

The highly contagious disease of Smallpox from which millions of people worldwide have died originated many centuries ago. During the 18th century epidemics swept through England but thanks to the pioneering work of Edward Jenner Smallpox was eradicated by the 1970s.

Edward Jenner (1749 - 1823) was born in Berkeley, Gloucestershire. Aged 14 he was apprenticed to a surgeon in Chipping Sodbury and in 1770 moved to London to complete his medical training, returning to Berkeley in 1772 to become a local practitioner and surgeon. He had always been intrigued by country lore which said people who caught cowpox from their cows could not catch smallpox and this led to the most important research of his life.

After experimenting for many years, Edward Jenner was able to prove there was truth in this theory. He inoculated an 8 year old boy with cowpox matter taken from the hand of a milkmaid and then inoculated him with smallpox germs, with no effect. He proved that an inoculation of cowpox virus produced an immunity against the human disease of smallpox. There was initially much opposition until more than 70 principal physicians signed a declaration of their confidence in it.

In 1980 the World Health Organisation formally declared "Smallpox is Dead". The most feared disease of all time had been eradicated. It has been estimated that the work Edward Jenner did led to the saving of more human lives than that of any other person.

In response to the 18th century epidemics in this country, isolation hospitals were set up and here in Nayland we had our own "Pest House" built in an isolated location to the north of the village off Gravel Hill. It is one of Nayland's most historic buildings and currently is once more for sale.

Dr Slade, Nayland's historian in the 1920s and 30s, had discovered an entry in the records of the Feoffees (Nayland charity trustees) about the Pest House which stated that it was built by the Feoffees at a cost of £64 16s. 6 $\frac{1}{2}$ d. in 1756. He also found another entry for 28 July 1757: "Order to pull down a messuage near the Church gates and out of the material to erect ... a lean-to for a Bakehouse at the south end of the Pest House and an oven with a little house adjoining the said building".

Some years ago Rosemary Knox studied the Nayland Feoffees' account books from 1553 to 1782 in the Suffolk Record Office. She found that from 1772 there was a steady flow of entries about the Pest House, for example: in July 1775 a payment of 11s. 1d. was made for Beer for the Pest House; on 19th July Bread for Margaret Hart cost 1s. 0d; a bill dated 12 July 1775 from J Smith contained a long list of amounts of cheese, butter, soap, salt and stockings totalling 7s. 8 ¼ d. and another one for 11thJuly from Mr Holton (the Nayland butcher) for neck of mutton, beef, breast of lamb and loyn (sic) of lamb, totalling 10s. 11d.

From Rosemary's study of the Wiston Overseers' books in the 18th century it appears that Wiston, then a separate parish, had its own house for smallpox sufferers but Doctors Leah and Fairclough who were employed to care for them came from Nayland.

Records exist of Ann Simpson, a resident of Stoke-by-Nayland, who stayed in the Pest House during her illness and payments made on her behalf by Stoke parishioners in 1768 included beer every day, wine and milk most days and occasionally gin, eggs, bread and wood. The list showed the nurse's pay for 3 weeks visits was 19s. 0d. and 7s. 6d. was paid for 10 bushels of coal. The Attendance Man was paid amounts varying from 2.s 11d. to 5s. 7d. for his weekly visits. There was a payment of 3s. 9d. for going with a horse and cart to the Pest House 5 times.

Writing in the 1930s Dr Slade said that the "The Pest House

was still in use in 1874 and today stands a ruin in a field to the west of the lane at the top of Gravel Hill. (With the sale of Town Land Farm this house was sold and has since been restored)". A local press report of unknown date but probably about the same time states "Those wishing to see this, one of the very few remaining relics of public health, as practised in the reign of George II, should visit the old Pest House at Nayland before it collapses, as it is now in a very dilapidated state of repair. It was used as an isolation hospital, chiefly for small pox"

The 1838 Tithe Map of Nayland confirms the Pest House was owned by the Nayland Feoffees and occupied by "Hooker and others" who were probably sufferers of smallpox but later Census returns indicate it was no longer needed for its original purpose and was occupied by working families until 1901 when it was unoccupied. The latest incidence of smallpox I have found in Nayland is recorded in the burial register for 1882: a Nayland resident aged 36 had died of smallpox and a sad note was added that he was "buried at night".

In the 1930s when Town Land Farm and the Pest House were sold, as recorded by Dr Slade, the Pest House was bought and restored by Harry Edward Sawdy, as a country retreat from the family's permanent address in London. Harry Sawdy was the son of the Reverend Edward Sawdy, Minister in the 1920s of what was then called the Congregational Church in Stoke Road Nayland (later the United Reformed Church), who lived at the Manse in Bear Street. Harry and his family later moved to a house at the foot of Gravel Hill which was demolished around 1960.

The old Pest House was originally just a very small cottage. Although it has been altered and enlarged in recent years it still stands alone in its remote location and will always be an important part of Nayland's history.

PETER MANN

Known for being the truest of gentlemen, a quiet man who embodied kindness, patience, generosity and self control, Peter Mann of Millstone Cottage died on 5th July 2024.

Peter was born in September 1948; son to Philip Mann and Elisabeth and brother to Christopher, Jennifer and later Alexander. They were living in a boisterous noisy fourchild household at Croxted Road, Dulwich, South East London; it was a Blitz-surviving two-storey flat above Buckles Corner Shop which was full of amazing smells of roasted coffee, hams and cheeses. It was post 2nd World War and the area had still-notfixed destruction; it was a time of real austerity with rationing still very much in force - but with lots of wonderful bombedout ruins to play in.

In the early 1960s the family moved to Greenwich. Peter's elder brother Christopher

recalled his little brother fell some 30' out of the third-floor window; his first near death experience. Amazingly he was relatively unscathed, just shocked, winded, and crying only breaking his wrist - the plaster cast of which he used to good advantage in sibling rivalry battles.

Their father Philip travelled a lot on shipping business; he later became President of the Vintage Sports Car Club. In the 1950s he bought the first family car,

the one he really dreamed of - a Bentley 3 litre YR 509. Journeys in those pre-motorway times, perhaps stirred within Peter the first glimmerings of his passion for old cars.

Peter went to Dulwich College Prep, later boarding there, before going to Harrow School. Having left school, and after some overseas and other internships and travel, it was pretty much straight into the family shipping business where he worked alongside Christopher in the international transport division. This was at the time of industrial unrest in UK; through it all Peter was a strong proponent of our family motto 'strive to overcome'. He went on to have an amazing career.

The early to mid 1970s saw Peter's interest in older cars expand enormously. For his 21st in 1969 he inherited a 1925 14/40 Sunbeam which soon he sold as being 'too slow'; he replaced it with an AC Ace Bristol which he competed in UK and overseas events. Peter then bought a dark blue curvy Frazer Nash Mille Miglia, cementing his passion for Bristol engined cars. When the opportunity to buy an ERA R9B arose; the brothers pooled resources to become co-owners. Now the Mann brothers needed to get their race cars around to circuits efficiently, and so together they bought a single-decker bus. Plenty of tales and some close brushes with Mr Plod ensued!

Meantime, the Mann family business that Peter had joined was sold by the Trustees. Peter chose to leave and join one of the family's long term shipping partners, and to bring his General Motors contacts to link-up with the Cobelfret Group, a major Shipping Group in Belgium. Peter was the driving force in negotiating the freight contracts and in progressing the acquisition and the re-development of the terminal at Purfleet. This is one of Peter's lesser-known legacies, of which

he could and should have been very proud.

In 1980 came Peter's second near-death experience. At the British GP at Brands Hatch on a slippery track Peter's R9B barrel rolled, ending with the car resting upside down on top of Peter. He was stabilised, flown to the Woolwich military hospital and into theatre to have his spleen removed. He'd broken several ribs, and had methanol burns.

Good things come from bad sometimes. To assist his recovery he needed physiotherapy and this is how he met Anna who was then living then in Greenwich. Peter was living between the parental home in Greenwich and Harwich; they fell in love and married in 1981.

From then on Peter was a truly happy Mann; their shared life was a wonderful union, none more so than since their moving to Nayland and joining the wider

village community (pictured here at a HortSoc outing). He took the vital role of Treasurer of the Village Hall Management Committee and he and Anna participated in many village activities. Peter delighted villagers at fundraising events when they had the opportunity to ride in his beautiful 1936 Delahaye (photo below); little did they know he was a racing driver! They moved first to Bear Street, then to Newlands Lane and finally to Millstone

Cottage, in all Anna created a lovely home for them, as she had done at Great Horkesley and at their other properties in Norfolk and their Madeira time-share.

Peter served on the Vintage Sports Car Club Committee, and also on the Historic Grand Prix Cars Association. He loved being a racing driver of Ace Bristol, Frazer Nash MM, ERA, and of Frazer Nash Le Mans. He co-drove with Christopher in the Disco Volante, and only last year in the arduous Lands End Trial in YR 509. Just as much as competing himself, he loved being a hands-on patron, where he invited other drivers to race his brilliantly-prepared cars to good effect.

The Frazer Nash Le Mans Rep, which he bought in 1994, was without doubt Peter's favourite car. He drove it to race meetings. He raced it. He rallied it. He went shopping in it. He went to the pub in it. He lent it to his friends...

He extended so much generosity to so many people, sponsoring, encouraging others to take his cars out and have fun. "Of course winning is fun", he would say.

His friend John Ure never heard him raise his voice in anger or frustration; even when he'd rearranged the tail of his Frazer Nash against the sleepers after a close encounter with a slow BMW 328 in practice. Peter squinted at the crushed bodywork

> and bent wing and said quietly: "I was thinking of having the tail reshaped this winter anyway..!"

During his racing he was more familiar with triumphs than disasters; when successful he had a smile that would envelope his face such that it simply beamed, but when things didn't go so well he was always supportive, positive and looked forward enthusiastically.

Peter will be greatly missed as a dearly loved husband, brother, uncle and a wonderful friend to so many. PAGE 39

is more efficient. Jesus Christ showed us examples on how changing the world in a more efficient way. He didn't take power to lead an army and liberate the Hebrews from the Romans. He served people around him, disregarding their ethnicity, gender or social status. Doing this he wasn't conquering territories, he was conquering hearts.

How can we do the same? First of all, we must stopped being mesmerised by the news. It's good to be informed, but with the right media and with moderation, not with a constant flow of superficial news. Taking time to read an in depth newspaper, watching a long document is much more informative than a series of short comments on Social Media. Then we must focus our action on local and visible issues. Everyone according to one's abilities. If you're too frail to be outside in action, you can always pray. But be specific, pray for a person you know, a situation you're aware of. If you have some wealth you want to dedicate for the good, use it for the local hardship fund, for the support of your church, your school, your village hall, your scouts or youth club. If you have time to volunteer, be involved, to be a parish representative, help for the reading at school, help for the catering of the community pantry, serve at the coffee morning in your village, go shopping for your neiahbour.

Changing this world doesn't happen with extraordinary events, it requires everyday acts of kindness to your neighbour.


