VILLAGE HALL SECURES NATIONAL LOTTERY GRANT

The Village Hall Management Committee should be congratulated for, after several years of hard work, securing a grant from the National Lottery towards replacing the village hall roof which has reached the end of its service life.

Further funds and donations have been raised locally for which the VHMC are most grateful. The Babergh District Council grants will be subject to their cabinet consideration on the 11th March.

The project will incorporate fully insulating the roof and fitting photovoltaic panels to harvest energy; this is expected to take four months to complete. The hall will have a protective roof covering during this time and as the work will be carried out externally the hall will remain open during the roof replacement works. NAYLAND WITH WISSINGTON PARISH COUNCIL

Notes by observer of the meeting: 11th December 2024

Laura Erith chaired the meeting.

PUBLIC FORUM

Sally Dalton confirmed the willow tree on Caley Green damaged during Storm Darragh was dealt with promptly by the SCC's contractors, however some large logs remain. It was agreed to check the situation with SCC.

Mike Hunter put forward a suggestion for the Scout hut to be relocated to the allotment field for use by the allotment holders. He also raised an issue regarding a footpath diversion near Pop's Piece which may need formalising. He volunteered to pursue this on behalf of the Conservation Society and keep the PC informed.

DISTICT COUNCILLOR

Isabelle Reece said the sweep of the A134 by-pass islands has been done, however, she will ask if they can visit again. The matter with the burial ground wall is continuing as is the weeding near the Harpers Estate old bus shelter. The PC asked Isabelle to chase up replacement of the Campion Hill name sign.

HIGHWAYS

A damaged Heycroft Way sign (potentially caused during recent Anglian Water works) has been reported and is in hand. **FINANCE**

Recommendations from Finance Sub Committee include:

- A Precept of £50,000 (just below 5% increase) for 2025/26
- Our contribution towards the Village Hall Roof increased to £60,000.
- A new capital fund is created for Fairfield driveway starting at £2,000. It is recommended that the driveway surfacing should not take place until after construction works of a dwelling adjacent to the burial ground.
- £7,000 to be earmarked for the Playground.
- The contribution towards Webbs Meadow grass cutting to stay at £385.
- The Allotment rents to increase to £52 (£1 per week) whole plot £26 half from October 2025.
- The Burial Fees will have an uplift of 3%
- Parish CIL monies are to be used for new capital projects such as the Village Hall Roof and potentially the Playpark signage and fencing (subject to checking the criteria). We cannot use CIL for maintenance, just new items.

PLANNING

Councillors heard that Babergh had refused an application at **11 High Street** (formerly the White hart) [DC/24/04395] for retention of pub bracket without a sign.

Plans for double carport at **2 Gravel Hill** [DC/24/03691] were discussed and it was agreed to raise objections on the grounds that the prominence of the proposal is on rising ground above Birch Street. They gave concerns about the lighting scheme which is currently unspecified. The PC strongly suggest a site visit by the Planning Officer confirming existing boundaries and to fully appreciate the land levels and therefore the potential effects on neighbour amenity.

An application at **The Willows**, **Wiston Rd** [*DC*/24/04272] for erection of single storey rear extension will be dealt with between meetings to meet Babergh's deadline.

Further viewings of planning webinars were being arranged for councillors.

COMMUNITY LED HOUSING

Tricia Fuller reported that the Lady Anne Windsor Charity had been in touch regarding the 12 acres off Plough Lane in Leavenheath and a meeting was to be arranged for January 2025 to discuss this further. It was agreed to retain Community Led Housing as an Agenda item.

RECREATION AND OPEN SPACES

The request for one-off permission for a banner on Caley Green for the Mill Street Deli until 2nd January was approved subject to a satisfactory risk assessment and proof of public liability insurance. It was noted The Anchor have a banner on display currently and Sam Treharne agreed to discuss with them the arrangements for the future.

A bench has been installed on the Fairfield Recreation Ground, believed to be from Nayland House for their residents. This will need to be checked for safety and potentially installed properly. It was agreed to contact Nayland House and offer to obtain an assessment/quote from our grounds maintenance contractors.

A site meeting with our grounds maintenance contractors will be arranged to finalise the specification and quote for work required along Candy Lane.

Use of Fairdield Drive was discussed. The surveyor for the Diocese (who own the drive) are checking with the land registry. Legalities and other concerns would be involved. The PC need to maintain the charitable aims of Fairfield which is recreation.

It was agreed for Sam Treharne to follow up with Woodland Corner regarding their suggestion regarding further parking spaces along Fairfield drive. It was anticipated further discussions will be needed in the future in this regard.

ALLOTMENTS

All the vacant plots had been let and rents were being received for the current period. The condition of plots will be an agenda item in February; to review their condition and agree actions regarding any neglected plots. It was agreed to respond to the Conservation Society representative about the suggestion to re-locate the old scout hut seeking further information.

IN BRIEF

It was agreed to seek further details regarding the use of the Thermal Imaging camera/project; Owen Brown is happy to represent the PC in this regard.

The PC streetlights will mirror SCC lights in remaining on all night on both Christmas Eve and New Years Eve.

The vacancy for a new Footpath Warden from May 2025 have been promoted in the Community Times and local Facebook.

PARISH COUNCIL

Gerry Battye chaired the meeting. Adam Birchweaver and Tim Leach have resigned from the PC.

PUBLIC FORUM

lain Wright was pleased to advise that the National Lottery Community Fund has granted, with conditions, a sum of £275 for the roof replacement and upgrade works.

Following an update from Matthew Lee (Suffolk CC) for the Community Times Lorraine Brooks asked if, as she requested previously, the PC had written to the Environment Agency in support of Matthew Lee's permit application to reduce the wall of reeds at Caley Green as they are dragging their heels processing a permit. The PC wrote to Matthew Lee expressing their support, and will now ask him whether their contacting the EA would be helpful.

DISTRICT COUNCILLOR

Isabelle Reece said a new name plate and posts have been ordered to replace the missing name sign at the bottom of Campions Hill. The Heycroft Way sign, pulled up during works by Anglian Water, has been replaced. An issue at Harper's Estate garages has been dealt with. The issue regarding damage to the old burial ground wall is ongoing.

Her report included that Babergh District Council Leader, Deborah Saw's response to the Government's White Paper on Devolution had been decidedly reserved but has since indicated her support for Devolution.

Babergh and Mid Suffolk District Councils say a huge rise in house building requirements set by the Government has left no option but to review their Joint Local Plan. Parishes are urged to develop up-to-date Neighbourhood Development Plans, to give their communities statutory influence to shape how their local area develops.

DEVOLUTION

Councillors observed reports on Devolution - transference of power from central government to local government – by our District and County Councillor with interest.

84 BUS ROUTE

Councillors unanimously support Stoke by Nayland PC who are making a case for the route 84 service to be the primary route for Sudbury to Colchester services, instead of the 784 service which runs along the A134. The 84 service is more accessible and provides for a greater population.

HIGHWAYS

Dawn Harris suggested asking the grounds maintenance contractors to quote for spraying the A134 by-pass islands with weedkiller twice per year and incorporate it into their schedule. Councillors agreed in principal, subject to the cost; it was delegated to the Clerk and Chair to take this forward.

Fly tipping on Stoke Road, near the Nayland sign, has been reported.

PLANNING

Councillors heard that Babergh had no objections at **16 Court Street** [DC/24/04752] for listed building consent to create a WC on the first floor; or at **72 - 78 Bear Street** [DC/24/05478] for discharge of conditions [for DC/24/03738] condition 4 Biodiversity Enhancement Layout.

Between meetings to meet Babergh's deadline councillors had no objections at **The Willows, Wiston Road** [DC/24/04272] for erection of single storey rear extension.

Discussing recent applications councillors had no objections at **Star House 83 Bear Street** [DC/24/04756] for listed building consent for the removal of a fireplace, part replacement of the frontage and excavation around the fireplace to deal with an oil leak from the supply line and remedial works.

Discussing an application at **Vine House 1 Court Street** [DC/25/00057] for construction of a shed a query regarding the hard standing was raised. Further comments are awaited; the clerk will summarise councillors' comments and submit them ahead of Babergh's deadline.

Regarding an Appeal application at **11 High Street** [DC/24/04395] listed building consent for retention of pub sign bracket without a sign the majority of councillors still had no objections.

Councillors will meet to view further Webinar recordings of planning training sessions.

The topic of a Neighbourhood Plan was raised as the parish would be stronger with one and without one the parish is missing out on the higher rate of CIL money (Community Infrastructure Levy). This will be an Agenda item next month.

COMMUNITY LED HOUSING

Tricia Fuller said she will be attending a meeting of the Lady Anne Windsor Charity to find about more about a proposed housing project for 12 acres of land off Plough Lane in Leavenheath.

Councillors were reminded that when the PC instigated the local needs housing in Wiston Road being built the process had gone very smoothly and the residents have been happy in their homes.

RECREATION AND OPEN SPACES

Following a site meeting with grounds maintenance contractors Dawn Harris reported that less work than originally thought was required along Candy Lane. The Clerk will ask them to requite on this. Work needs to be carried out before bird's nesting season.

OLD SCOUT HUT

Following an appeal for suggestions for potential uses for the old scout hut adjacent the burial ground there had been one letter of response suggesting some options in saving the hut which has some historical significance and is on the Local List. The hut was gifted to Nayland Scouts, which no longer exist, but it sits on land owned by Tendring Estate who do not wish to maintain it.

Suggestions included moving it to the allotment field or the new burial ground. No definite viable future use for the hut or proposal to take responsibility has been identified. Moving the hut would incur costs and future maintenance. After some discussion it was agreed that this is not something the PC could be involved with; they are just the messengers in this instance, so will pass the letter on to Tendring Hall Estates.

IN BRIEF

Gerry Battye has reported SCC's No 24 streetlight on Elm Grove as it has been hit by a vehicle and demolished.

The finance precept form for Charging Authority for 2024-25 was completed and signed.

The village hall garden spring working party with be on Saturday 5th April.

An old tree in the Babergh burial ground which came down during Storm Darragh has been reported.

It was agreed that the advertisement for a Footpath Warden would be repeated in the Community Times.



COMMUNITY COUNCIL REPORT

Meeting: 6th January 2025 Chair: Rachel Hitchcock 07788 954309 Full minutes available at: www.naylandcommunitycouncil.org.uk

Rachel Hitchcock welcomed members to the meeting.

Executive Committee: As always we welcome new members to join the team – please spread an encouraging word to anyone who may be interested in joining us. It is an enjoyable friendly village committee that provides positive events and facilities for the community. Contact Rachel on 07788 954309 or rachel_hitchcock @hotmail.com if you would like to know more.

Fundraising Activities/Events: The idea of a Barn Dance was suggested to celebrate the CC's 60th anniversary in 2026. It was agreed that this could be a nice family event but that we can consider further nearer the time.

Community Defibrillator (AED): AEDs are located at the Village Hall and at the Fire Station. The AED at the Village Hall is managed by the CC and regularly checked.

Regarding the proposed public access AED in Wiston. Community Heartbeat Trust (CHT) confirmed a defibrillator could operate without a power supply. The cost would be in the region £2,600; the PC have agreed to contribute 50% of the cost (approx £1,300) via CIL (Community Infrastructure Levy) funding. A location by the Parish Council noticeboard in Wiston is being considered; the PC are writing to a nearby householder to advise of the proposal.

Adam Lunn has liaised with Jenny Taylor at the Fire Station about the need for the Fire Station defibrillator to be registered with the British Heart Foundation Scheme and she is going to raise this at their meeting on Thursday. Adam is going to reiterate the importance of this for us to be able to proceed with locating the Wiston defibrillator and the importance of it being checked regularly (as we do with the Village Hall one). He will keep us updated.

Online Ticketing Facility: NaylandEvents.org – This is extremely useful for selling tickets to village events. If village organisations wish to use this facility to sell tickets for their events contact Justin Dowding at jpdowding@gmail.com.

Village Hall Gardening Morning: The spring session will be on 5th April from 9am with refreshments. Chris Thompson agreed unveiling the plague to Ken Willingale would be a good idea.

Community Involvement: Ideas to help raise participation in village groups and events are welcome. Please let Lorraine know if you would like to include an appeal under '**Volunteer Vacancies**' for committee members or volunteers.

Resident Volunteer List: This is a list of residents prepared to assist other residents with collection of prescriptions or errands. If anyone requires assistance or could give assistance if needed please contact Lorraine.

Plaque to mark the contribution of Ken Willingale: Members had agreed a plaque to commemorate the contribution of Ken Willingale to the CC and for this to incorporate an existing tribute of his wife Olive in the HortSoc section of the village hall garden. Tony Fryer has produced an engraved slate plaque mounted on an oak backing at no cost. The CC are extremely grateful to Tony for doing this. He will drop it to Trevor Smy who will install it on the existing post; it will be officially unveiled during the village hall garden working party on 5th April.

Recent Activities:

Bonfire Night: *5th November.* It was a huge success and raised an incredible £4,816. Rachel expressed thanks to the many volunteers who help make the event such a success. She has booked Firework Crazy again for 5th November next year.

Remembrance Service: Claire Buller said it was an honour to lay a wreath on behalf of the CC. The organisations laying a wreath paraded behind the flag bearer (Kathy Hunt) to the war memorial. After the last wreath was placed on the war memorial a bugler sounded the last post followed by Andrew Gowen reading a Remembrance verse. It was a very moving experience.

Christmas Fayre: 30th November. Thank you so much to everyone who was involved in this with special mention to Father Christmas, the Nayland Primary School performers and Vicki's family who helped with set up and manned the refreshments.

We had lots of stallholders and had lovely feedback from them all. **Christmas Trail:** *Advent Windows, Christmas Tree Trail & Wreath Competition.* Elaine Muskett won the wreath competition. These activities received many positive comments. Thanks to Lorraine for putting together, and to all who portionated. These were other

for putting together and to all who participated. There were other lovely festive displays around the village. Bear and Fish were visiting and provided a lovely display.

Due to dwindling numbers for the wreath competition it was suggested that an alternative competition might be more popular.

Village Christmas Tree: Many thanks to Claire Buller for organising the village tree and to Claire and the team for putting it up despite the, once again, inclement weather conditions! The tree looked spectacular and received many compliments.

Father Christmas Visits Nayland: 24th December Tour of Nayland in George Pratt's vintage tractor and decorated trailer, driven by his father Jim. There were many comments of how lovely this activity was. There was a large crowd waiting for them at the Christmas tree and they were mobbed at Caley Green. Over 100 bags of chocolate coins were given out to children. Many thanks to Claire, Wayne, George and Jim.

TREASURER'S REPORT: Matt Cable gave his report on finances to 6th January. Please note these results are preliminary and awaiting certain income and expense items.

Breakdown of profits: Community Times £1,080, Bonfire Night £4,852, Quiz £664, Village Calendar £717, Christmas Fayre £283. Grants paid: Nayland Village Choir £1,500, Nayland School Choir £400, Baby & Toddler Group £300.

Expenses: £900 for path maintenance, £1,045 for new water level gauge, £446 for Christmas activities, £1,116 for central costs including insurance for the year.

Current Position: The accounts show reserves of £28,822 represented by Deposit a/c £11,748, Current a/c £16,402, Cash £663. We hold £144 for the RBL Services Fund and grants are pending for: VH roof £10,000.00 and Lizzie's Fund £153. Other accrued expenses total £100 and there is £476 of accrued income. **Therefore unencumbered assets are £18,902**.

GRANTS & DONATIONS:

Nayland Village Hall: £10,000 towards the Replacement Roof Project. The VHMC have applied for grants from the National Lottery and match funding from different sources which is a requirement of the National Lottery bid. The VHMC have asked the CC for a further £10,000 in addition to the £10,000 already committed, subject to the National Lottery grant approval - this was agreed.

Nayland Bear: Contribution towards the cost of batteries and decorations for the various seasonal displays. It was agreed to contribute £100.

Permissive footpath maintenance: David Slater has asked Danny Thurlow to look at the soggy stretch of footpath between Court Knoll and the Allotment Field to see whether a similar solution to that on Nayland Meadow footpath would be viable and if so how much it might cost. He will let us know once he has the details. Once we have costs and idea of the best solution it was suggested that we could perhaps approach the Parish Council and potentially Tendring Estate with regard to contributing. (Obviously any solution would need to be approved by Tendring too). The Conservation Society may also be interested in this as the stretch they maintained might also benefit.

Community Times & Websites: Lorraine Brooks thanked all for contributing to recent issues, adding we are heading towards another deadline.

Village Calendar: Lorraine Brooks said this year's sales are currently 120 calendars with profit to date £717 (£185 of which is for 2023 late sales). To add to this there will be a few sales from the Choir [£56 for 8 calendars], Wednesday Coffee Mornings and there will no doubt be some late sales.

It was agreed that it would be good to produce another calendar; it is still well received and a valuable fundraiser thanks to Lorraine and Wendy's efforts for which the CC are very grateful.

Forthcoming Activities:

Fun Village Quiz: *Friday 7th February.* Rachel is leading. The quiz is in hand. Jo Metson has kindly offered to help on the evening and Vicki Sargent will assist on the raffle. Raffle prizes are welcome.

AGM: *Monday 3rd March* with VHMC AGM on the same evening. The CC at 7.30pm (Exec 7pm) and VHMC at 8.15pm. **SOCIETY REPORTS**

HortSoc: Trevor Smy said the Spring Show will be on Saturday 22nd March; the AGM and Fun Quiz with horticulture in mind on 15th April and the Morning Market on 10th May. They are pleased to be able to have a Summer Garden Party again this year which will be on 11th July and the Flower Show will be on 2nd August.

Friends of Caley Green: Sally Dalton reported the willow tree which came down during Storm Darragh in early December has been dealt with but some of the wood remains stacked on the Green. Winter activity on the Green has been much the same as usual; there was a fisherman who camped overnight in early January and a lady who braved the cold to take a dip on New Year's Day. The swans have been toing and froing.

First Responders: Adam Lunn said they provided training for the Great Horkesley Guides in basic life support; they welcome requests from all community groups for the basic life support sessions. Over 40 people attended Dr Anthony Roberts' recital of *A Christmas Carol*, with Jamie Cunliffe on the piano; the event raised £424.32. They have secured the status of 'Chosen Charity' during the upcoming year, for two local community groups: Men's Senior Team at Stoke-by-Nayland Golf Club, and Springwood Sun Club, West Bergholt. They are grateful to St James' Church PCC for the generous donation of half of their Christmas collection. Responders are only deployable by the NHS Emergency Operations Centre to 999 calls. This is for the safety of the volunteers and patients, and to ensure that our volunteers are utilised to best meet the demands of the ambulance service.

St James Church: Kathy Hunt reported Christmas was busy as usual and services well attended including the Christmas morning communion singing to accompany 'on-line' music. The traditional nine lessons and carols service was full to capacity. Many thanks are due to all those who helped with these events. Littlegarth and Nayland Primary schools each held their own lovely carol services; a rendition of a verse of 'Silent Night' in sign language was particularly moving. The normal service pattern has returned and the Wednesday coffee mornings resume in mid January.

Parish Council: Laura Erith reported the remaining wood from the fallen tree on Caley Green will be dealt with in due course; they have agreed to increase their financial support for the village hall roof so hope that the target can be met subject to the lottery money and grants; they further supported the food bank over the Christmas period; there is no progress regarding the possibility of a community led housing project; ground works have begun on the site adjacent Nags Corner for 5 dwellings so CIL money will be payable. No solutions have been found regarding parking issues and access on Fairfield Drive relating to Woodland Corner; planning permission for a dwelling adjacent to the cemetery may add to the issues.

Royal British Legion: Robert Dossor reported they had a very successful 2024 with visits to WW2 airfields and Stephen Walters & Sons silk mill in Sudbury. Their Poppy Appeal raised over £3,500 and they heartily thank all contributors to this most important annual fund raiser. For 2025 dates or meetings with be Mondays: 10th March, 16th June, 1st September and the AGM on 24th November. They hope to have at least one external visit and there will be talks from local speakers and hopefully a couple of guests. 2025 is the 80th Anniversary of both VE-Day and VJ-Day and they hope to have some joint events with the Community Council and Nayland Choir in September.

Conservation Society: Mike Hunter reported their programme of speakers this year begins with an additional talk on *'House Martins'* on Wednesday 22nd January at 7.30 pm. The speaker

is Martin Tickler who is a member of the Suffolk Bird Group. As usual everyone is welcome to attend. At the AGM in March, Professor Jules Pretty will speak about how we can work together to solve the climate and conservation crisis. In conjunction with the Royal British Legion we hope to arrange a visit to Ingatestone Hall later in the year. Open Gardens will take place on 8th June this year and as usual we are looking for as many garden openers as possible. If anyone is tempted please do not hesitate to contact Mike Hunter.

Nayland Meadow: David Slater said the riverside section of the completed circuit was reopened on time at the end of November and has since then provided a level, clean and dry surface to walk on. We regret that there is much more plastic grid exposed than intended because the grass seed mixture used frustratingly failed to take advantage of the excellent growing conditions this autumn. We hope to remedy this by reseeding in the spring, as our intention has always been to create the 'least urbanised' all weather path possible.

Art Group: Kathryn Niven reported that before the Christmas break they went to the Blue Owl pottery to paint Christmas decorations. They continued to explore colour mixing with different shades of the primary colours and used a scene from the Nayland calendar as inspiration for landscape painting. They have used Nayland calendar pictures before and enjoy recreating local scenes. After a meal at The Crown, they had a Christmas break but are looking forward to re-starting on 8th January.

Village Hall: Iain Wright said he is hopeful that the National Lottery bid for half the funds required will be successful. If that is the case then the next step will be to secure funding from Babergh. Assuming funding is secured, once work commences it will be done externally so that the hall can remain open throughout.

AOB: Battery Recycling: The suggestion of introducing another location for battery recycling in the village was discussed. It was highlighted that when this was attempted before it became unmanageable due to the need for volunteers to regularly take quantities of batteries to e.g. the tip which wasn't always able to receive them. It was suggested that all supermarkets now had battery recycling points which reduced need for a point in the village and it was also mentioned that some supermarkets (Tesco and Sainsburys) also take batteries with home deliveries. We will research and put a brief note in Community Times about where batteries can be recycled locally.

Noticboards: Rachel Hitchcock will contact Bryn Hurren for a quote to replace the CC noticeboard. When we hopefully have the go ahead to install the defibrillator by the PC noticeboard at Wiston she will pass on details should they wish to take the opportunity to refurbish their noticeboard .

RIVER WATCH

WATER LEVELS

There has been no real need to refer to the water level gauge at Caley Green as levels have not been outside the 'norm' for the season.

Should you feel there is an issue use the above sea level measurement to report to the EA hotline, and Lorraine would be pleased to be advised in order to keep a note of incidents (details as above).

WATER QUALITY & SEWAGE

There is currently no news on water quality and testing results.

REED & VEGETATION GROWTH

The situation with reeds around the Horseshoe weir (and other areas of the river through Nayland) remains disgraceful. The EA are the riparian owners around the weir.

A nearby resident recently contacted the EA requesting either work is carried out or consideration given to other options towards a solution. The EA's response says:

"There is insufficient flood risk to people and property for us to justify carrying out maintenance work at this asset. This also means that it is unlikely to attract funding for any future works. It should be noted that as our powers and responsibilities are focussed on our priority from Government to manage flood risk to people and property, we must prioritise our works where the flood risk is the highest.

As previously explained due to the Nayland flood relief channel, reed cutting is no longer needed in the area for flood risk. This is the same for carrying out a desilt.

We are actively encouraging communities to not see dredging and desilting as standalone solutions to reducing flood risk.

We have, again, considered carrying out a limited reed cut and weed removal exercise regarding riparian owner responsibilities immediately around the Nayland weir. Our position remains the same that we do not believe there is a need to carry out such work at this time.

The presence of the reeds and in-channel weed growth are an integral part of a healthy river ecosystem. A <u>fringe of reeds and marginal plants</u> is vital to provide food and cover for wildlife including protected species and to shade and oxygenate the river.

Our navigation team cut reeds and remove weed in the area to <u>maintain a navigable channel</u> and not for the purpose of amenity. The Truxor therefore cuts the middle of the channel and not the reed beds around the edges of the weir.

We understand from colleagues that the area has a <u>local population of water voles</u>, any proposed works would require serious consideration and appropriate permissions."

Underlined in the above are some points which could be argued as this reply does not match what residents locally believe.

'Insufficient flood risk': houses may not be at risk currently but the way the fields flood has certainly altered since 2005 when the EA ceased proper management of the river.

'Desilting': the EA's own booklets state that reeds will spread rapidly in shallow and silted areas. It is common sense that if a body of water is full with silt it will hold less water. There is an 8 foot depth of silt in some areas of the river.

'Fringe of reeds': if only we had a 'fringe'! It is somewhat more than that through Nayland! It encroaches more than half way across the river in places

'Navigable channel': Only very narrow craft can navigate through Nayland; gone are the days of residents taking their families out in a rowing boat.

'Water voles': of course it is food news that water voles, and other wildlife have a healthy population. However, the water voles will not be making burrows into the concrete weir! Water voles live in burrows which can be very complex and consist of nesting and nursing chambers, with two entrances, one on the bank and one underwater.

Nor will they be setting up home in the riverbank at Caley Green among the wall of reeds as there is no bank to speak of; the reeds just grow into the shallow riverside, where the water level sometimes rises to. Water vole may visit these locations but careful management of the reeds with not disrupt the population.

So we can only conclude, as some EA employees have said off the

record, that the real reason is funding restrictions. Even that does not stand up as there have been offers of private funding to reduce the reeds at the weir, and at Caley Green Suffolk County Council applied for a permit to reduce the wall of reeds on their land some months ago but still await a response. The reeds here have encroached more than half way across the river.

The EA have claimed various excuses for the way they manage (or don't manage) the river here. One relates to their: duties under the 1977 Anglian Water Authority Act section 8 which states: "The Authority" shall take such steps as are reasonably practicable to maintain the main navigation channels and navigation works of the waterways specified in Schedule I to this Act to at least as good a standard for the purpose of navigation by pleasure boats as that to which they were maintained in the period of nine months immediately preceding 8th December, 1975."

Another resident has been in correspondence with the EA in this regard, but making little progress. It is very frustrating!

WILDFOWL & SWANS

As many will know the Nayland cob swan (ring No F4GV) has an injured wing; advice sought recommended no action but to continue monitoring. He has appeared to sit on the bank for longer periods lately so close monitoring will continue.

Other swans have been coming and going to the river and the Meadow pond. A few geese have called by and Little Egret and Cormorants have been seen.

NAVIGATION

The EA issued warnings on 12th November that large trees are restricting navigation in Nayland between the weir and Abel Bridge. The situation doesn't appear to have changed.

THE LONG REED BED

The long running saga regarding reduction of the enormous and expanding wall of reeds along Caley Green continues still! SCC have the funds in place, a contractor ready to undertake the work; the delay is with the EA who are dragging their heels granting a permit. The season whereby this work can be undertaken is rapidly passing.

FLYTIPPING: HARPERS HILL WILDLIFE SITE

It was astonishing last year that flytipping of garden waste occurred regularly on the Harpers Hill county wildlife site - presumably by a local resident/s. It is an offence to do so. An eye will be kept on the situation this year - if you see anyone depositing waste please report it and also notify the Parish Council.

THE RIVER AS AN AMENITY

With the days gradually getting longer and signs of spring arriving all around us it perhaps time to get excited about the prospect of outdoor activities. This does bring with it a few rules and regulations to be aware of....

RIVER CRAFT

All craft must be registered to take to the water on any part of the Inland Waterway network of England.

The **River Stour Trust** can issue craft registrations. Alternatively, membership of **British Canoeing** includes a licence - but it covers the member and not the craft. Join at https://www.britishcanoeing.org.uk/

FISHING

The closed season, when you cannot fish on rivers and streams, is 15th March to 15th June 2024. At any time of year a rod licence must be carried.

Although recently Caley Green and the river have been used far less than during warmer months there have been some dedicated river craft users and fisherfolk. One fisherman camped overnight on a cold evening and a brave lady took a dip in the river on a chilly day after Christmas. Many thanks to Jan Verrall for the photo of the tent complete with a warming fire. (It is the case however that camping is not permitted on the Green)







Thanks to Darius Laws for these fabulous frosty scenes captured in January. Court Knoll, with its frozen moat looks magical in the frost. On the allotment field if you look closely you can see where other allotments were situated in the past.

Romantic, parasitic and poisonous... perhaps we should nickname this the 'kissing tree'.

Mistletoes does produce own food via photosynthesis but takes minerals

and water from the host tree. Their white berries are less sought after than brighter coloured berries; they are an important food source for the mistle thrush and visiting redwings and fieldfares.





Another Willow was severely damaged at Caley Green, this time during Storm Darragh. It blocked Navigation on the river but was promptly dealt with by Suffolk CC. However, their contractors failed to remove all the debris from the Green. The Parish Council are chasing up its removal with SCC. Unfortunately it may be necessary in due course to fell the whole tree as the damage remains considerable. It's always so sad to lose trees, especially on Caley Green.



Antony Day spotted this debris in the old section of the Burial Ground when an old tree came down during Storm Darragh. Babergh DC are aware.

Martin Wright found that at least a dozen used bottles were floating in Mill Lade by the Mill Street bridge. Whether they were tossed into the river, or have floated downstream is not known. But a reminder... please dispose of your rubbish appropriately!

Once they were back in the village the Rev. Tony Bickersteth was presented with a cheque for more than £70, part of the money raised by their efforts.


The money will go to the St. James' Church restoration fund and the first phase of work will start on the roof this autumn, at a cost of £50,000.


The next Village Lunch will be held on Wednesday 9th April in the

Most pharmacies can help you with seven conditions without needing a GP appointment, these are:

Sinusitis (adults & children aged 12 years+)
Sore Throat (adults & children aged 5 years+)
Earache (children & young adults aged 1-17 years)
Infected insect bite (adults and children aged 1+)

Impetigo (adults & children aged 1+)
Shingles (adults aged 18+)
Urinary tract infection (Women aged 16-64)

We had just over 40 people attend the Christmas fundraising event. Dr Anthony

Roberts gave a moving recital of A Christmas Carol, supported by Jamie Cunliffe on the piano.

We were kindly donated the hall hire by the Community Council, and raffle prizes from Stoke-by-Nayland Resort (Golf club), Rushbanks Farm Campsite, and The Anchor Inn. The event raised £424.32.

We are grateful to St James' Church Council for the generous donation of half of their Christmas collection.

October, November and December figures: As a group we volunteered 622 hours and attended 11 calls. We also trained 10 people in basic life support.



Community First Responders (or CFRs for short) are volunteers who respond to life threatening emergencies in theirlocal communities. They are trained by the East of England Ambulance Service NHS Trust (EEAST) to a nationally recognised qualification. Our purpose is to bridge the gap between the 999 call being made, and the ambulance arriving. For the most serious calls, emergency ambulances aim to arrive between 8 and 18 minutes. As our volunteers live or work within the community, they aim to be with you in half this time.

What types of calls do CFRs attend?

CFRs are usually reserved for attending the two highest levels of calls the ambulance service have, Category 1 lifethreatening injuries and illnesses, and Category 2 non-life-threatening emergency calls. These include cardiac or respiratory arrests, anaphylaxis, strokes, seizures, chokings, and unresponsive patients.

Who are CFRs?

There are currently 5 qualified CFRs responding from the Nayland group, with another volunteer trained and waiting to go through the onboarding processes. CFRs don't need previous medical training, as this is provided. Our group includes a university communications manager, a surveyor, and a local farmer, all responding while at home or working in the area.

Are CFRs paid?

No. Our volunteers receive no payments from the NHS while responding, training or fundraising.

How are CFRs deployed?

Our volunteers are equipped with a dedicated smart phone that is linked directly to the EEAST Emergency Operations Centre by way of an app. We can only be deployed by the ambulance control room, and you should not attempt to contact our volunteers yourself. All 999 calls, regardless of what ambulance resource is sent, are risk assessed for scene safety, triaged for urgency, and evaluated so that the right skills can be sent to the right call. Any contact details publicly listed for our volunteers are for administration purposes only.

Do you only respond in Nayland?

Once we are booked on, the emergency dispatchers in the control room can view our live location and assign us to medical emergencies within 5 miles of our current location.

Although the group is called the "Nayland CFRs" we attend calls in Bures, Assington, Boxford, Leavenheath, Polstead, Stoke-by-Nayland, Boxted, Wormingford, Little Horkesley, Great Horkesley, Horkesley Heath and West Bergholt.

Do you receive funding?

CFR groups receive no direct funding from the NHS Trusts. In the East of England, they are given some support by the East of England Ambulance Service Charity who now fund their training, some uniform, and certain items of equipment. As well as responding, our volunteers also give up their time to raise funds for our charity. 

Nayland with Wissington Crime Review 18/11/24 – 09/01/25:

Unfortunately the burglaries have continued across a wide area of Suffolk and the Nayland with Wissington area has been targeted more than some other areas. The offences in this period include two house burglaries, one attempted house burglary and two shed/outbuilding burglaries, areas affected this time include Newlands Lane, Bures Road, Harpers Hill and Bear Street. The house burglaries are all

likely to have occurred in the evenings. The residents of Nayland need to continue to be vigilant and security conscious. Police patrols in the Nayland area have already increased and I will continue to personally patrol. Police investigations and activity resulted in 4 people being arrested late November for burglary and an extensive search recovered a lot of suspected stolen items, they were arrested a few miles away from Hadleigh. Other reported crime includes an assault and a public order offence. In addition to those, there have been a few incidents resulting in a number of child and/or adult welfare referrals.

In the last edition of this publication, I gave some theft prevention advice for your home, so here are some additional tips for securing your sheds and garages:

- Always keep your shed or garage locked
- Use dusk to dawn lights
- Use coach bolts to fasten hinged and hasps and staples or pad bar
- · Fit anchor points to secure items to
- · Fit an alarm and use it
- · Avoid storing high value items in the shed
- · Cover windows in the shed
- Use two good quality closed shackle padlocks to secure the shed door
- Always lock internal doors between the garage and house
- · Add ground mounted locking bars to enhance security on 'up and over' garage doors
- Use two good quality closed shackled padlocks or a 5 lever mortice and rim lock (BS3621) to secure garage doors
- · Lock all garage windows
- Try to have it covered by a CCTV system
- · Attach a cheap battery powered alarm to an item of value with fishing wire, when the suspect moves it, the alarm will sound

In addition to this, do not leave anything of value on display in your vehicles, preferable do not leave anything of value in your vehicle at all. Remember to note serial numbers of your property and security mark if possible, as this helps us identify the items and adds to the evidence if recovered. Please also keep your back door locked even if you are at home in the evening. If you see anyone around acting suspiciously, please call police.

I will be in the **Nayland Village Hall on Saturday 1st February between 9:30-midday** if you need any advice, I have security marker pens for your property, advice leaflets, fingerprint keyrings, colouring sheets, stickers and also uniform that children can try on.

JOIN YOUR CONSERVATION SOCIETY NEW MEMBERS ARE WELCOME

The Nayland with Wissington Conservation Society is a friendly organisation which holds several interesting speaker meetings each year as well as arranging an annual footpath walk, visits to historic houses and organising the very popular Nayland Open Gardens.

The Society was founded in 1974 and since then has achieved a great deal. The Society has commissioned four very interesting books on the history of the parish and has a huge archive of historic photographs which can also be viewed online.

NAYLAND WEATHER SUMMARY: November & December 2024 by David Lowe

November was about average temperature wise but was short on sun hrs and solar energy. Rainfall was just below average.

The standout event was the rapid switch from temperatures around freezing point on 20-22nd to 18.6°C on the 24th. This is the highest temperature that I have recorded in November since I started keeping records 17 years ago. Perhaps the most remarkable aspect of this was the temperature rise from 16°C at 18.00 on the 24th to 17.3°C at 22.15! There are plenty of days in July and August when the temperature is a good bit lower than that, at that time. All due to a rush of air up from the Canaries, ahead of an advancing cold front.

The mean temperature for the month was 8.2°C (7.95) with a low of 1.7°C (- 1.95). Lowest max was 3.2°C (5.25). There were 5 each of air, ground and grass frosts (ground average 4.8 and air, 3.06. On 2 days, the temperature failed to make 5 (1) and on 9, failed to make 10 (10.94). Days failing to make 15 were 29 (27.65).

Bright sun hours were 63.8 (81.53) third lowest over the 17 years record period, solar energy 1580 Ly (2171.76) the second lowest over the record period. Evapotranspiration was 14.5 mm (17.81), third lowest over the record period.

Rainfall was 54.4 mm (65.91). Highest rainfall in a day was 21.6 mm (16.29) and highest rainfall rate, 16.8 mm/hr (44.17). Only on one day was there over 10 and 20 mm of rain (1.64

and 0.23)

Mean wind speed was 4.2 mph (3.88) with highest daily average 11.6 (10.33) second highest. There were 3 days with a gust over 30 mph (2.53) and 1 over 35 mph (1.12). The predominant direction was W.

December was a mild, cloudy month with just below average rainfall.

Mean temperature was 7.6° C (5.78) the third highest over the 17 year record period. The max was 15 $^{\circ}$ C (13.61) and the lowest -0.4 $^{\circ}$ C (-3.52). the lowest max was 4.7 $^{\circ}$ C (2.85).

There was only 1 air frost (7). There were no days with a mean or max of less than 0°C (0.88 and 0.06 respectively). Only on one day did the temperature not reach 5°C (5.64) with 18 less than 10°C (20.35). 15°C was achieved once (0.29).

Bright sun hours were 28.8 (45.99) the second lowest over the 17 year period with solar energy also second lowest at 1180 Ly (1364.71). Evapotranspiration was 12.25 mm (13.1).

Monthly rain was 57.5 mm (62.35) with highest rainfall rate of 56mm/hr (36.98). there were 2 days with over 10 mm (1.29) max only 3 days apart with highest of 15.6 mm.

Mean wind speed was 6.6 mph (4.49) with 4 days in succession with a mean of over 10 mph -7^{th} to 10^{th} . Highest gust was 43 mph, with 10 days over 30 mph (4.29) equal highest. Prevailing wind direction was WSW.

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THE BOURDALOUE, A NAYLAND ARTEFACT

At first glance you might think that the object in the photograph, made of blue and white china, looks like a large gravy boat but I have it on good authority that it was originally called a 'coach pot'. Back in the 18th century when transport was mainly by horse and carriage, gentlemen passengers dismounted to relieve themselves behind a tree while ladies stayed on the coach and used a coach pot, hidden under their long dresses.

The first known examples were made in Holland in about 1710 and later in other European countries. They were also made in the Far East and today the most sought after are Chinese, Japanese and Dutch. This one is British, dating from the

early 19th century. The pattern is known as Spotted Deer and it may have been made in Devon.

Another name for this pot is a Bourdaloue. Louis Bourdaloue was a 17th century French priest whose skills as an orator were so inspiring that women did not want to miss a single word of his long sermons and would sit throughout with these pots lodged within their long dresses in case of need.

Nowadays many churches have toilets but over the years this innovation has sometimes caused division within congregations. A press cutting in the 1980s referred to "Traditionalists of a certain church being offended by the prospect of worshippers seeking relief during sermons". In the same article a lady vicar described her difficulties when motoring on Sundays to several



churches without facilities. She said she often had to find relief behind a gravestone near the vestry door and suggested that perhaps a modern version of the Bourdaloue could be produced.

The pot in the photograph was given to us many years ago by a Nayland resident whose family lived in Nayland for over 200 years and I have often wondered if it was ever taken to St James' Church.

I suspect that large families in later years may have used these decorative pots as gravy boats, perhaps unaware of their original function. I have to say that we have never used ours for serving gravy. It stands on a shelf and has proved to be quite a conversation piece.


Huge congratulations and thanks to all involved, it really was a team effort.

NAYLAND VILLAGE HALL: ROOF UPGRADE



NAYLAND WITH WISSINGTON COMMUNITY TIMES

The Nayland with Wissington Village Hall roof has reached the end of its service life and will be replaced. The agreed replacement roof incorporates additional depth to accommodate increased roof non-combustible insulation, continuous roof membrane and Welsh slates. There will be photovoltaic panels incorporated within the replacement roof covering. The project will take four months approximately with scaffold around the outside of the Village Hall and a protective roof covering will be provided by additional scaffolding. Your Village Hall will remain open during the roof replacement works.

Good News

The National Lottery Community Fund has granted, with conditions, a sum of £275,305.00 for the roof replacement and upgrade works. Your Village Hall Management Committee are currently working with their Solicitor to comply with the conditions imposed by the National lottery.

The local funds has raised a total of £157,040. This is in addition to the fees remitted by the Architect, Project Manager and Structural Engineer.

The Matched funding requirement by the National Lottery Community Fund took into account the values of the remitted fees for professional services which formed part of the matched funding.

The Babergh District Council grants will be subject to their cabinet consideration on the 11th March.

The Village Hall Management Committee are grateful for the donations as listed in the adjacent Funding Thermometer, especially those from the local community.

The Village Hall management would like to thank the helpers for the fund raising events and those who helped with the applications to the National Lottery and Babergh District Council, the applications could not have been made without their help.

There were four tenders returned and the best returned tender returned that complied with the specification including the temporary roof protection was received from T J Evers.

Your Village Hall Management Committee has used all of the reserve funds available from the Village Hall reserves and substantial donations from both the Parish Council and the Community Council. There will be two events to help the requirement to build up a reserve fund for future maintenance and replacement of equipment.

Candlemas

Maybe you're reading this on the first Sunday of the month, 2nd February. In the past that used to be a big deal, inside the church and outside it. Candlemas, it was called.

We now take our Christmas decorations down on Twelfth Night, after 12 days of Christmas. But in the past we took them down after 40 days of Christmas, ie 2nd February.

The candles for use in the church for the year were blessed on that day. Remember what a big deal candles then were. Hence Candlemas.

In Scotland and northern England, Candlemas was one of the Quarter Days: the four dates in each year on which servants were hired, school terms started, and rents were due.

Like St. Swithun's day, 15th July, Candlemas was, and in some places still is, associated with weather forecasting:

St. Swithun's day if thou dost rain For forty days it will remain St. Swithun's day if thou be fair For forty days 'twill rain nae mare And

If Candlemas Day be fair and bright Winter will have another fight. If Candlemas Day brings cloud and rain, Winter won't come again.

So 2nd February is Groundhog Day. Which is very widely celebrated in the US, though it's been shown it's worse than useless at weather forecasting.

And it was cause for celebration generally, being half way between the shortest day and the Spring equinox. So it became, and in French-speaking Europe still is, a pancake day (Chandeleur (chandelle = candle)). Celebrated by people who are unaware of its Christian significance. Just like our Shrove Tuesday.

Supposedly started by Pope Gelasius I, around 500 AD, who had pancakes distributed to pilgrims arriving in Rome. Circular and golden, like the sun, they encouraged us to think of spring after the dark and cold of winter.

So could we in the church make more of Candlemas? It meets a human need for cheering up in the middle of winter.

Candles are now nice-to-haves, not the only source of light in darkness.

Nowadays Christmas starts so early, we're glad to forget it by Twelfth Night.

In England, the first Quarter Day is Lady Day, 25th March, the Feast of the Annunciation. Which is near enough Mothering Sunday – a good example of an ancient church celebration, commercialised and Disneyfied, but now to quite an extent reclaimed by the church.

A second Pancake Day wouldn't work. But a celebration needs to be associated with a greedy.

Liturgically, Candlemas is officially a Principal Feast, namely the Presentation of Christ in the Temple. But that obscure item of Jewish ritual is distastefully sexist if you pause to think about it. Much the best bit in the service is in the Gospel, the Nunc Dimittis, that single sentence, just 43 words. That speaks to us still. But since we have that every Morning and Evening Prayer, we don't associate it with 2nd February.

This 2nd February, we happen to have a celebration, in the form of two people being confirmed, by a Bishop. Let's try to build on that, and concoct a regular event, speaking to lay people, speaking of the prospect of Spring and new life even in the depths of wet and dull and depressing February. And associated with a greedy.

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
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
